REPORT No. 156.

NEW YORK, March 27, 1900.

To the Honorable the Aqueduct Commissioners:

GENTLEMEN—I beg to inform you that on the Croton River Division there are many buildings on parcels of land on which the awards and final payments have been made.

If approved by you, I will have the buildings sold at auction, and I would set the date of the sale to be May 16, 1900.

Resolved, That the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund be and are hereby respectfully requested to authorize the Comptroller to execute renewal of lease of premises No. 211 Eastern parkway, in the Borough of Brooklyn, for station-house purposes for the Sixty-fifth Precinct, for one year, from May 1, 1900.
