Resolved, That section 54 of the Sanitary Code be and is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

"Section 54—Any milk found to be adulterated which has been brought into The City of New York or is held or offered for sale in said City may be seized and destroyed by any Inspector or other officer of this Department authorized to inspect milk.
