MEMORIAL.

Alderman Hawes presented the following memorial from Dexter A. Hawkins, Esq., in reference to public instruction:

THE BOARD OF APPOINTMENT AND THE PUBLIC SCHOOLS.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

GENTLEMEN—The public sentiment of this city is undoubtedly in favor of enabling all school-children to acquire a fair English education at public expense.

The Board of Apportionment express the same view; but last year, to the surprise of the friends of public education, the Board cut down the appropriation for Public Schools half a million—and did it at a time when there were many thousand children seeking admission to public schools, but could not get in for want of room, and were compelled to grow up in ignorance and in its accompanying vices.

This year the Board have cut down the appropriation nearly four hundred thousand dollars. These two disastrous and unstatesmanlike acts are probably the consequence of not understanding the facts.

I wish now to call the attention of your Honorable Board to a few of these facts:

On the first day of June, 1880, there were in the city of New York 385,000 children of the public-school age. The United States census shows this fact. The entire seating capacity of the public school-houses and rooms in the city at that time, did not exceed 130,000. The records of the Board of Education show this fact.

This excluded 255,000, or say two-thirds of the school children of the city, from the public schools.

The population of the city, in the last two years and a half, has increased very fast; at least 100,000 have been added to it.

This would give an addition of 32,000 school children; making to-day in the city 417,000 school children; but with accommodations in the public schools sufficient for only 130,000, thus excluding now from the public schools of the city 287,000 children who have a legal right to attend. It is the duty of the city government to provide accommodation for them.

This is about 70 per cent. of the whole number.

No new school-houses have been built in the last two years for the want of money in the hands of the Board of Education to build them.

The money appropriated by the Board of Apportionment for public education is less than ten dollars per head for each child having a right to attend the public schools.

So small an appropriation means the dwarfing of the intellects of the great majority of the rising generation in this city, and the reducing of their capacity to earn a living, from what it would be if properly educated, from twenty-five to fifty per cent.

It means an annual prevention of the increase of property, the result of industry and economy in the city, that comes of education, equal to many times the amount saved by cutting down the appropriation.

Children grown up in ignorance in this city, produce nine times as many criminals, and twenty times as many paupers as they would if provided with a good common school education. The statistics of pauperism and crime show this fact.

The annual expense entailed upon the city by the pauper and criminal classes, in supporting the one and protecting society against the other, amounts to five millions of dollars a year. An analysis of the annexed expenses shows the fact. This false economy of the Board of Apportionment will soon add annually to the pauper and criminal expenses of the city much more than the amount saved.

Unwise and imperfect administration of the School Department of the City Government is held up as a reason for cutting down the appropriation.

It is quite clear that the administration of the Board of Education is not what it should be.

As in other cities and countries that have a public school system, the Board of Education should take an annual census of the school children and their residence, so as to know for how many they have to provide.

They should divide the city into proper and convenient school districts, with a school-house in each district, instead of having it all one district, with school-houses located without regard to proximity of scholars. Then they would know when and where they have an excess, or a deficiency of school accommodation for the pupils that should attend school.

In this census they should take the names of the parents and the ages of all the children of the compulsory school-age, so that it might be possible for the Truant Officers to tell how many and who are growing up in ignorance, and where they are, and who are responsible for them, and what school they should attend.

By proper regulations as to attendance, they should bring the per capita expense of the different schools in the same grade to something near a uniformity, instead of as now expending four or five times as much per capita in some schools as in others of the same grade.

As corporal punishment is not allowed, but when the pupils become incorrigible they are thrust into the street to prey upon society, the Board should establish a truant or bad boy school, where this class could be properly instructed and reformed.

But these shortcomings of the Board of Education are no reason why the Board of Apportionment should reduce the appropriation so much as to make an efficient and universal common school system in the city impossible.

Such unwise economy is reducing the average grade of education of the children brought up in this city to such an extent that it places the city at a great disadvantage in comparison with other cities that do better by their children; and were it not for the educated people that come into the city from without, and the youth of the city that are sent out of the city to get the education that should be furnished them in the city, this unwise course would in a few years result in very serious consequences.

Public evils, social and industrial demoralization, and incompetent and corrupt administration of public affairs, are not only possible, but constant in this city; but would not be if proper attention were paid to public education.

The duty of the Board of Apportionment in this regard is simply to appropriate the money. When this is done the whole responsibility will be upon the Board of Education. The Aldermen should restore the appropriation to the amount asked for by the Board of Education.

GENTLEMEN—In view of the great loss of life that has recently taken place in your city and Philadelphia and other populous centres, where of necessity immense crowds are gathered, as in theatres and other public places of amusement, and in large manufacturing establishments, I most respectfully address your Honorable Bodies as to the practicability of devising some plan or system by which such disasters may be avoided in the future; and I would suggest a special corps or organization for the saving of human life, auxiliary to the Fire Department proper, and similar to the Special Fire Insurance Patrol for the saving of goods and merchandise.

Such a system is in operation in Paris (France) and in many of the large cities on the continent, and there are deemed indispensable.

Of the system I am fully conversant, being a member of the Corps de Sauvetege of Chau de Fonds in Switzerland, and later having formed a similar corps in the Canton de Vaux, of which the instructor.

The details and workings of this system I would be pleased to fully explain at any time that would suit the convenience of your Honorable Body.

Abstract of Proceedings for the week ending November 25, 1882.

WEDNESDAY, NOVEMBER 22, 1882.—ADJOURNED MEETING—9.30 A. M.

Present—Commissioners Lane, Wales, MacLean, and Olliffe.  
Commissioner MacLean in the chair.

The following communications were received:

From the Clerk of the Board of Aldermen, transmitting copies of the following resolutions:

- 1st. Resolution directing the New York and Harlem Railroad Company to erect a retaining wall along each side of their track, between One Hundred and Fifty-sixth and One Hundred and Sixty-second streets.
  - 2d. Resolution requesting the Commissioners of this Department to increase the pay of laborers to \$2 per day.
- From the Mayor, transmitting a resolution adopted by the Board of Aldermen, amending an ordinance relating to hackney coaches by providing additional stands in Twenty-third street, and Madison avenue at Madison square.
- From M. K. Jesup, President American Museum of Natural History, relative to placing signs upon the principal drives and walks in the Central Park, to indicate the location of the Museum.
- From the Comptroller, desiring to be furnished with information concerning the excavation of rock in the construction of a sewer in One Hundred and Thirty-ninth street, under contract with James W. O'Grady.
- From W. S. Dunn, in relation to the matter of the proposed grading of Sedgwick avenue.
- From the President of the Fire Department, desiring permission to place two fire-alarm telegraph poles on the east side of Union square, between Fifteenth and Seventeenth streets.
- From John D. Crimmins, in relation to the earth and stone on the park sidewalk of Fifty-ninth street, between the curb and the asphalt walk.

From the Superintendent of Parks, stating that the material referred to by Mr. Crimmins is the refuse from the work in grading for the asphalt walk, and that the material is such as was found on the ground by the contractor, and that the work is being done to his entire satisfaction.

From Francis Brenzinger, desiring permission to place and exhibit an achromatic telescope in the City Hall Park on 6th December, 1882.

From John S. McLean, in relation to keeping the ice on the Central Park lakes in good condition for skating during the coming season.

From the Counsel to the Corporation, submitting his opinion as to the informality of the proposal of the Passaic Rolling Mill Company for building the iron superstructure of the Madison avenue bridge.

Aldermen Keenan and Wells, from a Committee of the Board of Aldermen, appeared, requesting that the pay of the park-keepers be increased from \$2.40 to \$2.75 per day; gate-keepers from \$2.00 to \$2.40 per day; sergeants from \$3.00 to \$3.30 per day.

The Secretary was directed to communicate with the Board of Aldermen, requesting that the appropriation for salaries and supplies for park and gate keepers, be fixed at the sum of \$116,000.00, the amount as originally submitted by this Department to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and to state that in the opinion of the Commissioners of the Department such sum is necessary for the proper preservation of the parks and the payment of the force of keepers.

In accordance with the action of the Board at the last meeting, inviting property owners interested in the construction of a sewer in the Southern Boulevard to appear before the Board at this time and be heard in relation to the same, Messrs. L. B. Brown, Thomas Handbode, Bryan Lawrence, A. A. Levy, Capt. Brown, and others, appeared and were heard.

The following preamble and resolutions were adopted:

Inasmuch as the erection of poles on the sidewalks of the public parks has been attended with the destruction of the pavements around such poles,

Resolved, That hereafter, and before a permit is issued for the erection of any telegraph or electric light pole on the sidewalk of any park or square, the party making such application shall do so in writing, pledging to restore the pavement at his own expense, and to employ the person who originally laid the pavement, or such party as the Department may select to do the work, and that the pole so to be erected shall be first approved by the Superintendent of Parks, and the entire work done to his satisfaction.
