Contracts Awarded.

The proposals submitted at public letting and laid over were disposed of as The contract for furnishing hay, straw, oats and bran for the Borough of Man-

hattan was awarded to Horace Ingersoll on his proposal of \$23,536. The contract for furnishing hay, straw, oats and bran for the Borough of The Bronx was awarded to George N. Reinhardt on his proposal of \$6,305.
