Approved Papers for the week ending Saturday, December 21, 1889.

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to W. A. Edwards to erect in front of the up-town branch of the New York "Sun" newspaper, No. 1265 Broadway, at or near the curb-line, an ornamental iron post surmounted by a thermometer resembling a clock, provided the post shall not exceed eighteen inches m diameter, to be circular in form and covered so as to protect the thermometer from the sun ; said post to be set on the sidewalk, as above, and not to exceed fifteen feet in length ; the flagging and stones disturbed in setting the post to be replaced in perfect condition, closely fitting to the post and cemented so as to prevent percolation of water, the work to be done at his own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works ; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.





PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN 1HAT in compliance with the provisions of chapter 559, Laws of 1887, amending sections 350 and 921 of the New York City Consolidation Act of 1882, passed June 9, 1887 the following changes are made in charging and collect or water reads:

REGULATIONS ESTABLISHING A SCALE OF WATER RENTS AND RULES OF WATER RENTS AND RULES GOVERNING THE USE OF WATER, FOR THE CITY OF NEW YORK, BY ORDER OF THOMASF, GLLROY, COM-MISSIONER OF PUBLIC WORKS.

UNDER CHAPTER 410, LAWS 1882, SECTIONS 350, 351, 352 and 353, and as amended by chapter 559, Laws 1887, as follows: "The commissioner of public works shall, from time to time, establish scales of rents for the supplying of water, which rents shall be collected in the manner now provided by law, and which shall be apportioned to different classes of buildings in said city in reference to their dimensions, values, exposure to fires, ordnary uses for dwellings, stores, shops, private stables and other common purposes, number of families or occupants, or modity, alter, amend and increase such scale from time to

time, and extend it to other descriptions of buildings and establishments. All extra charges for water shall be deemed to be included in the regular rents, and shall become a charge and lien upon the buildings upon which they are restectively imposed, and, if not paid, shall be returned as arrears to the clerk of arrears. Such regular rents, including the extra charges above mentioned, shall be collected from the owners or occu-pants of all such buildings respectively, which shall be situated upon lots adjoining any street or avenue in said city in which the distributing water-pipes are or may be laid, and from which they can be supplied with water. Said rents, including the extra charges and or shall become a charge and lien upon such houses and lots, respectively, as herein provided, but no charge what-ever shall be me against any building in which a water-meter may have been, or shall be placed as pro-vided in this act. In all such cases the charge for vater shall be differentied only by the quantity of voter actually used as shown by said meters. * * * * * * * * * The said commissioner of public works is hereing anthorized to prescribe a penalty not exceeding the sum of five dollars for each offense, for permitting water to be wasted, and for any violation of such rassonable rules as he may, from the to time, prescribe for the presention of the upste of vaster such tras shall be added to the regular water rents." The rent of all tenements which shall exceed in width fifty feet shall be the subject of special contract with the Commissioner of Public Works. The apportionment of the regular rents upon dwelling-houses are on the basis that but one family is to occupy the same, and tor each additional family, one doilar per year shall be charged. METRES will be placed on all houses where waste of water is found, and they will be charged at rates fixed by the Department for all the water passing through them.  LIQCOR AND LACER BEER SALOONS shall be charged or each tap or wash-box.
 PHOTOGRAPH GALLERIES shall be charged an annual rate of from five to twenty dollars, each tap or wash-box.

hotels, manufactories, public edifices, at wharves, lerry-houses, stables, and in all places where water is lurnished for business consumption, except private dwellings. It is provided by section 352, Laws of 1852, that "all expenses of meters, their connections and setting, water rates, and other lawful charges for the supply of Croton water, shall be a lien upon the premises where such water is supplied, as now provided by law." * * All manufacturing and other business requiring a large supply of water will be fitted with a meter. The rate charged for steam-vessels taking water daily or belonging to daily lines, is one-half cent, per ton (Cus-tom House measurement) for each time they take water. Steamers taking water other than daily, one cent per ton (Custom House measurement). Water supplied to sailing vessels and put on board, twenty-five cents per hundred gallons. All matters not hereinbefore embraced are reserved for special contract by and with the Commissioner Public Works

HYDRANTS, HOSE, TROUGHS, FOUNTAINS, ETC., ETC.

No owner or tenant will be allowed to supply water to

HYDRANTS, HOSE, TROUGHS, FOUNTAINS, ETC., ETC.
No owner or tenant will be allowed to supply water to another person or persons.
All persons taking water from the City must keep their own service-pipes, street tap, and all fixtures connected therewith, in good repair, protected from frost, at their own risk and expense, and shall prevent all teaster of souter.
The use of hose to wash coaches, omnibuses, wagons railway cars or other vehicles or horses, cannot oe permitted in the street or on the sidewalk, except upon a license or permit taken out for that purpose. All licenses or permits must be annually renewed on the first of May. Such fixtures must be by overrunning the sidewalk or street, or to become dangerous in winter by freezing in and about such troughs or fixtures.
No hydrant will be permitted on the sidewalk or in the front area, and any hydrant standing in a yard or alley, attached to any dwelling or building, must not be left running when not in actual use, and if the drip or waste penalty of five dollars inpose.
Taps at wash-basins, water-closets, baths and urinals for each offense, which will be strictly enforced.
Fountains or jets in hotels, porter-houses, eating-saloons, confectoreres or other buildings are strictly prohibited.

saloons, confectioneries or other buildings are strictly prohibited. The use of hose for washing sidewalks, stoops, areas, house-fronts, yards, court-yards, gardens, and about stables, is prohibited. Where premises are provided with wells, special permits will be issued for the use of hose, in order that the police or inspectors of this depart-ment may understand that the permission is not for the use of Croton water. Opening fire-hydrants to fill hand sprinklers or other vessels will not be allowed. The penalty for a violation of any of the preceding rules and regulations will be five dollars for each offense, and if not paid when imposed will become a lien on the premises in like manner as all other charges for unpaid water rates. NOTICE TO CROTON WATER CONSUMERS.

NUMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN made to this Department by citizens claiming reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through meters, on the alleged ground of leakage caused by de-fective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by willful waste of water by tenants allowing the faucets to be turned on in full force in water-closets, sinks, etc., with-out the knowledge or consent of the owners of the prem-iess.

The set of the set of the owners of the prem-ises. The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and un-warrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this ob-ject can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted. Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises re-sponsible for the amount of water used or wasted. Notice is therefore civen to all householders that, in all further applications for reduction of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of waste of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by trenants or occu-pants of buildings. Mouse-owners are further notified that whenever their foremises become wacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is complied with no deductions in extra water rents will he allowed for any portion of one year.
