

mittee on Surgeons, submitted the following report, which was adopted and ordered to be entered upon the minutes of the Board:—

Report.

1st. The Committee recommend that the city be divided into twelve Surgeons Districts, upon such arrangement as shall assign to each District as nearly as may be, an equal number of mem-bers of the Police force, so as to equalize the burthens and duties of Surgeons in charge of the

several districts.

2d. That a surgeon of skill, experience and reputable standing in his profession, be appointed and assigned to duty in each district (except the 12th, which district shall have two surgeons) to be designated as District Surgeon. Such surgeon to have the medical and surgical care of the officers and members of the police force, and the subordinates and employees of the Department; and to answer all calls and treat all cases, accid-

ents, injury or illness at the Station Houses or elsewhere on the call of the police authorities, and to perform their duties under and in pursuance of the rules and regulations of the Department concerning surgeons. The compensation of such District Surgeons to be \$1,500 per year each except the Surgeons of the 12th District, which shall be \$1,000 per year each

3d. That three surgeons of skill, experience and standing in the profession be appointed and designated examining surgeons, who shall examine all candidates for appointments, and all cases referred to them for examination by the Board of Police, and make reports on all subjects required by the Board of Police. Such duties to be performed under and in pursuance of the rules and regulations of the Board of Police. The compensation of examining surgeons to be \$2,000 per year each.

4th. There shall be appointed one surgeon of skill, experience and reputable standing in his profession, to be designated as medical director, who shall have his office in the Central Department, whose duty it shall be to supervise the examinations by the examining surgeons, and report to the Board all delinquencies and irregularities which occur in the surgeons' department. The compensation of the medical director shall be \$2,250 per year.

5th. Examining surgeons shall report in writing the result of their examinations to the medical director, who shall keep a perfect record thereof, and report the same to the Board and to the saveral commissioners. the several commissioners.

The district surgeons shall make daily reports in writing of all visits to members of the force and department, and of visits to station houses and cases treated thereat. Such report to be sent to the medical director's office, at or before 11 o'clock A. M. The medical director shall keep a record of such reports, and report to the Board in writing all cases and matters requiring the attention of the Board.

Record of the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending September 13th, 1873.

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors, was 2388 as follows:

9 public buildings, 919 tenement houses, 335
private dwellings, 175 other dwellings, 24 manufactories and work-shops, 26 stores and warehouses, 96 stables, 2 markets, 24 slaughter houses, 3 gut cleaning establishments, 1 head cleaning establishment, 1 sausage manufactory, 2 lard
rendering establishments, 7 fat rendering establishments, 2 manufactory, 4 street sewers and rendering establishments, 7 fat rendering establishments, 3 manure dumps, 4 street sewers and drains, 3 piers and bulkheads, 50 sunken and vacant lots, 75 yards, courts and areas, 212 cellars and basements, 60 waste pipes and drains, 110 privies and water-closets, 202 street gutters and sidewalks, 8 dangerous stairways, 2 cisterns and cess-pools, 23 other nuisances.

The number of reports received from the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 767.

During the week 73 complaints have been received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 27 premises where contagious diseases were found and have disinfected and fumigated 26 houses, 26 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, &c.

In addition to the regular duties performed by the Disinfecting Corps, 203 miles of street gut-ters, 751 privies, 97 yards and 39 cellars were disinfected.

140 permits were granted to scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks.

67 permits were granted for vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

425 loads of night soil were removed by night scavengers from the privy vaults of the city.

The tollowing number of cases of contagious diseases were reported for the week ending Sept.

13, 1873: Typhus fever, 2; typhoid fever, 8; scarlet fever, 11; measles, 2; diptheria, 42 and small pox 3.

3 cases of small pox were removed to hospital by the ambulance corps.

The amount of meat and fish condemned by the officers as unfit for human food, during the week ending Sept. 13th, 1873, was: carcass of cattle 1; sheep, 17; calf 1; 902 pounds of beef, 359 pounds of mutton and 265 pounds of poultry. During the week ending Sept. 13th, 1873, there were issued from this Bureau 578 burial permits for city deaths, 51 for bodies in transitu, and 32 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 578 deaths, 210 marriages, 513 births, 32 still-births, 51 applications for transit permits and 54 returns from coroners. There were 31 searches of the registers of births, marriages and deaths, and 3 transcripts of birth record, 2 of marriage and 24 of death were issued from this Bureau. 2 cases of deaths were re-

Sir—In the week ending on Saturday last there were 578 deaths reported. The number reported in the previous week was 635; being 57 in excess of the mortality last week. There was m excess of the mortality last week. There was a marked decrease (47) in the deaths by diarrhoeal disorders; and the decrease in the number of deaths of children (39) under 5 years of age is wholly due to the abatement of that class of causes.

Diphtheria is charged with 40 deaths last week, Diphtheria is charged with 40 deaths last week, against 24 in the week previously, and against an average of less than 5 in the five preceding years. It is just cause for special sanitary care and timely medical attention in the families that suffer from it. There were no deaths from typhus, and only 8 from the enteric or typhoid fever reported less week. Pulmonary consumption is charged

only 8 from the enteric or typhoid fever reported last week. Pulmonary consumption is charged with the unusual number of 89 deaths.

The mean temperature, in Central Park, was 64.50 Fahr.; the maximum was 78.2, and the range of temperature extended over 23.7 degrees. The average humidity was at 71, total saturation being 100.

There were 306 deaths in that portion of the population over 2 years of age. There is a little

The death-rate in London, the last week of August, was equal to 23 per 1,000 annually; in the 21 chief cities of Great Britain it was equal to 25; in Liverpool it was 28, but in Edinburgh it was only half that rate. In Paris it was equal to 24; in Brussels, the previous week, it was 29; in Berlin, 38; in Vienna, 55; in Rome, a week previously, it was 34, and in Florence and Turin, 23 and 22 respectively. The conditions of temperature, humidity, civic cleanliness, and domestic life under which the population of Edinburgh suffered a death-rate only half as great as that of Liverpool and New York, and only one-fourth as great as that of Vienna, are worthy of fourth as great as that of Vienna, are worthy of

Inspector Tracy (6th Ward) reports the following streets in his district as dirty with street dirt manure or garbage: Chambers street, from Chatham to Centre; Centre street, at junction with Duane; Pearl street, from Centre to City Hall Place; Park street, from Mulberry to Mott; and Cortlandt Alley.

Assistant Inspector Emerson (7th Ward) reports that the condition of the streets in his district is better than for many weeks, with the exception of Hamilton and Division, between

Other Cities.—No epidemic is prevailing in any of the large cities of the United States. Cholera, which has proved very fatal in many towns and villages that were defective in their pure water supply and their sanitary arrange-

fair condition.

Inspector Bryant (10th and 13th wards), reports a continual improvement in the condition of the streets, and that in many places the pavements are being repaired.

Inspector Munde (11th ward), reports that the streets in his district are cleaner than usual, with the exception of those where the pavement is notoriously bad, and where the inhabitants persist in throwing garbage &c., into the streets and sist in throwing garbage &c., into the streets and gutters. He can specify none as particularly dirty.

Inspector Hall (14th ward), reports that the streets in his district, have been kept uniformly clean during the past week.

Assistant Inspector Hamilton (16th ward), reports an improvement in the condition of the streets in his district, with the exception of 21st street, between 7th and 9th avenues.

Assistant Inspector Atwater (17th Ward) reports that the streets in his district are well swept and clean.

Inspector Russell (18th Ward) reports that the streets in his district are in a fair condition, the exception being 18th street, east of First av-

Assistant Inspector Walker (20th Ward) re-ports that the streets in his district are better than during the previous week, the exceptions being 36th, 38th and 39th streets, west of Tenth

Assistant Inspector Ewing (22d Ward, lower part) reports that, with the exception of those that are unpaved, the streets in his district are kept tolerably clean.

Assistant Inspector Strong (22d Ward, upper part) reports all the paved streets in his district as faultlessly clean.

Inspector Roberts (21st Ward) reports that all the streets in his district have been swept during the week, and that the well-paved streets are in a fair condition.

Inspector Post (19th Ward, lower part) reports that the streets in his district are in a cleanly that the streets in his district are in a cleanly condition with the exception of the unpaved streets, and also the following: First avenue, between 44th and 47th streets; Second avenue, between 42d and 43d, 46th and 50th, 51st and 54th streets; Third avenue, between 44th and 47th, 57th and 54th, 53d and 56th streets; 41st street, between Madison and Fourth and between Second and Third avenues; 42d street, between Third and Fourth avenues; 46th, 47th, 48th, 49th and 56th streets, between First and Second avenues; 51st and 52d streets, between First and nues; 51st and 52d streets, between First and Third avenues; and 54th street, between Lex-

ington and Fourth avenues.
Assistant Inspector Fowler (12th Ward, upper part) reports the streets in his district in good condition, except the unpaved, and those that are

badly paved.

One of the cases of small pox came to this office from Orange, N. J., and was sent to hospital. The other two belong in New York.

REPORT ON CASUALTIES FROM STREET RAIL-ROAD CARS.

The Sanitary Committee submit the following report upon casualties occurring to persons get-ting on or off, or falling from the front platform

From this table it appears that eighteen cases of injury, occurring from falling while attempting to get on or off, or pushed off the front platform of the street cars, were admitted to this hospital during a single year. Of these six died, giving a mortality of 33½ per cent. The nature of the injuries was as follows: Fracture of the thigh and leg, with laceration of the soft parts, 6, of whom 4 died; injuries of foot, 4; injury of head and arm, 2; dislocation of hip, 1; dislocation of elbow, 1; injuries, 4, of whom 2 died. Of all the injuries which the surgeon the points above indicated; the work to be done

meets, none equal in severity those which occur from the crushing effect of the street cars; when the wheels traverse the limbs the parts are so crushed as to require, with rare exceptions, immediate amputation.

The victims of these accidents are generally children, or laborers in a state of semi-intexication. In endeavoring to get on or off the front platform while the car is in motion, they seize firmly the hand rail, but miss their footing, and while endeaving to save themselves from falling, the foot or leg is thrust under the forward wheel. In other instances, the platform is so crowded with passengers, that the child or intoxicated person is easily thrust aside and off the steps.

person is easily thrust aside and off the steps.

To guard against these accidents, the city railroads, with but an exception or two, have made and posted rules and regulations forbidding persons getting on or off the front platform, but these rules are posted inside of the cars, and are not heeded by the class of persons who are generally the subjects of such accidents.

There is but one way to enforce these very judicious regulations, and that is by enclosing the platform so effectually that neither the step nor hand-rail are accessible from the outside. If this provision were made, it would not only prevent persons from attempting to get upon the

this provision were made, it would not only prevent persons from attempting to get upon the front platform, except as they passed through the car, but it would prevent persons upon the platform from getting off directly, or from being pushed off by the crowd.

In order to give practical effect to the rules of the City railroad companies, which will not be obeyed by children and drunken persons, as the records of accidents for the past year prove, the committee are of the opinion that this Board should adopt an ordinance requiring these companies to inclose the front platform of their cars in such manner as to render them directly inacin such manner as to render them directly inac-cessible to persons on the street, and to prevent persons already upon them from getting off or

It may be alleged that this is not a proper sub-ject for an ordinance of this Board, as the remedy ject for an ordinance of this Board, as the remedy for the evil complained of is to be found in the courts, where every person suffering from these accidents can obtain redress, and that in attempting to get on or off the front platform of street cars when the car is in motion, the person is himself culpably negligent.

Admitting the truth of these statements, it does not follow that this Board has no duty to perform in the premises. On the contrary, the

does not follow that this Board has no duty to perform in the premises. On the contrary, the statute expressly includes among the powers of this Board "the ordering and enforcing in the same manner as other orders are provided to be enforced * * the prevention of accidents by which life or health may be endangered," (last clause Sec. 12 Chap. 74, laws 1866.)

In its ordinances the Board recognizes this power, and has ordained: "Nor shall any person omit to do any act, or to take any precautions reasonable and proper to prevent or remove

power, and has ordained: "Nor shall any person omit to do any act, or to take any precautions reasonable and proper to prevent or remove danger or detriment to the life or health of any human being," (last clause, Sec. 8 Code of Sanitary Ordinances.)

The propriety of legislation to prevent accident, by which life or health may be endangered, even though such accidents could occur only through the negligence of the individual, has long been recognized. Ferry and steamboat companies are obliged to regulate their course and speed with direct reference to the safety of their passengers. Railroad companies have to use proper precautions at street crossings to prevent accidents. Places of amusement, manufactories, etc., are required to provide against accidents of every description. The Legislature of the State of Missouri seems to have fully appreciated its duty and its obligations to prevent the horrible and fatal accidents by street cars, now of such frequent occurrence in this city, by the following enectment, passed February 6, 1866, Sec. 10: No passenger shall be permitted to get on or off any car by the front platform while the car is in motion; and each car shall be furnished with such adjustable gate or guard as shall effectually prevent it. white the car is in motion; and each car shall be furnished with such adjustable gate or guard as shall effectually prevent it.

The committee respectfully recommend the adoption of the following ordinance:

That each of the several persons and companies that run or cause to be persons and companies that run or cause to be persons as decompanies.

panies that run or cause to be run any car drawn by horses for the transportation of passengers in any part of the City of New York do cause both the front entrances from the street upon the plat-form of the fore end of each of said cars to be effectually barred or closed by gate or otherwise while said cars are in motion, so as to prevent access to any portion of the said platform, or the hand-rails or the steps thereof, by any person not
