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## DEPARTMENT OF DOCKS AND FERRIES.

Transactions of the Department of Docks and Ferries for the Week Ending Saturday, June 27, 1903.

The following communications were received and ordered on file, action being taken thereon as stated, to wit:

From the Mayor—

First—Transmitting communications from J. O. Ward, No. 43 South street, New York, complaining of the unclean condition of the street in the rear of the bulkhead between Piers, old 12 and 13, and at Pier, new 32, East river, and from R. W. Graham, No. 477 Central Park West, New York City, protesting against the erection of an additional landing at the Battery. Mr. Ward notified that his communication has been forwarded to the Commissioner of Street Cleaning with statement that this Department would be glad to have the localities mentioned cleaned by the Department of Street Cleaning. Mr. Graham notified that the additional landing now being constructed at the Battery is being built by the contractors for the Rapid Transit tunnel to Brooklyn, and is a temporary structure to take the place of the existing steamboat landing which is to be occupied by the tunnel company for disposing of their excavation; that the private bath at the Battery has been there for some forty years and the other bath is a free public institution maintained by the Borough President, that being the only location therefor between the Battery and Jackson street on the East river, and between the Battery and Little West Twelfth street, on the North river.

Second—Transmitting communication from the East Side Civic Club, suggesting that the East Third street Recreation Pier be turned over to the Board of Education on September 1, 1903, in order that ample time may be allowed to put the pier in condition for school purposes. The Mayor and the East Side Civic Club notified that the pier in question is in one of the most thickly populated tenement districts of the City; that complaints are continually made to the Department in regard to the closing of the pier, and that it should be kept open for recreation purposes until October 16, 1903, as all the other recreation piers are.

From the Comptroller, transmitting application of Isaac G. Johnson & Co. for a grant of land under water at Spuyten Duyvil Creek, and requesting that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be advised as to whether the Department has any objection to making the grants applied for. Sketch showing the most desirable position for proposed public dock at Spuyten Duyvil with suitable approaches thereto, transmitted to the Comptroller.

From the Corporation Counsel—

First—Approving terms of sale of the buildings on the block between Little West Twelfth street and West Thirteenth street, west of Tenth avenue, with the exception that the machinery owned by the City now in the buildings should either be sold with the buildings or separately, as may be deemed best.

Second—Transmitting resolution from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on May 29, 1903, fixing the terms and conditions of the grant of the franchise made by the Board of Aldermen to the Erie Railroad Company on March 3, 1902, for the laying of tracks on the marginal street, between Twenty-seventh and Twenty-ninth streets, North river.

Third—Suggesting that a conference be had between the Engineers of the Department of Docks and Ferries and those of the Borough of Manhattan relative to the commencement of the work of construction of a marginal street between Sixty-fourth and Eighty-first streets, on the East river. Notified that the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department has been directed to take necessary steps for the conference suggested.

From the Municipal Civil Service Commission, stating that the titles of Walter S. Graham, Thomas E. Brady, Jeremiah Crowley, James Rafferty and James McCabe cannot be changed to Foreman of Laborers, as there is now a preferred list for the position of Foreman.

From the President of the Borough of Richmond, stating that he understands the Department of Docks and Ferries to have full authority for constructing such dredges as the Department may need, and that as far as the Borough of Richmond is concerned, he does not see any need at the present time or in the near future for dredging other than what would naturally come under the care of the Department.

From the Commissioners of Accounts, disapproving of triplicate wharfage tickets and advocating the use of a duplicate wharfage ticket. Order for 40,000 wharfage tickets at 30 cents per book of 100 tickets to W. H. Campbell.

From the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, requesting to be advised as to whether the proposed establishment of a ferry between Northfield, Borough of Richmond, and Elizabethport, N. J., refers to the present ferry. Notified that the proposed franchise refers to the present ferry, diagrams of which may be seen on any map of Richmond County; that on April 22, 1896, the County Judge of Richmond County granted a license for five years to the New York and Staten Island Ferry Company for

the operation of the ferry in question; that in April, 1901, the County Judge granted what purported to be an additional license for the ferry and that the object of the communication to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund is to have the ferry established in the usual way and then to offer such franchise for sale.

From the Secretary of State—

First—Stating that C. D. Burrus, of the State Engineer and Surveyor's Office, who did the original work, is willing to make a copy of the index page of grants of land under water in the Borough of Queens at a cost of \$10. Ordered, at \$10.

Second—Stating that grants of land under water in the Borough of Manhattan have not been plotted in a similar manner as are the grants in the Boroughs of Brooklyn, Queens and Richmond, and that a list affecting the Borough of Manhattan cannot therefore be granted.

From the War Department, suggesting that the Department submit a technical engineering report relative to the proposed change in lines on the North river, and stating that it is of much importance that the War Department should have before it any arguments bearing upon the question.

From the Engineer-in-Chief—

First—Submitting partial report on Bureau Order No. 1272, stating that he has prepared plans, specifications and form of contract for building Pier, new 38, East river; that the property in front of which the proposed pier is to be built has not yet been acquired by the City; that Pier, old 49, East river, which is a private pier, would seriously interfere with the use of the westerly side of the proposed pier; and requesting further instructions with reference to submitting plans and specifications for Pier, new 38, East river. Engineer-in-Chief directed to proceed with the preparation of plans for Pier, new 38, East river. New York, New Haven and Hartford Railroad Company (Captain J. W. Miller, General Manager) notified that the matter of the company's title is now in the hands of the Corporation Counsel for investigation, and requested to advise whether they desire the Department to proceed with the erection of Pier, new 38, East river, as soon as the Corporation Counsel certifies that the company has a good title to the premises south of Montgomery street.

Second—Reporting need of an additional Stenographer and Typewriter in the place of Addison Kavanagh, resigned, and requesting that he be permitted to assign the various Stenographers and Typewriters in his Bureau to such work as in his opinion will best serve the interests of the Bureau. Municipal Civil Service Commission requested to furnish a list of persons eligible for appointment as Stenographer and Typewriter, and the request of the Engineer-in-Chief relative to assignment of Stenographers granted.

Third—Recommending that the title of Charles Johnson No. 2, Dockbuilder, be changed to Foreman Dockbuilder, with compensation at the rate fixed for that position. Denied.

From the Astoria Light, Heat and Power Company, transmitting notice of application to be made to the Commissioners of the Land Office for a grant of land under water at Luyster creek and Berrian Island. Corporation Counsel notified.

From American Ice Company, returning bill of the Department for \$150.84, cost of removing the building on the south side of East Ninety-third street, and stating that they are not the owners of the said building. Corporation Counsel requested to furnish the Department with Mr. Renwick's address or the name of his attorney, or the name of the owner of the property.

From Franklin Bartlett, attorney, requesting, on behalf of the estate of Heyward Cutting, estate of Francis B. Cutting and of the estate of Thomas Miller, an extension of time to January 1, 1904, in which to build Twelfth avenue, between the centre line of Forty-sixth street and the centre line of Forty-seventh street, on the North river, as ordered by the Board of Docks on July 19, 1901. Time extended to October 6, 1903.

From Harold P. Brown, complaining of the dumping of ashes on the new made land in the vicinity of Piers 14 and 15, North river, by the American and Red Star lines. Notified that the cause of complaint has been removed.

From the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company and the Brooklyn Heights Railroad Company, requesting to be advised as to when the dredging is to be done by the Department at the foot of Division avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn. Notified that the bids received for the dredging contract under which this work was to have been done have been rejected and said contract is now being readvertised, and also that if the dredging in front of their premises is urgent it might be well for them to proceed with the work independent of the dredging to be done by the City.

From the Consolidated Gas Company of New York, declining the offer of the Department for the purchase of the bulkhead rights between Forty-first and Forty-second streets, North river, the proposed offer being insufficient, and stating that if the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund will authorize an offer for the property and rights at a reasonable valuation, the matter will be taken under consideration.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment was requested to consent to and authorize the institution of condemnation proceedings for the acquisition of the following described property:

The land, land under water and bulkhead rights between the northerly line of West Forty-first street and the southerly line of West Forty-second street, North river, including the bulkhead westerly of the westerly side of Twelfth avenue, in the Borough of Manhattan, City of New York, together with the riparian rights and privileges, the right to collect wharfage and cranes at said bulkhead, and all other rights, terms, easements and privileges appertaining thereto.

From Nicholas J. Carey, requesting permission to maintain a boat float between Twenty-fourth and Twenty-fifth streets, East river. Application denied, as the slip is used for the storage of timber by the Department.

From the Central Railroad Company of New Jersey, requesting a ten-years' lease, with renewal privilege of ten years, of the bulkhead extending from the northerly side of Pier, new 32, to the southerly side of Pier, new 33, North river, together with the new made land extending inshore a distance of 50 feet, with the privilege of erecting a shed on the new made land. Notified that the Department will entertain a proposition along the foregoing lines for a lease at the rate of \$2.080 per annum for the 87 feet of bulkhead north of Pier, new 31; that the length of the bulkhead is 102 feet, but that the ramp leading to the dumps at present existing extends 15 feet over the bulkhead, and that it will be necessary for said company to furnish the Department with a diagram showing the maximum exact dimensions of the float which it proposes to moor at said bulkhead before this matter can be finally passed upon.

From John W. Crump, requesting reinstatement as Timekeeper on the recreation piers. Application denied, no Timekeepers being employed on the recreation piers.

From the Edison Electric Illuminating Company, stating that the Corporation Counsel has decided that the City has no authority to charge compensation for the privilege of laying submarine cables across Gowanus Canal, Borough of Brooklyn, at Hamilton avenue. Forwarded to the Corporation Counsel in connection with said company's previous communication in this matter.

From the Erie Railroad Company—

First—Accepting the permit for the use of the bulkhead between Twenty-seventh and Twenty-eighth streets, North river, with the understanding that as soon as possible after approval by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of a lease of the bulkhead, such lease will be granted to the Erie Railroad Company for a term of ten years, with a renewal term of ten years.

Second—Accepting offer of lease of bulkhead between Piers 57 and 58, North river, for a term of ten years, with a renewal term of ten years; the rental for the first term to be at the rate of \$20 per linear foot for the 162 feet of bulkhead, plus 25 cents per square foot per annum for such land under water as may be covered by their transfer bridge, etc., and \$200 for each double track crossing the marginal street. Permit granted to Erie Railroad Company of the premises above referred to, as herein-after mentioned, and the Engineer-in-Chief directed to supervise the erection of bridge in front of the bulkhead in accordance with amended plan.

From the Edison Electric Illuminating Company of Brooklyn, requesting permission to build a pier and basin between Wakeman place and Sixty-sixth street, Borough of Brooklyn. Notified that the City claims ownership of the property at the foot of Sixty-sixth street, and also claims that a portion of said company's building is located within the lines of the street and upon property which is owned by the City, and



that the matter has been referred to the Corporation Counsel for his opinion on the subject.

From Joseph Gilbert, attorney, requesting copy of the rules and regulations of the Department. Notified that the same are now out of print, but that a copy of the rules and regulations may be read at the office of the Superintendent of Docks; also that the procedure of the Department is governed by the Greater New York Charter and the amendments thereto.

From Joseph Heller, declining appointment as Recreation Pier Attendant. Municipal Civil Service Commission notified.

From Freeman F. Huntington, Laborer, requesting that he be promoted to the position of Foreman Laborer so that he may be able to enter any future examination for the position of Messenger. Application denied.

From the Hoboken Ferry Company, requesting a lease of 225 feet of bulkhead near the foot of Twenty-second street, North river, and inclosing diagram of property desired, which is to be occupied by ferry house of the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western Railroad Company.

The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund were requested to approve a lease to the Hoboken Ferry Company of franchises for ferries from a point between Twenty-second and Twenty-third streets, North river, in The City of New York over and across the waters of the Hudson river to the landing places of the said ferry company in the City of Hoboken, State of New Jersey, together with the property belonging to The City of New York to be used in connection with said franchises, upon the following terms and conditions:

First—The City to lease to the Hoboken Ferry Company the property described in the annexed memorandum entitled "Technical description of limiting lines within which it is proposed to lease to the Hoboken Ferry Company for ferry purposes in the vicinity of West Twenty-third street, North river."

Second—The right to run ferries from a point between Twenty-second and Twenty-third streets, North river, in The City of New York over and across the waters of the Hudson river to the landing places of the said Ferry Company in the City of Hoboken, State of New Jersey.

Third—The lease to be for a term of ten years with the privilege of a renewal for a further term of ten years.

Fourth—Rental for the first term to be fixed as follows:

For the wharf property and land under water used in connection therewith, the sum of..... \$32,149 00  
For the ferry franchise, the sum of (per annum)..... 1 00

Fifth—The annual rental for the renewal term to be fixed as follows:

For wharf property and land under water used in connection therewith, the sum of..... \$37,099 00  
For the ferry franchise the sum of (per annum)..... 1 00

Sixth—The Hoboken Ferry Company to surrender its right, title and interest in and to the franchise and right to operate a ferry from the foot of Fourteenth street, in The City of New York, to the landing place of said Ferry Company in the city of Hoboken.

Seventh—The City to lease to the Hoboken Ferry Company about 225 feet of bulkhead, together with the land under water in front of same, to be used in connection with and for the purposes of said ferry, a technical description of which is hereto attached, and leaving for the sole use of the pier marked "No. 62" on said map a slip to the south of said premises (as shown in pink) of 86.19 feet broad, the Ferry Company to have no wharfage rights, nor any right to make fast, nor in any way use or occupy the space along the line marked "AB" on the accompanying map.

Eighth—The rental to commence upon the completion of the bulkhead or river wall on and in front of which the ferry structures are to be erected.

Ninth—The remainder of the terms and conditions of the lease to be similar to those now used in the leases of ferry franchises and wharf property in this Department, a copy of which may be seen and examined at the office of the Secretary, Pier "A," Battery place, New York City.

The Commissioner recommended the adoption by the unanimous vote of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of a resolution authorizing the leasing of the franchise and wharf property to the Hoboken Ferry Company by private agreement, for the term above set forth, and under such conditions as in the judgment of said Commission will best protect and further the interests of the City and the traveling public, which conditions are set forth in the above communication and in the form of lease of ferry franchise and wharf property now used by the Department.

Technical Description of Limiting Lines Within Which It Is Proposed to Lease to Hoboken Ferry Company Property for Ferry Purposes in the Vicinity of West Twenty-second Street, North River.

The limiting area proposed for ferry platform and ferry bridges is bounded and described as follows:

Beginning at a point in the bulkhead line established in 1871 distant 180.82 feet southerly, measured along said bulkhead line from the southerly side of Pier No. 63, or West Twenty-third street pier, and running thence southerly along said bulkhead line 180.82 feet to the westerly prolongation of the southerly side of West Twenty-second street, said point being the southerly end of the bulkhead line established in this vicinity in 1871, as intercepted by the bulkhead line of 1897.

Thence easterly along the westerly prolongation of the southerly side of West Twenty-second street and along the bulkhead line established in 1897 121.34 feet to a point where a line drawn parallel with and 86.19 feet northerly from the northerly side of Pier 62 intersects the same.

Running thence westerly along said parallel line 321.57 feet to a line drawn parallel with and 200 feet westerly from the bulkhead line established in 1871.

Thence northerly along said line drawn parallel with the bulkhead line of 1871 260.51 feet.

Thence easterly in a straight line 200.34 feet to the point or place of beginning, the herein described area for platform, ferry bridges, etc.

The limiting area for ferry racks, "A" piers or center piers, etc., is bounded and described as follows:

Beginning at the southwesterly corner of the platform area hereinbefore described and running thence westerly in the prolongation of the southerly side of the hereinbefore described platform area to the pierhead line as modified by the Secretary of War in 1897.

Thence northerly along said pierhead line 314.53 feet to a point in the prolongation of the northerly side of the hereinbefore described platform area.

Thence easterly and along said westerly prolongation in a straight line to the westerly side and northwesterly corner of the hereinbefore described platform area.

Thence southerly along the westerly side of the hereinbefore described platform area 265.51 feet to the point or place of beginning, the herein described area for ferry racks, "A" piers, center piers, etc.

From the Independent Contracting Company, requesting permission to maintain a floating dump at the foot of Little West Twelfth street, North river, and submitting plan of the approach therefor. Said company requested to furnish the Department with exact statement of what it will cost it to put the premises at the foot of Little West Twelfth street in proper condition for dumping purposes.

From C. H. Mallory & Co., requesting to be advised as to when the dredging will be done in the slips between Piers, old 20 and new 16, East river. Notified that contract No. 768 for dredging, under which this work is to be done, is now being re-advertised.

From William J. McGirr, reporting that the approach to the dump foot of Forty-fourth street, North river, has not been repaved, and that it is practically impossible for trucks to pass during wet weather. Commissioner of Public Works requested to have pavement repaired, and Mr. McGirr notified of this action.

From Daniel McPeak, Foreman of Laborers, requesting that he be granted a vacation of two weeks. Two weeks' vacation granted, commencing June 27, 1903, without pay.

From Narrows Ferry Company, requesting a lease of the franchise for the operation of a ferry from Bath Beach, Borough of Brooklyn, to South Beach in the Borough of Richmond. Lease of the franchise for above mentioned ferry ordered to be advertised for sale at public auction in accordance with recommendation of the Secretary.

From John I. O'Brien Printing Company, stating that the printing of the Department index to the minutes of 1901 is now being pushed vigorously and will be completed by July 1, 1903. Notified that in the event of its failure to furnish the 175 copies of the index on or before June 30, 1903, the order will be canceled.

From Pennsylvania Railroad Company, requesting that Piers 27 and 28, North

river, be extended to the pierhead line, and that they be granted permission to shed the piers, and that in order to justify the increased expenditure that renewal leases be granted for both piers for ten years from September 1, 1904, with the option of ten years further renewal. Said company requested to advise the Department whether it will be agreeable to it to pay for the extensions until the termination of its present lease at the same rate it now pays for the piers under its lease; that this would mean an addition, until the termination of its present lease, to wit: September 1, 1904, of \$29,118.25 per annum for both extensions; that these extensions will be quite costly; that after September 1, 1904, the rate to be charged for both piers and extensions to be the usual ten per cent. advance on the present rate; the lease, of course, to include the right to shed the extensions and to provide for one renewal of ten years upon the usual advance of ten per cent.

From H. C. Pearce, protesting against the awarding of Contract No. 779 for furnishing cobble, to the Phoenix Towing and Transportation Company, and stating that he based his bid upon the fact that the invitation for the bids and the specifications called for two classes of materials. Protest subsequently withdrawn.

From Pennsylvania Railroad Company, Owl Commercial Company, and sixteen others, requesting that the Department leave the Pier foot of East Twenty-eighth street open for public use, as it is very much needed to accommodate the general wharfage requirements in that vicinity. The Mayor was heretofore notified that the Department had no intention of setting aside the Pier foot of East Twenty-eighth street for other than general wharfage purposes.

From George Ross, accepting the offer of the Department for a lease of the ferry from South Beach in the Borough of Richmond to Bath Beach, Borough of Brooklyn. Notified that the franchise will be offered for sale at auction.

From Richmond Borough Realty Company, stating that they will submit, within a few days a plan for a dock at the foot of Summerfield avenue, Borough of Richmond, and that if granted a lease of the premises he will defend the City's title to the property.

From J. P. Sloane, requesting employment as Appraiser for the Department on property in the Borough of Brooklyn. Requested to call upon the Commissioner and state what appraisals he has made of property in the Newtown Creek District of the Borough of Brooklyn.

From A. L. Tuska, stating that The Bronx Contracting Company have completed the work of rebuilding the platform between One Hundred and Fifth and One Hundred and Sixth streets, Harlem river, and asking to be advised as to whether the work has been done to the satisfaction of this Department. Notified that the work was done in substantial accordance with the plans submitted.

From Louis O. Van Doren, requesting to be advised as to what steps have been taken by the Department toward the construction of the exterior street between Sixty-fourth and Eighty-first streets, East river. Notified that if he will communicate with the Corporation Counsel, fixing a time agreeable to him for a conference on the above matter, the Commissioner and the Engineer-in-Chief will attend, with plans and estimates of the cost of construction of the exterior street referred to.

From Thomas Ward, requesting that dredging be done south of Eightieth street, North river. Notified that objections to the maintenance of his coal yard and structures have been filed with this Department, and to do no work in connection therewith until a hearing is held upon said objections.

From Agent for Williams Line, requesting that they be permitted to temporarily place part of cargo of lumber on docks while unloading other portions of cargo thereat. Notified that this method of discharging lumber would be a violation of the rules of the Department, and would very often interfere with the adjoining gangways of other vessels, and that the practice cannot be allowed.

The following permits were granted, the work to be done under the direction and supervision of the Engineer-in-Chief:

The Mott Haven Company, to build a crib bulkhead on the Harlem river, in the Borough of The Bronx, in the vicinity of One Hundred and Forty-fourth street, the work to be done in accordance with plans submitted.

Estate of William Beard, to erect a single story shed on the east side of Richard street, Erie basin, Borough of Brooklyn, the work to be done in accordance with plans submitted as amended, and the structure to remain thereat only during the pleasure of the Commissioner of Docks.

Hamburg-American Line, to dredge in the slip adjoining Pier foot of West Twenty-fifth street, North river.

William J. McGirr, to dredge under his dumping board, foot of Forty-fourth street, North river.

Alexander C. Chenoweth, to dredge in front of his dumping board, foot of West Forty-seventh street, North river.

Arthur Von Briesen, to build two small cribs, platform and basin, to be used for bath purposes at Fort Wardsworth, Borough of Richmond, the structures to remain thereat only during the pleasure of the Commissioner of Docks.

The following permits were granted, the privilege to continue only during the pleasure of the Commissioner of Docks, but not longer than April 30, 1904:

John McDermott & Son, to use and occupy the northerly half of Pier, old 54, East river, foot of Jackson street, at a rental of \$75 per month, commencing from the date they take possession of the premises; the permittees to vacate the berth at the bulkhead between Piers, new 32 and 33, East river, immediately.

Bouker Contracting Company, to load cellar dirt from the bulkhead foot of East Sixteenth street, compensation to be paid for the privilege at the rate of \$10 per day.

William J. McGirr, to use and occupy an additional space 25x100 feet in the rear of bulkhead between Fifty-second and Fifty-third streets, North river, compensation to be paid for the privilege at the rate of \$300 per annum, to commence from the time the permittee begins to use the premises.

William Healy, to maintain a newspaper stand in front of the ferry at the foot of Liberty street, North river, compensation to be paid for the privilege at the rate of \$2 per month.

The following permits were granted on the usual terms:

Empire City Subway Company, to open the pavement for the purpose of running a telephone service to Pier, new 22, North river, for the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad Company.

Cornell Steamboat Company, to lay a Croton water supply pipe from the water main to the Pier foot of West Fifty-first street, North river.

Consolidated Gas Company of New York, to take up and relay the pavement on property under the jurisdiction of this Department, for a period until December 31, 1903, for the purpose of making repairs to gas pipes along the water front; twenty-four hours' notice to be given to this Department prior to the commencement of any work.

The Corporation Counsel approved printer's proofs of the following contracts:

No. 708, for dredging between West Fifteenth and West Sixteenth streets, and at West Eighteenth street, on the North river.

No. 799, for dredging between West Thirteenth and West Fifteenth streets, North river.

No. 800, for dredging between Bloomfield and Little West Twelfth streets, on the North river.

The Corporation Counsel approved blank form of Contract No. 781, for repairing and painting the recreation pier foot of Metropolitan avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, under Class VII. of said contract; and also the form of advertisement of Contracts No. 768 for dredging on the East and Harlem rivers, No. 779, Class II., for furnishing rip-rap stone, No. 782 for furnishing granite stone, No. 794 for 10,000 barrels of Portland cement, and No. 797 for 2,000 tons of anthracite coal.

The Comptroller approved sureties on contract No. 778, and on classes VII. and X. of Contract No. 760; and attached to his certificate, to Contract No. 780 for furnishing coal, No. 781 for repairing and painting the recreation pier foot of Metropolitan avenue, Borough of Brooklyn (Class VII.), and No. 788 for furnishing ice.

The substitutions of the Aetna Indemnity Company as surety in the place of W. R. Thompson and H. B. Ver Eecke on the estimate of Joseph N. Early, for furnishing supplies under Class VII. of Contract No. 760; and of the Aetna Indemnity Company as surety in the place of N. A. Parks and J. B. Dauchy on the estimate of A. Gunnison & Co., for furnishing supplies under Class X. of Contract No. 760, were approved.

The Comptroller was requested to approve sureties on Contract No. 784, for dredging at the Peck slip section on the East river, in order that the Department might proceed with the building of Pier, new 20, East river, which cannot be done until the work of dredging out the old crib work, etc., shall have been completed.

The Engineer-in-Chief reported that the work of repairing and painting the recreation structure on Pier foot of Metropolitan avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, under Class VII. of Contract No. 781, was commenced by Fox & Saron, contractors, on June 22,



1903; that the work of delivering the steam pile hammer under Class I. of Contract No. 766 was commenced on April 29, 1903, and that the work of delivering hoisting engines under Class II. of Contract No. 766 was commenced on June 20, 1903.

The form of Contract No. 794, for furnishing and delivering about 10,000 barrels of Portland cement, was amended so as to provide for the delivery of 3,500 barrels of slow-setting cement and 1,500 barrels of quick-setting cement.

An extension of time was granted Charles S. Hirsch & Co., contractors, under Contract No. 763, for furnishing yellow pine, to and including July 5, 1903, said contractors having submitted the consent of the sureties on their contracts to such extension of time.

An extension of time to June 8, 1903, for the completion of the work of building a pier at the foot of East Eighty-sixth street, East river, was granted Bernard Rolf, provided the written consent of the sureties to said contract was filed in this Department.

Spearin & Preston, contractors under Contract No. 764, for building a new pier at the foot of Albany street, North river, submitted the consent of the American Bonding Company of Baltimore to the extension of time granted on said contract. Comptroller notified.

Bids were opened June 23, 1903, and June 24th, respectively, under Contracts No. 778 for furnishing and delivering about 1,000 piles, and No. 793 for furnishing and delivering sand and broken stone, a representative of the Comptroller being present in each case.

On Contract No. 778 five estimates were received, each bidder furnishing the security deposit required, viz.: \$300, as follows:

All bids received under Classes I. and II. of Contract No. 793 were rejected by the Commissioner, and the said contract ordered to be readvertised.

A credit account was granted George E. Varrelmann, No. 81 New street, New York. The following orders were issued:

Gerry & Murray, for one Edison oscillating mimeograph and 10 reams of paper, size 8½x13 inches, the paper to be equal to sample No. 2, bearing the Neostyle water mark, all for the sum of \$60.

Superintendent of State Prisons, for two ash typewriter cabinets, No. 16 of catalogue, for \$25 each.

Alexander Pollock Company, for six extra heavy iron strapped blocks with four sheaves, lashing shackle, becket and metalline bushing, Boston & Lockport Company's make or equal, as shown on page 20 of Baldwin's catalogue or on Department drawing No. G-58, the blocks to be 18 inches and the sheaves to be of a size suitable for manila rope of a 5-inch circumference, for \$248.70.

Timothy Gleason, for 30 days' use of horse, cart and driver at \$3.50 per day. Gould W. Hart, for 54 lantern slides to be made from glass negatives and from Velox prints furnished by the Department, for \$32.40.

Fox, Bros. & Co., for 1 dozen combination can and bag carriers, on wheels, similar to those used by the Department of Street Cleaning, at \$13.45 each, with the proviso that the Department may obtain, as many more at this price as it desires.

W. H. Campbell, for 40,000 wharfage tickets in books of 100 tickets each, at 30 cents per book.

Kings County Penitentiary, for various brushes, as detailed in specifications. The resignation of Addison Kavanagh, Stenographer and Typewriter, was accepted as of June 19, 1903.

The names of George W. Shaffer, Laborer, and Daniel Darby, Foreman Dock-builder, both deceased, were ordered taken from the list of employees.

The following persons, certified by the Municipal Civil Service Commission as eligible for the position, were appointed Recreation Pier Attendants, with compensation at the rate of \$75 per month, to take effect when they report and are assigned to duty, and this salary to be paid to them for such time only as they are actually employed in the Department in the position of Recreation Pier Attendants: Edward D. Hedenkamp, Frederick S. Poynton, James S. McConnell, Abraham F. Hazen, Perry L. Greenough, John T. Healy, John A. McGarry, Peter F. McGoey, Joseph S. Burdett, Andrew T. Higgins and John J. Walsh.

The appointment of Frederick Asher as Recreation Pier Attendant was revoked, the said Asher having failed to report for duty.

Benedto Datvia, having been certified by the Municipal Civil Service Commission as eligible, was appointed Recreation Pier Cleaner, with compensation at the rate of \$50 per month, to take effect when he reports and is assigned to duty.

The titles of Daniel Maguire, Joseph A. Flynn, George Marion and Thomas F. Halpin, Laborers, were changed to that of Dockbuilder, subject to the approval of the Municipal Civil Service Commission, and their compensation fixed at the rate of 43¾ cents per hour while employed.

The application of Peter E. Hogan, Laborer, for change of his title to that of Foreman of Laborers, was denied.

The title of George Schwenck, Blacksmith, was changed to that of Blacksmith and Tool Sharpener, subject to the approval of the Municipal Civil Service Commission, and his compensation fixed at the rate of 50 cents per hour while employed.

A leave of absence, without pay, was granted David J. Mills, Dockbuilder, on account of illness.

The Municipal Civil Service Commission was advised, in reply to its communication of June 25, 1903, that the following persons are eligible for examination for promotion to the \$1,800 grade of Assistant Engineer: Norman B. Gardiner, Assistant Engineer; William P. Brendlin, Max Raymond, John P. Nordstrom, David C. Serber, William G. Johnson, Robert A. Wimmer, Robert M. Kid and Isaac J. Stander, Draughtsmen.

The application of Jeremiah Collins, Scowman, for the restoration of his salary to \$15 per week was denied.

The following orders were issued to the Engineer-in-Chief: To have the bells on the various boats of the Department engraved with the names of the boats as they now exist, the engraving to be sunk and the completion of such engraving to be reported.

To make repairs to the piers and bulkheads on the East and Harlem rivers, Borough of Manhattan, owned by the City and unleased, the work to be done from time to time as may be required, at a cost not to exceed in the aggregate \$500.

To remove the awning shed and other appurtenances from the old Battery landing to the new temporary dock just built.

To make necessary repairs to Pier 48, foot of Clinton street, East river, cost not to exceed \$500.

To order dredging at the bulkhead between Piers 42 and 43, North river, to the extent of 380 cubic feet, the work to be done under Contract No. 786, at a cost not to exceed \$65.

To repaint at once the designation on the ends of the piers (white and black in squares) showing the street numbers.

To proceed with the construction of a pier at or near the foot of West Eightieth street, North river, as shown on new plans, this order to supersede that heretofore issued for a pier at or near the foot of West Eighty-first street, the latter order having been rescinded.

The Engineer-in-Chief reported that the following work had been done under Bureau orders:

No. 1223, repairs to the piers and bulkheads along North, East and Harlem rivers, as required from time to time.

Repairs to the piers and bulkheads on the East and Harlem rivers as required.

The Engineer-in-Chief reported that the following work had been superintended under Bureau orders:

No. 984, construction of and repairs to bulkhead at the First street basin, Gowanus canal, Borough of Brooklyn, by the Brooklyn Heights Railroad Company.

No. 1100, repairs to crib bulkhead northerly in Ninth street, Gowanus canal, Brooklyn, by the Tartar Chemical Company.

No. 1265, erection of fence between One Hundred and Fifth and One Hundred and Sixth streets, Harlem river; also erection of board fence on the northerly line of One Hundred and Fifth street, Harlem river, by C. D. Jackson & Co.

No. 1404, driving of about forty piles for small boat house foot of Holland avenue, Rockaway Beach, Borough of Queens, by Marie B. Hartman and Thomas Wilcox.

No. 847, repairs to Pier, old 34, East river, by Wm. P. Clyde & Co.

No. 1331, repairs to backing log between One Hundred and Seventh and One Hundred and Eighth streets, Harlem river, by John Cloughen.

No. 1357, repairs to pile platform between One Hundred and Fifth and One Hundred and Sixth streets, Harlem river, by Mrs. Julia Tusks.

No. 1408, renewed the backing log and replaced the fenders in front of the bulkhead on the south side of the Harlem River Ship canal, easterly of Broadway, Harlem river, by the American Real Estate Company.

No. 1407, dredging in front of bulkhead between Forty-sixth and Forty-seventh streets, East river, by Kane & Wright.

No. 99, repairs to Pier, new 43, North river, by the Saugerties and New York and the Catskill and New York Steamboat Companies.

No. 1413, erection of two temporary sheds on the bulkhead north and south of Pier 35, North river, by the Ocean Steamship Company of Savannah.

No. 1057, cutting of doors in the bulkhead shed in front of Pier 41, North river, by the Delaware, Lackawanna and Western Railroad Company.

No. 384, repairs to inner end of the Bloomfield street Pier, North river, by T. G. & W. R. Patton, lessees.

No. 1247, installation of an electric light plant on Pier, new 12, East river, by the War Department.

No. 1295, repairs to Pier 23, North river, by the West Shore Railroad Company.

No. 998, extension inshore of Piers 34 and 35, at Atlantic basin, Borough of Brooklyn; also removal of existing platform between these piers and the replacing of same by a bulkhead platform by the New York Dock Company.

Harold P. Brown was notified in reply to his complaint dated June 23, 1903, that there were cinders on the marginal street in the vicinity of Piers 14 and 15, North river, that the cause for complaint had been removed.

The Richmond Borough Realty Company was requested to submit plan for the proposed dock at the foot of Summerfield avenue, Mariner's Harbor, Borough of Richmond, as soon as possible.

The Auditor was directed to prepare voucher for payment of the claim of J. W. Fiske for settees furnished in 1898, and to forward the same to the Comptroller for payment.

The Department of Taxes and Assessments were requested to furnish this Department with the assessed valuation of Pier, old 27, East river.

The permit granted the New York and Jersey Railroad Company to occupy bulkhead between Piers, new 41 and 42, North river, was amended so as to provide for the insertion of a provision that said company should do all dredging in the slip in front of said bulkhead whenever so directed by the Commissioner of Docks; the remaining terms and conditions of the permit heretofore granted as amended to remain the same.

Bids were opened June 23, 1903, for a lease of the dumping board privilege between Ninety-fourth and Ninety-fifth streets, East river, as follows:

The above mentioned privilege was awarded to the Manhattan Transport Company at \$3,650 per annum, in accordance with the terms of the advertisement thereof.

The Commissioner recommended that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approve of the lease to the Manhattan Transport Company for a term of five years at an annual rental of \$3,650 per annum, payable quarterly in advance at the office of this Department, of the bulkhead between Ninety-fourth and Ninety-fifth streets, East river, together with the privilege of erecting and maintaining during the term of said lease a dumping board on said bulkhead about 85 feet long by 23 feet wide, with a ramp about 113 feet long by 18½ feet wide, on the bulkhead and on the new made land in the rear of said bulkhead, said dump to overhang the slip in front of said bulkhead not to exceed about 1,634 square feet, and with the privilege of erecting and maintaining during the term of said lease the necessary runways, ramps and approaches to said dump; the plans and specifications for said dump, runways, ramps and approaches to be submitted to and approved by the Engineer-in-Chief of this Department.

The lessees to keep posted in at least two conspicuous places on the bulkhead, printed in large type, the prices to be charged by the lessees to the public for the privilege of dumping cellar dirt, which prices are also to be made a condition of the lease, and to be not more than 25 cents per cubic yard; for regular and ordinary dumping carts which contain two cubic yards, not exceeding 50 cents; for ordinary cellar diggers' carts which contain one and one-half cubic yards, not exceeding 35 cents; for brick trucks containing between two and one-quarter and two and one-third cubic yards, not exceeding 60 cents.

The lessees to keep during the term of the lease true and correct books of account, showing moneys received, the quantity of material dumped thereat, rates charged therefor, and the names of persons using said dump. Said books to be at all times during the term of the lease open to inspection by the Commissioner of Docks. The remaining terms and conditions of said lease to be fixed by the Commissioner of Docks.

The Engineer-in-Chief reported on Bureau Order No. 1395, that the raft of timber found adrift at the foot of Greenpoint avenue, Newtown Creek, Borough of Brooklyn, has been removed by unknown parties.

The Commissioner approved the change in the westerly line of the marginal street, wharf or place between East Twenty-first and East Twenty-third streets, East river, a technical description of which is as follows:

The westerly line of the marginal street, wharf or place between East Twenty-first and East Twenty-third streets, East river, instead of extending in a straight line southerly from the southerly side of East Twenty-third street, as heretofore established, will begin at a point in the southerly side of East Twenty-third street distant 378.86 feet easterly of the easterly side of Avenue A, and running thence easterly in the prolongation of the southerly side of East Twenty-third street 75 feet. Thence southerly in a straight line to a point in the easterly prolongation of the northerly side of East Twenty-second street, distant 31 feet easterly from the westerly line of the marginal street, wharf or place as established in 1888. Thence in a straight line still southerly to a point in the easterly prolongation of the southerly side of East Twenty-second street, distant 14 feet easterly from the westerly line of said marginal street, wharf or place; thence still southerly in a straight line to a point in the westerly line of said marginal street, wharf or place, distant 174 feet southerly from its intersection with the southerly side of East Twenty-second street. Thence proceeding in the westerly line of the marginal street, wharf or place as heretofore established in 1888.

The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund were requested to approve the change in the lines as above set forth.

The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund were requested to approve a lease to John A. Bouker of a crib work dump inside of the established bulkhead line between Seventy-first and Seventy-second streets, East river, with an approach from the foot of East Seventy-first street for a term of five years, at an annual rental of \$3,000, the lessee to do the dredging.

Mr. Jeremiah Pangburn, Secretary of the Coal Trade Protective Association, was advised, in reply to his communication of June 22, 1903, that the use of the bulkhead, foot of Barrow street, North river, for ice bridge purposes, is merely temporary, and that it was absolutely necessary that the New York and Jersey Railroad Company, which is now constructing the tunnel across the North river, should have the use of the bulkhead between Piers 41 and 42, North river, which necessitated the removal of Mr. Richard J. Foster, who had been occupying that bulkhead, to the bulkhead northerly of Pier 42, North river.

The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund were requested to approve the establishment of a ferry from and to a point between One Hundred and Thirty-fourth and



One Hundred and Thirty-fifth streets, East river, Borough of The Bronx, thence to North Beach, thence to the foot of First street, Third Ward, Borough of Queens (in the late village of College Point), in accordance with the provisions of Section 818 of the Greater New York Charter.

The Co-operative Ice Company was notified, in response to its communication of June 15, 1903, that, in accordance with the order of this Department under date of June 5, 1903, it could immediately proceed with the work of restoring the deck of the West Thirty-ninth street pier to the condition it was in prior to the erection of the ice bridge scales, etc., thereon.

The Secretary of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment was requested to transmit to this Department a copy of the resolutions adopted at the meeting of said Board on Friday, June 19, 1903, authorizing the commencement of condemnation proceedings to acquire certain lands under water in the Borough of Richmond for the establishment of proposed ferry terminals, namely, at the foot of Ferry street, Port Richmond, in the vicinity of South street, St. George, and at the foot of Canal street, Stapleton.

Gen. Howard Corroll was notified, in reply to his communication of May 22, 1903, requesting that the lease to the Hoboken Ferry Company be 225 feet of bulkhead near the foot of Twenty-second street, North river, instead of the premises previously asked for by the Ferry Company, that the Commissioner was prepared to recommend to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund a lease to the Hoboken Ferry Company of 225 feet of bulkhead and land under water, shown in pink on accompanying map, and leaving for the sole use of Pier marked 62 on said map a slip to the south of said premises, shown in pink, of 86.19 feet broad, without wharfage rights to the Ferry Company or any right to it to make fast along the line AB, the rent for the first term of ten years to be \$32,150, and for the renewal term of ten years \$37,100.

Mr. Louis O. Van Doren was advised that the Commissioner had been informed that the cost of the bulkhead wall along East river, between Sixty-fourth and Eighty-first streets, would be in the neighborhood of something over \$3,000,000; that the Commissioner some time since wrote to the Corporation Counsel stating that he would be happy to attend a conference at the latter's office with the Borough President in this matter upon whatever date might be decided upon, and Mr. Van Doren was requested to advise the Corporation Counsel what time would be agreeable to him, in which case the Commissioner and the Engineer-in-Chief of the Department would attend with plans and estimates, etc.
