MOTIONS, ORDINANCES AND RESOLUTIONS.

Alderman Dowling asked and obtained unanimous consent to introduce the following:

No. 2831.

Whereas, The mystery of the ages has been solved, and the search for the North Pole, that elusive goal of the nations, fraught with deeds of desperate daring, disappointment, disaster, during the past three centuries, has at last been crowned with success by the intrepidity, foresight and marvellous endurance of our fellow citizen, Frederick A. Cook, M.D., LL.D.

Resolved, That in recognition of this most admirable achievement, accomplished on April 21, 1908, which has already been enthusiastically acclaimed in other lands, where honors have been showered on the brave man who first planted the Stars and Stripes on “the roof of the world,” the Aldermen of The City of New York deem it proper to extend to the premier explorer of the twentieth century a public welcome in the form of a reception in the Aldermanic Chamber, which shall be memorable, marking a lofty civic sense of what is due to work well done and as an encouragement to such enterprise in others who may in like manner reflect glory on the City which is proud of such sons.

Resolved, That as a further mark of distinction and as a lasting token of our admiration for and pride in this scion of the Empire City, at the reception to be accorded him as herein determined, the freedom of The City of New York be conferred on Frederick A. Cook, together with a copy of this Preamble and Resolutions, suitably engrossed and duly authenticated by the autograph signatures of his Honor the Mayor, the President of the Board of Aldermen, the Board of Aldermen and the City Clerk.

MESSAGES FROM HIS HONOR THE MAYOR.

The President laid before the Board the following message from his Honor the Mayor:

City of New York, Office of the Mayor, }
September 22, 1909. }

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

Gentlemen—I desire to recall to the attention of your honorable Board the resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, passed July 2, 1909, in regard to the fixing of grades of a chief inspector and inspectors of taxicabs. I am informed that this resolution, immediately after its passage in the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, was transmitted to you for action.

I hope that your honorable Board will take this matter up and consider the same at your earliest convenience.

It is my duty to further suggest to your honorable Board that when you decide on the number of taxicab inspectors you also take up the question of providing means for me to pay their salaries and necessary expenses until the 1st of January, 1910.

I further desire to call to your attention the necessity of some action in regard to inspectors of dancing academies.

I furthermore recall to your attention my letter to your honorable Board, dated May 10, 1909, transmitting my veto message forwarded to the Governor, on Senate bill, printed No. 1042, int. No. 854, entitled:

“An act to amend the Greater New York charter in relation to regulating the sale in the public streets of the City of New York of tickets of admission to places of amusement.”

You will remember that in the last paragraph of my veto message on this Senate bill I stated that the Board of Aldermen was entirely capable of handling the situation, and that action would be taken by the Board to meet the existing difficulties.

I hope that this question also will be taken up very soon by you.

Hon. PATRICK F. McGOWAN, President of the Board of Aldermen:

Sir—His Honor the Mayor having instructed me to conduct a series of tests of cinder concrete and other fireproofing materials to determine not only their strength, but their fire-resisting qualities, I applied to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for an appropriation of \$30,000 to cover the expense of these tests. The matter was presented to the Board at the meeting held on this date, but it seemed to be the opinion of the Board, that, although it was hoped that the information obtained would be of permanent value, there was some doubt as to the propriety of an issue of Corporate Stock to meet the expense, and it was suggested that the necessary funds should be raised by an issue of Special Revenue Bonds.

Under these circumstances I have prepared a resolution recommending such an issue of Special Revenue Bonds, and if you can consistently do so, I beg to ask if you will not have this resolution presented to the Board of Aldermen at its next meeting.

Notice of Application for the Appointment of Commissioners of Appraisal.

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that it is the intention of the Corporation Counsel of The City of New York to make application to the Supreme Court of the State of New York for the appointment of Commissioners of Appraisal under chapter 724 of the Laws of 1905 as amended, and the acts relating thereto.

Such application will be made to the Supreme Court at a Special Term thereof to be held in and for the Ninth Judicial District, at the Judge's Chambers, in Nyack, Rockland County, N. Y., on the 25th day of September, 1909, at 10 o'clock in the forenoon of that day or as soon thereafter as counsel can be heard. The object of such application is to obtain an order of the Court appointing three disinterested and competent freeholders, one of whom shall reside in the County of New York and at least one of whom shall reside in the County of Westchester, to act as Commissioners of Appraisal under said act and discharge all the duties conferred by said act and the acts amendatory thereof.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for the City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.
The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.
Bidders will quote out the amount of their bids.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids on estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
