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BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT.

MINUTES, BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT, CITY OF NEW YORK, ROOM 16, CITY HALL, FRIDAY, FEBRUARY 8, 1907.

The Board met in pursuance of an adjournment.

Present—George B. McClellan, Mayor; Herman A. Metz, Comptroller; Patrick F. McGowan, President of the Board of Aldermen; John F. Ahearn, President of the Borough of Manhattan; Desmond Dunne, Acting President of the Borough of Brooklyn; Louis F. Haffen, President of the Borough of The Bronx; Joseph Bermel, President of the Borough of Queens; George Cromwell, President of the Borough of Richmond.

Hon. George B. McClellan, Mayor, presided.

After disposing of the public improvement calendar the following financial matters were considered by unanimous consent:

The President of the Board of Aldermen presented the following communications from the Board of Trustees, Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, requesting an issue of \$990,444.81 Corporate Stock to provide means for the construction of the Pathological Department and the Male Dormitory of the new Bellevue Hospital, at First avenue and Twenty-ninth street, Manhattan; also the approval of the plans and specifications for this work; reports of the Comptroller, to whom, on December 21, 1906, this matter was referred; also report of the Select Committee consisting of the President, Board of Aldermen, and the President, Borough of Manhattan, to whom this matter was referred on January 18, 1907:

DEAR SIR—The Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, at their meeting held on December 11, resolved to request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the issue of Corporate Stock to the amount of nine hundred and ninety thousand four hundred and forty-four dollars and eighty-one cents (\$990,444.81), to provide means for the construction of the Pathological Department and the Male Dormitory of the new Bellevue Hospital at the southeast corner of First avenue and Twenty-ninth street, on the property recently acquired by the City for hospital purposes. The plans and specifications for these buildings are sent herewith, as are also a letter from the architects, Messrs. McKim, Mead & White, No. 160 Fifth avenue, describing the buildings, and a statement showing the cost of the heating, plumbing, electric wiring, sweeping system, etc.

Our dormitories for the men employees are scattered about various parts of the building, are overcrowded and badly arranged, and the Trustees are therefore very anxious that the new building be erected as speedily as possible. The Pathological Department is also far from what it should be for the very large amount of work done

there, and our Director of Laboratories and our Pathologists are much inconvenienced by the lack of proper accommodations and facilities.

The Trustees therefore beg that their request may receive prompt and favorable consideration.

SIR—Under date of December 13, 1906, Mr. J. K. Paulding, Secretary of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals, submits to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment a report of the Bellevue Trustees for an appropriation of \$990,444.81, to provide for the erection of the Pathological Department and Male Dormitory of the new Bellevue Hospital.

It will be recalled that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on March 16, 1905, formally adopted the scheme of a new Bellevue Hospital to cover the blocks between Twenty-sixth and Twenty-ninth streets, First avenue and the East River, and appropriated \$850,000 for the erection of pavilions "A" and "B."

It is now proposed to erect a building to house the Pathological Department, that branch of hospital work being in greatest need of new quarters, and to provide in the upper stories a dormitory for male help.

I have examined the plans and estimates submitted, and I find that the proposed building is to be of the same type exteriorly as the pavilions now under contract and designed as a part of the architectural scheme adopted in March, 1905.

Pavilions "A" and "B," now under contract, will cost something over \$700,000, leaving a balance of more than \$100,000 out of the original appropriation.

This estimate is considerably higher than that for Pavilions "A" and "B," owing to the increased size of the building and to the quite different requirements of its interior to fit it for pathological purposes. Complete systems of ventilation and refrigeration must be provided, which alone will add \$100,000 to the cost.

But I still think that the estimate is rather high, however special the interior of the building may be.

Allowing for the \$100,000 available from the former appropriation, I think that \$850,000 additional should be sufficient to cover the cost; and I therefore recommend that, pursuant to section 47 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter 409 of the Laws of 1904, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorize the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock to the amount of \$850,000, to provide means for the construction of New Bellevue Hospital.

In this connection I beg to call attention to the resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, adopted March 16, 1905, that the contract and specifications for the construction of New Bellevue Hospital, or any part thereof, be first submitted to this Board for approval before they are let. The plans and specifications for this laboratory have not been yet submitted to the Board for approval.

SIR—At a meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, held January 18, 1907, the reports of the Comptroller upon the request of the President of the Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals for an appropriation of \$990,444.81 for the erection of a Pathological Department and Male Dormitory of the new Bellevue Hospital, and upon the request of the Board of Trustees for the approval by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the specifications prepared for the erection of this building, they were referred to a Select Committee of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, consisting of the President of the Board of Aldermen and the President of the Borough of Manhattan.

We have looked into both matters with some care and have taken up in detail with Mr. Withington, the Chief Engineer, and Mr. Reed, Assistant Engineer of the Department of Finance, such questions as have arisen in connection therewith.

The Board of Trustees of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals asked for an appropriation of \$990,444.81, and the Department of Finance, after a careful examination of the estimate and cost, recommended that \$850,000 be allowed for this work.

Due examination leads to the opinion that the amount recommended in the Comptroller's report is adequate for the erection of the building in question, and may properly meet the approval of the Board.

The Engineers of the Department of Finance took exception to certain features of the specifications, and required that modifications be made therein before giving their approval.

We advise that the specifications as presented to the Board in the modified form be approved.

The Secretary presented the following communication from the Secretary, Department of Docks and Ferries, and report of the Comptroller, to whom, on February 1, 1907, was referred, for report at this meeting of the Board, the request of said Department for the acquisition by condemnation of property located between Twenty-eighth and Thirty-eighth streets, and between Fifty-seventh and Sixty-first streets, Borough of Brooklyn:

JOSEPH HAAG, Esq., Secretary, Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

SIR—I beg to submit herewith map showing property, colored in yellow, where, in my opinion, it would be advisable for the City to institute proceedings for the condemnation and acquisition of as soon as possible.

Roughly speaking, this property lies between Fifty-seventh and Sixty-first streets, South Brooklyn, and between Twenty-eighth and Thirty-eighth streets, South Brooklyn. The northerly property, between Twenty-eighth and Thirty-eighth streets, is directly tributary to the ferry established at Thirty-ninth street.

Under section 823-D of the Charter (being chapter 517 of the Laws of 1906) the City has the right to proceed, without seeking to arrive at a price for the purchase of the property, by the direct appointment of Commissioners of Estimate and Appraisal; and by virtue of the authority conferred by the above legislation, I beg to request permission to proceed for the acquisition of the property as shown on the attached map, a technical description of which is herewith enclosed.

All this property will be available for Transatlantic ships when improved, and plans have been drawn with this end in view. The development of the Pennsylvania Railroad (connecting railroad) and the developments sure to proceed from the fact of the City's operation of the ferry to Thirty-ninth street from Whitehall street, and in connection with the projected or proposed ferry to run from Whitehall street to about the foot of Sixty-first street, South Brooklyn, will, in the near future, increase the valuation of this property without any doubt.

It is, therefore, to my mind, expedient for the City to start proceedings for the acquisition of that portion of it shown on the map at the earliest practicable date.

SIR—Hon. J. A. BENSEL, Commissioner, Department of Docks and Ferries, in communication under date of January 28, 1907, requests the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to institute proceedings for the condemnation of water front property between Twenty-eighth and Thirty-eighth streets, and between Fifty-seventh and Sixty-first streets, Borough of Brooklyn.

With the acquisition of this property and the proposed strip between the Thirty-ninth Street Ferry and Eighth Ward Market, the City will own the water front between Twenty-eighth and Sixty-first streets, except between Thirty-ninth and Fifty-seventh streets, which water front in my opinion is necessary in order to make improvements for the shipping interests of The City of New York.

I therefore think that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, pursuant to section 823 D of the Greater New York Charter, may properly authorize the institution of condemnation proceedings for the acquisition of the water front property between Twenty-eighth and Thirty-eighth streets, and between Fifty-seventh and Sixty-first streets, Borough of Brooklyn, as requested by the Commissioner of Docks and Ferries in his communication under date of January 28, 1907.

The Secretary presented a communication from the Comptroller suggesting that the Board of Estimate provide for the appointment of a commission of three engineers, who shall make a careful study of the Borough of Queens, investigate and report upon the sewers and the disposal plants already built and planned, and recommend a general policy for the drainage of said borough, the method of disposing of the sewage for the different centres of population, and topographical districts, etc.

Which was laid over so as to give the President of the Borough of Queens an opportunity to confer with the Comptroller on the subject.

The Secretary presented a communication from the President, Borough of Manhattan, requesting an issue of \$7,000 Corporate Stock for improving and permanently bettering the three Governor's rooms in City Hall, and communication from Carroll Beckwith, Esq., recommending the improvement of said rooms.

Which were referred to the Comptroller.

The Secretary presented a report of the Comptroller, to whom on December 7, 1906, was referred the request of the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity for an appropriation of \$4,000,000 to provide for the cost of the work comprised in the first section of the plans for the construction of a filtering plant at the Eastern Division of the Jerome Park Reservoir, together with a report of the Chief Engineer of the Board of Water Supply and subsequent communication from the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

Which were referred to the Chief Engineer, Board of Estimate and Apportionment, with instructions that he confer with the Chief Engineers in charge of the Water Departments of Philadelphia and Washington and with Mr. George H. Benzenberg, President of the American Society of Civil Engineers.

The Secretary presented the following communication from the Commissioner of Street Cleaning requesting an issue of \$785,000 bonds for the payment of liabilities incurred during the last fall of snow and the expense of removing the present one:

SIR—I have to request that, in accordance with provisions of section 546 of the Greater New York Charter, the Comptroller be authorized and directed to issue bonds of The City of New York to the amount of five hundred and sixty-five thousand dollars (\$565,000) for the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, and two hundred and twenty thousand dollars (\$220,000) for the Borough of Brooklyn, making a total of seven hundred and eighty-five thousand dollars (\$785,000), the proceeds thereof to be used for the payment of liabilities incurred by this Department during the last fall of snow, and the expense of removing the present one.

The reason for the direct issue of bonds is that it would do away with the transferring of money from one account to another, and the replenishment of the same by the issue of bonds later on.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, New York City:

GENTLEMEN—Your committee, to whom was referred on January 4, 1907, the accompanying resolution adopted by the Board of Aldermen on December 21, 1906, returning resolution Int. No. 1236, adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on October 30, 1906, relative to "the establishment of the various grades and positions in the offices of the Mayor, the Bureau of Licenses in the Mayor's office, and the President of the Board of Aldermen and City Clerk, as set forth in the Budget for the year 1907," with the request that separate resolutions of each department affected be forwarded to said Board of Aldermen, respectfully reports:

That the resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on October 30, 1906, referred to above, was a proper step in the direction of segregating departmental items in the matter of salaries, and that it was also in line with a resolution adopted by the Board of Aldermen on October 9, 1906, upon the recommendation of the Finance Committee that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, "instead of following the usual course of making general and unitemized allowances to the general accounts of the various departments, the Budget do allow specific appropriations, indicating which estimates are granted and which are denied, in the case of every item in every account as they appear in the departmental estimate, and the expenditure of each allowance be confined to the purposes as so indicated;" and also in line with a recommendation of the Committee on Salaries and Offices adopted by the Board of Aldermen on February 6, 1906, "that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and it is hereby requested to establish a rule requiring applications for the creation of new positions and grades and the fixing of salaries to be made in conjunction with the submission of departmental estimates for the purposes of the Budget, and that said Board is further requested to advise the several departmental heads that such applications will not be considered at any other time except upon extraordinary case shown."

Your committee wishes to call attention to the fact that all of the items referred to in the resolution returned by the Board of Aldermen were approved by the Finance Committee of that body in its report upon the Budget, and adopted by the Board on November 27, 1906, and in its opinion the purpose and object of the returned resolution should be adhered to, and advises that the request of the Board of Aldermen be complied with to the extent of submitting two resolutions of the same tenor and purpose, instead of the one returned to the Board of Aldermen; and it hereby recommends that the resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on October 30, 1906, relative to "the establishment of the various grades and positions in the offices of the Mayor, the Bureau of Licenses in the Mayor's office, and the Board of Aldermen and the City Clerk, as set forth in the Budget for the year 1907," etc., be rescinded; and it further recommends that there be adopted in its stead the two accompanying resolutions.

The Comptroller presented the following report and resolution of the Board of Education, together with a communication relative to amending resolution adopted by the Board of Estimate on November 23, 1906, which authorized the acquisition of property selected as a site for school purposes, located at Fort Hamilton avenue and Fifty-eighth street, Brooklyn, in so far as it relates to the description of said property, which amended resolution shall authorize the acquisition of property on Tenth avenue and Fifty-eighth street, etc.:

To the Board of Education:

The Committee on Sites, to which was referred a communication from the Comptroller, dated January 28, 1907, reading as follows:

"Some time since the Board of Education adopted a resolution for the acquisition of a parcel of land on Fifty-eighth street and Fort Hamilton avenue, and transmitted the same to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for its approval. The Board of Estimate and Apportionment, upon the recommendation of this office, approved of the acquisition of part of the property at private sale and a small portion by condemnation proceedings. Contracts were entered into between Bridget Hart and others for a conveyance of two of the parcels of land, and when the titles were examined it was discovered that the description should read 'Beginning at the point formed by the intersection of Tenth avenue and Fifty-eighth street,' and not Fort Hamilton avenue, inasmuch as Tenth avenue joins Fifty-eighth street and Fort Hamilton avenue at this point.

"The matter was referred to the Corporation Counsel for his opinion and in a communication under date of January 23, 1907, he transmits the following:

"I am in receipt of your communication under date of January 3, 1907, transmitting closing report of the Title Guarantee and Trust Company (No. 290,109) together with executed contract, whereby Bridget Hart agrees to convey to The City of New York certain property described in the contract as being at the intersection of the southerly side of Fifty-eighth street and the easterly side of Fort Hamilton avenue, required for the purposes of the Board of Education.

"I note from your letter and also from the resolution of the Board of Education that the property authorized to be purchased is described as being situated at Fifty-eighth street and Fort Hamilton avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn. The closing report, however, describes this property as being situated at Fifty-eighth street and Tenth avenue in the Borough of Brooklyn. I would therefore suggest that for the sake of exact conformity to the authorization to purchase, that the resolution of the Board of Education be amended to describe the property as being located, as it is in fact, at Fifty-eighth street and Tenth avenue, Brooklyn, instead of as described at present, at Fifty-eighth street and Fort Hamilton avenue.

"I will hold the certificate and the contract in abeyance pending the amendment of the resolution of the Board of Education."

"Will you kindly have the Board of Education amend their resolution in the matter of this site and immediately transmit the same to this office, in order that it may be presented to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the amendment of the original resolution prepared by them."

—respectfully submits for adoption the following resolutions:

Resolved, That the resolution adopted by the Board of Education on October 24, 1906 (see Journal, pages 1749-50), selecting and determining as a site for school purposes certain lands and premises on Fort Hamilton avenue, Fifty-eighth street and Kouwenhoven lane, adjoining Public School 105, Borough of Brooklyn, be and the same is hereby amended so as to make the description of said lands and premises read as follows:

Beginning at a point formed by the intersection of the southwesterly line of Fifty-eighth street with the southeasterly line of Tenth avenue, and running thence southwesterly along the southeasterly line of Tenth avenue to the northeasterly line of the lands of Public School 105, thence southeasterly along the northeasterly line of the lands of Public School 105 to the northwesterly line of Kouwenhoven lane, thence

northeasterly along the northwesterly line of Kouwenhoven lane to the southwesterly line of Fifty-eighth street, thence northwesterly along the southwesterly line of Fifty-eighth street to the southeasterly line of Tenth avenue, the point or place of beginning.

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and it is hereby requested to amend the resolutions adopted November 23, 1906, approving of the action of the Board of Education in the matter of the selection of said lands and premises and authorizing the acquisition of title thereto, in accordance with the foregoing resolution.

SIR—The Board of Estimate and Apportionment at a meeting held November 23, 1906, adopted a resolution approving of the resolution adopted by the Board of Education, selecting a site in the Borough of Brooklyn, on Fort Hamilton avenue and Fifty-eighth street, and authorized the acquisition of a part thereof at private sale, and authorized the acquisition of the remainder thereof by condemnation proceedings.

The Board of Estimate and Apportionment upon the recommendation of this office approved of the acquisition of part of the property at private sale and a small portion by condemnation proceedings. I would therefore respectfully recommend that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment amend the resolution adopted November 23, 1906, so that the resolution shall read, "The intersection of the southwesterly line of Fifty-eighth street with the southeasterly line of Tenth avenue" instead of Fort Hamilton avenue, and when amended shall read as follows:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the action of the Board of Education in the matter of the selection of the following described premises for school purposes, in the Borough of Brooklyn:

Beginning at a point formed by the intersection of the southwesterly line of Fifty-eighth street with the southeasterly line of Tenth avenue, and running thence southwesterly along the southeasterly line of Tenth avenue to the northeasterly line of the lands of Public School 105; thence southeasterly along the northeasterly line of the lands of Public School 105 to the northwesterly line of Kouwenhoven lane; thence northeasterly along the northwesterly line of Kouwenhoven lane to the southwesterly line of Fifty-eighth street; thence northwesterly along the southwesterly line of Fifty-eighth street to the southeasterly line of Tenth avenue, the point or place of beginning.

Whereas, The Comptroller of The City of New York has reported to this Board that he can acquire a portion of the above-described premises, bounded and described as follows:

Beginning at a point formed by the intersection of the southwesterly line of Fifty-eighth street with the southeasterly line of Tenth avenue, and running thence southwesterly along the southeasterly line of Tenth avenue 77 feet 1 3/4 inches, more or less, to the northeasterly line of the lands of Public School 105; running thence southeasterly along the northeasterly line of the lands of Public School 105 to a point in said line 38 feet 6 1/2 inches northwesterly from the intersection of the said lands of Public School 105 with Kouwenhoven lane; thence southeasterly on a line at right angles to Fifty-eighth street 77 feet 1 3/4 inches to the southwesterly line of Fifty-eighth street; thence northwesterly along the southwesterly line of Fifty-eighth street to the southeasterly line of Tenth avenue, the point or place of beginning, together with all the right, title and interest of the owners of said premises of, in and to the streets in front thereof to the centre thereof,

—at a price of \$4,750; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Comptroller of The City of New York be and he hereby is authorized to enter into contracts for the acquisition of the portion of the property above described and included in the original resolution of the Board of Education, at a price not exceeding \$4,750, said contracts to be submitted to the Corporation Counsel for his approval as to form.

Whereas, The Comptroller has reported to this Board that he has been unable from investigations made to locate the owner of the premises at the junction of Fifty-eighth street and Kouwenhoven lane, being the balance of the portion described in the original resolution of the Board of Education; therefore be it

Resolved, That the Corporation Counsel be and he hereby is authorized to institute condemnation proceedings for the acquisition of the following described property:

Beginning at a point formed by the intersection of the northwesterly line of Kouwenhoven lane with the southwesterly line of Fifty-eighth street, and running thence northwesterly along the southwesterly line of Fifty-eighth street 33 feet 10 1/4 inches; running thence southwesterly at right angles to Fifty-eighth street 77 feet 1 3/4 inches, more or less, to the lands of Public School 105; running thence southeasterly along said lands of Public School 105, 38 feet 6 1/2 inches to the northwesterly line of Kouwenhoven lane, and running thence northeasterly along said northwesterly line of Kouwenhoven lane 77 feet 1 3/4 inches, more or less, to the point or place of beginning, said premises being assessed for the purposes of taxation for the year 1906 at \$300,

—and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, deeming it for the best interests of the City that title shall be vested in The City of New York at a fixed or specified time, does hereby direct that the title to the above-described premises shall vest in The City of New York one day after the filing of the oaths of the Commissioners of Estimate and Appraisal, pursuant to the provisions of section 1439 of the Revised Charter.

Sir—The Deputy Fire Commissioner, Boroughs of Manhattan, The Bronx and Richmond, to whom was referred your communications of 2d and 17th inst. in relation to the selection of a site for an apparatus house in the Borough of Brooklyn, in lieu of one in the vicinity of Sixth avenue and Forty-second street, in said Borough, has returned the same with report reading as follows:

"NEW YORK, November 26, 1906.

"Hon. FRANCIS J. LANTRY, Fire Commissioner:

"Sir—I have the honor to report that I have examined the proposed sites as shown on the accompanying diagram, Borough of Brooklyn, as requested by the Comptroller in a former communication, to select any one of the sites as presented in lieu of a site formerly recommended and located at Sixth avenue and Forty-second street, Borough of Brooklyn, and would recommend that the site located on the east side of Seventh avenue, 75 feet 2 inches south from the corner of Fiftieth street, be selected, and also that the lot on the south side of Fiftieth street, 100 feet east of Seventh avenue and connecting on the rear with the Seventh avenue site, be also selected as a site for a hook and ladder house, which is badly needed in this vicinity. In the former communication the Comptroller stipulated that but one lot could be selected from the number in the said diagram, but this will not be sufficient, as the additional company will be required within a short time, and recommend further that those two sites, as shown on the diagram, be substituted in lieu of the one formerly recommended at Forty-second street and Sixth avenue for the uses and purposes of this Department.

Hon. HERMAN A. METZ, Comptroller:

Sir—Honorable Francis J. Lantry, Commissioner of the Fire Department, in a former communication designated a certain locality near Forty-second street and Sixth avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, and requested the Comptroller to select premises for Fire Department purposes. Under date of November 2, 1906, and November 17, 1906, this office submitted to the Commissioner of the Fire Department certain properties which were owned by The City of New York, held under tax sale titles acquired by the old City of Brooklyn, in pursuance of the provisions of chapter 114 of the Laws of 1883. The property submitted to the Commissioner was one lot on Fifty-first street, near Seventh avenue; one lot on Seventh avenue, near Fiftieth street; one lot on the southeasterly side of Seventh avenue, 75 feet southwest of Fiftieth street; one lot on the southwest side of Fiftieth street, 100 feet southeast of Seventh avenue, which connected with the lot fronting on Seventh avenue, and the Commissioner, under date of November 27, 1906, transmitted a communication accepting the Seventh avenue and Fiftieth street lots, stating in his communication that he desired to use one for a new hook and ladder house, which is needed in the vicinity, and the other for a steamer house.

As I stated before, the City acquired title to this property in accordance with the provisions of the tax sale law, served notices upon the owners and acquired deeds thereunder on March 18, 1890. There is a large amount of taxes due and unpaid on these two parcels of land, and as may possibly be the case with these old tax sale titles, there may be a flaw in the service of the notice which might invalidate the title and thus jeopardize the interest of the City in case it should construct a building thereon without first having a perfect record title.

The owners of the property have offered to dispose of the same to the City, subject to all the taxes due thereon, and to the City's deed, for the sum of \$300. While ordinarily I would not recommend the payment of this amount, for the reason that I believe that the City's tax title is a good and valid one, still, at the same time, if the City should attempt to take any outside interest that there may be in the property, the fees of the Commissioners alone would amount to more than the sum asked by the owners of the property for their title, which, when vested in the City, would make a perfect title. I would therefore respectfully recommend that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopt a resolution authorizing the Comptroller to enter into contracts and to acquire the interest of the Estate of Chauncey M. Felt in the property, at a price not exceeding \$300, and present resolutions herewith to that effect for adoption.

Dear Sir—I send you herewith report of the Department of Public Works for the quarter ending September 30, 1906, attaching reports of the Assistant Commissioner, Bureau of Sewers, Bureau of Highways, Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices, Bureau of Incumbrances and General Bookkeeper.

Assistant Commissioner.

During the quarter one hundred and thirty-eight contracts were entered into, amounts aggregating \$665,075.93, divided among the Bureaus as follows:

as against the same quarter in 1905, which showed ninety contracts, amounting to \$706,091.70. The detailed report gives the title of each contract, together with estimated cost of same. In the same report will be found the work done by the Bureau of Incumbrances, and statement of the Cashier of Highways.

The railroad companies, in making repairs to their lines, relaid 72,010 square yards of pavement.

During the quarter, we have entered into thirty-two contracts, amounting to \$364,076.48, chargeable to the Repaving Fund; sixty-three contracts, amounting to \$333,602.21, chargeable to the Street Improvement Fund, and two contracts, amounting to \$1,957.11, chargeable to Labor, Maintenance and Supplies, making a grand total of ninety-seven contracts, amounting to \$699,635.80.

The preliminary estimates made for original improvements for use in the Local Board number eighty-nine and amount to \$945,500.

The Repair Division report shows that 50,354 square yards of cobble, granite, belgian and brick pavements were relaid; 97,257 square feet of flagging relaid; 9,162 square feet of cement walk laid; 80,376 square yards of macadam repaired and laid during the quarter, and 77.14 miles of macadam and dirt roads were cleaned and cared for, requiring a large force of laborers, horses and carts and sprinklers.

The Topographical Bureau, in addition to the regular field work, prepared maps and statements of facts used in carrying out improvements throughout the borough.

The Chemical and Physical Testing Laboratory made report that the tests made of cement brought on the work, in the majority of cases, maintained a high degree of excellence. In cases where the cement was not up to the standard, it was replaced with good material.

Asphalt, creosote oil and creosote wooden block tests were also made.

Bureau of Sewers.

During the quarter 8.127 miles of sewers were built, including vitrified stoneware pipe sewers, cast iron pipe sewers, reinforced concrete sewers and brick sewers; 103 sewer basins were also constructed.

The Superintendent of Maintenance report shows that 1,424 new sewer connection permits were issued; 9,202 basins examined; 7,126 basins cleaned, and 9,223 cubic yards of deposit removed from the basins. A total of 334,460 linear feet of brick and pipe sewers were examined, and a total of 363,450 linear feet of brick and pipe sewers cleaned.

Bureau of Public Buildings and Offices.

The Borough Hall and other Municipal buildings were looked after in the way of repairs during the quarter by this Bureau. In the Borough Hall the work of refilling the entire lower corridor, painting the walls and ceilings and installing new electric light fixtures was completed.

The condition of the Jail is such that only emergency plumbing repairs were made, and it is urged that a sufficient amount of appropriation be secured to build a new jail or thoroughly renovate the present building.

The same conditions exist in the Brooklyn Disciplinary Training School. If the Legislature does not abolish the institution, a new home should be selected, as the buildings now occupied do not warrant the expenditure of an amount of money necessary to put them in repair.

The floating baths closed on September 23, and showed a total attendance of 1,043,221.

The interior baths show a phenomenal increase in receipts for soap, towels and bath tubs. The receipts for the quarter, namely, \$4,616.47, exceed by \$160.72 the amount received for the entire year of 1905, which was \$4,446.75. The quarterly differences follow:

Showing an increase of \$2,817.86. The total number of bathes in interior baths for quarter were 743,585.

In reference to the need of comfort stations at such congested points as indicated by the Superintendent, namely, Fulton street and Flatbush avenue, Long Island Railroad depot at Atlantic avenue and Flatbush, Williamsburg Bridge plaza, and at Coney Island, I am heartily in favor of the proposition, and strongly urge the necessity of the erection and maintenance of the comfort stations not only as humane, but as an absolute necessity, in so large and rapidly growing a borough as ours.

Work is progressing in filling in the land for the new Eighth Ward Market; an average of 250 loads of refuse is being delivered daily, which is making land very rapidly. Plans and specifications have been submitted for a fence to enclose the land now made, and it is expected that the fence will soon be erected. Plans are also under way for a bulkhead.

Bookkeeper.

The Bookkeeper's report shows in detail the financial transactions of the several bureaus under this Department.

The work of the Topographical Bureau consists of matters relating to the determination, the preservation, and the changes in the established lines and the established elevation of public streets, parks, etc., the preparation of maps for the legal opening of streets, etc.; the making of reports on the legal status of streets, etc.; the preservation and maintenance of lines, monuments, records, etc.; and connecting to the several secondary stations in this Borough, the traverse lines, monumented street lines and the monumented lines holding the triangulation stations.

The work of this Bureau is directly for the use of the Local Boards, for the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, for the Corporation Counsel's office in the matter of condemnation proceedings for street openings, and for the various other departments of The City. Hence it affects the map of the City, which is the basis of all city improvements; and, therefore, not only the local improvements, such as highways, sewers, etc., but in a greater or less degree the work of all the other departments of the Borough depend upon the work of the Topographical Bureau.

A—FIELD WORK.

The field work, which was required for and which is included in the maps and reports under the head of "office work," consists of chaining, line work, angular measurement, leveling and damage survey work. The amount of this work, which was done as required, completed during this quarter, is as follows:

Two hundred and twenty-seven thousand five hundred feet of chaining (131,000 feet of precise chaining, and 96,500 feet of approximate chaining).

Ninety thousand feet of precise line work.

Four hundred and five precise angles measured.

2. Triangulation of the Borough of Brooklyn.

In accordance with chapter 406 of the Laws of 1903, directing each Borough to connect its street lines with the triangulation stations determined by the United States Coast and Geodetic Survey, the following triangulation stations were connected with the street lines in the neighborhood of each station:

Centennial tower (Coney Island), Avenue K School, Avenue U, Blake Avenue School, Atkins Avenue School.

During the quarter there was laid down on the Ocean parkway a standard of 150 feet in length.

This standard was laid down in a modern and scientific manner, under the direction of Mr. Frederick W. Koop, Principal Assistant Engineer on the triangulation of The City of New York by the United States Coast and Geodetic Survey. The tape used was one of the four New York City base line tapes, made and tested in Washington especially for the triangulation of The City of New York. These tapes were also standardized four times with three most valuable United States Coast and Geodetic Survey base line tapes that were used to measure nine bases along the 98 meridian, and also used to measure the Ocean parkway base and the Unionport base, together with the New York City base line tapes.

The high accuracy and reliability of this standard are therefore unquestionable. The technical work was done at 8 p. m., so as to obtain absolutely correct temperature. This was done by lashing two base line thermometers to the tape and supporting it from the ground. The tension used was 15 kilograms, about 35 pounds. This standard was later subdivided into a 50-foot and a 100-foot standard.

One of the most difficult things to contend with in this Borough has been the lack of an official standard of measurement. This difficulty has now been removed. Hereafter all measurements can be compared with this standard.

B—OFFICE WORK.

Maps were completed as follows:

1. Maps forwarded for Adoption.

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IX. From January 1, 1898, to September 30, 1906, a total of 153 street opening proceedings were confirmed.

Summary.

The following summary shows in a brief and general way the quantities and the kinds of work completed during the three (3) months ending September 30, 1906:

A—Field Work.

1. Two hundred and twenty-seven thousand five hundred feet of precise and approximate chaining; 90,000 feet of precise line work; 405 precise angles measured; 6 feet of leveling for profile maps, and 31,360 feet of damage survey for 9 streets.
2. Surveys for preliminary hearings in matter of 15 street openings.
3. Twelve monument points set; 47 monuments referenced; 42 monuments reset; 47 monument covers set; 10 miles of surveyor's private cuts referenced; 24 cement walks cut to render monuments accessible; 31 monuments dug for that were not previously reported found; 13 monuments found that were not previously reported.
4. Triangulation points were set in and around Centennial Tower, Coney Island, Avenue K School, Avenue U, Blake Avenue School and Atkins Avenue School.

B—Office Work.

1. Twenty-four maps for adoption for twenty-four streets; eighty maps for filing sixteen streets, and eighteen miscellaneous maps for nine streets, making a total of one hundred and seventy maps for forty-nine streets.
 2. No certificates of dedication and thirty-one statements of facts for thirty-one streets.
 3. No rule maps; thirty-six draft damage maps for twelve streets; seven draft benefit maps for seven streets; ninety-three sheets of final damage and benefit maps for eight streets, and no profile maps, making a total of forty-three maps, ninety-three sheets and twenty-seven streets.
 4. One hundred and thirty-eight communications were received and four hundred and fifty letters and reports were sent.
- During the quarter work has been in progress on one hundred and forty-eight different contracts, of which seventy-four have been completed. The annexed table shows in detail the streets and the character of the work.

Dear Sir—I have the honor to submit a report of the conduct of business in the Bureau of Sewers for the third quarter of the year 1906.

You will find attached hereto a statement from the Chief Engineer of Sewers, relating to the transaction of affairs in the Engineering Division of this Bureau; also a statement from the Superintendent of Maintenance, setting forth that which has been done in maintaining and cleaning the sewerage system existing in the streets of the Borough.

Details are set forth in tabular statements in both reports.

You will find that the value of the work under supervision being performed by contract from the status of plans being prepared, to work completed during the quarter, amounts to \$4,959,705.04.

Borough Hall.

The recent appropriation of \$17,000 Special Revenue Bonds, secured by Borough President Coler for renovating this building, has enabled me to greatly improve the interior of the structure. The Borough President's private offices, Commissioner of Public Works Dunn's offices, Chief Engineer Crenshaw's rooms, the Bookkeeper's room and the Corporation Counsel's offices have been thoroughly renovated, the sidewalks having been painted and the ceilings kalsomined. New carpets and other furnishings were provided for the Borough President and the Commissioner of Public Works' offices; a new window for ventilating purposes was cut in the wall dividing two of the Corporation Counsel's offices; a new skylight, to increase the light in the Corporation Counsel's Stenographer's office, was placed in the roof of the building and the entire roof, which, in many places, had become corroded, was gone over and repaired.

Otto Metz's contract for a new tile floor on the first corridor, which I referred to in my last quarterly report, was entirely completed in September, and this corridor, with the addition of new electrical fixtures is now one of the most imposing portions of the building.

Municipal Buildings.

During the quarter I caused the rooms on the third floor which were recently vacated by the Bureau of Sewers, to be thoroughly renovated for the use of the Assistant Engineers, and the Superintendent of Public Baths and Comfort Stations, this Bureau. The roof of this building was repaired and the Cashier's compartment in the offices of the Commissioner of Taxes and Assessments was reconstructed at the request of Collector of Taxes David E. Austin.

Kings County Court House.

In anticipation of a special appropriation of \$17,000 to defray the cost of fixing up additional quarters in this building for the new justices of the Supreme Court, Second Department, who are to take their seats on January 1 next, I have had plans and specifications prepared to carry through this work as soon as the money becomes accessible. Some slight repairs to the plumbing of the building were made during the period.

Hall of Records.

A number of the offices in this building were renovated during the past three months and the plumbing and electrical fixtures throughout the structure were overhauled and repaired.

Kings County Jail.

Pending a probable appropriation of a sum sufficient either to build a new jail or to thoroughly renovate the present buildings, I expended but little money, and that only on emergency plumbing repairs on these structures during the quarter.

Brooklyn Disciplinary Training School.

I have issued practically no orders whatever for repairs to these buildings during the past three months, in view, as I explained in my last quarterly report, of probable Legislative action to abolish the institution. Whether or not the school is done away with, the present buildings do not warrant the expenditure of public funds. If the school is to remain, a new home should be selected for it. To make its present headquarters habitable, it would require a sum of money which my Repairs Account would not now admit of.

City Magistrates' and Municipal Courts.

Minor repairs of an insignificant character have been made to the buildings owned by the City and occupied by the District Courts. It is my intention, if a sufficient sum is forthcoming, that I have asked for in my Budget for 1907, to place in thoroughly A1 condition each of these Municipal and Magistrates' Court buildings which the City owns.

Wallabout Market, Administration Building.

Except to repair the heating apparatus in the cellar of this structure, this Bureau has been placed at no expense whatever during the Quarter on this building.

Firemen's Hall.

This building, which is owned by the City and occupied by the exempt firemen of the Eastern District, has been the cause of no expense during the past three months.

Floating Baths.

The season for the public baths this year practically closed on September 23, but the bathers were admitted to most of the five City baths for a day or two later.

The reported total number of bathers was 1,043,221, the majority of which were boys. The bath at the foot of Conover street was the first to open—on June 16—followed by the Dock street bath, on June 16; the Fifty-eighth street and the North First street baths, on June 18, and the Noble street bath, on June 19. The buildings were towed to their winter quarters on September 25 and 28.

The oldest floating bath (No. 1), which was stationed at the foot of Fifty-eighth street this year, has become so worn out that it is doubtful if it can be used another season.

No serious accident happened to any of the bathers during this summer.

Interior Baths.

The salient feature of the past quarter, in connection with these buildings, is the phenomenal increase of receipts for soap, towels and bathtubs. The receipts for the quarter exceed those for the last year, having been \$4,616.47, against \$4,440.75 for the entire year of 1905, distributed as follows:

This great increase in receipts does not seem to be due to an increase in the actual number of bathers, but rather to an improvement in the character of them, or a better appreciation of the facilities afforded by the City.

The total number of bathers in the interior baths during the quarter was, approximately, 743,585.

The progress on the new bath, at Fourth avenue and President street, has been prevented by the lack of proper piling on which to start foundation, and no work as yet has been done on the sites on Nostrand avenue and Hamburg avenue. The Coney Island project has been somewhat discussed, but without definite result as yet.

Public Comfort Stations.

The six public comfort stations have been in commission, as usual. The Lorimer street comfort station is in need of a new roof, and I have asked for an appropriation of \$5,000 in my budget for 1907 for the purpose.

I would especially direct your attention to the fact that several comfort stations are needed at congested points, such as the location at the junction of Fulton street and Flatbush avenue, and the Long Island Railroad depot, at Atlantic and Flatbush avenues (which locality will become still more congested on the full and free opening of widened Livingston street); at the Williamsburg Bridge plaza, concerning which I have already reported to you in full, and at Coney Island during the season.

Proposed New Eighth Ward Market.

On July 24 the Board of Aldermen concurred in a resolution passed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on June 22, appropriating the sum of \$200,000 for the preparation of land for a new Eighth Ward Market, and his Honor the Mayor approved these resolutions on July 31, 1906. Immediately thereafter arrangements were made by this bureau to begin filling in the property. I gave permission to the Street Cleaning Department, which had been served with an injunction restraining it from using one of its interior dump stations on Fourth avenue, near the market, to dump ashes and other inoffensive material collected at that section of the City, on the market property. The same permission was extended to the Bush Terminal Company, which was excavating for a number of buildings in the neighborhood. Up to a day or two ago we were receiving as high as a total of 250 truckloads of refuse per day, which, of course, was operating to make land very rapidly.

Plans and specifications have been prepared and submitted for a fence to inclose the land now made. The fence will soon be erected. Plans are also under way for a bulkhead.

PROCEEDINGS OF THE BOARD OF RAPID TRANSIT RAILROAD COMMISSIONERS.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD HELD IN NO. 320 BROADWAY, ON THURSDAY, THE 7TH OF FEBRUARY, 1907.

There were present—Alexander E. Orr, President, presiding; John H. Starin, Vice-President; Mayor George B. McClellan, Comptroller Herman A. Metz and Commissioners Woodbury Langdon and Charles Stewart Smith.

Commissioner Morris K. Jesup sent word asking to be excused on account of illness.

George L. Rives, of Counsel; George S. Rice, Chief Engineer, and Alfred Craven, Deputy Chief Engineer, also were present.

The president announced a hearing on the form of contract for the proposed Lexington Avenue Rapid Transit Railroad, which had been duly advertised in accordance with the requirements of chapter 106 of the Laws of 1906.

George Zabriskie, of Zabriskie, Burrill & Murray, addressed the Board in behalf of W. & J. Sloane, Lord & Taylor, B. Altman & Co., and others, and presented a petition that the Board reconsider the form of contract heretofore proposed for the construction of a rapid transit railroad in Fifth avenue and Broadway, between Thirty-sixth street and Fourteenth street, and determine that such railroad, if constructed, shall be constructed by tunneling in such a manner as not to break or disturb the surface of the street.

Henry W. Jessup, in behalf of an Association of Broadway and Fifth Avenue Property Owners and Business Men, urged the same course.

F. W. Hinrichs, representing the Citizens Union, and individually, urged the Board to divide the proposed Lexington avenue work into smaller sections and to take advantage of all the alternatives provided by the Rapid Transit Act, as amended by the so-called Elsborg bill.

Nicholas R. O'Connor, representing the President of the Borough of Manhattan, spoke of the desirability of providing a system of inspection of the condition of street pavements before and after subway construction work, so as to determine exactly the responsibility of the contractors for the repairs to pavements.

Henry C. Wright, Secretary of the City Club, protested against including in the contract section 5A, and suggested certain changes in the specifications, such as smooth floors in the subway, side doors in subway cars, a different arrangement of seats, signs inside of trains; also telephones in the trains.

Rev. Mr. Sherer, Vice-President of the Citizens' East Side Improvement Association, objected to the including of section 5A in the contract.

A. A. Gardner made a number of suggestions in behalf of the Interborough Company for changes in the contract and specifications.

J. Hampden Dougherty, representing a Committee on Underground Transit of the Merchants' Association, protested against the said contract as far as the same provides for a railroad under Broadway, from Twenty-third to Vesey street, by any plan or method of open ditching or cut and cover process.

The president then declared the hearing closed.

Report of the Special Committee appointed to confer with President Winter, of the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company, including report of the Chief Engineer, was read as follows, together with letter of President Winter:

To the Board:

Your Committee had a conference with President E. W. Winter, of the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company, as to the character of the rolling stock now operated by his company, and after consulting with the Chief Engineer, whose report in writing is attached hereto, the Committee adopted a resolution as follows, which is recommended to the Board for adoption:

Resolved, That the character of the rolling stock which will be allowed in the portion of Subway Route No. 9 connecting the Manhattan terminals of the Williamsburg and Brooklyn Bridges, shall be at least as good as the most modern now operated on the elevated railway tracks of the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company.

Hon. A. E. Orr, President, Rapid Transit Board:

DEAR SIR—In accordance with the request of the Board, I present a report in connection with the use of the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Company's cars through the proposed subway loop extending through Centre and Delancey streets, connecting the Brooklyn and Williamsburg bridges.

This connection is about 6,730 feet in length, including the Brooklyn Bridge station, near Park row, and the station at the Manhattan approach to the Williamsburg Bridge; other stations along this elongated terminal being at Franklin street, Howard and Grand streets, and the Bowery.

The present subway cars are of recent design and construction, and at the time of building were considered to be the best type of car obtainable. Since that time, however, 300 steel cars have been built and are in use.

The better class of car now in use on the Brooklyn Rapid Transit system is a wooden car, with asbestos protection on the floors and steel frames. In my opinion these cars are suitable to be operated in the proposed subway loop when fitted with additional motive power to overcome higher grades. They are as good as the wooden cars now operated in the present subway and will compare well with those operated in the Boston subway, where wooden cars have been in use for a number of years without serious results in their operation. Of course, in the operation of any subway a car with the least amount of inflammable material is the most desirable, and in future operation all cars should be replaced by those of more modern design as circumstances require.

Hon. A. E. Orr, Chairman, Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners, No. 346 Broadway, New York:

DEAR SIR—Lest the magnitude of cost which would be involved in the one item of composing the elevated trains of the Brooklyn Rapid Transit system exclusively of motor cars, as suggested at the conference yesterday, should be underestimated by your committee through lack of technical information on that phase of the subject, I beg leave to supplement what I then said with the following brief statement:

The Brooklyn Rapid Transit elevated equipment consists of 558 motor cars and 269 trailers. A motor car is constructed after plans quite different to those of a trailer. It is heavier, of somewhat different proportions and stronger, in order to accommodate and carry the equipment and bear the strain incident to its operation. The trailer car not being designed for the purpose, cannot be adapted to motor service; hence, if the elevated trains should be composed exclusively of motor cars, the 269 trailers now owned by the Company would have to be thrown out and motor cars substituted. This would mean an outlay in the first instance, and without increasing train capacity, of, say, \$3,000,000, and a proportional increase in the cost of all new elevated trains. I mention this because in the somewhat hurried discussion yesterday afternoon it was not brought out. It will readily be seen that this item alone would be an important contribution to the list of serious questions involved in the plan under consideration.

Nor can I see how the operating company could be secured in the right against contingencies permanently to operate other than strictly fireproof cars through the proposed subway however remote the risk, and I believe with his Honor the Mayor that it would be remote; but I have not consulted our legal department on this point.

It is the earnest desire of this company to co-operate to the fullest possible extent in your effort to solve the troublesome problem, and we feel that we would fall short of this if we did not put before you in all frankness the grave questions, physical and financial, with which from our point of view the operation of a subway loop would be invested. Now is the time to consider them.

Report of the Committee on Plans and Contracts was presented, as follows:

To the Board:

The Committee on Plans and Contracts have had under consideration the form of the construction contracts to be let for building the various parts of the Brooklyn loop lines, particularly that portion lying in Manhattan. This portion will be divided probably into five parts, one running from the Williamsburg Bridge to the Bowery, under Delancey street; another from the Bowery to the intersection of Centre and Broome streets; a third from Broome to Canal street; a fourth from Canal to Pearl street; and a fifth comprising the terminal connections between the Centre street line and the Brooklyn Bridge.

Perhaps the most difficult part of this work, owing to the character of the soil, is the section between Pearl street and Canal. It has therefore been taken up first, as it will probably take longer to execute.

The contract submitted by the Committee for the consideration of the Board contains substantially similar provisions to those contained in the proposed contract for Lexington avenue, so far as relates to construction only. There is nothing in regard to equipment and no provisions relative to a lease. The order in which the various subjects are treated has, however, been rearranged.

With respect to security, the Board proposes to follow the usual practice of the City government in making construction contracts and not to require any deposit of money in addition to the contractor's bond. There will be required a bond (or, at the contractor's option, a deposit of money or approved securities), and a percentage will be retained from the monthly payments made by the City.

The contractor will be required to finish his work within twenty-one months from the date of the contract, that being considered ample time, and damages will be imposed for delay.

There will be four tracks and a station at Franklin street, reaching nearly to Leonard street at one end and to White street at the other.

This portion of the work will include a connection between the new Manhattan Bridge and Centre street.

The Committee recommends that the Board now proceed to fix a time as required by law for a public hearing on the form of this instrument.

Report of the Chief Engineer and letter of Mr. Philbin, of Philbin, Beekman & Menken, were presented as follows, together with a number of communication of property owners in Thirty-second and Thirty-third streets, asking for a postponement of action on the application of the Pennsylvania, New York and Long Island Railroad Company for permission to open streets from the surface in certain places. Mr. Philbin explained that his clients had already made agreements with certain abutting owners and were prepared to arrange with others as far as possible, and urged the Board to grant the permits without delay, as the company was losing \$1,600 a day, and the men employed about \$1,000 a day:—

New York, February 7, 1907.

Hon. A. E. Orr, President, Rapid Transit Board:

DEAR SIR—The Board at its last meeting requested a report upon the petition of the Pennsylvania, New York and Long Island Railroad Company for the right to make excavations from the surface of Thirty-second and Thirty-third streets, in the vicinity of Fifth avenue, and also from the surface of the same streets, west of Sixth avenue.

On account of the construction of this work in the vicinity of the Thirty-third street station of the present subway, I have for some time kept in touch with it, and have been familiar with the methods of construction, and also the nature of the material through which the work has been done.

Taking the section at Thirty-third street and Fifth avenue, the original borings showed rock generally about the level or above the inside top of the structure. Some of these were made by core borings and others by wash borings. A short distance west of Fifth avenue on Thirty-third street it is found that the rock does not go to the level, as was supposed, and there is at that place a depression considerably below the top of the tunnel for a distance which is unknown at the present time.

At this particular place I find, from maps in our possession, that an original water course in this section of the City runs diagonally across Thirty-third street, just west of Fifth avenue, and also crosses Thirty-second street to the east of Fifth avenue. This water course has evidently been the cause of depression in the rock, and has been tunneled under by the contractors on both Thirty-second and Thirty-third streets in the vicinity of Third and Second avenues. As the tunnel is at a very much greater depth at these particular sections, and inasmuch as there is a greater depth of rock cover, no trouble was encountered. On Thirty-third street, west of Fifth avenue, the rock gradually rises and extends westerly to the end of the section, and in my opinion the depression in the rock will last for a comparatively short distance, possibly 250 or 300 feet. The contractors for this work have asked permission to open the street from the surface by means of taking out slices of the street practically between the curbs and to make a timbered trench in this section, underpinning those buildings where it is found necessary, previous to or at the time of making the excavation. This method of construction is a perfectly feasible one, and in my judgment the safest which could be pursued.

East of Fifth avenue the tunnel is a two-track tunnel, but west of Fifth avenue it becomes a three-track tunnel. This requires a width of excavation of about 44 feet, and as the street has only a width of 60 feet, the excavation is necessarily within 6 feet of the building lines, and at the bottom of the tunnel about 65 feet from the surface of the street. If the rock should continue half way on this section from the bottom of the tunnel to the surface of the street, a comparatively small amount of trouble would be anticipated; but when the rock goes to a depth below the bottom of the arch there necessarily is serious danger, particularly where the underground water table naturally flows. These are conditions which have been found at the point where a break in the sewer was encountered west of Fifth avenue, since which time very little progress has been made except in the way of exploration. It is possible to construct a tunnel through this particular section by means of timbering, but it would be more dangerous than that proposed by the contractors. If it were attempted to excavate in this way, there would no doubt be a depression of the street which would naturally lead to the leakage of the sewer, and the middle of the street being depressed the sides of the street would naturally come in. In the method proposed by the contractors, i. e., timbering and excavating from the top, sheathing is immediately put in place and braced, so that the movement of the neighboring material can be prevented, and the street planked over for practically constant use, both for vehicular and pedestrian travel. The same condition of affairs exists on Thirty-third street, where the contractor has made an excavation in the vicinity of Fifth avenue; this excavation, however, has not been made the full width.

An application has been made to open the street, by the method proposed, on Thirty-third street, and for a distance of 500 feet from a point 200 feet west of Madison avenue on Thirty-second street, but not to exceed in any event 600 feet. In my opinion this length will be about 500 feet, and the method of opening the construction across Fifth avenue is, I think, desirable, as the rock is so low at this place that any settlement whatever of the material over the roof of the tunnel would cause trouble with the pipes which run down Fifth avenue at this particular place.

In reference to the petition for the section on Thirty-third street, west of Sixth avenue, it appears that the contractors wish to make an open excavation for a distance of 30 feet eastward from a point 300 feet west of the west line of Sixth avenue, but not to exceed a distance in any event of over 600 feet. From the borings which have been made in this section it seems to me that the rock is of sufficient elevation here not to require open excavation, except in the immediate vicinity of the shaft which it is proposed to sink at this place. In order that there may not be delay in the work, the contractors have already erected some timbered work in the street where it is proposed to sink this shaft, and the method of handling material is in my judgment the best that can be obtained; it contemplates an electric hoist, with facilities for loading teams in a manner which is both rapid and well designed.

On Thirty-second street application has been made to make an open trench for a distance of 30 feet eastward from a point 550 feet west of the west line of Sixth avenue, petitioning that this work shall not exceed in any event 750 feet. In this particular locality, judging from the borings, there will be very little trouble in ex-

cavating this tunnel until the vicinity of Sixth avenue is reached, and in my judgment it would not be necessary to make an open trench in this particular section, only in the immediate vicinity of the shaft as already located. This shaft is also to be operated in the same way as the one proposed on Sixth avenue, with modern appliances, and would no doubt materially advance the completion of this work.

I understand that originally it was intended to have all work done without having any openings in the street west of the block lying between Fourth avenue and Madison avenue, but on account of having met the conditions which exist both on Thirty-third and Thirty-second streets, in the vicinity of Fifth avenue, it is now recognized that considerable delay will be occasioned in the carrying on of the work at these places, no matter what method of excavation may be pursued. For this reason requests are made to sink shafts on both Thirty-third and Thirty-second streets, not only to find out the nature of the material at these particular places, which seems to be objectionable, but also to expedite the work to completion. In my estimation, if the petition of the contractors should be allowed, all the excavation work above referred to can be done in the course of twelve months.

To the Honorable Board of Rapid Transit Commissioners, New York City:

SIRS—In relation to the petition recently filed by the Pennsylvania, New York and Long Island Railroad Company, for leave to make certain surface excavations, we beg to set forth some very strong reasons why the decision of your Honorable Board should not be deferred beyond to-day, Thursday.

The application is, as his Honor the Mayor stated, when it was presented, one that involves a determination as to what the circumstances require from an engineering point of view, and, therefore, the information that has already been furnished to the Board by not only the well known engineers who have been consulted by us, but also by the Board's Chief Engineer, whose many years of practical experience in this particular phase of engineering work have made his opinion really conclusive, should afford sufficient ground for immediate decision.

Since the last meeting the owners of some of the most important parcels of real estate that might be affected by the excavations in question, have given their consent to the method proposed, having been reassured that such method will not in any way interrupt traffic or prevent the fullest enjoyment of their property.

The only opposition to the granting of the permit that has appeared has been based upon a fear on the part of the property owners that their properties would be injured without any adequate remedy being provided for such injuries, and such opposition has not been based upon any doubt as to the necessity for the method suggested from an engineering point of view.

The counsel for the Board, Hon. George L. Rives, has had submitted to him certain proposed permits, which contain certain clauses suggested by him, for the purpose of more definitely protecting the interests of the property owners along the routes, and we have assented to these. In view of the safeguard thus created for the benefit of the property owners, it would seem that the objections that have been made have been fully met, and, therefore, no reasons can be suggested for further delay. The attention of the Board has already been called to the serious consequences that will follow any further delay in relation to this great public improvement.

DEAR SIR—I have your letter of February 4, transmitting copy of the resolution of the Board of Aldermen, dated January 12, 1907, recommending the construction of an elevator at the West Farms station in The Bronx.

Passengers using this station are required to ascend approximately 32 feet from the street surface to the ticket house, thence about 15 feet more to the train platform, altogether about 47 feet, before they can board the trains.

The contract with John B. McDonald provides that "wherever station platforms are located at a depth or height exceeding 30 feet from the surface of the street, the contractor shall, if required by the Board, establish an approved plant of elevators not exceeding four in number."

When the plans for this station were prepared, no provision was made for either elevators or escalators. The station is now entirely completed in accordance with the plans prepared by the Board. It is now entirely practicable to provide either elevators or escalators for this station at a very small additional cost over what the cost would have been if they had been installed when the station was first constructed.

If elevators are used property will have to be acquired on one or both sides of the street. Escalators could be constructed from the street level without acquiring private property.

For the reasons stated in the above mentioned report of the Committee on Plans and Contracts, which has been accepted by the Board, the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment is requested to the amendatory certificate herewith transmitted, which, as it will be observed, is to take effect if and when approved by your Board, and consented to by the sureties on the bond given by the New York and Jersey Railroad Company, in so far as such certificate modifies the original certificate of February 2, 1905, in respect to the definition of vault space and the mode of calculating the payments therefor.
