On motion of Commissioner Cram, the resolution adopted February 26, 1891, was amended so as to read as follows: Resolved, That permission be and hereby is granted to Horatio D. Mould to erect and main-tain a platform for discharging ice on the westerly side of Pier 53, East river, near the foot of Jack-son street, provided he agrees to pay as compensation for the use of the land under water to be covered by said platform, the sum of one hundred and twenty-five dollars (\$125) per annum, pay-able monthly when due to the Treasurer of this Department, commencing from the time when the said platform is ready for occupancy, the platform to be built under the supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department, and to be and remain only during the pleasure of the Board. Richard Lacey, James Dyckman, James J. Coogan, Clark Bell and George W. Sauer, a committee appointed by an association of property-owners, contractors, builders, and tax payers (whose object is the improvement of Harlem river), appeared before the Board. Richard Lacey, on behalf of the committee, submitted a communication signed by Dwight H. Olmstead, requesting the Board to improve the Harlem river, from One Hundred and Thirty-fifth to One Hundred and Seventieth street, which was ordered to be placed on file. Two plans embracing contemplated improvements of this section of the Harlem river were shown the committee. They stated that either would be satisfactory.
