GENTLEMEN—Pursuant to the provisions of section 164 of chapter 410 of the Laws of 1882, as amended by section 1 of chapter 78 of the Laws of 1885 and section 195 of the Charter of The City of New York of 1898, the Commissioners of Accounts do hereby certify and report to the Mayor and Municipal Assembly that they have examined the accounts and vouchers of the City Chamberlain's office for the year ending November 30, 1897 (with the exception of seven vouchers, viz.: "A" 14900, "B" 2260, "B" 8221, "B" 9522, "B" 12290 of 1897, "P. R." 4542 of 1896 and "B" 9479 of 1897, which are missing from the Comptroller's files) and find therefrom as follows:

The balance in the Treasury to the credit of the City Treasury Accounts at the close of business on the 30th day of November, 1896, was \$15,882,681 79
The amounts of money received into the Treasury to the credit of the City Treasury Accounts during the year ending November 30, 1897, were (as per statement "A" hereto annexed) as follows, viz.:

All of said payments were made by the Chamberlain from the Treasury upon warrants drawn in due form by the Comptroller and signed by the Mayor or his Chief Clerk, in accordance with the requirements of chapter 64, Laws of 1887, as amended by chapter 85, Laws of 1888. Such warrants were so drawn in payment of bills examined, audited and allowed by the Auditor of Accounts, and filed in the Finance Department.

BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN AND THE BRONX.

IN BOARD OF EXAMINERS, JANUARY 25, 1898.

The Board of Examiners met this day, 3.40 P. M.

The roll was called with the following results:

Present—Thomas J. Brady, Commissioner of Buildings for the Boroughs of Manhattan and the Bronx, in the chair, and Messrs. Dobbs, Moore, Conover, Bonner, Post, O'Reilly, Fryer and McMillan.

The minutes of January 18, 1898, were read and approved. Petitions were then submitted for approval as follows:

Plan 619, New Buildings, 1897—Edward Wenz, petitioner—To allow the J. W. Rapp system of fireproof floor construction to be used for the first floors of buildings, as stated in petition; northwest corner of Second avenue and Ninety-fifth street. Approved, on condition that the soffits of iron beams are protected by wire-lath and plaster.

Plan 16A, New Buildings, 1898—Harry T. Howell, petitioner—To allow first story light shaft wall to be built 12 inches thick in cement mortar, and to have 20-inch foundation of stone, as stated in petition; north side of One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, 331 feet 6 inches west of Willis avenue. Approved.

Plan 885, New Buildings, 1897—Schneider & Herter, petitioners—To allow main entrance hall partitions to be of 4-inch angle irons, filled in with fireproof blocks, as stated in petition; No. 259 East Seventh street. Approved on condition that the uprights, tees, channels and angle shall be not less than 4 inches, properly braced and set not more than 30 inches on centres, and filled in between solid with burnt clay blocks, or porous terra cotta, or hard burnt brick of not less than 4-inch thickness, and plastered on both sides. Ceilings to be not less than 2-inch tees, angels or channels, set not more than 2 feet apart, well braced and filled in between solid with burnt clay blocks.

Plan 886, New Buildings, 1897—Schneider & Herter, petitioners—To allow main entrance hall partitions to be of 4-inch angle iron filled in with hollow burnt fireproof blocks, as stated in petition; No. 241 East Seventh street. Approved, on condition that the uprights, tees, channels and angles shall be not less than 4 inches properly braced and set not more than 30 inches on centres, and filled in between solid with burnt clay blocks, or porous terra cotta, or hard burnt brick of not less than 4 inches in thickness, and plastered on both sides. Ceilings to be not less than 2-inch tees, angles or channels, set not more than 2 feet apart, well braced and filled in between solid with burnt clay blocks.

Plan 31, New Buildings, 1898—John Hauser, petitioner—To allow stairwalls on first stories to remain of thickness as shown on plans, and as stated in petition; south side of One Hundred and Fifty-first street 275 feet east of Amsterdam avenue. Approved.

Plan 8, Alterations to Buildings, 1898—Small & Schumann, petitioners—To allow number of window at present shown on plans to be constructed in building without increase of 4 inches thickness to present front wall, but jambs of new windows to be broken through, and new addition to front wall to be laid up in cement mortar, as stated in petition; No. 1080 Lexington avenue. Approved.

Mr. Moore here offered the following:

Resolved, That where this Board approves any modification of the law as to the thickness of walls or the number of percentage of openings, it shall be understood that such approval is with the understanding and on condition that the masonry shall be or shall have been found by the engineers of the Department to be sufficient to resist the stress upon it.

Mr. O'Reilly moved that the resolution be laid over until next meeting, and that in the meantime a copy thereof be sent to each member of the Board. Carried.

Plan 15, New Buildings, 1898—Ralph S. Townsend, petitioner—To allow construction of pent house and elevator enclosure above main roof, as shown on drawings; said construction to be formed of steel framing filled in with fireproof material, and sheathed with metal on outside; also to allow construction of 12-inch brick walls to height shown on drawings, which is about 9 feet more than specified by law, or if this is objectionable, then to permit construction of these walls, 8 inches in thickness, above height specified by law, as stated in petition; Nos. 116 to 120 West Thirty-fourth street. Approved, on condition that the hall in the west portion be carried through, and a doorway placed at point marked "A" on roof plan, and that an independent staircase and balcony be constructed at points marked "B" and "C" at each story, these balconies to connect at the roof line, and also at the line of second story, with one staircase continuing to the ground, and that each floor from the top down to second story have the window from end of each of the halls made into doors to open on fire-escape balconies. The request to continue the 12-inch wall about 9 feet higher than prescribed by law is approved.

Mr. Moore was here excused.

Plan 247, New Buildings, 1897—John Streifler, petitioner—To allow glass lights to be placed in first or store floor at intervals of about 15 feet for the purpose of giving light thrown from skylights to said floor, to cellar, lights to be 14 by 16 of 3/4-inch wired floor-glass, set on brick laid in cement mortar; also to allow window to be placed in stairway partition at first story for the purpose of giving light, thrown from skylight over store, to said staircase, window to be about 16 inches by 16 inches of Oxydant rolled glass and made stationary, all as shown and as stated in petition; No. 363 West Forty-second street. Denied.

Plan 775, New Buildings, 1897—Henry Davidson, petitioner—To allow entrance hall partitions and ceiling above to be constructed of 3-inch fireproof blocks and angle iron, as stated in petition; south side of Seventeenth street, 223 feet west of Eighth avenue. Laid over.

Plan 1162, Alterations to Buildings, 1897—Franklin Baylies, petitioner—To allow occupancy of building to be changed from a dwelling to a building for stores and offices without increasing side walls, as per plans and application and as stated in petition; No. 242 West Fourteenth street. Approved.

Plan 1491, New Buildings, 1895—Oswald Wirz, petitioner—To allow construction of additional sixth story with 12-inch thick walls all around, present roof tier to remain and to be levelled with new 14-inch spruce beams, 14 inches apart, new roof to be spruce 3 by 10, 18 inches apart, fireproof shaft of present elevator to be extended 4 feet above new roof and covered with skylight, as stated in petition; No. 25 First avenue. Laid over for proper drawings.

Plan 713, New Buildings, 1897—G. F. Pelham, petitioner—To allow J. W. Rapp system of fireproof floor construction to be used for first floor of building; No. 59 Seventh street. Approved on condition that the soffits of iron beams are protected by wire-lath and plaster. Mr. Fryer voting No.

Plan 936, New Buildings, 1897—Cyrus L. W. Eidlitz, petitioner—To allow figured load upon soil to be 4 3/4 tons per square foot under interior columns; also to allow 45 per cent., 46 per cent. and 50 per cent. of opening in front and rear walls, all as stated in petition; Nos. 175 and 177 Wooster street. Approved, as to walls with excessive openings. Question of pressure on soil referred to Commissioner of Buildings.

Plan 1160, Alterations to Buildings, 1897—William J. Fryer, petitioner—To allow building to be increased two stories in height, making total height of building nine stories when completed, without increasing present thicknesses of walls, as floor loads are supported in most cases independently of said walls, as stated in petition; Nos. 429 to 433 Greenwich street. Laid over.

Mr. Post was here excused.

Plan 866, New Buildings, 1897—Henry Anderson, petitioner—To allow J. W. Rapp system of fireproof floor construction to be used for first floors of buildings, as stated in petition; north side of One Hundred and Eighteenth street, 185 feet east of Lenox avenue. Approved on condition that the soffits of iron beams are protected by wire-lath and plaster. Mr. Fryer voting No.

Plan 895, New Buildings, 1897—Thomas Bailey, petitioner—To allow Bailey system of fireproof floor filling to be used between steel or iron beams on first story, in place of brick arches, as stated in petition; north side of One Hundred and Fourteenth street, 277 feet 6 inches west of Lenox avenue. Approved, Mr. Fryer voting No.

Plan 299, New Buildings, 1897—Thomas Bailey, petitioner—To allow Bailey system of fireproof floor filling to be used between steel or iron beams on first stories of building, in place of brick arches as stated in petition; west side of Amsterdam avenue, One Hundred and Sixty-fourth street to One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street. Approved, Mr. Fryer voting No.

Plan 857, New Buildings, 1897—Thomas Bailey, petitioner—To allow the Bailey system of fireproof floor filling to be used on first floor of building as stated in petition; north side of One Hundred and Forty-seventh street, 100 feet west of Amsterdam avenue. Approved. Mr. Fryer voting No.

Plan 952, New Buildings, 1897—John Hauser, petitioner—To allow thickness of walls of light shafts, also those inclosing staircase on first and upper stories to remain, with the openings into as stated in petition; north side of One Hundred and Twenty-third street, 90 feet west of Second avenue. Approved.

Mr. Bonner was here excused.

Plan 14, Alterations to Buildings, 1898—S. B. Ogden & Co., petitioners—To allow bay windows on second and third stories of extension, and overlooking yard of same premises, to be constructed of steel angles, filled in with 3-inch fireproof partition blocks set in cement, and covered on outside with galvanized sheet iron; also the erection of one-story conservatory in yard to be constructed, as follows: brick foundation walls, 12 inches and 8 inches thick, to a height of 4 feet above yard level, with steel angles forming uprights for glass panels on west and south sides, and steel trusses for glazed roof extending over the whole, skylight frames and sash in roof to be of galvanized sheet iron, iron frames for glass panels on sides, and wood sash, all as stated in petition; No. 1000 Madison avenue. Denied.

Styne-Harde, petitioners—To allow central partition wall to be built of brick as per plan, walls to be 12 inches thick in basement, first and second stories and 8 inches thick on third, fourth, fifth and sixth stories; as stated in petition; north side of Eighty-third street, 90 feet east of Riverside Drive. Plan 17, Alterations to Buildings, 1898—Brazier & Simonson, petitioners—To allow use of present walls as stated in petition; No. 127 East Twenty-third street. Approved.

Slip Application 20, 1898—Bernard Rosenstock, petitioner—To allow the putting in of plate-glass windows and sash doors and necessary steps to each of the portable steel houses now on premises, as stated in petition; northwest corner of Eighty-sixth street and Madison avenue. Denied.

Plan 706, New Buildings, 1897—G. A. Schellenger, petitioner—To allow Bailey system of floor filling to be used between steel beams of first story, as stated in petition; south side of Eighty-sixth street, 100 feet west of Amsterdam avenue. Approved. Mr. Fryer voting No.

Plan 951, New Buildings, 1897—Babb, Cook & Willard, petitioners—To allow iron beams of

basement floor (first tier) to be filled with cement arches of Roebling system, put in by Roebling Company, and constructed like arch tested last year, as stated in petition; east side of Fifth avenue, 25 feet 8 1/2 inches north of Eighty-eighth street. Approved. Mr. Fryer voting No.

Plan 6, Alterations to Buildings, 1898—Alexander M. Welch, petitioner—To allow openings in Thirty-eighth street wall, both of old building and extension, to be built as shown on plans, although percentage exceeds 25 per cent., all changes and new work on wall to be done in cement mortar; also to omit 8-inch cellar brick partition wall in new extension, making floor beams in this part 10-inch I beams, 25 pounds per foot, all as stated in petition; No. 314 Lexington avenue, northwest corner Thirty-eighth street. Referred to Mr. O'Reilly for examination and report.

Plan 926, New Buildings, 1897—James Kilpatrick, petitioner—To allow J. W. Rapp system of fireproof floor construction to be used for first floors of building, as stated in petition; Nos. 526 and 528 West One Hundred and Twenty-third street. Approved, on condition that soffits of iron beams are protected by wire-lath and plaster. Mr. Fryer voting No.

Plan 756, New Buildings, 1897—John Fish, petitioner—To allow first story brick floor arches between I beams to be laid in lime and cement mortar, composed of two parts cement and one part machine-made lime mortar, instead of cement mortar, as stated in petition; Nos. 75 and 77 East One Hundred and Tenth street. Referred to Mr. O'Reilly for examination and report.

Plan 1, New Buildings, 1898—R. Maynicke, petitioner—To allow erection of building without skylight on main roof, as shown on plan; also to allow walls to be built as shown on plan, thus modifying the law in regard to 25 per cent. of openings, all as stated in petition; northwest corner of Bowery and Spring street. Approved.

Peter Duffy, petitioner—For exemption from fireproof shutters; Nos. 535 to 541 East One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street. Fire shutters required at all side and rear windows.

Minnie Brothers, petitioner—For exemption from fireproof shutters on north side, third, fourth, fifth and sixth stories; No. 54 Allen street. Petition denied. Window openings in north side wall may be bricked up or protected by wire-glass in suitable iron frames.

Horenburger & Straub, petitioners—For exemption from fireproof shutters on doors opening into light court on east side of building, second and upper stories; No. 48 Canal street and No. 132 Division street. Fire shutters or wire-glass in suitable iron frames required at the unprotected windows.

Wm. H. H. Childs, petitioner—For exemption from fireproof shutters on rear windows above the first story; No. 114 Livingston street. Small windows on each floor at water closets must be protected by wire-glass in suitable iron frames.

B. Mittelstaedt, petitioner—For exemption from fireproof shutters on northerly and southerly walls of six stories; No. 97 Crosby street. Laid over for examination and report.

Joseph Goldstein, petitioner—For exemption from fireproof shutters at all stories of rear of building; No. 272 Stanton street. Laid over for examination and report.

A communication was received from Mr. A. M. Thorburn, Secretary, certifying that at the regular monthly meeting of the New York Board of Fire Underwriters, held June 16, 1897, Mr. F. C. Moore was appointed delegate to the Board of Examiners of the Building Department of the City of New York for the ensuing year.

On motion, the Board then adjourned, 6.35 P. M.

On motion of Councilman Leich, the communication was received and referred to the Board of Aldermen for action.

BOARD OF PUBLIC IMPROVEMENTS.

Meeting of the Board of Public Improvements, held January 21, 1898.

Present—Commissioner of Bridges, Commissioner of Water Supply, Commissioner of Highways, Commissioner of Sewers, Commissioner of Street Cleaning, Buildings and Supplies, President of the Borough of Manhattan, President of the Borough of Bronx, President of the Borough of Queens, President of the Borough of Brooklyn.

Meeting called to order by the President.

Minutes of the previous meeting read by the Secretary, and the same approved unanimously.

President—In the future provision will be made for having copies of the minutes of each meeting printed and sent to the various members of this Board. This will make it unnecessary to read the minutes in full before each meeting, and will greatly facilitate the work of this Board.

Has the Commissioner of Street Cleaning any communication which he wishes to present to the Board?

Communication marked "P," in minutes of previous meeting of the Board, relating to an appropriation of \$1,800 for building a dumping-board on Pier 43, East river, read by the Secretary.

Mr. McCartney—This was included in the Estimate for 1897, but, awaiting the consent of the Dock Department, the matter hung fire until this year. This is a work of very grave importance. The Dock Department has notified us that the dump at the present time is in a very unsafe condition and may break down any day. If it was necessary to attend to this in 1897 you can see how important it is now, and every day we neglect it it becomes more dangerous. This is something that ought to be attended to at once. The Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorized it and it comes under the appropriations already made for 1897.

Mr. Shea—What is Mr. McCartney's motion?

Mr. McCartney—I move that the Board of Public Improvements approve my request for an appropriation of \$1,800 for the purpose of building a dumping-board on Pier 43, East river, at the foot of Rutgers street.

Mr. Kearny—I second the motion.

President—It is regularly moved and seconded that the Board of Public Improvements approve the request of the Commissioner of Street Cleaning. All in favor respond in the usual manner, as their names are called.

Carried unanimously.

Communication from Commissioner of Water Supply relative to the issue of "Additional Water Fund Bonds" to the amount of \$500,000, marked "F" in the minutes of previous meeting, read by the Secretary.

President—Of course, this differs entirely from other matters of new work. This \$500,000 is for the purpose of paying counsel fees and paying owners whose property has been acquired by the City, and while the bills are unpaid interest at the rate of six per cent. is payable by the City. If the original \$500,000 is exhausted I think it will be necessary to approve this at once and have it transferred to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, but as we do not know how much is left over from the \$500,000 appropriated I think it had better be left over for the next meeting of the Board in order to ascertain how much of the last \$500,000 remains unexpended. Of course, the Water Commissioner ought always be ready to meet the bills as they come in. Until we are ready to pay them, the interest keeps accumulating. However, it would be advisable to lay the matter over until the Comptroller can be present.

Mr. Dalton—I can find out in fifteen minutes how much of the original \$500,000 is left.

Mr. Shea—If the Commissioner can find out in fifteen minutes I think we can wait and make a report to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

President—I do not think that any injury will be done by laying the matter over. The Board of Estimate and Apportionment will not take up any other matters until the question of the various budgets is settled.

There is a letter here from the Commissioner of Water Supply (marked "J" in previous minutes) respecting an appropriation of \$110,000 for additional pumps. I think it would be wise to let this matter take the same course as the other.

President—In regard to this matter of Brooklyn: I do not know the condition of the contracts there—that is, those that were not entirely executed. The Engineer promised to send a report on this matter. I do not know whether these old contracts are to hold good or not, but my opinion is that as this is a new administration there should be new bids invited.

Mr. Grout—In looking at these contracts I find that they are signed by the executive officers of Brooklyn but not certified, and I have come to the conclusion (I am a lawyer), that contracts not certified have no rights against the City. I doubt whether these contracts are binding.

President—It would probably be a benefit to the City if new bids were invited.

Mr. Kearny—I move that the matter be referred to the Corporation Counsel.

President—What is the pleasure of the Board? I do not think we ought to bind ourselves in any way until we have the opinion of the Corporation Counsel. Therefore, it is regularly moved and seconded that the question of the validity of these contracts be submitted to the Corporation Counsel. All in favor please respond in the usual manner.

Carried unanimously.

President—Here is another application from the Department of Water Supply in regard to the issue of \$500,000 for the Manhattan and the Bronx (marked "H" in previous minutes), and as the requests from the Commissioner of Water Supply have been laid over until the Comptroller is here, if there is no objection this matter will take the same course.

Mr. Haffen—Is that in regard to the mains?

President—It relates to the contract for reservoir at Byram Pond, improvement of White Pond, and relaying part of the Bronx River pipe conduit.

Mr. Haffen—Absolutely necessary work.

President—There is no question about it, but I think the Comptroller should be here before we take official action.

Mr. Haffen—I think the contract with Brady is now on, and he would have a case against the City unless some action is taken immediately.

Mr. Dalton—I intended to ask the Board to pass upon all these matters to-day, but, in the absence of the Comptroller, I think they had better go over.

President—I do not think the postponement for a week will do any harm.

Mr. Haffen—It is a critical state of affairs.

NEW BUSINESS.

Secretary read a communication from the Jamaica Water Supply Company, the Woodside Water Company and the Citizens' Water Supply Company of Newtown, marked, respectively, "1," "2," and "3," as follows:

To the Board of Public Improvements of the City of New York:

GENTLEMEN—The Jamaica Water Supply Company, with wells located south of the old Village of Jamaica, in the Borough of Queens, has such a quantity of pure and wholesome water as would permit of its delivery to The City of New York in such Borough of five million gallons per day, if desired, and would be pleased to enter into a contract for such supply.

Such additional information as you may desire will be promptly furnished.

SIR—The fact of the impurity of the water supplied to Long Island City from distinctly local sources has become a matter of almost general knowledge.

The existing condition in this regard is evidenced by the supplying of some of the largest consumers in that locality of water from our system.

Realizing these conditions, and having some millions of gallons of surplus water, with some of our pipe lines running to the old division line between Long Island City and the former town of Newtown, we respectfully suggest that the Citizens' Water Supply Company of Newtown would be glad to negotiate with the greater City to meet the pressing necessities for an increased and better supply of water at any point or points on the Long Island side of the East river.

Mr. Bowley—I wish that you would instruct the Secretary to send me certified copies of those letters.

President—I think these matters should be referred to the Commissioner of Water Supply, under whose Department these matters come. I will, however, take the liberty of sending the President of the Borough of Queens the certified copies he asks for.

I think that before acting on these matters we should await the report of the Chief Engineer of the Water Supply.

The following communication from the Corporation Counsel, relative to the Riverside Drive Viaduct, was read by the Secretary and put on file:

LAW DEPARTMENT—BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN,
January 15, 1898.

To the President, Board of Public Improvements:

SIR—I am in receipt of your communication of January 6, 1898, requesting my opinion "as

to what department represented in the Board will have jurisdiction over the construction of the Riverside Drive Viaduct."

The statute authorizing the construction of the viaduct is entitled "An act to lay out and establish and construct a public drive and parkway in the City of New York as an extension of Riverside Drive to the Boulevard Lafayette," and it provides that upon the vesting of title to the real estate required for the improvement the Commissioner of Public Works is empowered and directed "to proceed to construct said public drive and parkway with the necessary viaducts and bridges as aforesaid."

Abstractly speaking, the question presented for determination is whether the proposed viaduct is a bridge, to be constructed by the Commissioner of Bridges, or a highway under the jurisdiction of the Commissioner of Highways.

The Greater New York Charter (595), after providing that the Commissioner of Bridges shall have cognizance and control of the New York and Brooklyn Bridge, gives him jurisdiction

"(4) Of the construction, repair, maintenance and management of all other bridges that may at any time hereafter be constructed in whole or in part at the expense of the city of New York, or that may be acquired by said city.

"(5) Of the construction, repair and maintenance of all other bridges that are or may be in whole or in part a public charge, not included in public parks, within the territory of the city of New York, * * *."

Among other things over which the Charter provides (524) that the Commissioner of Highways shall have cognizance and control is

"(2) Of constructing and repairing public roads."

At the common law the term "bridge," as used in indictments for failure to repair public bridges, means a structure super flumen vel cursum aquae, and the words flumen vel cursum aquae denote water flowing in a channel between banks more or less defined, although such channel may be occasionally dry.

But by modern usage the term "bridge" has a more enlarged signification and the structure need not be over a water course but may be over a ravine, railroad canal or other obstruction in a highway.

A bridge is, in a general sense, a highway, and the rules of the common law applicable to highways apply, generally, but only generally, to bridges. It is obvious that there are differences between the ways usually designated by the terms "highways" and "bridges" which render it impossible to always bring them under one rule. This is true, although they have in common the chief characteristic of being ways of passage for the public. It cannot always be true that statutes respecting highways extend to and include bridges; whether they do or not must depend upon the general tenor of the particular statute and the purposes it was intended to accomplish. It is quite clear that a statute concerning bridges cannot be deemed to include roads and streets. I cannot, therefore, accept without qualification the statement found in some of the books that a bridge falls within the rules applicable to highways. There are very many cases where an unqualified adoption of the broad, general doctrine would lead to serious error. It is often necessary to consider bridges as distinct and independent subjects of legislation, and it is also often important to treat them as differing in material respects from ordinary highways laid out for the use of footmen, horsemen and vehicles.

In order to charge a party with a breach of duty in maintaining a bridge in repair, the word "bridge" should be used; it will not do to use the word "highway," for, as was said in one case, the "term 'bridge' alone describes such a structure." This word, ordinarily, describes the whole structure, approaches, abutments, piers and all the other parts which are necessary to make it a safe and convenient passageway for the public.

Exactly what constitutes a bridge is not a question of law, but rather of fact. The structure may be of such a peculiar construction, or so peculiarly located in the particular case, as to require its character to be determined, in a case where the question arose in a court of law, by a jury under the facts of the particular instance. So it must, sometimes, be that what are parts of a bridge is a question to be determined as one of fact and not of law.

While, primarily, the duty devolved upon you to decide what department shall have charge of the work in question, I am strongly of the opinion that the viaduct is not a bridge in the sense in which that word is used in the Charter, but merely an extension of the Riverside Drive, and, therefore, a public highway.

The title of the act under which the viaduct is to be constructed fortifies such a conclusion, and a close reading of the Charter convinces me that the word "bridge" is used in its common, as contradistinguished from its strict legal technical sense.

Kearny, Commissioner of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies of the City of New York, do hereby establish a branch office of said Department of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies in the Borough of Brooklyn, and do assign William Walton as Deputy of the same.

In pursuance of the authority vested in me by section 451 of chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897, of the State of New York, entitled the Greater New York Charter, I, Henry S. Kearny, Commissioner of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies of the City of New York, do hereby establish a branch office of said Department of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies in the Borough of Manhattan, and do assign John J. Ryan as Deputy for the same.

The request of the Commissioner of Bridges for the transfer of various employees from the different Departments to his Department was granted.

The request of the Commissioner of Sewers for the transfer of various employees from the different Departments to his Department was granted.

The following resolution was presented by the Commissioner of Bridges:

Resolved, That the President and Commissioner of Bridges be and they are hereby appointed a committee to inquire and report as to the desirability of building a bicycle path on the New York and Brooklyn Bridge.

Mr. Shea—I would say in connection with this, that last week a committee, composed of members of the Good Roads Association waited upon me and called my attention to this matter. They have been agitating this subject for a long time and the Bridge Engineers have had the matter under advisement. This committee informs me that they represent 300,000 members and that they regarded the necessity for a path over the bridge as imperative. For this reason I have brought the matter before the Board to-day, to see if there is not some scheme which can be devised for the furtherance of this project. I think the Board ought to consider this matter.

President—Have the engineers made an investigation?

Mr. Shea—The engineers have examined into the matter and have plans. I understand that there are some engineers connected with this organization who have ideas and perhaps plans for the building of such a path. I presume that at some subsequent meeting of the Board a proper committee of this organization will wait upon us and in their own way urge the great importance of this subject.

President—All in favor of this resolution say "aye."

Carried.

The following communication was received from the Commissioner of Street Cleaning:

JANUARY 14, 1898.

Hon. MAURICE F. HOLAHAN, President of the Board of Public Improvements:

DEAR SIR—The Greater New York Charter (sections 545 and 547) seems to confer upon me the exclusive duty and authority for the removal of incumbrances from the streets, avenues and public places of the City of New York, both from the roadways and the sidewalks, etc. In order to be sure of my duty under the law, I have, in a letter to the Corporation Counsel, dated the 13th instant, asked for an opinion upon this subject.

I deem it proper, therefore, to call the attention of your Board, for such action as it may deem proper, to the fact that in the CITY RECORD of the 14th instant, under the plans adopted by the provisions of section 1536 for the apportionment of the persons and property of the departments under the former municipalities among the departments of the city as now constituted, the Bureau of Incumbrances of the former Public Works Department of the City of New York, and certain properties connected with the Department of that Bureau, are assigned to the Department of Highways.

President—Mr. Farley, has the Corporation Counsel rendered an opinion on this subject yet?

Mr. Farley—No, sir.

Mr. Grout—The question has been raised in Brooklyn; under the old law there were no provisions as to leaving trucks in the streets; under the new law it is a misdemeanor. There are cases where it may be necessary or proper to let them remain in the street, and I am glad to know that this is one of the ordinances to be prepared by this Board.

President—Is there a provision in the Charter providing for obstructions in the streets?

Mr. Grout—There is a provision in the Charter.

President—Well, the question at issue now is, Which department has the removal of these obstructions?

Mr. Keating—I hold that the Department of Highways. The Department of Public Works has charge of this particular branch of work, but it is better to wait for the opinion of the Corporation Counsel in the matter.

President—Referred to the Corporation Counsel for an opinion.

Mr. Grout—I think the matter should be referred to the Corporation Counsel as to whether there are or are not means by which permits may be obtained for use of the streets by trucks in the Borough of Brooklyn also.

Mr. Farley—I would say that in former times the City had power to grant such permits, but the Court of Appeals held that it was a nuisance.

Mr. Grout—The Charter says there must be permits for this purpose.

President—I think until the passage of the new ordinances on this subject the old ordinances hold, and under the ordinances passed here under the recommendation of the Street Cleaning Commissioner, I do not think any permits can be granted. However, this is a matter that the Corporation Counsel can deal with better than we can—first, as to which department removes all obstruction, and second, as to permits.

By Mr. Grout—

Resolved, That the views of the Corporation Counsel be requested as to whether or not permits for the use of the streets by trucks can be lawfully granted, and, if so, whether or not the same must be granted under conditions to be prepared by this Board and submitted to the Municipal Assembly for adoption or rejection.

The following communication from Bernard W. Webel, Recording Secretary of the Washington Heights Progressive Association, was received:

NEW YORK, January 20, 1898.

Hon. Board of Public Improvements, City Hall:

GENTLEMEN—We respectfully call your attention to the dangerous condition of the sidewalks of Washington Heights, north of One Hundred and Sixty-second street. In a great many places the sidewalk has caved in to such an extent that it is dangerous to life and limb, and we ask you to interest yourself in this matter and have same put in proper shape.

This matter was referred to the Commissioner of Public Works, and an answer received October 19, 1897, stating that the matter would be attended to, but nothing has been done.

President—This is a matter that evidently comes under the jurisdiction of the Commissioner of Highways and it is referred to him.

Last week there was referred to the Commissioner of Highways a communication in regard to the excavations on the Kingsbridge road.

Has the Commissioner any report to make?

Mr. Keating—I wish to say that I wrote a letter to the President of the railroad which made the excavations and he answered my letter by denying my right to interfere with the road in any way. I wrote to the Corporation Counsel asking his opinion as to my powers, and as soon as I receive word from him I will proceed to close up the excavations.

The following communication from the President of the Borough of Queens, relative to a bridge across the East river, was read by the Secretary:

Whereas, As far back as in the seventies the necessity for the construction of a bridge over the East river and Blackwell's Island, for the purpose of making connections between the middle portion of the County of New York and Long Island City, in the County of Queens, to provide for foot passage, driveway and railroad crossing over same, was agitated, recognized and franchise granted to private corporation or individual thereof by the Legislature of the State, and

Whereas, Up to the present time no definite progress has been made in such undertaking, and

Whereas, The Borough of Brooklyn, notwithstanding the fact that in the meantime it has secured connection over the East river with the now Borough of Manhattan by means of the New York and Brooklyn Bridge, and now has another bridge in course of construction from Grand street, Borough of Manhattan, to South Sixth street, Borough of Brooklyn, the latter

Submits a proposition for a third bridge to cross over Governor's Island, for railroad purposes, for the benefit of Bensonhurst and such like land speculative schemes, and the railroad corporations exclusively.

Now, in view of the foregoing, of the limited resources of The City of New York for such purposes, of the priority of claim of this section as hereinbefore mentioned, of the old established, conservative and progressive interests from the East river to Montauk Point to be benefited thereby,

Do hereby respectfully and earnestly demand that justice be first accorded to the Borough of Queens, by prompt action being had to first construct the bridge over the East river and Blackwell's Island before any other bridge over the waters between the Borough of Brooklyn and Manhattan is in any manner countenanced; and further

Resolved, That the President of this Board place a certified copy of the foregoing before the Board of Public Improvements and make appeal to all concerned to accord the justice due our people in the matter.

Mr. Bowley—It is understood by our people there that it is essential to have a bridge from Queens to New York. I would like to have that matter referred to the same Committee—the President of the Board and the Commissioner of Bridges.

Mr. Shea—There are some difficulties involved in the proposition. As I understand the matter, a private concern holds the franchise for the construction of a bridge between Queens and New York; and although they have not made much progress, they have made enough to hold the franchise.

President—The matter is referred to the Commissioner of Bridges, and when it comes up for consideration by this Board it can be fully discussed.

The following communication, from the President of the Borough of Queens, relative to the water supply, was read:

Resolved, That we, the Local Board of the Borough of Queens, in meeting assembled, this 20th day of January, 1898, do hereby most emphatically

Protest against The City of New York taking any water from within the boundaries of Queens County for use by the inhabitants of the Borough of Brooklyn, as the limited supply of water therein is absolutely necessary for the requirements of the people in Queens County; and further

Resolved, That the President of the Board is respectfully requested to file a duly certified copy of the foregoing with the Board of Public Improvements of The City of New York.

Mr. Bowley—The Borough of Brooklyn has drained us pretty nearly dry on the south side, and now they propose to drain us on the north side. We are willing to grant them everything within reason, but we do not propose to be supplied by private corporations. Brooklyn can do business with these private concerns, but our own water should be for our own people. After we get all we need we can take our sister Boroughs into consideration.

President—This matter is referred to the Commissioner of Water Supply.

Mr. Grout—Mr. President, there is a piece of mandatory legislation now before the Legislature at Albany which I wish to bring to the attention of this Board. There were in the Comptroller's office at the time of consolidation a vast number of contracts for grading and paving streets not certified. Then the Common Council passed scores and scores more. This bill now before the Legislature makes it mandatory on the City of Brooklyn to execute these contracts. It seems to me that this Board ought to ask the Corporation Counsel to instruct his representative in Albany to make that an enabling act instead of a mandatory act.

President—I presume that if the bill relates to the City it will be referred to the Mayor before it is acted upon by the Governor.

Mr. Grout—I think it would be better to have the Corporation Counsel's representative try to amend the bill before it is acted upon by the Legislature.

President—Will you put that in the form of a resolution, Mr. Grout?

By Mr. Grout—

Resolved, That the Corporation Counsel be requested to instruct his representative in Albany to recommend an amendment to the bill now before the Legislature making it mandatory on The City of New York to execute the contracts made by the former City of Brooklyn, so as to read "discretionary or permissive" instead of "mandatory."

Mr. Haffen—There were several resolutions passed by the old Board of Aldermen allowing the regulating and paving of streets. The contracts not having been executed, does it require new additional resolutions by the Board of Public Improvements previous to getting up the plans and letting the contracts? The authority has been given and I would ask that the matter be referred to the Corporation Counsel to see if any further authority is necessary or whether the old authority is sufficient.

President—It is moved and seconded that this matter be referred to the Corporation Counsel for an opinion.

DEAR SIR—Referring to my letter to you of the 10th instant, as to the necessity of the further issue of bonds for "Additional Water Fund," authorized by chapter 189 of the Laws of 1893, I beg to inform you that the available balance of amounts of bonds heretofore authorized to be issued was on the 24th instant, \$3,396.05.

Your Board will, therefore, appreciate the necessity for action in the matter.

President—Now, gentlemen, at our last meeting there were several requests made that called for the appropriation of money to complete work. We have been requested to send to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment a recommendation for the issue of \$500,000 of bonds to pay claims on the Aqueduct; \$500,000 for the purpose of laying mains, etc.; \$110,000 for additional pumping engines, and a sum between two and three million dollars for the purpose of making contracts to increase the water supply of Brooklyn. At our last meeting these matters were all postponed for a week, or until such time as the Comptroller could be present at meetings of the Board. We are in the same predicament as on last week, for the reason that the Comptroller is not here, and we must bear in mind that it will hardly do for this Board to recommend any new work until such time as the Mayor and financial officer of the city government know the exact condition of the financial situation. We are in a peculiar condition. The experts who have been engaged for two or three months in examining the books do not know as yet how near the limitation line we are, and for that reason I do not think we ought to recommend to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment the issue of these bonds until the Comptroller meets with the Board and the matters are discussed in his hearing. The Board of Estimate and Apportionment will probably complete the budget sometime next week, possibly before the next meeting of this Board, and the Comptroller will then be able to be present and give us his advice. I ask the Board's permission to allow these things to go over until such time. It is a very unfortunate position for the Board of Public Improvements to be in, but I think it would be very unwise for us to take a step contrary to our best judgment in the matter. Even looking at it in the brightest light, our margin is only about nineteen million dollars, and the Board of Estimate and Apportionment—at least the last Board of Estimate and Apportionment—authorized the issue of about twenty million dollars of bonds. These bonds must be issued within three years. We have no report as yet from the Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment respecting the Elm street widening; we do not know what the damages will amount to there—possibly \$10,000,000. Then we have contract liabilities in all the Boroughs, so that it would be the part of wisdom for this Board not to incur any indebtedness until we find out just where we stand. It is not the desire of the President to create any alarm amongst the people of the city, but there exists a sad condition of things, and until we can unravel the tangle, matters will be at a standstill.

The following communication from the President of the Borough of Queens was read:

OFFICE OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE BOROUGH OF QUEENS,
LONG ISLAND CITY, January 19, 1898.

To the Board of Public Improvements, City of New York:

GENTLEMEN—Under authority conferred on me by resolution therefor adopted by your honorable body on 21st instant, I immediately, in the absence of any apparent responsibility of any person over the offices and its contents of the late General Improvement Commission of Long Island City, situated in Hackett's Building, corner Jackson Avenue and Fifth Street, placed same under police protection and so continued. On the following morning, accompanied by Stevenson Towle, Esq., of your Department, I took formal possession of said offices and its belongings to the extent as was then contained therein, and relieved all persons therein, claiming to be employees from any further obligations in that direction, followed by placing Mr. James McDonald, for years Clerk to the Board of Assessors, in charge for the purpose of imparting information and performing any requisite clerical work without in any manner disturbing matters as I found them.

Herewith please find copy of chapter 644 of the Laws of 1893, by which the General Improvement Commission was created, and respectfully call attention to the part that the term of the person and the offices by virtue of which they became members of said Commission have expired and been abolished, to wit:

The Commissioner of Public Works formerly removed by Mayor Van Wyck, the two Aldermen at Large, term expired, office abolished. The two citizens appointed by the late Mayor of Long Island City, term expired with that of the appointing powers.

As to what Department the carrying out and completion of this undertaking, embracing sewerage, grading, etc., and the assessments therefor, shall be assigned to, or what special legislation, if any, will be required to further carry out the provisions of said special act, the Law Department should promptly determine.

Already General Improvement Bonds have been issued to the extent of \$1,245,000 out of a limit of \$1,500,000—of which about \$185,000 become due next year, and as yet "no assessment whatever" has been filed. And when ready to file can be done but in annual installment of one-twentieth part only, and shall become liens for such fractional parts and only as so filed.

In the absence of any assessment filed, hence no revenue or return for expense incurred for any of this improvement, the amount of general tax already raised and paid and the amounts required to meet the interest on said bond for local improvements to end of present year will aggregate \$171,310.63.

There are warrants outstanding to be paid "from proceeds of bonds," of which none are on hand, to the estimated amount of \$140,000, the validity of which claims should be subject to scrutiny before paying same.

Permit me to respectfully suggest that the completion of the work of said Commission be carried out at present quarters as the same are well adapted thereto, and to ask your aid to expedite matters to a speedy termination thereof, which to the taxpayers affected by the past doings of said Commission became burdensome and which I, as a minority member of such Commission, was unable to alleviate.

President—There are two propositions in this communication of yours and I would suggest, as a matter of convenience, that in all reports you keep the subjects separate.

Do you know whether an inventory of the public property was made when you took possession?

Mr. Bowley—Yes, sir. It was made by Mr. Towle, my private secretary and myself. I then placed this man in charge because I thought it was necessary to do so. I did not put in one of the former employees, for the reason that I did not know what would become of what was left in charge. I did not want to go to the Civil Service and take a man from the eligible list, because I did not think I could get one who would be courageous enough to stand the abuse, and upon the advice of the secretary I put in a man of my own.

President—The Secretary of the Board will present the latter part of this communication, respecting contracts made by the late General Improvement Commission of Long Island City, to the Corporation Counsel, and I would suggest that the President of the Borough and the Commissioner of Public Buildings give the Secretary such detail information as they may have respecting this matter in order that the same may be transmitted to the Corporation Counsel. It will save the Corporation Counsel a good deal of time and by that means we will have his opinion sooner.

Mr. Kearny—I would say, Mr. President, that a great deal of this information is contained in the report of the City Treasurer of Long Island City.

The following communication from the President of the Borough of Queens, relative to the condition of Webster Avenue and the establishment of a branch office in Queens by the Corporation Counsel was received, read by the Secretary, and referred to the Commissioner of Highways for investigation.

Communication from the President of the Borough of Queens was read as follows:

LONG ISLAND CITY, January 26, 1898.

To the Honorable Board of Public Improvements, City of New York:

GENTLEMEN—Since I took possession, under your authority, of the office effects of the late General Improvement Commission of Long Island City, I submitted report thereon and statement embraced therein relative to the doings of said Commission, its effects, etc., and respectfully suggested that said subject matter therein as would appear proper for opinion and direction as to law should be laid before the Corporation Counsel for his prompt action.

There has been received in this office that, of which the accompanying document is a copy, and which accentuates the necessity of the transmission suggested as aforesaid.

The failure of the Corporation Counsel to establish a branch office for the Borough of Queens, in close connection with this office, which the interests of the people of this Borough makes imperative so to do, causes me to resort to this method of calling attention to this important matter as aforesaid.

The Board of Assessors have made request for some of the assessment books, completed or otherwise, and I have, under existing circumstances, requested them to await advice and direction of the Law Department as is sought by

BOROUGH OF QUEENS, January 7, 1898.

President FREDERICK BOWLEY, Borough of Queens, New York City:

The undersigned respectfully request that the opening on Webster Avenue, running west from Vernon Avenue, be either closed or else that the work be pushed to completion, so that the street may be restored to a proper condition. This street has been open since the middle of the summer of 1897, and is a continual menace to the health of the neighborhood. In addition to this, the street is impassible, which makes it a great inconvenience to those living on it.

At the present time the ditch is filling with water and from time to time the earth falls off from the sides, thereby greatly endangering the gas-main which supplies gas to Long Island City, and also a private water-main along the side of the ditch. Should the water-main break the ditch would be flooded and a great deal of damage done in the neighborhood.

Should the gas-main break, Long Island City would be out of light, and in addition serious damage might be done to persons and property in the neighborhood.

The following communication, from the Commissioner of Water Supply, was received and read by the Secretary:

NEW YORK, January 24, 1898.

Hon. MAURICE F. HOLAHAN, President Board of Public Improvements:

DEAR SIR—Under section 415 of the present city charter (paragraph 7), the Board of Public Improvements has power over "water rents, superintendence of water supply of private water companies, contracts for water supply with private companies or other municipalities."

Under section 469 (paragraph 1), the Commissioner of Water Supply has cognizance and control "of all structures and property connected with the supply and distribution of water for public use, except where the same shall be owned by private corporations, including all fire and drinking hydrants and all water-meters."

In the now consolidated territory of the city, there are about six thousand fire-hydrants, which are supplied with water under existing contracts with private water companies, at prices running from \$25 to \$40 per annum for each hydrant.

When the territory in Westchester County, east of the Bronx river, was annexed to The City of New York, in 1895, there existed five separate agreements made by the several villages and towns in that district, with the New York and Westchester Water Company for the furnishing of water to fire-hydrants and the maintenance of the hydrants, at the rate of \$40 per annum for each hydrant.

The question of the status of these contracts and of the relations between that Company and the Department of Public Works, was submitted to the Corporation Counsel, but has never been adjudicated. The subject was also submitted in 1896 to the then Board of Estimate and Apportionment, without any action being taken thereon. The amounts which became due under these contracts for furnishing water to hydrants, etc., have been allowed to be paid by judgments from the "Judgment Fund."

The question, therefore, still remains open as to the relations between the private water companies and this Department, and the further question presents itself as to the respective jurisdictions of the Board of Public Improvements and of this Department in respect to the water supply from private companies, and whether the amount necessary to pay for water furnished to fire-hydrants and for the maintenance under existing contracts, should be provided for in the amounts appropriated to this Department.

I present the entire subject to your Board for its action, and for obtaining such advice from the Corporation Counsel thereon as may be necessary.

President—As I understand this, Mr. Birdsall, these outside towns made contracts for these hydrants but made no provision for payment.

Mr. Birdsall—They usually put it in the tax levies for the towns. They had a special appropriation for that—a special tax upon the different villages for these items.

President—That is, in regard to the hydrants in the recently annexed district of Westchester.

Mr. Birdsall—Also in Queens, Brooklyn and Richmond.

President—Well, it seems that the city is obligated to pay so much for each hydrant. There ought to be some way of paying for these hydrants without suing the city. How is it that they recover from the city?

Mr. Birdsall—Because the old Town of Westchester was obligated to the company, and the contracts were assumed by the city.

President—How can we prevent them from going to law and recovering by judgment?

Mr. Birdsall—The only way to prevent it is by making an appropriation.

President—We do not know now whether it belongs to the Board of Public Improvements or to the Commissioner of Water Supply to take charge of this matter and until the Corporation Counsel gives his opinion—

Mr. Farley—If there is any doubt about the jurisdiction the charter provides that the President shall decide the question.

Mr. Birdsall—I will say here that in the Borough of Richmond, in Westchester County and partially in the Borough of Brooklyn they have been looked after by the Fire Departments in the several places, and their bills certified by them.

President—Who has charge of the hydrants here in the Borough of Manhattan?

Mr. Birdsall—The Commissioner of Water Supply, because they belong to the city.

President—Now the question is whether the Fire Department, the Water Supply or the Board of Public Improvements shall include it in their estimate. In the past the city has not only been compelled to pay for these hydrants, but also the costs of the suits brought against it by the private water companies.

President—The matter is referred to the Corporation Counsel for an opinion as to which Department shall have jurisdiction.

Mr. Dalton—I will say, Mr. President, that Mr. Scannel did not think it ought to be included in their estimate.

The following communication from the Chief Engineer of the Board of Public Improvements, relative to establishing a branch office in the Borough of Brooklyn, was read:

Hon. MAURICE F. HOLAHAN, President Board of Public Improvements:

DEAR SIR—I understand that branch offices of the several Commissioners forming the Board of Public Improvements have been assigned rooms in the Municipal Building of the Borough of Brooklyn, and that no provision has been made for the Engineer's quarters of the Board of Public Improvements.

It would greatly facilitate the work of preparing and completing the maps of the Borough of Brooklyn if the necessary rooms for its engineering force could be had near to the rooms assigned to the Commissioner of Highways where the records and maps are filed.

Resolved, That, pursuant to section 412 of The Greater New York Charter, provision is hereby made for offices for the Chief Engineer of this Board in the Municipal Building in the Borough of Brooklyn.

Approved.

The list of transfers from the Commissioner of Highways to the Commissioner of Bridges.

Approved.

Application for the transfer of employees from the Topographical Bureau of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards to the Board of Public Improvements, and from the Commissioner of Highways to the Board of Public Improvements. Approved.

Application for the transfer of employees of the Bureau of Street Openings to the Board of Public Improvements. Approved.

Two communications relative to levying assessment for assessment work done in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards were read.

President—I do not know whose fault it is, but we must get money into the treasury to meet these assessment bonds. We ought to find out where the responsibility lies and make a report to the Board and try to compel these people to do their work. If there are millions of assessments ready and no money in, this Board of Public Improvements ought to make an investigation. It is only a question of time before we will have to stop all public improvements. If we could get this money in for unpaid assessments we would not be in this crippled condition, and I do not know any Board that ought to more properly take the step than this Board of Public Improvements.

Mr. McCartney—I move that we place ourselves on record that the Commissioners of Accounts make an investigation and place the blame where it ought to be. I think this Board ought to put itself on record; it is a step in the proper direction.

President—All in favor respond in the usual manner.

Carried unanimously.

President—A communication will be sent to the Commissioner of Accounts, through the Mayor.

Mr. Peters—I want to say that in the minutes that were read here this afternoon, a letter was read (from Bernard J. Weble, Secretary of the Washington Heights Progressive Association) respecting the condition of the sidewalks. There is a section in the charter that provides that the Local Board shall take the initiative in the matter of improvements for sidewalks, crosswalks, etc. Now that comes in as part of the duties of the Local Board, and now that the Borough officers are starting in to fulfill their part, would it not be well for the heads of the Departments, when

petitions come to them, to refer them to the Borough officers. Under the charter all improvements have to be taken up by the Local Board first, and, by process, get before this Board, and it would tend a great deal toward having the business considered regular, if the heads of the Departments, when these matters come to them, to refer them to the Borough office.

President—I think it is entirely proper that whenever complaints or petitions are sent to the heads of any of the six Departments, that they be referred to the head of the Borough, because—

Mr. Haffen—There comes the question as to who is to make the investigation. They have no officials for the purpose. That matter came up in our meeting to-day. There is no money appropriated for the purpose of making investigations into complaints.

President—I should judge that if it is a matter of crosswalks, sidewalks, etc., you are privileged to call upon the Commissioner of Highways for what you need.

Mr. Haffen—The charter doesn't say so.

Mr. Peters—It clearly defines what the duties are. He places the petition on file and informs the petitioner that within ten and not more than fifteen days, the parties in interest can present their recommendations to the Local Board and on the recommendation of the Local Board this Board acts.

Mr. Haffen—At the meeting of our Local Board to-day there were several communications, and in order to act upon the communications it will be necessary to furnish certain information to accompany the petitions made. The matter of appropriating sufficient money for the obtaining of that information should be taken into consideration. The Presidents of the Boroughs are not investigating officers or unhealthy conditions, etc.; and in the matter of regulating, grading, paving, and matters of that kind, the members of the Board are not supposed to be engineers or professional men. The question continually comes up in almost every communication that requires information from somewhere.

Mr. Peters—Section 402 of the charter says that "a copy of such resolution shall be sent to the Board of Public Improvements." If the Local Board approves of a petition, they forward a copy of the resolution of this Board.

Mr. McCartney—It seems to me that this matter will settle itself. The Borough certainly takes the initiative, but it naturally comes back to the heads of the Departments, and I think the whole matter will simplify itself as time passes. At best, the charter is a very crude arrangement, as we all know.

Mr. Grout—The charter gives this Board the right to call on any Commissioner for necessary information, and I think that where necessary the Local Boards could call upon this Board and request it to procure such information from the different Departments.

Mr. Haffen—As at present constituted, the Local Boards are simply transmitting committees. There is no necessity for the Borough Board as it stands; a clerk could do the work just as well.

President—Why don't you have a meeting of the Borough Presidents, decide upon a plan, and then request this Board to help you out.

Mr. Peters—The Presidents have contemplated having such a meeting, but the business of the Boroughs has been so insignificant thus far that it has been put off.

President—But it is well to anticipate that there will be considerable to do. If the Borough Presidents will meet and draw up an address, and submit it to this Board, possibly we can formulate some plan that will be legal. We want to help you for we see the great difficulty of carrying out the provisions of the charter.

The following communication was submitted to the Board by the Commissioner of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies:

In pursuance of the authority vested in me by section 451 of chapter 378 of the Laws of 1897, of the State of New York, entitled The Greater New York Charter, I, Henry S. Kearny, Commissioner of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies, of The City of New York, do hereby establish a branch office of said Department of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies, in the Borough of Queens, and do assign Harvey Supphin as Deputy of the same.

Meeting of the Board of Public Improvements held on the 2d of February, 1898.

The following communication was read from the Deputy Commissioner of Street Cleaning, Borough of Brooklyn:

JANUARY 31, 1898.

Hon. JAMES MCCARTNEY, Commissioner of Street Cleaning:

DEAR SIR—It will be necessary for the proper transaction of the business of the Borough Departments to have certain alterations and improvements made in what is known as the Municipal Building and also the Borough Hall, the latter being the old City Hall of Brooklyn. The quarters now occupied by the deputies and some of the other officials of the borough are wholly inadequate. I take it that under section 413 of the charter, the authorization for the work required must emanate in the first instance from the Board of Public Improvements. The Municipal Assembly has already been asked to assign rooms for the purpose of the Borough Departments, under the charge of the deputies, and I am informed that measures ordering such assignments may be taken by that body to-morrow. The work of alterations and improvements should follow as soon as practicable. Will you have the goodness to bring the matter to the attention of the Board of Public Improvements, in order that there may be no unnecessary delay in the completion of the work?

Similar letters were received from the Deputy Commissioners of Sewers and Highways for the Borough of Brooklyn, and they were referred to the Commissioner of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies for attention.

On motion, the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, That under section 386 of the charter, rooms known and designated by the numbers 1 and 2, on the second floor of the Town Hall, so called, corner of Flushing road and Fulton street, in Jamaica, Borough of Queens, be designated for the use of the Department of Public Buildings, Lighting and Supplies, Borough of Queens.

The following communication was received from J. W. Butler, of No. 1 Union square:

NEW YORK, February 1, 1898.

Board of Public Improvements:

GETLEMEN—I send you herewith a petition of property owners owning property along the line of Hamilton Terrace and One Hundred and Forty-fourth street, east of Convent avenue, to have both of said streets laid down upon the Land Map of The City of New York. Both streets have been open and used as public thoroughfares for the past twelve years, and a number of dwelling houses have been erected thereon. The owners were not aware until recently that the title to said streets was not legally vested in the city.

President—This is the first application we have received of this kind since the Board of Public Improvements came into existence, and shows very strongly the necessity for completing the map of the Borough of Manhattan, and in fact all the other boroughs. Here are two streets between Convent avenue and Hamilton Terrace that were laid out about twelve years ago—laid out by private owners who owned all this property, and it was regulated, graded, sewered, lighted and macadamized at the expense of the owners of this property. Now, then, on both sides of the streets purchasers have put up houses. One man bought property for the purpose of putting up sixteen houses and wants to borrow an amount of money to carry on the work, \$150,000. The guarantee company refuses to accept the title because it is not clear, so now that the fact has come out that this does not appear on the map of The City of New York, there is not a person there who can sell with a clear title. There are hundreds of cases of this kind, and it shows the necessity for a complete map. I think the best course for us to pursue in this matter is to refer it to the Chief Engineer to find out if the grades are all correct, etc.

Referred.

The following resolution from the Commissioner of Bridges was introduced:

Resolved, By the Board of Public Improvements, that the Commissioner of Bridges in The City of New York be and is hereby authorized to advertise for bids for supplying fifty million excursion tickets and fifty million trip tickets, for use upon the New York and Brooklyn Bridge, and to award the contract therefor, the expense thereof to be a charge upon the fund deposited with the Comptroller to the credit of the New York and Brooklyn Bridge.

Mr. Shea—Under a recent decision of the Corporation Counsel of The City of New York, the New York and Brooklyn Bridge is to set apart the receipts of the bridge for its maintenance and repair, and in view of that fact I thought it was best to bring the subject before the Board of Public Improvements to-day, in order to get authority to go ahead and advertise for the tickets. The expense is very trifling as the tickets are all lithographed.

President—How were they purchased before?

Mr. Shea—By advertising in the same manner. We are all out of tickets and the Chief Engineer has requested that this matter be attended to very promptly.

Mr. Farley—I do not see what the Board of Public Improvement has to do with it at all; it is not a matter of public improvement. It seems to me that it is a matter that rests with the head of the Department.

Mr. Shea—We have applied to the CITY RECORD people but of course they have no jurisdiction in the matter.

President—This matter is referred to the Corporation Counsel and the Commissioner of Bridges. If we have no jurisdiction in the matter there is no reason for delaying it.

The following communication was received from the Commissioner of Water Supply in regard to plumbers licenses:

DEPARTMENT OF WATER SUPPLY,
NEW YORK, February 1, 1898.

Hon. MAURICE F. HOLAHAN, President Board of Public Improvements:

DEAR SIR—Prior to January 1, 1898, the late Department of Public Works, through its Commissioner, issued licenses to plumbers to make and repair house connections with water-mains, sewers and drains, according to the inclosed form, and each plumber receiving a license was required to give a bond to the city in the sum of \$1,000 conditionate for the proper performance of all such work, according to a form which I also inclose.

As the sewers and water supply system are now under separate Departments, the question arises whether plumbers should be required to obtain licenses separately from the Department of Water Supply and the Department of Sewers, or whether the two Departments should unite in issuing such licenses, or whether the licenses should be issued by the Board of Public Improvements or the President of the Board.

It appears to me that in order to have a complete record of these matters in each of the two Departments, separate licenses should be issued, but I submit the entire matter for the decision of your Board.

President—Now, under the old Consolidation Act it was customary to make an application for all street openings and for all connections for sewers, water-mains, etc., to the Department of Public Works, but under the new charter there is no provision made so that no one can tell to-day whether it is necessary for the Department of Highways to first issue a permit and subsequently for the Commissioner of Water Supply, where a water connection is involved, or to the Commissioner of Sewers where sewers are involved. Then there is a question regarding bonds—whether one Department or both shall require bonds. It is one of the imperfections of the new charter, and I think the only course we can pursue will be to refer the matter to the Corporation Counsel, and it is so referred, if there is no objection.

The following communication was received from George A. Wells, Esq., Secretary of the Upper East Side Association:

Hon. MAURICE F. HOLAHAN, President Board of Public Improvements, New York:

DEAR SIR—We beg leave to call your attention to the petition filed with the Commissioners of Street Openings, etc., on October 6, 1896, which contains a number of signatures of property-owners on Fifty-ninth street, petitioning for the widening of Fifty-ninth street, in accordance with the terms thereof, and to hand you herewith a copy of said petition with additional signatures.

We renew our application to your Board for the widening of said street. We request that you will notify this Association of the next meeting of the Board of Street Openings when this matter will be taken up, and give us an opportunity to present our arguments in favor of said improvement.

President—This is an application for the widening of Fifty-ninth street, and now the question comes up whether the initiative should be taken by this Board or by the Borough President and his Local Board. Have you looked into the matter of your jurisdiction, Mr. Peters?

Mr. Peters—Section 393 of the charter, says: "A local board, subject to the restrictions provided by this act" and to provide signs designating the names of the streets." It comes before the Local Board in the form of a petition, and on the recommendation of the Local Board it comes to this Board. In this case the improvement would go before more than one Local Board, because it extends across the city, and would, therefore, have to be submitted to the Local Board of each Senatorial District included in the proposed improvement.

President—Yes, but section 426 comes in after that and wipes you out.

Mr. Haffen—I have a resolution, Mr. President, covering that matter.

President—No action or resolution of this Board can change the law.

Mr. Grout—I think there is nothing inconsistent between the two sections. It simply provides that the Local Board shall recommend to this Board improvements that are to be made.

Mr. Peters—I agree with the President of the Borough of Brooklyn that the Local Board simply recommends to this Board.

President—Section 955 of the Consolidation Act of 1882 provides that: "They shall keep full record of all its proceedings and shall have all the powers and authority as to laying out, opening, widening, straightening, extending, altering and closing streets or avenues, or parts of streets or avenues in that part of The City of New York south of Fifty-ninth street * * *." This refers to the Board of Street Openings, which, under section 426 of the charter, is placed under the jurisdiction of this Board. Section 413 of the charter says:

"But no public work or improvement, involving an assessment for benefit, shall be so authorized until there has been presented to the board of public improvements and estimate in writing * * *." Under that you would have to prepare all the estimates as to what the probable cost would be.

Mr. Peters—The Local Board could hear the petitions, get the engineer's preliminary report, and that would save this Board just so much time. The Local Boards take the initiative, and thus save this Board from hearing a mass of details which would take up their whole time.

Mr. Grout—Section 402 bears on this subject. It states that the action of the Local Board shall be simply recommendatory; that their findings shall be transmitted to this Board, so that the real action will come from this Board.

Mr. Haffen—We have gone over this thing very carefully and there is no doubt that the initiative should come from the Local Board, and that action should be taken first there on public improvements, because there is no use bothering this Board or the Departments if the improvement is not approved by the people who are to be assessed and the people who are to pay for the improvement. The better knowledge could be had from the Local Board of the district in which the improvement is to be made, and if the matter is brought before that Local Board it will be discussed and some knowledge will be had, and not only the President of the Borough but also the Alderman and Councilman will be prepared to speak upon the question before this Board, of which the President is a member, and before the Municipal Assembly, of which the Alderman and Councilmen are members. The powers we apparently have are simply recommendatory and do not prevent this Board from acting in their own way finally. Certain information which you gentlemen desire to have will be presented in this way. Before going to the expense of getting a final estimate or spending money in examinations, we would get the approximate estimate from the Commissioner of Highways or the Commissioner of Sewers in the borough where this improvement is initiated.

Mr. Peters—The idea is to allow the people who live in the district to have an idea of what is going on. Section 402 of the charter distinctly states the method of procedure. It seems that that section of the charter was intended to give the people of the district an opportunity to be heard in the matter. It is only to-day I have called the first meeting of the Local Board, by pasting the notice in the office of the President of the Borough and a notice in the CITY RECORD.

President—Don't you think that this would be a proper matter to be referred to the Corporation Counsel?

Mr. Peters—Perfectly proper, Mr. President. I would say that the President of the Borough has not moved without consulting the Corporation Counsel's office. The first notice will appear in the CITY RECORD to-morrow morning in regard to the repair of sidewalks and the pavement on upper Madison avenue—two cases. Petitions have been filed in the office of the President of Manhattan for these improvements.

Mr. Farley—The Presidents of the Boroughs seem to have placed the proper construction on the charter.

Mr. Peters—You can readily see, Mr. President, that if the matter of improvements of the sort I have called this meeting for are to be considered by the Board of Public Improvements, the whole time of this Board will be taken up in listening to those that might be objected to by residents, and the time of this Board would be absolutely consumed in hearing statements of facts.

President—Have you thought as to how you are going to present estimates?

Mr. Grout—There are two resolutions before you not yet read, submitted by the Borough Presidents which are intended to cover this matter. I would like to call your attention to the fact that if the intention of the charter is not carried out, you will find that resolutions for local improvements will be introduced into the Board of Aldermen, and from there you will have proposed local improvements coming from every direction—odds and ends. Our two resolutions now before you will cover the whole thing.

Mr. Haffen—We find that there are resolutions being introduced into the Board of Aldermen ignoring this Board—ignoring all Boards.

President—They have not read the charter yet.

Mr. Peters—An object lesson or two might give them a clearer idea of the modus operandi.

President—The great difficulty with the charter is that some one man wrote the introductory and a number of men wrote the charter. It seems too bad that we have to spend all our time trying to define our duties.

RESOLUTIONS.

Mr. Grout—I move that these resolutions, together with a transcript of the stenographer's minutes, be referred to the Corporation Counsel's office for his information, with the request that he give an opinion upon the question as soon as possible. Laid over.

Resolved, That with a view of facilitating desirable local improvements, which may be duly petitioned for, and in contemplation of the provisions of section 413 of The Greater New York Charter, such heads of Departments as may be concerned shall be required to furnish to Borough Presidents and Local Boards, when requested in writing by a Borough President or his Secretary, duly authorized, approximate estimates of cost of such improvements, in such detail as may be required, with a statement of the assessed value according to the last preceding tax roll of the real estate included within the probable area of assessment in each particular case, which approximate estimates and statements shall be transmitted by Borough Presidents and Local Boards to this Board with the petitions for such improvements, in case the Local Boards shall recommend such petitions, and in case petitions are not recommended, such estimates and statements shall be kept on file in the respective offices of the Borough Presidents, subject to requisition at any time by this Board.

Laid over; and be it further

Resolved, That duplicates of these estimates and statements, in all cases, shall be kept on file in the respective offices of the heads of Departments making such estimates and statements, and that copies of these resolutions shall be forwarded to the officials concerned.

Laid over.

Resolved, That before any action shall be taken by this Board authorizing assessable improvements, it shall be required that action be taken first by Local Boards; and be it further

Resolved, That the Municipal Council and the Board of Aldermen be and they are hereby respectfully requested to pass a resolution that before either branch of the Municipal Assembly passes resolutions authorizing assessable improvements, it shall be required that action be taken first by local Boards and that a copy of these resolutions be transmitted to each branch of the local legislature.

Laid over.

Resolved, That with a view of promoting uniformity of procedure, it is the sense of this Board that all local improvements, authorized by The Greater New York Charter be initiated by Boards of Local Improvements under recommendations or resolutions duly certified to the Board of Public Improvements by Borough Presidents, and that a copy of this resolution be transmitted to the Municipal Assembly for its concurrence.

Laid over.

NEW YORK, February 2, 1898.

Commissioner SHEA:

DEAR SIR—In re the lease which the city was authorized to make with the property owners for the temporary bridge over the Bronx river near Westchester avenue, I beg to call your attention to the fact that an important consideration in the lease which was sent me on December 28, 1897, has been omitted. The verbal agreement, as made by me with Mr. Briggs, Chief Engineer, was, that there was in addition to the money consideration, to be built a roadway leading from my dock, which is cut off by the temporary bridge, to the new grade of Westchester avenue when said Westchester avenue is regraded.

I would suggest that the matter be sent to Mr. Briggs and have him investigate the claim and include in the specifications for the new bridge over the Bronx, the specifications for building this roadway as per the requirements set forth in the form herewith. Copy of old lease inclosed herewith.
