## BOARD OF EXAMINERS.

November 14, 1905.

Present—Messrs. Walter Cook, Warren A. Conover, Charles Buek, Lewis Harding, Charles G. Smith, Edward F. Croker and William J. Fryer, Chairman.

Meeting called to order at 2 p. m.

On motion, minutes approved as read.

Appeal 51—Alteration 581 of 1905, premises No. 2505 Third avenue, The Bronx; George A. Boehm, appellant.

"Proposed alteration is unlawful. Section 105 of Code."

That the amount involved in such decision exceeds \$1,000.

That the second floor of the building be allowed to remain as it is at present, as follows:

Twenty-inch I-beams, 9 feet 10 inches O. C., across the building with 3-inch by 9-inch wood beams, 12 inches O. C., running fore and aft, all covered with rough and finished flooring. The entire under side of this framing is covered with a metal ceiling, including the flanges of the I-beams. The plaster of the side walls is brought down to brick fire stops at all points where wood beams occur.

Also that the third tier of beams be allowed to remain as at present, the construction being the same as above and the whole being covered underneath with a metal ceiling, including the flanges of the I-beams.

That the first floor is now fireproof, being constructed of I-beams and terra-cotta arches.

That all of the proposed construction is to be fireproof.

That the stairway from cellar to roof will be entirely fireproof.

That the partitions will be fireproof, and that the building will be equipped with a proper fire escape.

All meeting with the full requirements of the Department of Buildings with the exception of the construction of the second and third floors.

Mr. Boehm and Mr. R. C. Bullard appeared before the Board.

On motion, denied.

FOR THE WEEK ENDING NOVEMBER 25, 1905.

No. 779.

AN ORDINANCE providing for an issue of Corporate Stock in the sum of three hundred and forty-seven dollars and forty-eight cents (\$347.48) in addition to the amount heretofore authorized, to meet expenses in connection with the acquisition of a site for the Borough Hall of the Borough of Queens.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. The Board of Aldermen hereby approves of and concurs in the following resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment September 29, 1905, and authorizes the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York to the amount and for the purposes therein specified:

"Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 47 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York, to an amount not exceeding three hundred and forty-seven dollars and forty-eight cents (\$347.48), in addition to the amount heretofore authorized, to meet expenses in connection with the acquisition of a site for the Borough Hall of the Borough of Queens, which site is bounded by Court street, Thompson avenue and the Long Island Railroad, and adjoins the present Court-house on the east in said borough; and that when authority therefor shall have been obtained from the Board of Aldermen, the Comptroller is authorized to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York, in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, to an amount not exceeding three hundred and forty-seven dollars and forty-eight cents (\$347.48), the proceeds whereof to be applied to the purposes aforesaid."

Received by the President of the Board of Aldermen, October 2, 1905. Received in the Board of Aldermen, October 3, 1905, and referred to the Committee on Finance. October 31, 1905, by said Committee reported to the Board and laid over under the rule.

November 14, 1905, the Board of Aldermen having failed to pass upon the proposition within six weeks after the same was received, either by an affirmative vote or by a failure of a majority of all the members of the Board of Aldermen to vote against the same, therefore, in accordance with the provisions of section 48 of the Greater New York Charter, the proposition is deemed to be passed.

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 226 of the Greater New York Charter, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment makes this the Budget of The City of New York for the year one thousand nine hundred and six, being, first, the amounts estimated to be required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business of said City for the said year, including State taxes; and secondly, the amounts estimated to be required to pay the charges and expenses of the Counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond for the said year, amounting in the aggregate to the sum of one hundred and sixteen million eight hundred and five thousand four hundred and ninety dollars and thirty-seven cents (\$116,805,490.37).

Which was adopted by the following vote:

The Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen and the Presidents of the Boroughs of Manhattan, Brooklyn, The Bronx and Richmond—fifteen votes.

## FOR CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS.

All such appropriations being made subject to the following conditions:

1. The accounts of all charitable institutions receiving public moneys shall be so kept as to show receipts and disbursements in such form as shall be satisfactory to the Comptroller, showing the addresses of the parents, guardians, or nearest relatives of inmates, and other information designed to facilitate inquiry into their financial inability to provide for such inmates.

2. Moneys received from the City Treasury shall be used by such institutions only for recurring expenses of "care, support and maintenance."

3. All institutions receiving public moneys shall be at all reasonable times open to the visitation and inspection of duly authorized representatives of the Department of Public Charities and the Department of Finance.

4. Upon it appearing to the satisfaction of the Comptroller that it would be to the public interests to withhold payments to any charitable institution for which an appropriation has been made, he shall give written notice to such institution of his intention to apply to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for authority to so withhold such payments, and upon the determination of said Board that such payments should terminate, the right of any such institution to receive payment for services rendered thereafter shall thereupon cease.

5. Except where appropriations are made in bulk and not upon a per capita basis, no payment shall be made for inmates of private charitable institutions unless the same shall have been accepted by the proper Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities as a proper charge against the City, and, except in emergency cases, Commissioner of Charities shall not accept as proper charges against the City inmates capable of paying for their own support or for whose care adequate provision can be made in public institutions. The City shall not become liable for any payment to a charitable institution in excess of the appropriation which may have been made to such institution, notwithstanding any per capita rates of payment that may have been fixed for the inmates thereof.

6. All institutions receiving money from the City are required to state specifically the amount so received, as from the City Treasury, in their printed annual reports.

7. "That no money be paid to any private charitable institution which pays any salary to or gives any consideration, financial or of any kind, for services to, or that has any business dealing with, or secures goods or merchandise, directly or indirectly, from any officer or trustee or member of its Board of Managers."

8. Where the City is paying 50 per cent. and upwards of the cost of maintenance of an institution, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment requires representation in the board meetings of that institution, with the right of taking part in all business transactions.

This representation shall be through the Comptroller, who may attend any meeting, either in person or through a representative appointed by him, of which appointment the Comptroller will give written notice to the board of the institution.

9. The rates of payments to private charitable institutions, unless otherwise specially provided for, are fixed for the various classes of inmates as follows:

For infants under two (2) years of age, and in infants' hospitals also between the ages of two and five, per day.....	\$0 38
For dependent children, from two (2) to sixteen (16) years of age, per week.....	2 00
For delinquent children, per annum.....	110 00
For adult inmates of reformatories, committed by the Courts, per annum.....	110 00
For inmates in homes for fallen and friendless women, per annum.....	110 00

*For homeless mothers, nursing infants, per month.....	12 00
To hospitals for medical treatment, per day.....	60
To hospitals for surgical treatment, per day.....	80

That charitable institutions for children now carried in the Budget and not sending their inmates to the Public Schools, and not sharing in the Corporate School Fund, and not receiving Teachers and school supplies from the Board of Education, but giving in their own buildings secular education to the children resident in the institutions, shall be paid a per capita of 7 cents per day, five school days in the week, for each child receiving such instruction of four years of age and over during ten months in the year. This money to be paid under the authorization of section 230 of the Charter, but under the general conditions relating to institutions receiving Corporate School money, as provided in section 1154.

Notification to institutions carried in this Budget receiving children either from the Courts or through the Charity Department.

\* Institutions shall be paid \$18 for the care of the mother and child during fifteen days of her confinement, and for every day thereafter shall be paid at the rate of 38 cents per day for the support of the child, and also \$12 per month for the maintenance of the mother, if she remain in the institution nursing her own infant after the expiration of the fifteen days.



The Board of Estimate and Apportionment does not intend to pay for the maintenance of dependent and delinquent children in the same institution after December 31, 1906. To give opportunity for the necessary changes, the institutions caring for both these classes must separate them as soon after January 1, 1906, as is possible, and on such a basis or conditions as shall meet the approval of the Comptroller.

Dr. S. T. Armstrong, the General Medical Superintendent, reported as follows:

Since the last meeting of the Board, and in compliance with its directions, the hospital has been carefully inspected by a representative of the Fire Department, Mr. Thomas King, Acting Chief of Battalion in charge. His report, which is submitted herewith, virtually sustains the criticisms made by Ex-Fire-Chief Bonner, Advisory Member of the New York City Visiting Committee, State Charities Aid Association. Certain repairs, such as that to the elevator, and the improvement of the fire drill, have been attended to. The estimate of Mr. Jones, Supervising Engineer, showing that it will require \$34,335 to make the changes recommended by the Chief of the Fire Department, is herewith submitted. This matter is presented for your consideration. It would seem best to submit the entire question of the appropriation to the Board of Aldermen for its decision.

The sleeping quarters for the employees of this hospital are crowded to such an extent as to be unsanitary. All available room in the hospital has been carefully inspected to ascertain whether it was possible to find a suitable room that could be used as a dormitory. It will be feasible to transfer certain property stored in the old boiler house under the pathological laboratory to a room adjoining the prison ward. A metal ceiling could be placed in the old boiler house, the steam pipes raised, the walls painted, the windows made weather-tight, a new flooring put in and bath tubs and closets placed in the boiler room adjoining, for \$600. It is recommended that the necessary steps be taken to make this boiler room suitable for dormitory uses.

It is recommended that the General Medical Superintendent be directed to proceed to Boston on September 25 for the purpose of investigating the system of book-keeping and administration of the Boston hospitals, and for consultation with the hospital superintendents of the United States, who meet there on the 26th, 27th, 28th and 29th.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That an abstract of the reports from the representative of the Fire Department and the Advisory Member of the New York City Visiting Committee of the State Charities Aid Association be transmitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Board of Aldermen, together with a copy of the estimate showing that it will require thirty-five thousand dollars (\$35,000) to make the changes recommended, for such action as in their judgment is necessary.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That the recommendation of the General Medical Superintendent in regard to the dormitory be approved, and that he be authorized to prepare the necessary plans and estimates to convert the old boiler house into a suitable dormitory for some of the employees of the hospital.

On motion, duly seconded, it was

Resolved, That the General Medical Superintendent be directed to attend the conference of the hospital superintendents of the United States to be held in Boston on September 25, 26, 27, 28 and 29, and also to investigate the system of book-keeping and administration of the Boston City Hospital and the Massachusetts General Hospital.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.
