Hon. FRANKLIN EDSON, Mayor:

SIR—I have the honor of making special report to you of the fact that the works for the additional water supply from the Bronx river are so far completed that the city is now receiving about ten million gallons of water per day from that source.

The conduit line consists of 15½ miles of 48-inch pipe from the collecting reservoir at Kensico to the receiving reservoir at Williamsbridge, and 2½ miles of 36-inch pipe thence to the junction of Jerome avenue and Croton avenue, where it connects with the distributing pipes.

This scheme for an additional water supply was originated and adopted by my predecessor, the Honorable Allan Campbell. The work on the first contract—the dam at Kensico—was begun in October, 1880. Three years and eleven months were therefore occupied from the commencement of the work until water was obtained through the conduit.

Considering the limitation of appropriation available each year, and the delays incidental to the legal proceedings for acquiring the necessary lands, water rights, etc., the work has been done with exceptional promptitude. The last proceeding for the acquisition of land was not consummated until January, 1884. The introduction of this additional supply, though comparatively small and greatly inadequate to the needs of the city, will probably enable the Department to furnish water to every part of the city at all times, while keeping a full reserve supply in the city reservoirs. For several years past the full supply from the Aqueduct was not adequate to do this, it being necessary in times of extreme heat or cold to draw down the reserve in the city reservoirs in order that no portion of the city should be without water, and thus expose the city to the danger of complete exhaustion of supply in case of accident to the Aqueduct. It is not expected that the additional supply of 10,000,000 gallons per day will result in much, if any, appreciable increase of pressures throughout the city, and such advantages and benefits as it will afford will gradually be diminished by the growing demands for water consequent upon increase in population, manufactures and commerce.

But it will avert incalculable injury to the industries, commerce and health of the community, which, without it, would certainly ensue before the new Aqueduct is finished.

I deem it an imperative duty on this occasion to convey to the people, through you, the solemn warning that all the benefits and advantages to be derived from the new supply will be destroyed, if they consider themselves at liberty, in consequence of it, to indulge in lavish use of water. Such indulgence would inevitably plunge the city into the perils of an inadequate water supply.

Mr. George W. Birdsall, the First Assistant Engineer of the Croton Aqueduct, who has had special direction of the works, deserves credit for the promptitude and success with which the project has been carried on.
