

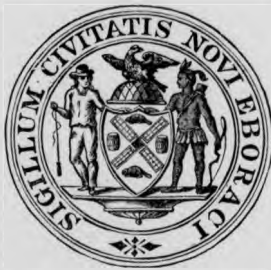

Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending January 30, 1886:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors was 5,632.

The number of complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors was 339.

During the past week 228 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

There were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port, 31 permits.

There were issued to consignees to discharge rags (in bulk, under bonds), 4 permits.

There were issued, under the Sanitary Code, 7 miscellaneous permits.

There were issued to scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks, 24 permits.

At premises where contagious diseases were reported 65 visits were made, and 48 disinfections and 18 fumigations were performed.

The number of cases of contagious disease removed to Riverside Hospital was 20.

The number of vaccinations performed was 1,640, of which 47 were primary, and 1,593 re-vaccinations.

There were seized and condemned 6,395 pounds of meat, and 600 pounds of fish.

The number of specimens of milk examined was 38, the number of analyses of same made was 1, the number of quarts of adulterated milk destroyed was 10, the number of arrests made was 2, and the amount of fines imposed was \$20.

The certificates of 603 births, 61 still-births, 220 marriages, and 652 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, January 30, 1886. This shows a decrease of 71 births and 64 deaths, and an increase of 4 still-births and 20 marriages when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1885, there was an increase of 24 births, and a decrease of 3 still-births, 62 marriages, and 25 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from measles decreased 1; scarlatina, 3; croup, 10; typhoid fever, 2; cerebro spinal fever, 3; malarial fever, 9; cancer, 7; phthisis pulmonalis, 38; bronchitis, 3; pneumonia, 7; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 2; convulsions, 2; apoplexy, 4; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 2; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 1; gastritis, enteritis and peritonitis, 5; cyanosis and atelectasis, 2; premature and pretermaternal births, 13; while the deaths from diphtheria increased 2; erysipelas, 3; puerperal diseases, 1; diarrheal diseases, 7; inanition, 2; alcoholism, 4; rheumatism and gout, 2; heart diseases, 10; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 2; meningitis and encephalitis, 10; Bright's disease and nephritis, 2; surgical operations, 1; drowning, 1. The number of deaths from small-pox, whooping-cough, and suicide was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

The ages of 156 of the persons who died during the week were reported to be under one year, 218 under two years, 266 under five years, and 40 seventy years and over, which shows that the number of deaths of children under five years of age was 22 less than the number reported during the preceding week, and represent 40.80 per cent. of the total weekly mortality.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 116 were in institutions, 371 in tenement-houses, 137 in houses containing three families or less, 17 in hotels and boarding-houses, 11 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 9 were on the basement floor, 150 on the first, 151 on the second, 110 on the third, 72 on the fourth, 24 on the fifth, 0 on the sixth; 630 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 13 non-residents; 84 were stated to be single, 178 married, 83 widowed, and the condition of 307 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week were as follows, viz.: City deaths, 652; still-births, 61; bodies in transitu, 14; of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births, 70 were upon certificates received from the Coroners; 604 burials, 220 marriages, 61 still-births, 652 deaths; 14 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed and tabulated; 109 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 9 transcripts of the birth record, 7 of marriage, and 74 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending January 30, 1886, was 28.5 degrees Fahr.; the mean reading of the barometer was 29.833; the mean humidity was 84, saturation being 100; the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,320, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.96 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

twenty days the water in the city reservoirs has gone
down three feet three inches, equal to 9,000,000 gallons,

Aqueduct and the Bronx river conduit. The Department
has no means to stop this enormous waste, which is
caused by consumers keeping faucets open day and night
to prevent freezing in the service-pipes, and can only
make this most urgent appeal to them to stop it, and
notify about their houses if they suspect the pressure in the
water-mains will be so much reduced that in a few days
the water will not rise to the basements and cellars in
thousands of buildings.
