

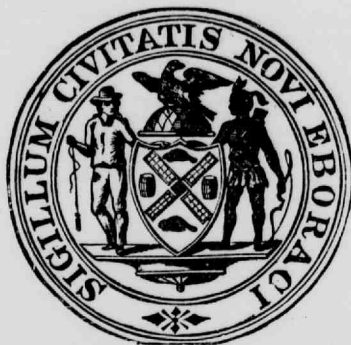

### BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT.

BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT—CITY OF NEW YORK,  
MAYOR'S OFFICE, CITY HALL,  
SATURDAY, October 30, 1880, 11 o'clock A. M.

The Board met in pursuance of an adjournment.

Present—All the members, viz.:

Edward Cooper, the Mayor of the City of New York; John Kelly, the Comptroller of the City of New York; John J. Morris, the President of the Board of Aldermen; John Wheeler, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments.

On motion, the reading of the minutes of the meeting held October 29, 1880, was dispensed with.

On motion, the Board proceeded to the consideration of the Departmental Estimates for the year 1881.

Messrs. Wenman and Lane, Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks, appeared before the Board and submitted a modified estimate for the said Department, and made statements relative thereto.

Professor Chandler, President of the Health Department, appeared before the Board, and made a statement in relation to the estimate of the said Department.

On motion, the Board took a recess for half an hour.

The Board reassembled at 3 o'clock P. M.  
Present—All the members.

The Chairman presented the following communication:

LAW DEPARTMENT,  
OFFICE OF THE COUNSEL TO THE CORPORATION,  
NEW YORK, October 30, 1880.

To the Honorable the Board of Apportionment:

GENTLEMEN—My attention has been called to the estimates of the Law Department, by his Honor the Mayor, in relation to the application thereto of the provisions of section 3 of chapter 521 of the Laws of 1880.

Upon examination of the estimate for salaries of the clerks, assistants and messengers, in that portion of the Department which is under my personal charge, it will be seen that the aggregate sum required is ten per cent. less than the aggregate amount paid for the salaries and compensation of such persons during the year 1880.

The estimates of the Corporation Attorney and Public Administrator, for the expenses of their respective bureaus, were submitted separately, and are subject to the application of the same statutory provision requiring a reduction thereof, to a sum at least ten per centum less than the aggregate amount paid for the salaries and compensation in such bureaus during the present year.

I am also asked to advise as to whether the Attorney for the Collection of Personal Taxes is an officer of the Law Department or of the Finance Department.

Under the law, chapter 334 of the Laws of 1867, the Attorney for the Collection of Arrears of Personal Taxes was made the Chief Officer of a Bureau in the Finance Department.

Under the present Charter the Counsel to the Corporation is authorized to appoint the attorney (section 36, Charter of 1873). In the case of Gale vs. The Mayor, 8 Hun., 370, the effect of this provision in the Charter of 1873 was considered, and the General Term of this district held that it had the effect of transferring the Bureau to the Law Department.

The Comptroller presented the following preamble and resolution, adopted by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on this date:

Whereas, The Comptroller has reported to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund that the revenues of the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt in the year 1881 are estimated at \$4,350,000.00, and that no bonds or stocks of the City of New York for which said Fund was primarily pledged fall due during said year; and,

Whereas, The total amount of bonds and stocks falling due in 1881, originally payable from taxation, and of bonds and stocks payable from said Sinking Fund under the provisions of section 8 of chapter 383 of the Laws of 1878 is \$1,390,212.80, as follows:

and, Whereas, The amount of the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt is in excess of the amount of bonds and stocks for which that fund is primarily pledged, therefore

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund do hereby certify to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that the revenues of the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt in the year 1881, are estimated at \$4,350,000, and that no bonds or stocks of the City of New York for which said fund was primarily pledged fall due during said year, and that the total amount of bonds and stocks originally payable from taxation falling due during said year is \$1,346,649.48, and that the amount of the Sinking Fund for the Redemption of the City Debt is in excess of the amount of bonds and stocks for which said fund was pledged before the passage of chapter 383 of the Laws of 1878, the securities held by said Sinking Fund being more than thirty-four millions of dollars, while the amount of bonds and stocks for which said fund is primarily pledged amounts to less than nineteen millions of dollars.

—and moved to deduct the sum of \$1,500,000 as the amount of estimated revenues of the General Fund not otherwise specifically appropriated by law.

Which was agreed to.

The Comptroller offered the following resolution, and Provisional Estimate for the year 1881.

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, as provided by section 112 of chapter 335 of the Laws of 1873, and the amendments thereto, do, by the affirmative votes of all the members, hereby make the following Provisional Estimate of the amounts required to pay the expenses of conducting the public business of the City and County of New York, in each department and branch thereof, and the Board of Education, for the next ensuing financial year, to wit, for the year eighteen hundred and eighty-one (1881), in which estimate is included such sum as is necessary for the payment of the interest on the bonds of the city and county, which become due and payable within said year, and also such sum as is necessary to pay the principal of any bonds and stocks which become due and payable from taxes during the said year, and also so much as may be necessary to pay the proportion of the State Tax required to be paid by the City and County of New York in said year, to wit:

## Maintenance and Government of Parks and Places:

#### Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending October 23, 1880:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,778, as follows, viz.: 1 public building, 800 tenement-houses, 41 private dwellings, 73 other dwellings, 10 manufactories and workshops, 19 stores and warehouses, 49 stables, 15 slaughter-houses, 1 lime kiln, 2 manure dumps, 1 garbage dump, 4 lodging houses, 2 public drains, 14 sunken and vacant lots, 1 dangerous building, 1 roadway, 91 yards, courts and areas, 98 cellars and basements, 172 waste-pipes and drains, 232 privies and water-closets, 30 street-gutters and side-walks, 10 dangerous stairways, 4 cesspools, 1 piggery, 3 smoky chimneys, 19 other nuisances, together with 84 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 605.

During the past week 153 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 120 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

104 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 87 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 579 houses, 79 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

One case of contagious disease was removed to hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

#### Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 558 births, 59 still-births, 200 marriages, and 570 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, October 23, 1880; this shows an increase of 7 births and 22 still-births, and a decrease of 50 marriages and 39 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1879, there was an increase of 31 births, 23 still-births, and 61 deaths, and a decrease of 40 marriages. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from diphtheria, decreased 15; typhus fever, 1; typhoid fever, 1; cerebro-spinal fever, 2; puerperal diseases, 5; diarrhoeal diseases, 16; inanition, 3; cancer, 7; phthisis pulmonalis, 16; convulsions, 3; apoplexy, 7; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 10; enteritis, gastritis, and peritonitis, 1; Bright's disease and nephritis, 8; premature and preterm births, 10; while the deaths from scarlatina, increased 4; whooping cough, 1; erysipelas, 2; rheumatism and gout, 1; bronchitis, 6; pneumonia, 5; heart diseases, 2; aneurism, 1; marasmus, tabes mesenterica, and scrofula, 10; meningitis and encephalitis, 4; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 5; cyanosis and atelectasis, 8; suicide and drowning, 2. The number of deaths from small-pox, 1; croup, 25; malarial fevers, 12; alcoholism 4; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 13; was the same in the two succeeding weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 103 were in institutions, 297 in tenement houses, 153 in houses containing three families or less, 4 in hotels and boarding-houses, 9 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 3 were on the basement floor, 111 on the first, 155 on the second, 99 on the third, 61 on the fourth, 7 on the fifth, 2 on the sixth; 568 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 2 non-residents; 50 were stated to be single, 123 married, 69 widowed, and the condition of 328 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week was as follows, viz.: City deaths, 570; still-births, 59; bodies in transit, 18; of the total burial permits issued for city deaths and still-births 64 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 558 births, 200 marriages, 59 still-births, 570 deaths, 18 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed and tabulated; 65 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 9 transcripts of the birth record, 5 of marriage, and 23 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending October 23, 1880, was 50.2 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.938, the mean humidity was 85, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,316, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.98 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The disposition of 556 deaths and still-births, or 88.39 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 10; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 225; City pauper burial-ground (undenominational), 70; Greenwood (undenominational), 49; Lutheran (undenominational), 90; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 21; Evergreen (undenominational), 37; Woodlawn (undenominational), 24; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 4; Union (Methodist Protestant), 3; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 5; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 5; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 7; Washington (undenominational), 6.

The actual mortality for the week ending October 16, 1880, was 616; this is 186 more than the number that occurred during the corresponding week of the year 1879, and 1,424 more than the average of the corresponding weeks of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 26.25 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,220,308.

PROPOSALS FOR ESTIMATES FOR REMOVING ALL THE OLD PLATFORM AND BUILDING A RIP-RAP EMBANKMENT, WITH RUBBLE WALL ON TOP THEREOF AND WOODEN PLATFORM IN FRONT OF THE SAME, AND A RUBBLE BOUNDARY WALL, FROM FORTY-NINTH STREET TO FIFTY-FIRST STREET, EAST RIVER.

ESTIMATES FOR REMOVING ALL THE OLD platform and preparing for and building a rip-rap embankment, with rubble wall on top thereof and a wooden platform in front of the same, and rubble boundary walls, from Forty-ninth street to Fifty-first street, East river, will be received by the Board of Commissioners at the head of the Department of Docks, at the office of said Department, Nos. 117 and 119 Duane street, in the City of New York, until 12 o'clock M. of

WEDNESDAY, NOVEMBER 10, 1880,

at which time and place the bids will be publicly opened by the head of said Department and read. The award of the contract, if awarded, will be made as soon as practicable after the opening of the bids.

Any person making an estimate for the work shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope to said Board, at said office, on or before the day and hour above named, which envelope shall be indorsed with the name or names of the person or persons presenting the same, the date of its presentation, and a statement of the work to which it relates.

The bidder to whom the award is made shall give security for the faithful performance of the contract, in the manner prescribed and required by ordinance, in the sum of Four Thousand Dollars.

The Engineer's estimate of the nature, quantities, and extent of the work is as follows:

CLASS 1. Old embankment to be dredged below one foot below mean low water-mark, and the dredged material to be removed and disposed of in accordance with the law, about 470 cubic yards.

CLASS 2. Rip-rap stone for embankment, deposited in place, about 1,127 cubic yards.

CLASS 3. Rubble wall built upon the embankment, about 664 cubic yards.

NOTE.—The price bid per cubic yard for this class of work will cover the cost and expense of the excavation, removal and disposal, in accordance with the law, of all the material of the old embankment (estimated at 900 cubic yards, more or less), including earth, stone, timber work, etc., which will be required to be removed, above one foot below mean low water-mark, to make room for the construction of the rubble wall on top of the rip-rap embankment, and for that portion of the platform that will come behind the wall.

CLASS 4. Wooden platform in front of the rubble wall. This item will require the following quantities:

Labor of framing and carpentry, including all moving of timber, jointing, planing, bolting, spiking, painting, oiling or tarring, and furnishing the materials for painting, oiling or tarring, and labor of every description.

The superficial area of this platform will be about 11,278 square feet.

NOTE.—The yellow pine timber in this class is exclusive of extra lengths required for scarfs, laps, etc., and of waste.

CLASS 5. Rubble boundary wall built, about 158 cubic yards.

NOTE.—The price bid per cubic yard for this class of work will cover the cost and expense of the excavation, removal and disposal, in accordance with law, of all the material (estimated at 180 cubic yards, more or less), including earth, stone, timber work, etc., which will be required to be removed to make room for the rubble boundary wall, and of filling in along said wall after it is completed.

N. B.—As the above mentioned quantities, though stated with as much accuracy as is possible, in advance, are approximate only, bidders are required to submit their estimates upon the following express conditions, which shall apply to and become part of every estimate received:

(1.) Bidders must satisfy themselves, by personal examination of the location of the proposed work, and by such other means as they may prefer, as to the accuracy of the foregoing Engineer's estimate, and shall not, at any time after the submission of their estimate, dispute or complain of such Engineer's estimate, nor assert that there was any misunderstanding in regard to the nature or amount of the work to be done.

(2.) Bidders will be required to complete the entire work to the satisfaction of the Department of Docks, and in substantial accordance with the specifications of the contract and the plans therein referred to. No extra compensation beyond the amount payable for the several classes of the work before enumerated which shall be actually performed, at the prices therefor to be specified by the lowest bidder, shall be due or payable for the entire work.

All the old material taken from said old embankment and old platform, between Forty-ninth street and Fifty-first street, East river, to be removed under this contract, will be relinquished to the contractor, and bidders must estimate the value of such material when considering the prices for which they will do the several classes of work under the contract and as affected thereby.

The work to be done under the contract is to be commenced within five days after the date thereof, and all the work to be done under the contract is to be fully completed on or before the 20th day of April, 1881; and the damages to be paid by the contractor for each day

that the contract, or any part thereof, may be unfulfilled, after the time fixed for the fulfillment thereof has expired, Sundays and holidays not to be excepted, are, by a clause in the contract, fixed and liquidated at Fifty Dollars per day.

Bidders will state in their estimates the price for each separate class above specified of the work to be done, in conformity with the approved form of contract and specifications therein set forth, by which the bids will be tested. These prices are to cover the expenses of furnishing all the necessary materials and labor, and the performance of all the work set forth in the annexed agreement.

Bidders will write out the amount of their estimate for doing this work, in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Should the lowest bidder or bidders neglect or refuse to accept to contract within forty-eight (48) hours after written notice that the same has been awarded to his or their bid or estimate, or if, after acceptance, he or they should refuse or neglect to execute the contract and give the proper security for forty-eight hours after notice that the same is ready for execution, he or they shall be considered as having abandoned it, and as in default to the Corporation; and the contract will be re-advertised and relet, and so on until it is accepted and executed.

Bidders are required to state in their estimates their names and places of residence, the names of all persons interested with them therein; and if no other person be so interested, the estimate shall distinctly state the fact; also that the estimate is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same work, and that it is in all respects fair, and without collusion or fraud; and also that no member of the Common Council, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of the Corporation is directly or indirectly interested therein, or in the supplies or work to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof; which estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party making the estimate, that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true. Where more than one person is interested, it is requisite that the verification be made and subscribed by all the parties interested.

Each estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders of the City of New York, with their respective places of business or residence, to the effect that if the contract be awarded to the person or persons making the estimate, they will, on its being so awarded, become bound as his or their sureties for its faithful performance; and that if said person or persons shall omit or refuse to execute the contract, they will pay to the Corporation any difference between the sum to which said person or persons would be entitled on its completion and that which the Corporation may be obliged to pay to the person to whom the contract may be awarded at any subsequent letting; the amount in each case to be calculated upon the estimated amount of the work by which the bids are tested. The consent above mentioned shall be accompanied by the oath or affirmation, in writing, of each of the persons signing the same, that he is a householder or freeholder in the City of New York, and is worth the amount of the security required for the completion of the contract, and stated in these proposals, over and above all his debts of every nature, and over and above his liabilities as bail, surety and otherwise; and that he has offered himself as surety in good faith, and with the intention to execute the bond required by section 6 of chapter 574, Laws of 1871, and by section 27 of chapter VIII, of the Revised Ordinances of the City of New York, if the contract shall be awarded to the person or persons for whom he consents to become surety. The adequacy and sufficiency of the security offered are to be approved by the Comptroller of the City of New York, after the award is made and prior to the signing of the contract.

Bidders are informed that no deviation from the specifications will be allowed, unless under the written instructions of the Engineer-in-Chief.

No estimate will be accepted from, or contract awarded to, any person who is in arrears to the Corporation upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the Corporation.

The right to decline all the estimates is reserved, if deemed for the interest of the Corporation.

The fines, received from those who, for business or other reasons, are unable to serve at the time selected, pay the expenses of this office, and if unpaid will be entered as judgments upon the property of the delinquents.

All good citizens will aid the course of justice, and secure reliable and respectable jurors, and equalize their duty by serving promptly when summoned, allowing their clerks or subordinates to serve, reporting to me any attempt at bribery or evasion, and suggesting names for enrollment. Persons between sixty and seventy years of age, summer absentees, persons temporarily ill, and United States and District Court jurors are not exempt.

Every man must attend to his own notice. It is a misdemeanor to give any jury paper to another to answer. It is also punishable by fine or imprisonment to give or receive any present or bribe, directly or indirectly, in relation to a jury service, or to withhold any paper or make any false statement, and every case will be fully prosecuted.

## CHAPTER 195.

**AN ACT** in relation to the payment of assessments for local improvements in the City of New York.

Passed May 7, 1880; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. At any time before the first day of September, eighteen hundred and eighty, any person liable therefor may pay to the officer authorized to receive the same, the amount of any assessment for any local improvement in the City of New York, heretofore confirmed and now unpaid, with interest thereon at the rate of seven per centum per annum from the date of confirmation to the date of payment and at any time on or after said first day of September, and before the first day of December, eighteen hundred and eighty, any such assessment may be paid as aforesaid, with interest at the rate of nine per centum per annum from the date of confirmation to the date of payment.

Sec. 2. Where any installment or installments of any assessments have been paid under the provisions of chapter one hundred and three of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-six, or of chapter one hundred and fifty-nine of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-seven, or of chapter two hundred and fifty-five of the laws of eighteen hundred and seventy-eight, the amount of such assessment or assessments remaining unpaid may be paid within the same periods prescribed in the first section of this act and upon the same terms and conditions therein prescribed.

Sec. 3. Upon such payment in full, as hereinbefore provided, such assessment or assessments shall cease to be a lien upon the property, and shall be deemed fully paid, satisfied and discharged; and there shall be no further interest or penalty by reason of such assessment or assessments not having been paid within the time heretofore required by law, or by reason of any statute heretofore requiring the payment of any penalty or interest over the rate hereinbefore provided for upon any unpaid assessment.

Sec. 4. No provision of this act hereinbefore contained shall be construed as applicable to or affecting any assessment for the collection of which assessment the property has been sold:

Sec. 5. This act shall take effect immediately.

## CHAPTER 123.

**AN ACT** in relation to arrears of taxes in the City of New York, and to provide for the reissuing of revenue bonds in anticipation of such taxes.

Passed April 15, 1880; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. At any time after the passage of this act, and before the first day of October, eighteen hundred and eighty, any person may pay to the Comptroller of the City of New York the amount of any tax upon real property belonging to such person, heretofore laid or imposed and now remaining unpaid, together with interest thereon at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the time that such tax was imposed to the time of such payment, provided, also, that the time when such payment may be made on the amount of any such tax laid or imposed in the years eighteen hundred and seventy-seven, eighteen hundred and seventy-eight, and eighteen hundred and seventy-nine shall extend to the first day of April, eighteen hundred and eighty-one. The Comptroller shall make and deliver to the person making any such payment a receipt therefor, and shall forthwith cancel the record of any such tax on the books of the finance department; and upon such payment being made such tax shall cease to be a lien upon the property and shall be deemed fully paid, satisfied and discharged, and there shall be no right to any further interest or penalty by reason of such tax not having been paid within the time heretofore required by law, or by reason of any statute passed requiring the payment heretofore of any penalty or interest over even per centum per annum upon any unpaid tax.

Sec. 2. Any revenue bond heretofore issued in anticipation of the taxes in the first section specified which may fall due and become payable before said taxes are collected, may be reissued by the Comptroller of said city, in whole or in part, for such period as he may determine, not exceeding one year.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect immediately.
