Sir—There were 677 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, December 17, 1887, which is an increase of 7, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 118 less than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1886. The actual mortality for the week ending December 10, 1887, was 699, which is 45.6 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 24.21 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,501,476.

The certificates of 722 births, 54 still-births, 231 marriages and 677 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, December 17, 1887. This shows a decrease of 44 births and 6 still-births and an increase of 22 marriages and 8 deaths, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1886 there was an increase of 147 births and 2 still-births and a decrease of 21 marriages and 18 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from whooping cough decreased 1; typhold fever, 3; malarial fevers, 1; inanition, 1; alcoholism, 2; rheumatism and gout, 1; pneumonia, 12; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 1; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 5; meningitis and encephalitis, 2; Bright's disease and nephritis, 9; cyanosis and atelectasis, 2; drowning, 1; while the deaths from measles increased 6; scarlatina, 1; diphtheria, 2; croup, 6; erysipelas, 1; puerperal diseases, 14; diarrhead diseases, 16; bronchitts, 1; heart diseases, 8; convulsions, 12; apoplexy, 4; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 12; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 1; premature and preternatural births, 4; surgical operations, 1, and suicide, 2. The number of deaths from cerebrospinal fever, cancer, phthisis pulmonalis, aneurism, gastritis, enteritis, gastro-enteritis, and peritonitis was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 143 were in institutions, 356 in tenement-houses, 161 in houses containing three families or less, 8 in hotels and boarding-houses, 9 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 10 were on the basement floor, 117 on the first, 168 on the second, 136 on the third, 73 on the fourth, 20 on the fifth, 1 on the sixth; 657 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 20 non-residents; 91 were stated to be single, 182 married, 91 widowed, and the condition of 313 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 677; still-births, 54; bodies in transitu, 16; of the total burial permits issued for city and still births, 77 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 722 births, 231 marriages, 54 still-births, 677 deaths; 16 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed and tabulated; 146 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 9 transcripts of the birth record, 9 of marriage, and 105 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending December 17, 1887, was 40.0 degrees Fahr.; the mean reading of the barometer was 20,836; the mean humidity was 65, saturation being 100; the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,201, and the total amount of rain-fall was 1.15 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.
