An Ordinance to amend section 44 of article 4 of chapter 42 of the Revised Ordinances of 1866, entitled "Of pawnbrokers, dealers in second-hand articles, and keepers of junk-shore." shops."

"§ 44. A separate license shall be obtained by the owner thereof, for each and every cart, wagon, or other vehicle, boat or other vessel; and the

or other vehicle, boat or other vessel; and the owner of ever such licensed cart or other vehicle, owner of ever such licensed cart or other vehicle, boat or other vessel, shall procure for every such cart or other vehicle, boat or other vessel, one metal badge containing the license-number of such cart or boat, and no person shall buy or sell, or solicit for the purchase or sale of any rags, bottles, old metal, or junk of any description, unless he have such badge conspicuously displayed upon his person, under a penalty of not less than \$1, nor more than \$25 for every offense; the form and material of such badge shall be determined by the Mayor." Sec. 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.
