### Dock Department—New Plan for Improvement of the Waterfront South of Dyckman St., North River.

This matter was on the calendar of the last meeting, and the hearing adjourned to be continued at this meeting.

On motion, the hearing was again adjourned to be continued at 10 o'clock in the forenoon on Friday, August 10, 1917.

Note—At this point His Honor, the Mayor, arrived, and after remaining but a few minutes was called away.

### Dock Department—Proposed Lease to the Vermont Hygeia Ice Company of Certain Land Under Water, South of Dyckman St., North River.

The Chamberlain brought up the matter of the proposed lease to the Vermont Hygeia Ice Company which was laid over at the last meeting.

A communication was received from the Commissioner of Parks, Manhattan, in opposition to the proposed lease, which was considered.

Mr. Cyrus C. Miller, Attorney for the Vermont Hygeia Ice Company, was again heard in regard to the matter.

After a discussion the matter was again laid over.

### Board of Education—Lease for, of Premises in the Parochial School Building on the Easterly Side of Brook Ave., 104 Feet North of 159th St., Bronx.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution:

August 3, 1917.

To the Honorable, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—The Secretary of the Board of Education in a communication to your Board under date of June 29, 1917, states that the Board of Education on June 27, 1917, adopted a resolution requesting a lease of six rooms on the third floor, nine rooms on the fourth floor and Room "A" on the first floor in the parochial school building of the Roman Catholic Church of St. Peter and St. Paul, located on the easterly side of Brook Avenue, 104 feet north of 159th Street, The Bronx, occupied as an annex to Public School 10, for a period of two years from July 1, 1917, with the privilege of renewal for an additional term of two years thereafter, at an annual rental of \$10,500, otherwise upon terms and conditions the same as those contained in the lease which expired July 1, 1917.

Deeming the rent reasonable and just under the circumstances and the City being a holdover tenant, I respectfully recommend that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopt a resolution approving of and consenting to the execution by the Board of Education of a lease of Rooms 304, 305, 306, 307, 308, 309, 401, 402, 403, 404, 405, 406, 407, 408, 409, Room "A" on first floor, and one-half of the playground in the basement, of the parochial school building of the Roman Catholic Church of St. Peter and St. Paul, located on the easterly side of Brook Avenue, 104 feet north of 159th Street, Borough of the Bronx, for use of the Board of Education, for a period of two years from July 1, 1917, with the privilege of renewal for an additional term of two years thereafter upon the same terms and conditions, at an annual rental of \$10,500, payable quarterly; the City to pay taxes and water rates upon the demised premises during the term of the lease or any renewal thereof; the lessors to furnish heat, light and janitor service, make all exterior repairs, and to permit the Board of Education to use the auditorium, exclusive of the gallery, on all school days between the hours of 8:40 and 11 o'clock A.M., otherwise on terms and conditions the same as those contained in the lease which expired on July 1, 1917. Lessor, Roman Catholic Church of St. Peter and St. Paul. Respectfully,

I am now endeavoring to obtain some other building in place thereof for use of the Board of Education.

Gentlemen—I am in receipt of a communication dated July 27, 1917, from the Commissioner of the Mayor's Bureau of Weights and Measures, requesting a lease of the premises at 48 Jackson Avenue, Long Island City, Borough of Queens, now occupied by the Mechanical Division of said Bureau, for a period of three years.

The Comptroller, in a communication to your Board under date of March 8, 1917, recommended the payment of rent, at the rate of \$35 a month, for the use of these premises by the Mayor's Bureau of Weights and Measures, for a period not exceeding four months from March 1, 1917, on a month-to-month basis, and said report was approved and payment of rent authorized at a meeting of your Board held March 15, 1917.

**Court of Special Sessions—Assignment to, of Premises at 49 Lafayette St., Manhattan, Surrendered by the Industrial Education Survey Committee.**

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution:

August 3, 1917.

*To the Honorable the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:*

Gentlemen—The Director of the Industrial Education Survey Committee in a communication to your Board under date of July 31, 1917, states that two of the



three offices assigned to them on the seventh floor of the building at No. 49 Lafayette Street, Manhattan, on July 13, 1916, by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, are no longer required by his Committee, and he therefore surrenders two of the offices to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, as of August 1, 1917, stating that the other office will be required until later in the year.

On November 16, 1916, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund assigned to the Court of Special Sessions, in lieu of leased quarters at 315 Fourth Avenue, part of this floor for their Probation Department, with the understanding that the space occupied by the Industrial Education Survey Committee should also be assigned to them when it should be vacated by said Committee.

In a communication to your Board under date of July 5, 1917, the Chief Justice of the Court of Special Sessions again makes request for the early assignment of this space, owing to the congested condition of their office at this location.

The report was accepted and the resolution adopted, all the members present voting in the affirmative.

#### Petition of the New York University for the Cancellation of Certain Assessments.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented a report recommending the cancellation of certain assessments for public improvements and water rents affecting premises in the Borough of The Bronx owned by the New York University.

The matter requiring a unanimous vote, action thereon was laid over.

#### Public Service Commission—In the Matter of the Request of, for the Turning Over of Certain Premises on Jerome Ave. and Moshulu Parkway, Bronx, for a Storage Yard.

(Not on the calendar. Brought up by unanimous consent.)

A communication was received from the Public Service Commission dated August 3, 1917, reciting the various steps taken in regard to its application for the turning over of certain premises at Jerome ave. and Moshulu Parkway, Bronx, for a storage yard; and in which the statement is made that a copy of the report of the Committee presented at meeting of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund held June 7, 1917, had not been received, and that the Public Service Commission is therefore not in a position to know the point of view of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund with respect to its request for the transfer of the land, etc.

On motion of the Chamberlain, the Secretary was directed to reply to the letter, calling attention to the fact that a copy of the report in question was transmitted to a member of the Public Service Commission on June 7, 1917, with the information that the report was ordered transmitted to the Commission for the preparation of detailed plans; that throughout the discussion and at all the conferences a member of the staff of the Public Service Commission was present, and that the Engineering Department of the Commission was kept fully advised of every step, and that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund still await the submission of the plan prepared by the Engineering Department of the Public Service Commission and approved by the Interborough Company.
