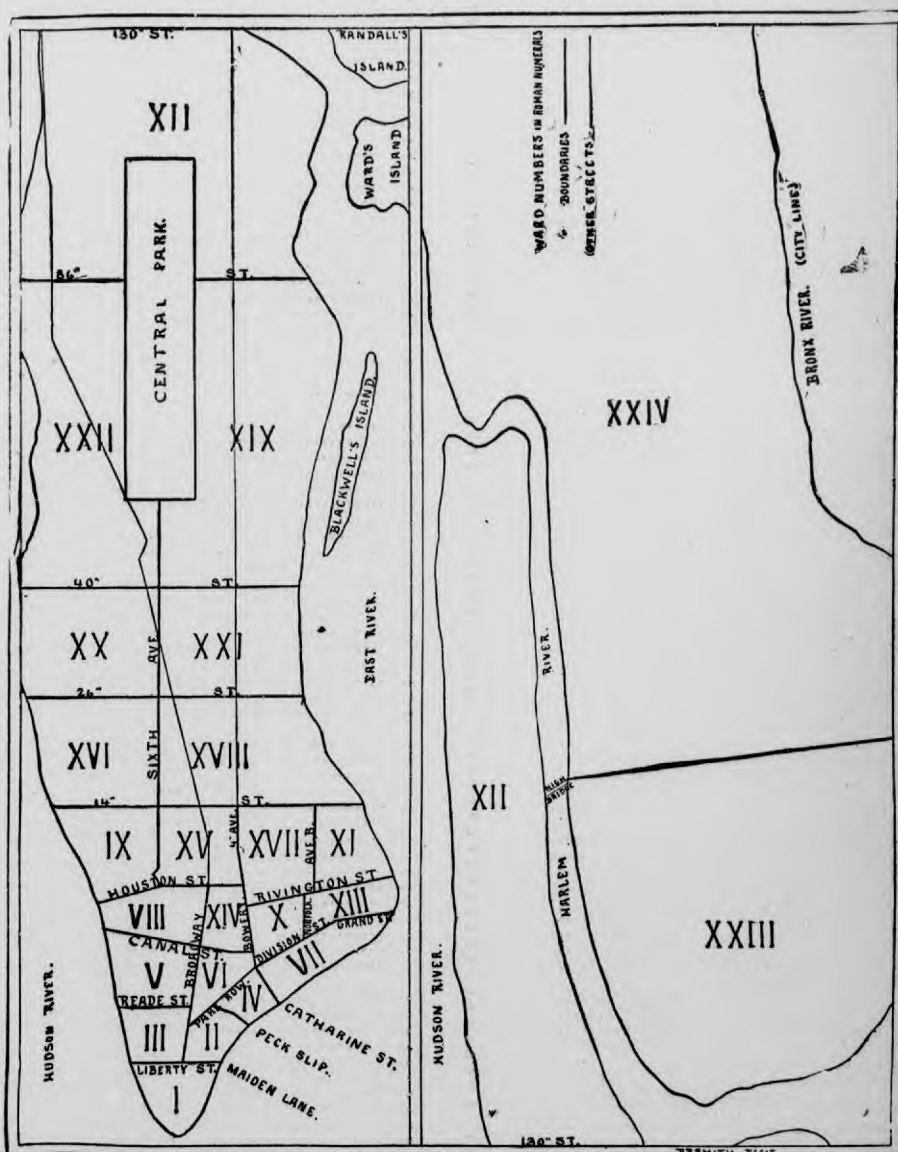

The 670 deaths represent a death-rate of 17.55, against 18.88 for the previous week and 22.34 for the corresponding week of 1893.

Contagious and infectious diseases show a slight decrease, the number of cases reported of diphtheria, measles, scarlet fever, typhoid fever and small-pox being respectively 183, 52, 109, 8 and 4, against 172, 78, 102, 23 and 5 for the previous week, a total of 356 against 380. The increase of diphtheria was mainly in the Eleventh and Nineteenth Wards, and the decrease in the Twelfth and Twentieth Wards. The increase of measles was most marked in the Tenth Ward, and the decrease in the Twenty-second Ward. The increase of scarlet fever was chiefly in the Thirteenth, Seventeenth and Nineteenth Wards, and the decrease in the Eleventh and Sixteenth Wards. Six of the 8 cases of typhoid fever were above Fortieth street, and 1 of the remaining 2 was below Fourteenth street, East. The 4 cases of small-pox were pretty well scattered.

Whereas, Said maps have not as yet been filed; and

Whereas, The said Commissioner of Street Improvements has not, in fact, ever submitted to the Board of Street Opening and Improvement for its approval or concurrence any map or plan showing the laying-out of a street on the line of the Mott Haven Canal south of One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street;

Resolved, That the Board of Street Opening and Improvement hereby rescinds its action, aforesaid, so far as relates to the laying-out of a street on the line of the Mott Haven Canal south of the southerly line of East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street, but it hereby ratifies and confirms the action of said Board in all other respects.

Resolved, That the Commissioner of Street Improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, be and he hereby is designated and directed to cause three similar maps or plans to be made showing the laying-out of a street on the line of the Mott Haven Canal, from the southerly line of East One Hundred and Thirty-eighth street to East One Hundred and Forty-fourth street, and extension of East One Hundred and Fortieth street and East One Hundred and Forty-first street, from Rider avenue to Railroad avenue, East, in the Twenty-third Ward of the City of New York, to be certified by him and to cause the same to be filed in the manner now prescribed by law; one in the office of the Secretary of State of the State of New York, one in the office of the Register of the City and County of New York, and one in the office of the Commissioner of Street Improvements of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards.

Any person making an estimate for the above work shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope to the President of said Armory Board, indorsed "Estimate for Furnishing Materials and Work in Making the Alterations and Repairs to the Ship 'New Hampshire,' in use as an Armory at the foot of East Twenty-eighth street, New York City," and also with the name of the person or persons presenting the same, and the date of its presentation.

Any bidder for this contract must be known to be engaged in and well prepared for the business, and must have satisfactory testimonials to that effect; and the person or persons to whom the contract may be awarded will be required to give security for the performance of the contract, by his or their bond, with two sufficient sureties, in the amount of FIFTEEN HUNDRED DOLLARS (\$1,500).

Bidders are required to submit their estimates upon the following express conditions, which shall apply to and become part of every estimate received:

1st. Bidders must satisfy themselves, by personal examination of the location of the proposed work, and by such other means as they may prefer, as to the accuracy of the estimate, and shall not at any time after the submission of an estimate dispute or complain of the statement of quantities, nor assert that there was any misunderstanding in regard to the nature or amount of the work to be done.

2d. Bidders will be required to complete the entire work to the satisfaction of the Armory Board, and in substantial accordance with the specifications of the contract and the plans therein referred to. No extra compensation, beyond the amount payable for the work before mentioned, which shall be actually performed, at the prices therefor to be specified by the lowest bidder, shall be due or payable for the entire work.

Bidders will state in their estimates a price for the whole of the work to be done, in conformity with the approved form of contract and the specifications therein set forth, by which price the bids will be tested. This price is to cover all expenses of every kind involved in or incidental to the fulfillment of the contract, including any claim that may arise through delay, from any cause in the performing of the work thereunder.

Bidders will distinctly write out, both in words and in figures, the amount of their estimates for doing this work.

The person or persons to whom the contract may be awarded will be required to attend at this office, with the sureties offered by him or them, and execute the contract within five days from the date of the service of a notice to that effect; and in case of failure or neglect so to do, he or they will be considered as having abandoned it, and as in default to the Corporation; and the contract will be readvertised and relet, and so on, until it be accepted and executed.

Bidders are required to state in their estimates their names and places of residence; the names of all persons interested with them therein; and if no other person be so interested, the estimate shall distinctly state the fact; also that the estimate is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and that it is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud; and also that no member of the Common Council, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of the Corporation, is directly or indirectly interested therein, or in the supplies or work to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof; which estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party making the estimate that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true. Where more than one person is interested, it is requisite that the verification be made and subscribed to by all the parties interested.

Each estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders of the City of New York, with their respective places of business or residence, to the effect that if the contract be awarded to the person or persons making the estimate, they will, upon its being so awarded, become bound as his or their sureties for its faithful performance; and that if said person or persons shall omit or refuse to execute the contract, they will pay to the Corporation of the City of New York any difference between the sum to which said person or persons would be entitled upon its completion and that which said Corporation or the Armory Board may be obliged to pay to the person to whom the contract may be awarded at any subsequent letting; the amount in each case to be calculated upon the estimated amount of the work to be done by which the bids are tested. #### TO OWNERS OF LANDS ORIGINALLY ACQUIRED BY WATER GRANTS

ATTENTION IS CALLED TO THE RECENT act of the Legislature (chapter 449, Laws of 1889), which provides that whenever any streets or avenues in the city, described in any grant of land under water, from the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty containing covenants requiring the grantees and their successors to pave, repave, keep in repair or maintain such streets shall be in need of repairs, pavement or repavement, the Common Council may, by ordinance, require the same to be paved, repaved or repaired, and the expense thereof to be assessed on the property benefited; and whenever the owner of a lot so assessed shall have paid the assessment levied for such paving, repaving or repairing, such payment shall release and discharge such owner from any and every covenant and obligation as to paving, repaving and repairing, contained in the water grant under which the premises are held, and no further assessment shall be imposed on such lot for paving, repaving or repairing such street or avenue, unless it shall be petitioned for by a majority of the owners of the property (who shall also be the owners of a majority of the property in frontage) on the line of the proposed improvement.
