DEPARTMENT OF BUILDINGS.

BY BOARD OF BUILDINGS, JUNE 26, 1900.

Present—Commissioners Brady, Guilfoyle and Campbell.

The minutes of the meeting of June 15, 1900, were read and, on motion, approved.

Petitions were submitted for approval, as follows:

Plan 488, New Buildings, 1900, Manhattan and The Bronx—Petition to allow the omission of fireproofing about the seven columns in the auditorium, which carry the front of gallery, fireproofing to be omitted from that portion of the columns between the auditorium floor and under side of gallery, as stated in petition; One Hundred and Fourteenth and One Hundred and Fifteenth streets, 100 feet west Seventh avenue. Petitioner, C. H. J. Snyder. Approved.

Plan 569, New Buildings, 1900, Manhattan and The Bronx—Petition to allow the omission of one stairway in said buildings, in accordance with plans filed and as stated in petition; Nos. 455, 457, 459 West Thirty-sixth street. Petitioner, F. H. Constock. Denied.

Plan 552, New Buildings, 1900, Manhattan and The Bronx—Petition to allow the present party wall 12 inches thick to be used as an inclosure wall for an elevator shaft, as stated in petition; No. 41 West Twenty-fourth street. Petitioner, Frederick C. Zabel. Denied.

Plan 241, New Buildings, 1900, Manhattan and The Bronx—Petition to allow wooden lath and plaster, three coats of plaster to be used for ceiling in place of plaster-boards, as stated in petition; north side of Eastern Boulevard, 50 feet east of Balcon avenue. Petitioner, Thomas J. Newman. On motion of Commissioner Guilfoyle the petition was denied, Commissioner Campbell voting to approve.

Plan 505, New Buildings, 1900, Manhattan and The Bronx—Petition to allow the depth to be full size of lot, as stated in petition; southeast corner Twelfth avenue and Fifty-fifth street. Petitioner, Peter Dreiger. Denied.

Plan 580, New Buildings, 1900, Manhattan and The Bronx—Petition to allow the erection of a frame building within the fire limits, for reason as stated in petition; south side of One Hundred and Forty-first street, 75 feet west of Locust avenue. Petitioner, G. Gibbons. Denied.

Plan 500, New Buildings, 1900, Manhattan and The Bronx—Petition to allow the side walls of pent-house above roof to be constructed of angle and tee iron, filled in with terra-cotta blocks and covered with 12-ounce copper throughout, as stated in petition; northwest corner Thirtieth street and Third avenue. Petitioners, Howells & Stokes. Approved.

Plan 1357, Alterations in New Buildings, 1900, Manhattan and The Bronx—Petition to allow the addition of one story to present extension, walls of third-story extension are 8 inches thick, proposed new extension to be used only as dressing-room in connection with bed-room, fourth,

rear, as stated in petition; No. 50 West Seventy-fifth street. Petitioner, Abraham Goldsmith. Approved.

Plan 1367, Alterations in New Buildings, 1900, Manhattan and The Bronx—Petition to allow walls of extension to be built of thicknesses shown on plans, foundation and basement walls 12 inches, first and second stories 8 inches, as stated in petition; No. 66 West Forty-eighth street. Petitioner, Mrs. James H. Herry. Approved.

Plan 1354, Alterations to New Buildings, 1900, Manhattan and The Bronx—Petition to allow the present ceiling and side wall of basement to be covered with 3-inch thick plaster-boards, properly fastened, covering same with plaster, making total thickness 2 inches, instead of using burnt-clay blocks; also to allow the building of brick chimney 8 feet high at rear corner in yard, and a galvanized-iron pipe from top of same to above roof, as stated in petition; No. 203 Elizabeth street. Petitioner, A. G. Redlin. Denied.

Plan 1387, Alterations to Buildings, 1900, Manhattan and The Bronx—Petition to allow the sides of conservatory below sill to be constructed with angle iron filled with 4-inch hard-tile blocks, wire lathed and plastered on outside and covered with sheet copper; walls above to be formed of angle iron, covered with copper and filled in with glass, as stated in petition; No. 17 West Seventh street. Petitioners, Isaacs & Harder. Approved.

Plan 576, New Buildings, 1900, Manhattan and The Bronx—Petition to allow factory building to be built as per plans filed, division walls being carried above roof and coped, and openings in walls are protected by automatic fireproof underwriters' doors, as stated in petition; north side Twenty-fifth street, 300 feet east Eleventh avenue. Petitioners, Schickel & Dittmar. Approved.

Application No. 2222, Alterations to Buildings, 1900, Brooklyn—Petition to modify the provisions of section 142 of the Building Code, Laws of 1899, so as to allow the erection of frame extension to frame building in the fire limits; premises, one building, southeast corner Russell place and Herkimer street, in the Borough of Brooklyn, New York City. Petitioner, Russell Place Methodist Episcopal Church. Approved.

Application No. 2043, Alterations to Buildings, 1900, Brooklyn—Petition to modify the provisions of the Building Laws so as to permit the alteration of a one-family dwelling into a tenement house, leaving but three feet in rear of same, but having ten feet at the side of building; premises, one building, east side Verman street, 100 feet north of Jamaica avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn, New York City. Petitioner, Theodore W. Myer. Denied.

A report was received from John Lee, Inspector, Department of Buildings, relative to a sample of lead-lined iron pipe submitted to this Department by the Lead Lined Iron Pipe Company for official approval, which, on motion of Commissioner Guilfoyle was adopted, and the lead-lined iron pipe declared to be disapproved by the Board.

A report was received from John Lee, Inspector, Department of Buildings, relative to the "Santo Porcelain Urinal," submitted to this Department by the J. L. Hunt Iron Works for official approval, which, on motion of Commissioner Guilfoyle was adopted, and the "Santo Porcelain Urinal" declared to be approved by the Board.

A communication was received from F. A. Ross, with descriptive book of device for elevator shafts, as protection against fire and accidents. Which was ordered on file.

A communication was received from Abraham Waite, President Fireproofing Manufacturing Company, relative to test of "Fireproofing" by the Board, and submitting some pine shavings which have been rendered fireproof, was referred to the President.
