Whereas, Appropriation has been made to the Police Department, by authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and the Comptroller authorized to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York, the proceeds thereof to be applied to the erection and equipment of a new station house, prison and stable for the Police Department for the 36th Precinct, and it appearing that there are certain special made articles specified to be used in the construction of the said station house, prison and stable,

Ordered, That in pursuance of the provisions of section 1554 of the Charter, application be and is hereby made to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for permission to contract for the same, and upon such permission being granted that they be incorporated in the specifications for the construction of said buildings, viz., 36th Precinct Station House:

Floor and Roof Construction—"Roebbling System B, Type 1," or hollow block tile arches, or Rapp fireproof construction, System B, or the Guy B. Waite, System A, or any other system for floors approved by the Department of Buildings and the architect. Vulcanite asphalt, or other roofing felt saturated with asphalt approved by the Architect as being equal thereto.

Stable Fittings—"J. L. Mott's Manufacture," or equal thereto, and approved by the Architect; stall floors and gutters to be Logan's sanitary horse stall floors and gutters, or equal thereto, and approved by the Architect.

Damp Proofing of Outside Walls—Antihydrine Resisting Paint, or other equally as good, and approved by the Architect.

Steel Cell Work—Van Dorn manufacture. Pauley patent round interlocking bar grating construction. Yale padlocks. Patley spring jail locks, or other goods equal thereto, and approved by the Architect.

Finishing Hardware—"Russell & Erwin," "Yale & Towne," "Corbin" or "Sargent," or other manufacture equally as good and approved by the Architect.

Sliding door hardware to be equal to "Corbin's."

Plumbing Fixtures—"Peck Brothers & Co." manufacture or other equally as good, and approved by the Architect.

Steam Heating—"Ideal" steam boiler of American Radiator Company make, or equal thereto, and approved by the Architect. Radiators to be of American Radiator manufacture, or equal thereto, and approved by the Architect. Radiator valves shall be of "Jenkins Brothers' Diamond Brand," or equally good, approved by the Architect. Riser valves to be of the Kennedy pattern, or equal thereto. Steam piping in cellar to be covered with Keasbey's Magnesia Covering, or equal thereto, and approved by the Architect. Boilers to be fed through a combined "Keily Pressure Regulator and Water Feeder," or equal thereto, as may be approved by the Architect.

## DEPARTMENT OF CORRECTION.

## REPORT OF TRANSACTIONS, AUGUST 24 TO 30, 1903.

## Communications Received.

From Civil Service Commission—Certifying names on eligible list for position of Resident Physician on Riker's Island. Dr. Augustin T. Kingston appointed. Stating that reports of Departmental Board of Examiners for non-competitive positions, under dates of August 3 and 24, have been approved. On file. Inclosing communication received from Thomas Carpenter in reference to assignment of persons in labor class to the performance of duties of keepers in the Department of Correction. Letter acknowledged. The services of mechanics in the Department are properly utilized.

From Finance Department—Inclosing copies of reports made by Mr. George B. Post, Consulting Architect, and by Messrs. R. W. Hunt & Co., in the matter of final payment on the contract of the Armstrong & Bolton Company, for steam plant, etc., at the new City Prison, Centre, Leonard and Franklin streets, and stating that "the reports seem to be conclusive, and justify the position taken by the Department of Finance in its letter" of July 7, 1903, to the Commissioner of Correction. Copies of these reports transmitted to the sureties of the Armstrong & Bolton Company, with recommendation to give the matter immediate attention, as delay will result in further injury to plant. Returning proposal of Charles H. Heinsohn for lumber, with approval of the sureties. Award to be made and contracts drawn. Receipt for security deposits accompanying bids for supplies received on August 27, 1903.

From Corporation Counsel—In answer to request for an opinion regarding interpretation of sections 715, 716 and 717 of the new Charter, which sections provide that the Commissioner of Correction "may" appoint and grade as Matrons "certain persons employed in the prisons, jails, workhouses and places of detention under the jurisdiction of the Department"—expressing the opinion that the Commissioner of Correction may properly exercise his discretion in proceeding under these new sections of the Charter. Copy of opinion of the Counsel to the Corporation transmitted to Wilson M. Powell, Jr., counsel for the Women's Prison Association.

From the Department of Health—Stating that that Department will be glad to assist the Department of Correction in any way, and will (until arrangements can be made, later on), convey the Chaplains to Riker's Island on Sunday mornings. On file.

From Department of Docks and Ferries—Stating that request of Department of Correction for the erection of a pontoon float at the City Island dock will receive due consideration. On file.

From Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity—Stating that if as much gas is used during the next six months as has been used during the first half of the year 1903 the appropriation for lighting made to the Department for the current year will be exceeded by \$8,011.12. Less money was appropriated for 1903 than for 1902.

From Bureau of the Census, Washington, D. C.—Chief Statistician King asks for specimen pages from the Registers of the different institutions under charge of the Department of Correction, and incloses franked envelopes for the same. Specimen pages sent, as requested.

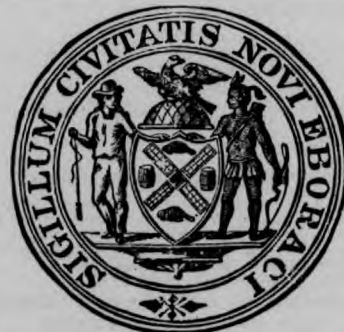

#### GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of the City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or to money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.
