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### APPROVED PAPERS.

*Ordinances, resolutions, etc., approved by the Mayor during the week ending September 17, 1881.*

Resolved, That the attention of the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks be called to the condition of Fairmount avenue, Prospect avenue and Broadway, formerly Grove street, Fairmount, Twenty-fourth Ward, and that they be requested to take immediate steps to repair the same.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, September 6, 1881.  
Approved by the Mayor, September 13, 1881.

Resolved, That the attention of the Commissioners of Public Parks be called to the dangerous and disgraceful condition of One Hundred and Forty-seventh street, between Robbins and Tinton avenues, in the Twenty-third Ward, and that they be and are hereby requested to take immediate steps to repair the same.

Whereas, His Honor the Mayor did, on August 23, 1881, return, without his approval, the resolution of the Board of Aldermen and accompanying ordinance, adopted July 26, 1881, providing that Brook avenue, between One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street and a point 174 feet south of the north line of One Hundred and Thirty-first street, be regulated and graded, "for the reason that the Engineers of the Department of Public Parks are of the opinion that the grades at present established for Brook avenue should be revised before the work of regulating and grading this avenue is carried out;" and

Whereas, The Board of Aldermen has been frequently petitioned by the property owners along the line of said avenue for the passage of resolutions regulating and grading the same, and as it is desirable that the prayers of these petitioners should be granted as soon as possible, in order that an improvement so essential to the growth and development of the Twenty-third Ward be no longer delayed; be it therefore

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks be and they are hereby requested and urged to revise, fix, and establish the grades of Brook avenue at the earliest possible moment, and that as soon as said grades are so revised and established to direct their engineers to prepare and transmit to this Board, for its consideration, proper resolutions for regulating and grading said avenue in accordance with said revised grades.

The Board of Health met this day.

#### Action of the Board on Tenement-House Plans.

Resolved, That the following plans for light and ventilation of tenement-houses be and are hereby approved upon the conditions specified in these several permits granted:

Plan No. 1184, for five four-story tenements, each 25 by 60 feet, on four lots 25 by 75 feet, and one lot 25 by 100 feet 11 inches on southwest corner of First avenue and One Hundred and Fourteenth street, each to be occupied by six families.

Plan No. 1188 was laid on the table for future consideration.

Plan No. 1189, for one five-story tenement, 38 feet 6 inches by 68 feet, with extension 22 by 26 feet, on lot 38 feet 6 inches by 100 feet 5 inches on south side Fifty-first street, beginning 163 feet 6 inches east of Ninth avenue, to be occupied by ten families.

The weekly report of inspections of new tenement-houses was received and ordered on file.

Resolved, That the application of John Brandt in reference to plan No. 997, denied at the previous meeting, be and is hereby granted, to continue as long as the windows remain unobstructed.

#### Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending September 10, 1881:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1312, as follows, viz.: 1 public building, 549 tenement-houses, 58 private dwellings, 64 other dwellings, 6 manufactories and workshops, 32 stores and warehouses, 14 stables, 7 slaughter-houses, 3 lodging-houses, 1 ash and garbage dump, 1 tripe-boiling establishment, 2 manure dumps, 27 sunken and vacant lots, 73 yards, courts, and areas, 86 cellars and basements, 143 waste-pipes and drains, 186 privies and water-closets, 33 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 6 dangerous stairways, 5 smoky chimneys, 6 cesspools, 9 other nuisances.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 413.

During the past week 230 complaints were received from citizens and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 86 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the port.

147 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 89 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 81 houses, 81 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

13 cases of contagious disease were removed to hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

#### Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 436 births, 44 still-births, 162 marriages, and 866 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, September 10, 1881; this shows a decrease of 61 births, an increase of 11 marriages and 102 deaths, and the same number of still-births, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1880, there was a decrease of 50 births, 4 still-births, and 33 marriages, and an increase of 297 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from croup decreased 3; puerperal diseases, 5; alcoholism, 3; rheumatism and gout, 4; cancer, 4; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 3; meningitis and encephalitis, 4; enteritis, gastritis, and peritonitis, 7; cyanosis and atelectasis, 3; while the deaths from small-pox increased 1; scarlatina 3; diphtheria, 9; whooping cough, 2; erysipelas, 3; typhoid fever, 8; cerebro-spinal fever, 1; malarial fever, 13; diarrhoeal diseases, 5; inanition, 1; phthisis pulmonalis, 8; bronchitis, 3; pneumonia, 1; heart diseases, 5; aneurism, 1; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 9; convulsions, 9; direct effect of solar heat, 32; apoplexy, 6; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 38; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 4; Bright's disease and nephritis, 4; suicide, 4, and drowning, 4. The number of deaths from measles, typhus fever and premature and preterm birth was the same in the two successive weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

The ages of 259 of the persons who died during the week were reported to be under one year, 363 under two years, 446 under five years, and 46 seventy years and over, which shows that the deaths of children under five years of age was more than the number reported during last week, and represent 51.50 per cent. of the total weekly mortality.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week 128 were in institutions, 510 in tenement-houses, 202 in houses containing three families or less, 7 in hotels and boarding-houses, 19 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 8 were on the basement floor, 155 on the first, 218 on the second, 181 on the third, 124 on the fourth, 31 on the fifth, 2 on the sixth. 859 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 7 non-residents.

The total number of burial permits issued during the week are as follows, viz.: City deaths, 866; still-births, 43; bodies in transit, 21. Of the total burial permits issued for city and still-births 88 were upon certificates received from the Coroners. 436 births, 162 marriages, 43 still-births, 866 deaths. 21 applications for transit permits were recorded, indexed, and tabulated, 41 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths were made, and 3 transcripts of the birth record, 2 of marriage, and 29 of death were issued during the week.

The mean temperature for the week ending Sept. 10, 1881, was 77.6 degrees Fahr., the mean reading of the barometer was 29.995, the mean humidity was 72, saturation being 100, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 732, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.09 inch depth of water, as reported by D. Draper, Ph. D., Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

## LAWS OF NEW YORK, 1881.

## CHAPTER 298.

## AN ACT for the preservation of the health of female employees.

Passed May 18, 1881; three-fifths being present.

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:

Section 1. It shall be the duty of all employers of females in any mercantile or manufacturing business or occupation to provide and maintain suitable seats for the use of such female employees, and to permit the use of such seats by such employees to such an extent as may be reasonable for the preservation of their health.

Sec. 2. Any violation of this act by any employer shall be deemed a misdemeanor.

Sec. 3. This act shall take effect immediately.

### NOTICE TO TAXPAYERS.

RELATING TO THE PAYMENT OF UNPAID TAXES, ASSESSMENTS, AND CROTON WATER RENTS.

THE COMPTROLLER OF THE CITY OF NEW York hereby gives notice to owners of real and personal estate in this city, that all unpaid taxes, assessments, and Croton water rents may now be paid with interest thereon at the rate of seven per cent. per annum, as provided by chapter 33 of the Laws of 1881, which is as follows:

#### CHAPTER 33.

AN ACT relative to the collection of taxes and assessments, and of arrears of taxes and assessments, and Croton water rents, in the City of New York.

(Passed March 16, 1881; three-fifths being present.)

The People of the State of New York, represented in Senate and Assembly, do enact as follows:  
Section 1. If any taxes of any year shall remain unpaid on the first day of November, after the assessment-rolls and the warrants to collect such taxes have been delivered to the Receiver of Taxes in the City of New York, it shall be the duty of said Receiver to give public notice, by advertisement for at least ten days in two of the daily newspapers, and in the CITY RECORD, printed and published in said city, respectively, that unless the same shall be paid to him at his office on or before the first day of December, in any such year, he will immediately thereafter proceed to collect such unpaid taxes, as provided in the following section of this act:

Section 2. If any such tax shall remain unpaid on the said first day of December, it shall be the duty of the said Receiver of Taxes in said city to charge, receive, and collect upon such tax so remaining unpaid on that day, in addition to the amount of such tax, one per centum on the amount thereof; and to charge, receive, and collect upon such tax so remaining unpaid on the first day of January thereafter, interest upon the amount thereof at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the day on which said assessment-rolls and warrants shall have been delivered to the said Receiver of Taxes to the date of payment.

The same rate of interest shall be so charged and collected upon any tax levied in the year eighteen hundred and eighty, remaining unpaid at the date of the passage of this act.

Section 3. All existing provisions of law which impose a charge and require the collection of interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum upon arrears of taxes on real and personal estate within the City of New York, upon arrears of assessments for local improvements and street openings in said city, and upon arrears of Croton water rents in said city, are hereby repealed; and in lieu of such charge of interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum, there shall be charged and collected by the officer authorized to collect and receive any such arrears of taxes and assessments and Croton water rents, interest upon the amount thereof at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated for the same period as interest at the rate of twelve per centum per annum is now required by law to be calculated thereon. This provision shall apply to taxes, assessments, or Croton water rents remaining unpaid and due, for the non-payment of which the lands and tenements liable therefor shall be hereafter sold at public auction as now provided by law; provided, however, that nothing in this act shall be construed to affect the rights of purchasers at sales for taxes, assessments, or Croton water rents, heretofore made, or to authorize the redemption of lands and tenements from sales heretofore made for any lesser sums than the sums collectible for such redemption under the provisions of existing laws.

Section 4. It shall be the duty of the Comptroller of the City of New York to give public notice, by advertisement, for at least ten days, in the CITY RECORD, printed and published in said city, immediately after the confirmation

of any assessment for a local improvement or street opening in said city, that the same has been confirmed specifying the title of such assessment and the date of its confirmation by the Board of Revision and Correction of Assessments in proceedings for local improvements, and by the Supreme Court in proceedings for street openings, and also the date of entry in the record of titles of assessments kept in the Bureau for the Collection of Assessments, and of Arrears of Taxes and Assessments, and of Croton water rents, notifying all persons, owners of property affected by any such assessment, that, unless the amount assessed for benefit on any person or property shall be paid within sixty days after the date of said entry of any such assessment, interest shall thereafter be collected thereon as provided in the following section of this act, and all provisions of law or ordinance requiring any other or different notice of assessments and interest thereon are hereby repealed.

Section 5. If any such assessment shall remain unpaid for the period of sixty days after the date of entry thereof in the said record of titles of assessments, it shall be the duty of the officer authorized to collect and receive the amount of such assessment, to charge, collect, and receive legal interest thereon, at the rate of seven per centum per annum, to be calculated from the date of such entry to the date of payment.

Section 6. This act shall take effect immediately.

### ORDER OF THE COMPTROLLER OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK, CONSOLIDATING CERTAIN BUREAUX IN THE FINANCE DEPARTMENT

SECTION 3 OF CHAPTER 521 OF THE LAWS of 1880, requires that heads of departments shall reduce the aggregate expenses of their respective departments by a reduction of salaries, and confers upon them authority to consolidate bureaux and offices for that purpose, as follows, to wit:

"In making the reduction herein required, every head of department may abolish and consolidate offices and bureaux, and discharge subordinates in the same department."

The Comptroller of the City of New York, in pursuance of the duty imposed and the authority thus conferred upon him, hereby orders and directs that the following Bureaux in the Finance Department shall be consolidated, the consolidation thereof to take effect on the first day of January, 1881, viz.:

First—"The Bureau or the Collection of Assessments, and 'The Bureau for the Collection of Arrears of Taxes and Assessments and of Water Rents,' shall be consolidated as one bureau, and on and after January 1, 1881, shall be known as 'The Bureau for the Collection of Assessments and of Arrears of Taxes and Assessments and of Water Rents,' and possess all the power conferred and perform all the duties imposed by law and ordinance upon both said bureaux, and the officers thereof, the chief officer of which consolidated Bureau shall be called 'Collector of Assessments and Clerk of Arrears.'"

Second—"The Bureau for the Collection of the Revenue accruing from rents and interest on bonds and mortgages, revenue arising from the use or sale of property belonging to or managed by the city," and "The Bureau of Markets," shall be consolidated as one Bureau, and on and after January 1, 1881, shall be known as "The Bureau for the Collection of City Revenue and of Markets," and possess all the powers conferred and perform all the duties imposed by law and ordinance upon both said bureaux, and the officers thereof; the chief officer of which said consolidated Bureau shall be called "Collector of City Revenue and Superintendent of Markets."
