RAPID TRANSIT SUBWAY CONSTRUCTION CO.—RETURN OF \$1,000,000 DEPOSIT.

With reference to the application of the Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company for a certificate entitling it to the return of a deposit of One Million (\$1,000,000) Dollars presented to the Commission on May 5th, and referred to the Counsel and the Chief Engineer for a joint report, which report was presented to the Commission on May 15th, and in accordance therewith communications were addressed to the Comptroller of the City of New York and the Corporation Counsel thereof, asking as to pending claims growing out of the work on the Brooklyn subway, the Secretary stated that the Comptroller had replied under date of July 16th, transmitting a statement showing the liens and claims recorded in the Lien Docket of the Department of Finance against the contract for the construction of the Brooklyn-Manhattan Rapid Transit Railroad, and that the Corporation Counsel had under date of September 21st sent the following communication:

To the Public Service Commission for the First District:

SIR—A communication from your Board dated 15 May, was duly received. This communication was as follows:

"The Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company, the contractor for the construction of the Brooklyn-Manhattan Rapid Transit Railroad, lately opened, has requested from this Commission a certificate entitling it to the return of the sum of one million dollars (\$1,000,000) deposited by it as security for the proper performance of the contract for construction.

Before taking any action on this request, this Commission is desirous of learning what claims growing out of this work are now pending, and will be obliged if you will advise it as soon as practicable what matters, if any, are now pending in your office, together with any suggestions you may wish to make in the premises."

This letter was not answered at the time it was received as there were several conferences between your counsel and myself as to the matters referred to therein, and it was supposed that an answer might not be necessary, but in view of the somewhat wide range that the questions under discussion have taken, it would seem that an answer to this communication is at this time advisable. The subject referred to is the deposit to be made with the Comptroller under the provisions of Contract No. 2 for the construction and operation of Brooklyn-Manhattan Rapid Transit Railroad, which provides, among other things:

"Simultaneously with the execution of this contract, the contractor shall give security for the performance of his obligations both under the agreement for construction and under the lease, as follows:

1. For Construction: By depositing with the Comptroller the sum of One million dollars (\$1,000,000) in cash or in value of securities as the contractor shall elect. . . ."

This deposit was made in cash by the contractor.

In regard to that it is provided in the contract, among other things:

"If at any time when the contractor shall otherwise be entitled to a return of the said deposit there shall be pending any claim for damages or loss caused to others by the negligence, fault or default of the contractor, for which it shall be claimed that the City shall be liable, then and in that case the said deposit, or such part thereof as the Board shall prescribe shall, upon the requirement of the Board, be reserved by the Comptroller for a reasonable time, as security against such claims. And the amount of any such damages or costs paid by the City to others or for which the City shall be liable to others, shall be deducted from the said deposit before the same shall be returned to the contractor as hereinafter provided.

When the contractor shall have fully completed the construction and equipment of the railroad according to the terms of this contract and the operation of the same shall have begun pursuant to this contract, the Board shall so certify, and upon such certificate the Comptroller shall pay and deliver to the contractor the said deposit or so much thereof as shall not have been reserved or used or applied for any of the purposes above mentioned. . . ."

It would seem from the provisions quoted from the contract that the duty of determining the questions as to deductions from the deposit of One million dollars must be determined by the Public Service Commission for the First District, as the successor of the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners for the City of New York, and it is quite clear also that your Commission must determine the question as to whether or not the railroad has been constructed in compliance with the contract.

Since writing the foregoing, your letter of September 17th has been received from which I note that you have received from the Comptroller a statement showing the liens and claims recorded in the Lien Docket of the Department of Finance against the contract for the construction of the Brooklyn-Manhattan Rapid Transit Railroad. I assume that this statement answers the question addressed to me in the latter part of your original letter of May 15th. The proposed agreement sent to me for approval as to form, will be examined by this office and returned to you at the earliest possible moment.

CONTRACT NO. 2—MODIFYING AGREEMENT ALLOWING RETURN OF PORTION OF CASH DEPOSIT FOR CONSTRUCTION.

The Secretary thereupon presented a communication dated September 22, from Geo. S. Coleman, Counsel to the Commission, as follows:

Public Service Commission for the First District:

SIR—Referring to the application of the Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company for the return of the sum of \$1,000,000 deposited by it as security for proper construction of the Brooklyn-Manhattan Rapid Transit Railroad, I beg to advise you that a form of agreement has been drafted providing for the return of part of such deposit, which is copies, save for the amount of the amount of money to be retained in accordance with the suggestion in my communication of July 30, 1908. The Chief Engineer thinks that the sum of One Hundred and Fifteen Thousand Dollars (\$150,000) will cover contingencies and necessary repairs. In order to be on the safe side, I would suggest that One Hundred and Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$150,000) be retained for the present at least.

If this meets with the approval of the Commission, such amount may be inserted in the proposed agreement, and I would then suggest that resolutions be adopted in the form enclosed.

Upon motion, duly seconded, it was Resolved, That in the matter referred to by Counsel, One Hundred and Fifty Thousand Dollars (\$150,000) be retained.

Resolved, That the Chairman and Secretary be and they hereby are authorized to execute and deliver an agreement in the form following:

Agreement, made this _____ day of _____, in the year 1908, between The City of New York (hereinafter called "The City"), acting by the Public Service Commission for the First District (hereinafter called the "Commission"), party of the first part; Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company (hereinafter called the "Contractor"), party of the second part; and Interborough Rapid Transit Company (hereinafter called "Interborough Company"), party of the third part, Witnesseth:

Whereas, Heretofore and on or about the 21st day of July, 1902, the City, acting by the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners for The City of New York, hereinafter called the "Board," entered into a contract with the Contractor for the construction, equipment and operation of a rapid transit railroad in The City of New York, the said contract bearing date July 21, 1902, and being hereinafter styled the "contract," which contract has been from time to time modified by certain other agreements between the said parties; and

Whereas, Upon entering into the said contract for construction and operation, the Contractor gave on or about the 11th day of September, 1902, to the City as security: (a) A deposit with the Comptroller of certain securities of the value of more than one million dollars, as a continuing deposit to secure the payment of rent under the lease part of said contract, and all the covenants, conditions and requirements specified and provided for in said contract;

(b) A deposit with the Comptroller of The City of New York of the sum of \$1,000,000 in cash, as security for the performance of the said contract for construction; and

Whereas, By written instrument dated the 23d day of December, 1904, approved by more than six members of said Board, it was agreed that a continuing bond in the amount of one million dollars (\$1,000,000) should be substituted for said continuing deposit of securities; and

Whereas, There are upon bonds heretofore given by the Contractor as security for the performance of the contract on its part the following sureties: The United States Fidelity and Guaranty Company, The Empire State Surety Company, National Surety Company, Fidelity and Deposit Company of Maryland, and the Aetna Indemnity Company; and

Whereas, By written instruments, dated the 10th day of August, 1905, the Contractor, with the written consent of the Board, concurred in by six members thereof, duly assigned the right or obligation to maintain and operate the said rapid transit railroad for the term of years specified in the said contract, and all rights included in the leasing portions of the said contract, together with the obligation to provide equipment for the said railroad, unto the Interborough Company, which Company also guaranteed the performance by the Contractor of all the provisions of the said contract not so assigned to it; and

Whereas, The Comptroller of The City of New York now holds the sum of \$1,000,000 in cash, as deposited on or about the 11th day of September, 1902, by the Contractor, as security for construction; and

Whereas, In and by the said contract for construction and operation, it is provided that when the Contractor shall have fully completed the construction and equipment of the railroad, according to the terms thereof, and the operation of the same shall have begun pursuant to the said contract, the Board shall so certify, and upon such certificate the Comptroller shall pay and deliver to the Contractor the deposit of \$1,000,000 made upon entering into the said contract, as aforesaid, or so much of it as shall not have been reserved or used or applied for any of the purposes in the said contract mentioned; and that the Contractor shall also then be entitled to be credited upon the rental, with a sum which shall be equal to the interest on the said deposit, if made in cash, from the time of such deposit, at the average rate of interest received by the City on its bank balances during the period of such deposit; and

Whereas, The Commission has succeeded to all the powers and duties of the Board; and

Whereas, The said rapid transit railroad is now in operation although not entirely completed, and the security held by the City other than the said deposit of \$1,000,000 cash is ample to protect the City against any possible claims against the Contractor in respect to its obligations to construct and equip the railroad; and

Whereas, The Contractor and the Interborough Company desire, and the Commission approves a modification of the said contract for construction and operation; Now, therefore, in consideration of the premises, but subject to the consents hereinafter provided:

It is agreed that the said contract for construction and operation be and the same hereby is modified so that the sum of \$ _____ constituting a part of the above mentioned deposit of \$1,000,000 as security for the performance of the contract for construction, shall be forthwith delivered to the Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company.

And it is further agreed that the Interborough Rapid Transit Company shall be credited on the rental of the railroad, hereafter to come due and payable, with an amount equal to _____ of the interest on the said deposit of \$1,000,000 in cash made on or about the 11th day of September, 1902 from the time of said deposit, at the average rate of interest received by the City on its bank balances during the period of such deposit.

The parties of the second and third parts upon such payment and credit being made release The City of New York and the Commission from all and all manner of claims in respect of the said deposit to the extent of the \$ _____ so paid to the Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company, and interest thereon as aforesaid which they or either of them may have as to the same or any part thereof.

And it is further agreed that all the obligations of the Contractor and Interborough Company under the contract shall be fully carried out and performed and that all such obligations and the obligations of the Interborough Company as guarantor, and of the several sureties upon the bond above mentioned and described shall be deemed to include any liability which would have been covered by the said deposit of \$1,000,000, if the said sum of \$ _____ constituting a part of said deposit of \$1,000,000 had not been delivered to the Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company, as provided in this instrument.

Provided, however, and it is hereby expressly agreed that this instrument shall take effect when and only when the following consents hereto shall be duly had, to wit:

(1) The consent of the Comptroller of The City of New York;

(2) The consents of the The United States Fidelity and Guaranty Company, The Empire State Surety Company, National Surety Company, Fidelity and Deposit Company of Maryland, and The Aetna Indemnity Company.

In witness whereof, this contract has been executed for The City of New York by the Public Service Commission for the First District, under and by resolution duly adopted by said Commission, and the seal of the Commission has been hereunto affixed, and these presents signed by the Chairman and Secretary of the said Commission, and the said Rapid Transit Subway Construction Company and the Interborough Rapid Transit Company have respectively caused their corporate seals to be hereunto affixed and attested by their secretaries, and these presents to be signed by their Vice-Presidents, all on the day and year above mentioned.

FISCAL ORDER (No. 726).

On motion by Commissioner Bassett, duly seconded, a Final Order (No. 726) was adopted, directing the Brooklyn City and Newtown Railroad Company to amend and modify its annual report for the year ending June 30, 1907.

(1) By striking off the debit side thereof the lease item of \$923,400 and off the credit side the corresponding credit of equal amount to capital outstanding, or

(2) By charging capital stock account with "Stock never legally issued, \$923,400," and by crediting the account containing the "Lease" item with an equal amount.

And permitting entries in the ledger of said Company in accordance with the foregoing provisions.

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(3) FINAL ORDER (No. 727).

On motion by Commissioner Bassett, duly seconded, a Final Order (No. 727) was adopted, ordering and directing the Coney Island and Brooklyn Railroad Company, on or before the 10th day of October, 1908, to take up and remove the special track work forming the crossing of the Coney Island and Brooklyn Railroad Company double tracks on Franklin avenue, by the double tracks of the Long Island Railroad Company on Atlantic avenue in the Borough of Brooklyn, and to replace said special track work by straight rails along Franklin avenue, so that there may be simply a double track of the Coney Island and Brooklyn Railroad Company crossing Atlantic avenue at Franklin avenue.

(4) ORDER (No. 728).

On motion, duly seconded, the following order (No. 728), in relation to reports to be made by gas and electrical corporations, was adopted:

The Public Service Commission for the First District being authorized and required by Section 66 of the Public Service Commissions Law to prescribe the form of the report required under said Act to be made by gas and electrical corporations subject to its jurisdiction;

It is hereby

Ordered, That the form for reports of all gas and electrical corporations subject to the jurisdiction of the Commission, as the terms are defined in Section 2 of the Public Service Commissions Law, for the six months ending December 31, 1907, as the said form has been prepared by the Chief Statistician of the Commission, be and the same hereby is approved and prescribed by the Public Service Commission for the First District.

And it is further

Ordered, That every such corporation shall on or before October 31, 1908, make and file with the Commission a report in said form for the six months ending December 31, 1907.

And it is further

Ordered, That the Secretary of this Commission serve upon each of the said corporations on or before September 30, 1908, in the manner prescribed by law a certified copy of this order, and two copies of the form hereby prescribed.

(5) FINAL ORDER (No. 729).

On motion made and duly seconded, a Final Order (No. 729) was adopted, directing and requiring the Nassau Electric Railroad Company:

(1) To fix a safe and convenient point on the north side of the bridge crossing Newtown Creek at which northbound trolley cars will stop on signal of a person or persons desiring to board cars at said point or on notice to the conductor of a passenger or passengers desiring to alight therefrom at said point;

(2) To make and enforce a rule requiring stops to be made as above;

(3) To continue in operation its present practice of stopping all southbound trolley cars on the north side of said bridge at the place now in use for that purpose.

The above mentioned changes to be put into effect within ten days after service of this order upon said Company.

(6) EAST RIVER TERMINAL RAILROAD CO.—APPLICATION.

The Secretary presented a communication from Joseph Haag, Secretary of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, transmitting copy of a report of the Engineer in charge of the Division of Franchises on the application of the East River Terminal Railroad for a franchise to construct, maintain and operate certain tracks on Wythe and Kent avenues and North Fourth street, in the Borough of Brooklyn.

The matter was referred to Commissioner Bassett in connection with the application of the said Company heretofore referred to him.

(7) The Secretary stated that he had referred to the Chief Engineer a communication,

dated July 30, 1908, from John V. Finley, President of the College of The City of New York, asking that in view of the changes being made at the 137th Street station of the subway, the name of "City College" be added in at least one place in that station, and that the Chief Engineer had replied under date of September 8, 1908, transmitting blueprints showing the location for two tablets on each platform, and giving data with regard to the cost of the same.

The matter was ordered filed, having once been decided.

(8) LONG ACRE ELECTRIC LIGHT AND POWER CO.—APPLICATION TO ISSUE SECURITIES—PETITION FOR REHEARING.

The Secretary presented a petition for rehearing from the Long Acre Electric Light and Power Company upon the order of the Commission denying its application for authority to issue \$10,000,000 of Preferred Stock and \$50,000,000 of Bonds to be secured by mortgage on its property, which was referred to the Committee of the Whole for consideration.

The petition, without the verification and without the copy of the order referred to, is as follows:

ORDER (No. 607).

To the Public Service Commission for the First District, State of New York:

The petition of Long Acre Electric Light and Power Company, a corporation duly organized under the laws of the State of New York and doing business in the City of New York, respectfully shows:

1. That heretofore an application was made in the above entitled matter by petitioner to Public Service Commission for the First District of the State of New York for authority to issue \$10,000,000 of preferred stock and also to issue \$50,000,000 of bonds to be secured by mortgage upon its plant and property.

2. Such proceedings were thereafter had thereon that on the 26th day of June, 1908, an order was made and entered upon the record of said Commission, denying the application of petitioner, a copy of which is herein annexed and forms a part of this petition.

3. This application is

For a rehearing founded upon erroneous findings of fact and conclusions of law upon which the order denying the application of petitioner is founded.

The nature and purpose of the evidence upon which the application to reopen the case is founded and the findings of fact and conclusions of law claimed to be erroneous with a brief statement of the grounds of error which are claimed by the petitioner to justify a reconsideration of the case are hereinafter set forth.

4. As the order denying the application herein contains no findings of fact and conclusions of law stated as such, the ten reasons urged by the Commissioner before whom the application was heard will be taken and treated as findings of fact and conclusions of law for the purpose of this application.

5. The applicant alleges that the reason designated 1 in the opinion of the Commissioner, to wit, "No certificate to begin construction has been obtained from this Commission or its predecessors, the Commission of Gas and Electricity," stated as ground for the order denying the application, is an erroneous conclusion of law, because under the provisions of Section 68 of the Public Service Commissions Law it was not necessary to obtain from this Commission or its predecessors, the Commission of Gas and Electricity, a certificate or permit to begin construction.

6. The applicant further alleges that the reason designated 2 in the opinion of the Commissioner, to wit, "It is probable that the bonds already issued are illegal and there is grave doubt of the legality of the stock, neither issue having been approved by the Commission of Gas and Electricity," is an erroneous conclusion of law, because under section 12 of the law creating the Commission of Gas and Electricity, the Long Acre Electric Light and Power Company was not required to obtain the consent in writing of such Commission to issue the bonds and the stock already issued.

7. The applicant alleges that the reason designated 3 in the opinion of the Commissioner, to wit, "It is doubtful whether the title of the Long Acre Company to the

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franchise which it claims is perfect," is an erroneous conclusion of law, because petitioner holds valid and unimpeached title to the franchise in question.

8. The applicant alleges that the reason designated 4 in the opinion of the Commissioner, to wit, "If the bonds already issued are illegal, the approval of the application would authorize the capitalization of a franchise, which is contrary to law," is erroneous. It is respectfully urged the result stated would not follow the granting of the application to issue the bonds prayed for in the original petition herein.

9. The applicant alleges that the reason designated 5 in the opinion of the Commissioner, to wit, "The amount of bonds of the new issue is very much too large as compared with the amount of voting stock," are incorrect and erroneous. It is respectfully urged that as the Commission possesses the power to authorize an issue of bonds less in amount than prayed for in the petition, the fact that too large an amount is asked for is an insufficient and erroneous reason for the denial of the application in its entirety. Permission should be given to issue such amount of bonds as the Commission determined necessary to enable petitioner to carry on its business as set out in the original petition.

10. The applicant alleges that the reason designated 6 in the opinion of the Commissioner, to wit, "The construction contract does not adequately protect the interests of the Long Acre Company or of the public," is an erroneous conclusion of law and fact. The finding is insufficient in that it does not point out the respects in which the contract is found to be inadequate or insufficient. It is respectfully urged the contract in its entirety does adequately protect the interests of the Long Acre Company and the public.

11. The applicant alleges that the reason designated 7 in the opinion of the Commissioner, to wit, "The applicant has not proved that the existing companies are not properly conserving the public interest and convenience and that it would be to the advantage of the community to have a new company authorized to enter the field," is respectfully urged the above finding and conclusion is improper for the reason the proof clearly establishes the fact that the existing companies are not properly conserving the public interest and convenience and the further fact is established that it would be to the advantage of the community to have a new company authorized to enter the field. The proofs further show that the field of operations within the territory covered by petitioner's franchise is sufficiently large to justify and does require the existence and operation of more than one company to furnish electric current for public use therein.

12. The applicant alleges that the reason designated 8 in the opinion of the Commissioner, to wit, "If a competing company were allowed to begin operation, it is not likely that it would continue to operate independently for any considerable period," is erroneous. It is respectfully urged the proof does not authorize the finding, but, on the contrary, shows that the applicant if allowed to issue the bonds prayed for would continue permanently to operate independently of any other company.

13. The applicant alleges that the reason designated 9 in the opinion of the Commissioner, to wit, "Competition would cause inconvenience and expense to the public, would cause duplication of plant, would lead to waste and ultimately be urged as a reason why rates should not be reduced to consumers," is erroneous. It is respectfully urged the finding is unwarranted and without evidence to support it. The evidence furnishes no warrant for such deduction or conclusion. The proof authorized and called for a finding that competition would result in advantage and profit to the public without resulting in waste. The finding that competition would be urged as a reason why rates should not be reduced to consumers is unstained by and is contrary to the evidence.

14. The applicant alleges that the reason designated 10 in the opinion of the Commissioner, to wit, "practically all of the advantages claimed by the applicant as the probable results of competition can be secured through the powers of this Commission, and until it has been demonstrated that these are ineffective, it would be unwise to adopt a method which has proved to be ineffective in the past," The finding is claimed to be erroneous because unauthorized by and without proof to sustain it. The reverse of the finding is established by the evidence.

15. The recommendation of the Commissioner, to wit, "I recommend that an order denying the application be adopted accordingly," was erroneous. The recommendation should have been that the order applied for be granted. All statements of fact or conclusions of law contained in the Commissioner's opinion herein referred to, in so far as the same are in conflict with the petitioner's right to have its application granted, are erroneous, as the proof shows the applicant was entitled to an order authorizing the issue of the bonds prayed for in the original petition, or at least to such an amount as the Commission might determine proper in the reasonable contract of applicant's business set out in the original petition.

16. The refusal of the Commission to grant petitioner's application was erroneous and the facts and law found upon which the order was based called for the granting and not the refusal of the order.

17. The original application of the petitioner should have been granted and an order authorizing the same should have been made upon petitioner's application, for the following reasons:

(a) The petitioner owns and is exercising a legal franchise for furnishing electric current within certain defined territory in the City of New York, in which territory it seeks to enlarge its business.

(b) Petitioner requires the issue of bonds to the amount asked for in the original petition herein, from the sale of which to realize electric current in the territory covered by its charter, to the extent set out in the original petition.

(c) An adequate and complete contract has already been made for the purchase and equipment of a sufficient plant with which to carry on petitioner's business as set out in its original petition.

(d) Sufficient proof was given upon the hearing showing the necessity for the existence and operation of more than one company for the furnishing of electric current in the territory covered by the petitioner's charter. Proof further showing the supply of electric current by companies already in the field is inadequate and insufficient for the public convenience and use.

(e) Petitioner has shown the actual ownership of a franchise and the conduct of a business already within the territory covered by its franchise and the necessity of additional funds with which to enlarge its plant and enable it by increase of business to meet the public requirement for electric current within the territory covered by its franchise.

(f) No adequate reason has been shown for preventing competition within the territory covered by petitioner's franchise. The proof justifies the conclusion that competition, such as would result from the enlargement of petitioner's business and the use of improved lamps and devices would result in increased service over that now existing and a cheapening of electric current to consumers.

18. For the purposes of this application petitioner consents to the following:

(1) The issuing of a voting preferred stock in lieu of non-voting preferred stock asked for in the original petition.

(2) To the issue of bonds only without an issue of preferred stock as prayed for in the petition.

19. Your petitioner avers and alleges that the effect of a denial of the petitioner's application will result in the destruction of its business and the ultimate confiscation of its property, for the reason that it has not now and has no way of obtaining funds with which to continue or increase its business except by the issue of securities as prayed for in the original petition.

20. Petitioner alleges the order denying its application is null and void, for the reason that the act known as the Public Service Commissions Law, being Chapter 429 of the Laws of 1907, approved June 5, 1907, is unconstitutional, in that the Act is a private and local bill and does embrace more than one subject not expressed in its title and is in violation of Section 16 of Article 3 of the Constitution of the State of New York; also, it confers authority upon the Commissions created to deprive a citizen of his property without due process of law; also, that it is an unauthorized delegation of legislative authority, and also is in violation of Article 5 and Article 14, Section 1 of the Constitution of the United States which provides that no person shall be deprived of life, liberty or property without due process of law, nor shall any State deprive any person of life, liberty or property without due process of law, nor deny to any person within its jurisdiction the equal protection of the laws, and for these reasons, among others, the Commission had no right to make the order denying petitioner's application for leave to issue bonds.

Wherefore, petitioner prays for a rehearing and reconsideration of the case and that the order heretofore granted denying petitioner's application be vacated and set

aside and in place thereof an order be made granting the prayer of the petitioner set out in its original petition as herein modified.
