Sir—I have the honor of making special report to you of the fact that the works for the additional water supply from the Bronx river are so far completed that the city is now receiving about ten million gallons of water per day from that source.

The conduit line consists of 155 miles of 48 inch pipe from the collecting reservoir at Kensico to the receiving reservoir at Williamsbridge, and 2½ miles of 36 inch pipe thence to the junction of Jerome avenue and Croton avenue, where it connects with the distributing pipes.

This scheme for an additional water supply was originated and adopted by my predecessor, the Honorable Allan Campbell. The work on the first contract—the dam at Kensico—was begun in October, 1880. Three years and eleven months were therefore occupied from the commencement of the work until water was obtained through the conduit.

Considering the limitation of appropriation available each year, and the delays incidental to the legal procreedings for acquiring the necessary lands, water rights, etc., the work has been done with exceptional promptitude. The last proceeding for the acquisition of lard was not consummated until January, 1884. The introduction of this additional supply, though comparatively small and greatly rears past the full supply from the Aqueduct was not adequate to do this, it being necessary in times of extreme heat or cold to draw down the reserve in the city reservoirs. For several years past the full supply from the Aqueduct. It is not expected that the additional supply of 10,000,000 gallons per day will result in much, if any, appreciable increase of pressures throughout the city, and such advantages and benefits as it will afford will gradually be distinuished by the growing demands for water consequent upon increase in population, manufactures and commerce.

But it will avert incalculable injury to the industries, commerce and health of the community, which, without it, would certainly ensue

APPROVED PAPERS.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to James P. Mahon to place a post and small emblematic sign thereon within the curb-line in front of his premises, No. 221½ Centre street, said post to be six inches in circumference and eight feet high, the sign to be two feet square; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

SIR—There were \$11 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, September 13, 1884, which is an increase of 186, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 262 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1883. The actua mortality for the week ending September 6, 1884, was 708, which is 101.6 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 26.98 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,364,487.
