



COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND.

Abstract of the proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at the meeting held March 20, 1877.

Present—Hon. Smith Ely, Jr., Mayor (Chairman); Hon. John K. Hackett, Recorder; Hon. John Kelly, Comptroller; J. Nelson Tappan, Esq., Chamberlain; and Patrick Keenan, Esq., Chairman of Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

The Comptroller submitted the following report, on the petition of the New York Institution for the Instruction of the Deaf and Dumb, in relation to a water grant, on the North river, in front of the upland owned by said institution, between One Hundred and Sixty-second and One Hundred and Sixty-sixth streets, viz.:

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

GENTLEMEN—The Comptroller, to whom was referred the petition of the New York Institution for the Instruction of the Deaf and Dumb, for a water grant on the North river, in front of the upland owned by them, between One Hundred and Sixty-second, One Hundred and Sixty-third, and One Hundred and Sixty-sixth streets, would

REPORT:

That he has presented the question of valuation of this grant to the Department of Taxes and Assessments, which has certified the value to be \$25 per running foot; upon the submission thereof to the Commissioner of Public Works, he has agreed that such valuation is fair and reasonable; and the Comptroller would recommend that the value of such grant be fixed at twenty-five dollars per running foot, excepting the streets running east and west; the grantees to be required to build a strong and substantial bulkhead, when the interest of the city may require it for the convenience of commerce; the work to be done under the superintendence of the proper officer of the city government, and reserving to the city the right to lay out and open an avenue or street running north and south through said land, when filled in; also intersecting streets running in an easterly or westerly direction, without cost or charge to the city for the land taken or used in said avenues or streets.

I would further suggest, that a covenant be included in this grant, that the bulkheads and streets or avenues should be kept in good repair, with penalty of forfeiture in case of non-compliance, upon notice having been first given by the proper officer of the city government; also that the wharfage along the whole line of the bulkhead be reserved by the city, except for such vessels as may be in use by or the property of the grantees, and that no dock or other obstruction be built in the slips between the streets by the parties to whom the grant is made, which should be subjected to the restrictions suggested by the Department of Docks in their letter of February 8, 1877, which is appended herewith.

On motion, the report was accepted and approved; and the following resolution, submitted therewith, adopted, viz.:

Resolved, That a water grant of the land fronting the premises of the New York Institution for the Instruction of the Deaf and Dumb, extending from the centre of One Hundred and Sixty-second to One Hundred and Sixty-sixth street, North river, reaching to the bulkhead line as established by law in 1868, and as shown on the accompanying diagram, be made to such institution, at the sum of twenty-five (\$25) dollars a running foot, excluding the width of the streets laid down therein running east and west.

Such grant to reserve to the city the right, that in case at any time it shall require any of said premises for its own use as a street, or for the proposed permanent improvement of the water front, or for any future improvement which may be decided upon, no charge shall be made for any part so required, nor for the cost of any improvement or structures thereon or damage thereto; also that the grantees shall covenant to build a strong and substantial bulkhead, when required for the convenience of commerce, the work to be done under the superintendence of the proper officer of the city, also reserving to the city the wharfage along the whole line of the bulkhead, except for vessels used by or the property of the grantees; the bulkheads to be kept in good repair by the grantees, with penalty of forfeiture in case of non-compliance, after notice from the proper officer of the city having the matter in charge; and that no dock or other obstruction be built in the slips between the streets by the grantees; excepting also from the operation of the grant any right which may have been acquired by the Hudson River Railroad Company.

On motion of the Recorder, it was

Resolved, That the aforesaid report and resolution, with annexed papers, be referred to the Counsel to the Corporation; and that he be and hereby is requested to issue a grant, as authorized by the resolution aforesaid, upon the acceptance of the terms and conditions therein stated, by the officers of the said Institution for the Instruction of the Deaf and Dumb.

The Comptroller submitted a report, on the application of Francis H. Macy, for water grant on Harlem river, between One Hundred and Twenty-second and One Hundred and Twenty-third streets; which, on motion, was referred back to the Comptroller to enable him to obtain further information.

A document was received in relation to "the matter of the application of the New York and Staten Island Ferry Co., to be awarded the franchise of a ferry, from Pier 1, East river, to Staten Island;" which, on motion, was laid over for consideration.

On motion, adjourned to Friday next, the 23d inst., at 12½ o'clock P. M.

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending March 17, 1877:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,366, as follows, viz.: 1 public building, 502 tenement-houses, 145 private dwellings, 38 other dwellings, 7 manufactorys and workshops, 29 stores and warehouses, 39 stables, 1 market, 12 milk depots, 30 slaughter-houses, 1 fat-rendering establishment, 3 car depots, 127 milk inspections, 1 public pound, 16 sunken and vacant lots, 58 yards, courts, and areas, 55 cellars and basements, 137 waste-pipes and drains, 108 privies and water-closets, 13 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 2 dangerous stairways, 1 cesspool, 2 violations of Code, 3 other nuisances, together with 47 visits of the Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 430.

During the past week 59 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 40 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

40 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 37 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 37 houses, 37 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

1 case of small-pox was removed to the hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

During the week ending March 17, 1877, there were issued from this Bureau 495 burial permits for city deaths, 27 for bodies in transitu, and 48 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 495 deaths, 134 marriages, 479 births, 48 still-births, 27 applications for transit permits, and 44 returns from Coroners. There were 34 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and 2 transcripts of birth record, 2 of marriages, and 30 of deaths were issued from this Bureau.

BUREAU OF VITAL STATISTICS.

REPORTED MORTALITY* for the week ending March 17, 1877, together with the ACTUAL MORTALITY for the week ending March 10, 1877.

W. DE F. DAY, *Sanitary Superintendent and Register:*

Sir.—There were 495 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, March 17, 1877, which is a decrease of 31, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 124 less than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1876. The actual mortality for the week ending March 10, 1877, was 507, which is 78 below the average for the corresponding week of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 24.56 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,072,390.
