COMMISSIONERS OF THE SINKING FUND OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

Proceedings of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, at a Meeting Held in Room 16, City Hall, at 11 O'clock A. M., on Wednesday, January 24, 1912.

Present—William J. Gaynor, Mayor; Douglas Mathewson, Deputy and Acting Comptroller; Robert R. Moore, Chamberlain; Ardolph L. Kline, Acting President Board of Aldermen, and Henry H. Curran, Chairman Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen.

The minutes of the meeting held January 10, 1912, were approved as printed.

The Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolutions relative to the setting apart out of the revenues and income of the Sinking Fund of the City of New York for the Redemption of the City Debt the sum of \$219,941.15 and investment of \$17,500,000 in General Fund bonds of The City of New York for the Redemption of the City Debt, in accordance with the provisions of chapter 103 of the Laws of 1903:

January 24, 1912.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—Chapter 103 of the Laws of 1903 as amended, entitled “An Act to amend the Greater New York Charter relative to the Sinking Fund of the City of New York for the Redemption of the City Debt, by adding a new section to be known as section Two hundred and Twenty-two, providing for the issue of additional bonds of the City of New York, to be called General Fund Bonds, and by amending section One hundred and Sixty-nine of said Charter,” provides:

First—“The Board of Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, in the year 1903, and in each year thereafter until all of the bonds and stock which are redeemable from the fund known as the ‘Sinking Fund of the City of New York for the Redemption of the City Debt,’ shall have matured, shall set apart out of the revenues and income of said Sinking Fund, except the income and accumulation thereof derived from assets held by said Sinking Fund on January 1, 1903, and except also the income and accumulation thereof derived from the amount to be thus annually set apart, a sum, which, with the accumulation of interest thereon, together with the said assets, of said Sinking Fund and the earnings and accumulations thereof, shall be sufficient to redeem at maturity all the bonds and stocks of the City of New York which are redeemable from said Sinking Fund.”

Second—“At least five weeks before the annual meeting of the Board of Aldermen, in each and every year, for the purpose of receiving the Assessment Rolls required to be delivered by the Board of Taxes and Assessments to the Board of Aldermen, the Board of Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, may, in its discretion, certify to the Board of Aldermen, the amount as estimated by said Board of Commissioners, of revenues or income, from all sources of ‘The Sinking Fund of the City of New York for the Redemption of the City Debt’ during the then calendar year, and also the amount required by this section to be set apart for such calendar year out of such revenues and income for the Redemption of Bonds and Stock.”

Third—“If in any year the said estimated amount of revenues or income of said Sinking Fund, excepting the income and accumulation thereof derived from the assets held by said Sinking Fund on January first, nineteen hundred and three, and from the amounts annually set apart for the ‘Redemption of Bonds and Stock’ as by this section required shall exceed the amount required to be set apart in such year as in this section provided, the Board of Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, may, in its discretion, at the time of making said Certificates to the Board of Aldermen, determine to invest the whole or any part of the amount of such excess in General Fund Bonds of the City of New York for the account of the ‘Sinking Fund of the City of New York for the Redemption of the City Debt,’ but such investments shall not be made in any year until the amount required by this section to be set apart for such year, as provided herein, shall have been so set apart.”

Fourth—“The Board of Commissioners of the Sinking Fund shall then notify the Board of Aldermen and the Comptroller of the amount it has determined to invest in General Bonds during the current year, and the Comptroller shall include said amount in the Certificate of estimated revenues of the general fund required to be by him made to the Board of Aldermen pursuant to section Nine hundred of this act.”

The following communication was received from the Commissioner of Docks relative to the failure of the Union Ferry Company to pay the rental due from the five ferries on the East River, known as Fulton Ferry, Atlantic Ferry, Wall Street Ferry, Brooklyn Ferry and Catharine Street Ferry, for the year ending November 1, 1910:

November 9, 1910.

Hon. WILLIAM J. GAYNOR, Mayor and Chairman of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Sir—The Union Ferry Company now operates the five ferries on the East River known as the Hamilton Ferry, the Atlantic Ferry, Wall Street Ferry, Fulton Ferry and Catharine Ferry. The ferry company had a lease of these ferries, franchises and wharf property belonging to the City used in connection therewith, which expired May 1, 1901, at a rental of 7¼ per cent. of the gross receipts, which averaged about \$60,000 per annum.

At the expiration of the lease, May 1, 1901, the ferry company applied for a reduction in rent, which the department refused to grant, and no additional lease was executed and no rental was paid for some years, the Department claiming that the ferry company was a hold-over tenant and liable for the rental reserved in the lease. An adjustment was finally made by the company with the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund on the basis of a payment at the rate of 5¼ per cent. of the gross receipts, from May 1, 1901, to November 1, 1904, and from the latter date a two years' lease was approved by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund at a rental of 2 per cent. of the gross receipts.

The ferry company, however, refused to execute this lease, but continued up to November 1, 1909, to pay rental at the rate of 2 per cent., which amounted to about \$16,000 per annum.

In addition to this rental the ferry company paid for the use of land under water for ferry racks, along the westerly side of Pier 13, East River, at the rate of \$9,000 per annum, this being the rate paid by the ferry company to the private owners of the premises, prior to the acquisition of the property by the City. The ferry company also paid rental for wharf property belonging to the City, occupied by ferry structures at the foot of Atlantic avenue, Brooklyn, at the rate of \$2,000 per annum, making the entire rental received from the ferry company for franchises and wharf property about \$27,000 per annum. The rental of the last two items, however, was paid to August 1, 1909, but for the franchises and wharf property to November 1, 1909, since which time nothing has been received.

There is now due from the ferry company 2 per cent. of the gross receipts for the year ending November 1, 1910, amounting to about \$16,000; the exact amount cannot be ascertained as they have failed to render quarterly statements of the gross receipts during the past year.

There is also due one year and three months' rent to November 1, 1910, of wharf property occupied by ferry structures at Atlantic avenue, Brooklyn, amounting to \$2,500, and one year and three months' rent to November 1, 1910, for land under water for ferry racks on the westerly side of Pier (new) 13, East River, Manhattan, amounting to \$11,500, and rent of two signs on structure leading from the elevated road to the 39th Street Ferry Terminal, from September 1, 1909, to November 1, 1910, fifteen months at \$1 per month, \$15.

A claim for rental has been placed in the hands of the Corporation Counsel for collection.

I also beg to submit herewith copy of a communication from Collin. Wells & Hughes, attorneys, Thomas L. Hughes of counsel for the Union Ferry Company, in relation to the operation of its ferries, and beg to request instructions as to what further action I shall take in the matter. Yours respectfully,

Hon. CALVIN TOMKINS, Commissioner of Docks and Ferries, Pier A, North River, New York City:

Dear Sir—The interests of the City and the public as well as those of the Union Ferry Company of New York and Brooklyn require that the ferry situation shall receive the early attention of the City authorities.

As the company's dealings with the City antedate your taking office in January last, a review of the facts seems necessary in order to reach a correct understanding of the relative position of the City and the company.

The Union Ferry Company of New York and Brooklyn was incorporated in 1890. It operates as the successor of the old Union Ferry Company of Brooklyn five ferries, as follows: Catharine street, Manhattan, to Main street, Brooklyn; Fulton street, Manhattan, to Fulton street, Brooklyn; Wall street, Manhattan, to Piermont street, Brooklyn; South Ferry, Manhattan, to Atlantic avenue, Brooklyn; South Ferry, Manhattan, to Hamilton avenue, Brooklyn.

On December 7, 1893, a lease was made by the City to the present company, bearing date on that day. That lease expired May 1, 1901, and that is the only lease that has been in force between the City and the company since December 7, 1893. It provided for a rental of 7¼ per cent. of the gross receipts from ferriage and required the company to pay any taxes legally imposed by the City of Brooklyn upon such parts of the demised premises as were situated in Brooklyn.

The lease also provided that if at the expiration of the term The City of New York desired to enter into a lease of the ferries with any other lessee the City must cause the boats, buildings and other property of the company used in and actually necessary for the operation of the ferries to be purchased at a fair appraised valuation by the new lessee, such appraisal to be made at least four months prior to the termination of the term in a manner provided in the lease.

The City permitted this lease to expire on May 1, 1901, without having made any arrangement for valuation, purchase or a new lessee, and without having made any new lease to this company. The operation of trolley cars and electric elevated trains over the Brooklyn Bridge had already made heavy inroads on the company's business. The company was therefore unable to make a new lease on the old terms and the City for some time refused to consent to a reduction. The City advertised a ten-year lease but received no bid, and finally sued the company as a hold-over tenant. The suit was tried in March, 1905, but was never decided because of the progress of negotiations for a settlement.

On May 2, 1905, Edward M. Grout, then Comptroller of the City, after a thorough investigation, made a report to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund substantially sustaining the company's contentions. He recommended that because of the falling off of traffic the indebtedness of the company for rental from May 1, 1901 (the date when the lease expired), to October 31, 1904, be liquidated by accepting from the company 5-3-10 per cent. of the gross receipts between those dates, and further recommended that the company should receive a new lease from November 1, 1904, until May 1, 1906, at the rate of 2 per cent. per annum on the gross receipts, the report concluding as follows:

"I call to your attention that this arrangement covers the period until May 1, 1906, only; that not many months after that date the tunnel to Brooklyn will be in operation, which will without doubt make it impossible for any private corporation to operate

these ferries, since the margin of profit will be destroyed. The City must therefore face the problem of either discontinuing these ferries, with the resultant damage to property and inconvenience to citizens, or take them over and run them as a municipal enterprise. I regard the latter course as the only alternative which is open to the City and recommend that the question be immediately taken up."

At the time of the Comptroller's report in 1905 there was no statute which permitted the purchase by the City of the ferries. Since then, however, by chapter 450, Laws of 1907, section 824a of Greater New York Charter, the Commissioner of Docks with the approval of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund has been authorized to make such purchase on behalf of the City.

The resolution of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of May 10, 1905, approved of the Comptroller's report and the settlement recommended. Thereupon the company, on June 8, 1905, paid to the City \$110,156.02, being the amount which the City was willing to accept in settlement of all the City's claims from May 1, 1901, to October 31, 1904.

By the same resolution of May 10, 1905, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund requested the Dock Commissioner to recommend to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund a lease of the ferries to the company on a basis of 2 per cent. of the gross receipts. Such recommendation was made by the Dock Commissioner on June 6, 1905, and thereupon the Sinking Fund Commissioners, by resolution of July 14, 1905, authorized a lease to the company of the franchise to operate the five ferries, "together with the property belonging to The City of New York to be used in connection with said franchises for the period from November 1, 1904, to May 1, 1906, at a rental basis of 2 per cent. of the gross receipts and otherwise upon the same terms and conditions as contained in the previous lease, excepting therefrom the clause as to the purchase of the boats and property of the Union Ferry Company of New York City at the end of the term hereinbefore provided, by any other lessee."

This authorized lease was never executed. The company objected to it because, among other things, it omitted the old clause as to the purchase by any new lessee of the company's property on an appraised valuation.

Thereafter, until November 1, 1909, the company paid to The City of New York the amounts demanded by the City, but all payments were made under protest, and the company at the time of making each payment expressly gave notice in writing that it reserved all its rights and claims and made the payment without prejudice.

The payments so made have been as follows:

1. Two per cent. of the ferry receipts.
2. A monthly payment of \$1 for two signs on the elevated structure at the foot of Whitehall street, Manhattan.
3. An annual rent of \$9,000 for the privilege of resting its racks on the westerly side of Pier 16 (new 13) at Wall street, formerly owned by the Murray Estate, title to which property vested in the City on April 12, 1905. This rental was unlawfully exacted by a former Dock Commissioner. When the title to this pier passed from a private owner to the City it became part of the property used in connection with the ferry franchises, and the City thereafter had no right to require the company to make any payment for its use in addition to the 2 per cent. of ferry receipts. As already pointed out, the resolution of the Sinking Fund of July 14, 1905, provided for the payment of 2 per cent. for "the property belonging to The City of New York to be used in connection with said franchises."
4. An annual rent of \$2,000 for a small strip of land at the foot of Atlantic avenue, formerly owned or claimed by the City of Brooklyn, title to which vested in The City of New York on the taking effect of the Greater New York Charter on January 1, 1898. This rental also was unlawfully exacted by a former Dock Commissioner.

On the taking effect of the Greater New York Charter on January 1, 1898, this strip of land became "property belonging to The City of New York, to be used in connection" with the ferry franchise, and the City could not lawfully require the payment of any rental for its use in addition to 2 per cent. of the gross receipts.

5. Taxes on real estate belonging to the City and covered by the ferry structure at Fulton street, Brooklyn, amounting to about \$1,625 per year. After January 1, 1898, these taxes were unlawfully exacted from the company. This was a survival of the tax formerly imposed by the City of Brooklyn upon the same property. Prior to the taking effect of the Greater New York Charter on January 1, 1898, the City of Brooklyn could lawfully impose taxes on land lying within the City of Brooklyn and used for ferry purposes, and the lease of the ferries to this company, dated December 7, 1893, required, as has already been pointed out, payment of such taxes to be made by the company. The imposition of such taxes after January 1, 1898, however, was clearly unlawful because, of course, the City of Brooklyn could thereafter impose no taxes and The City of New York could not properly tax its own property.

The total claims of the company against the City therefore amounts to \$62,715.03, besides interest.

At the present time, however, it is not our desire to lay great stress upon the legal claims and counterclaims which exist between the company and the City, but rather to lay the important facts before you in order that you may have a clear view of the situation.

Since the date of the negotiations between the Company and the City in 1905, the operation of the subway tunnel to Brooklyn has been begun and the new Manhattan Bridge has been opened for traffic. Without going into great detail at the present time, the gravity of the present situation may be judged from the fact that during 1909 there was a decrease from 1908 in passenger traffic of 7,339,338, and that notwithstanding this tremendous decrease during that period there was in the six months from November 1, 1909, to May 1, 1910, a further average daily decrease of 4,351 passengers. The Company has reduced its operating expenses to the lowest point consistent with safe and adequate service, but, nevertheless, the difficulties are daily increasing, leading to the time when they will become unsurmountable.

There is no prospect of increased business. The operation of two new ferries from Broadway, Brooklyn, subsidized in part by the City, is about to begin, and in the near future cars will be running over the new Manhattan Bridge, and the new 4th avenue tunnel to Brooklyn will be opened.

The Company owns property consisting of real estate, ferry-houses, bridge approaches, racks, boats, machinery, tools, horses, carts, etc. Practically all of this property is adapted and can be used only in connection with the ferry franchise. To the other difficulties confronting the Company is added that of maintaining this property in the necessary condition of efficiency.

It seems evident from these facts that the time is close at hand, if indeed it has not already arrived, when in the language of the Comptroller's report of May 2, 1905, the City must face the problem of either discontinuing these ferries with the resultant damage to property and inconvenience to citizens, or taking them over and running them as a municipal enterprise. Anything short of a sale to the City would from necessity be a temporary makeshift, and would undoubtedly result in a repetition of the present unsatisfactory situation if not in one much more unfortunate for all concerned.

So far as we are able, we desire to refrain from taking any position antagonistic to the City, or injurious to public convenience, and our wishes are to meet the City in a spirit of fairness and good faith. In our opinion, however, the only remedy possible is that the ferry property should be purchased by the City at a fair price, which proposition we hereby submit to the City.

This important matter is presented, confident that it will receive the benefit of your immediate attention, and result in a sound decision satisfactory to the public, the City and the Company. Respectfully,

Hon. WILLIAM A. PRENDERGAST, Comptroller:

Sir—Under date of November 9, 1910, a communication was addressed by me to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund with reference to the present condition of affairs in connection with the Union Ferry Company, and setting forth certain facts in relation to said Company and its dealings with this Department; also enclosing a copy of a recent communication received from counsel to said Company, containing a proposition for acquisition by the City of the property of the Company with a view to operation of the ferries by the City. This communication, I understand, is now under investigation by the Bureau of Engineers of your Department.

It is, I think, of the utmost importance that as a preliminary step towards the consideration of the matters contained in my communication of November 9, that an examination should be made by expert accountants of the books of the Company, in order to obtain a knowledge of its financial condition. As this matter is now under investigation by your office, it would seem that such an examination of the books should be conducted by you, and I respectfully request that you cause such an examination to be made, and would be pleased to receive a copy of the result. The Committee to which this communication was referred at meeting held December 21, 1910, presented the following report:

January 18, 1912.

The Honorable Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, City of New York:

Gentlemen—At the meeting of your Board held December 21, 1910, there was referred to the undersigned, as a Select Committee, for their consideration and report, the matter of the failure of the Union Ferry Company of New York and Brooklyn to pay to the City the franchise and other rentals due from it for the five ferries operated by the Company between the Boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn, viz.: Hamilton, South, Fulton, Wall street and Catharine.

Your resolution in this matter was the result of a communication addressed to your Board by the Commissioner of Docks, dated November 9, 1910, in which that official asked to be instructed as to what action he should take in the premises.

The communication of the Commissioner of Docks was accompanied by a copy of a letter received by him from Messrs. Collins, Wells & Hughes, attorneys for the Union Ferry Company, dated September 6, 1910, setting forth the attitude of the Company in the existing situation. This letter is appended hereto and made a part of this report.

In order to ascertain the facts regarding the business of the Union Ferry Company upon which the Committee might base a reasonable and just conclusion as to the proper course for the City to adopt in the situation, an examination has been made in the Division of Expert Accounting of the Department of Finance into the revenues and expenses of the Company since November 1, 1904, a statement of the financial operations of the Company from November 1, 1901, to November 1, 1904, having been submitted to your Board by the then Comptroller on April 12, 1905.

The examination made for the purposes of this report covers the period from November 1, 1904, to August 31, 1911, a term of six years and ten months. As a result of the examination thus made, we submit the following statement, which is exemplified in detail in Schedule B hereto annexed:

Of this sum \$27,789.08 is the ferry franchise or rental payment accruing to the City from November 1, 1909, based upon a resolution of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund adopted July 14, 1905, which authorized the Commissioner of Docks to make a lease of the five ferries for the period from November 1, 1904, to May 1, 1906, on a rental basis of 2 per centum of the gross receipts.

No lease was executed as provided in the resolution of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, but the ferry company agreed provisionally to comply with the rental terms of 2 per cent. on the gross ferry receipts, not binding itself, however, as to the duration of the lease or other stipulations contained in former agreements. The company continued until November 1, 1909, to pay to the Commissioner of Docks a sum equal to 2 per cent. of its revenues from ferriage, but since that date no ferry franchise or dock rental payments have been received by the City.

The balance of the \$49,789.08 due the City to August 1, 1911, namely, \$22,000, is for rentals of uplands and lands under water, owned by The City of New York, occupied by the ferry company and for which the company, upon technical grounds, now disclaims liability. The facts in relation to these dock rentals will be more fully discussed below.

The Company's Manner of Disposing of its Surplus.

On October 31, 1904, as shown in the Comptroller's report submitted to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund April 12, 1905, the Union Ferry Company had a surplus of \$633,926.84. As herein previously shown, there was a further accumulation of undivided profits from November 1, 1904, to August 31, 1911, of \$738,822.89, making a total surplus of \$1,372,749.73. Since November 1, 1904, the company has reduced its bonded indebtedness from \$2,200,000 to \$1,100,000 by the redemption of \$1,100,000 bonds bearing interest at 5 per cent. The cost of the redeemed bonds in premium and brokerage fees was \$31,547.60. On August 31, 1911, there was a balance in surplus account of \$241,202.13, after setting aside \$49,789.08 as contingent liabilities due The City of New York.

Capital Stock and Dividends Thereon.

The capital stock of the company is \$3,000,000. Upon this dividends have been paid during the period included in this statement, as follows:

The decision of Chief Justice Daly, of the Court of Common Pleas, in the McClave case in 1892 placed the valuation of the ferry company's property at \$3,229,401. Since that time two boats have been retired from the company's fleet, but no new ones added. The real estate, it may be assumed, is more valuable than in 1892, but the whole question of the value of the company's real estate is dependent upon the exact character of the titles. It has been suggested that certain of the company's properties were acquired through state grants, and as yet no examination has been made to determine whether these grants conveyed the property with any covenants or restrictions as to its use for ferry or general commercial purposes.

The passenger traffic statistics as given in greater detail and by ferries in an addendum to this report show a constant decrease in this branch of the ferry business after the fiscal year ending October 31, 1907. As the next period, November 1, 1907, to October 31, 1908, embraces the period during which the Brooklyn-Manhattan rapid transit tunnel was open to the public, viz.: Opened to Borough Hall, January 9, 1908; opened to Atlantic avenue, May 1, 1908, the falling off of 8,554,155 in the number of ferry passengers is no doubt due to the new method of travel, assisted materially by the practice adopted by the Brooklyn Rapid Transit Railroad Company of operating to and from the subway stations in Brooklyn, "shuttle" or short line cars on their surface and elevated lines. It will be seen that the passenger traffic for the year 1908-1909 further decreased 7,339,338, yet the receipts from this source increased \$21,859.49. The explanation of this apparently peculiar condition is that on April 12, 1908, the passenger rate was increased to two cents a head for all hours of the day, thus abolishing the one-cent rate during the "commission hours" that had prevailed for many years. On December 6, 1908, the passenger rate on all the five ferries was increased to three cents during all hours of the day. In the fiscal year 1909-1910, there was a still further falling off in the number of passengers amounting to 1,470,287, while the revenues from this source decreased \$37,238.21. Despite the fact that there have been no additional subway extensions in Brooklyn, the ferry passenger business has continued to decline, as the statement shows, to the extent of 1,217,394 for the ten months ending August 31, 1911, with a reduced revenue of \$32,469.56, the percentage of reduction being 9 5/10 per cent., as compared with the corresponding months of the preceding fiscal year.

On August 20, 1911, the company again increased the passenger rate on all of the five ferries from three cents flat at all hours to five cents during the non-commission hours, leaving it at three cents during the hours from 5 to 7 o'clock, morning and evening. The returns for the month of September, that being the first full month during which the new rates were in effect, show the average fare per passenger to be 4.24 cents, as against the previous rate of three cents, representing a net increase of about 40 per cent. in these revenues per passenger.

In the analysis of the revenue from vehicular traffic, the fiscal years prior to December 6, 1908 (upon which date the ferriage rates were increased) will not be considered. On the date mentioned a new rate card was issued increasing the rates, for the several kinds of vehicles using the ferries, on an average of 38 per cent over the rates prevailing for several years previously. During the fiscal year succeeding the increase in rates, there was an increase in the revenue from this source of \$69,959.77. The next yearly period ending October 31, 1910, shows a decrease of \$36,937.68, and this decrease is attributed to the opening of the Manhattan Bridge on December 28, 1909. An analysis of this decrease by individual ferries makes the following showing:

In the ten months period ending August 31, 1911, there was a further decrease in the revenue of the ferries from vehicular traffic amounting to \$39,943.67 or about 11 7/10 per cent as compared with the corresponding months of the previous year. This would indicate a net loss in revenue from this source of about \$45,500 during the current fiscal year.

Upon the discontinuance of the Broadway, Brooklyn, ferries in 1908 the Union Ferry Company receipts from truckage were considerably augmented. The revenue from vehicles on the Catherine Ferry during 1908-1909 showed a total of \$102,151.04, an increase of \$17,014 over the preceding year. The resumption of service on the Broadway ferries in March and May of this year, however, has already resulted in a loss of considerable of the mercantile business of the Union Company's ferries.

Tolls on vehicles on the municipal bridges were abolished on the 19th day of July, 1911, and on the 20th day of August the Union Ferry Company increased its rates on passengers by approximately 40 per cent and on vehicular traffic by 20 per cent.

The actual effect of these changes in the situation is as yet very difficult to determine, for, while the abolition of tolls on the bridges would naturally divert vehicular traffic from the ferries to the bridges, the short period elapsing between the date of that action by the City and the company's increase of rates is not sufficient to afford any fair basis for estimate of the actual effect of the City's new policy.

However, the decrease in ferry receipts was fully overcome in the month of September, which period shows an actual increase in the ferry receipts over the month of June and the period from July 20 to August 20, 1911. This would indicate that the net result of these two changes would not appreciably affect the receipts. Still the actual receipts of the Union Ferry Company show a considerable decrease in 1911 as compared with 1910, amounting to about 10 per cent, showing that the bulk of ferry business continues to decline.

Comparing the receipts for June and September, 1911, on the various ferries, it appears that the Hamilton Ferry increased \$1,065.47, and the Atlantic \$2,409.33, while the Wall Street decreased \$73.15, the Fulton \$635.74 and the Catharine \$744.17; the net result being an increase of \$2,021.74. Comparing the months of June and September, 1911, with the same months of 1910 the gross receipts show a decrease of \$8,006.97 or 11.73 per cent in June, 1911, while in September the decrease is but \$3,548.71 or 5.39 per cent.

The gross receipts for the 10 months from November 1, 1910, to August 31, 1911, however, show a decrease of \$70,413.23 or 10.60 per cent from the corresponding period of the previous year.

Relative to the Union Ferry Company's Contentions.

We may now consider the ferry company's contention disclaiming liability for rentals on the Atlantic Avenue, Brooklyn and Wall Street, Manhattan properties, as well as taxes on its structures at Fulton Street, Brooklyn. The Ferry Company operated the Fulton, Wall, Catharine, South and Hamilton ferries under a written lease with the City at a rental of 7 1/4 per cent of gross receipts from ferriages, to expire May 1, 1901. The lease was not renewed, the ferry company contending the rental rate was excessive. The subject of rental remained in dispute until June 18, 1905, when the ferry company, in accordance with the terms of settlement, paid to the City a sum equal to 5 3/10 per cent of the gross receipts from May 1, 1901, to October 31, 1904, and offered to continue to operate the ferries until May 1, 1906, at a rental rate of 2 per cent from October 31, 1904.

The Commissioners of the Sinking Fund approved the offer and authorized a lease which the ferry company refused to execute on the ground that it did not conform with the previous lease and contain the clause for the purchase of its property by a subsequent lessee.

The ferry company still continued to operate the ferries and paid the franchise rental thereon at the said rate of 2 per cent up to November 1, 1909. In addition to this rental the ferry company paid to the City of Brooklyn prior to consolidation, and

subsequent thereto to The City of New York, an annual rental of \$2,000 on property at the foot of Atlantic avenue, Brooklyn; also an annual rental of \$9,000 on land under water at foot of Wall street, Manhattan, as well as taxes on its ferry structures at Fulton street, Brooklyn, amounting to approximately \$1,075 per annum. The rentals hereon were paid to May 1, 1909, and the taxes paid for 1909.

The ferry company through its attorneys, Collins, Wells & Hughes, now contends as per their communication of September 6, 1910, that the rentals on the Atlantic avenue and Wall street properties were unlawfully exacted, because when the City acquired title to the same (the former by consolidation of the cities in 1898, the latter through purchase April 12, 1905); the land became City property and used in connection with ferry franchises; therefore, the City could not exact these rentals in addition to the rental of 2 per cent on the ferry receipts.

These rentals were not improper nor were they unlawfully exacted. Investigation fails to disclose any agreement between the parties that would absolve the ferry company from the payment thereof. Its attitude, as evidenced by correspondence on record, shows conclusively that its real intent did not comprehend that the rental on these properties be merged in the franchise rental. (See letters from ferry company, September 26, 1905, October 10, 1905.)

As further evidence of this fact, during the entire period of the franchise rental controversy, viz.: 1901-1905, while the ferry company disputed and contested the payment of that rental it never questioned but regularly paid the upland rental on the Atlantic avenue property.

The weakness of the ferry company's contention in reference to the Wall street property rent is most apparent. The rental, primarily fixed after the City acquired title to this property, was reduced to the present rate upon the solicitation of the ferry company; and its approval in writing of this rate is on record. The significant feature is that these negotiations took place before, and the company's approval after, its offer to operate the ferries at the rental rate of 2 per cent and the acceptance thereof by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

The ferry company, through its attorneys, further contends that the taxes on the real estate at Fulton street, Brooklyn, were unlawfully exacted, as they were taxes formerly imposed by the City of Brooklyn, and after consolidation the City could not tax its own property.

If the facts were as stated, the contention of the ferry company may not be without merit, but investigation shows the tax is not on the City property but on the structures belonging to the ferry company, and its enjoyment of the benefits thereof does not warrant its exemption from the obligations attached thereto.

The final contention of the ferry company, that up to November 1, 1909, its payments were made under protest, need not be considered at great length here. There are several letters on file containing notice of protest and reservation, but a thorough search fails to unearth a specific protest against the payment of the Atlantic avenue and Wall street ferry rentals or taxes on the Fulton street, Brooklyn, structure.

To support the conclusion of this report many references may be made, for an exhaustive investigation utterly fails to sustain the ferry company's contentions and discloses abundant facts to warrant the conclusion that its position is untenable.

The obligation resting upon the ferry company for the rentals and taxes herein is apparent. Its acquiescence would in itself cast doubt upon the merits of these now aged claims and justice would surely decree an estoppel at this late day.

In view thereof it is the sense of the undersigned that the facts hereinbefore set forth do not warrant the cancellation of any part of the unpaid franchise and dock rentals as has been suggested by the company's officials, and the indebtedness herein stated should not only be liquidated but the company, while operating the several ferries, should continue the payment of these rentals until some other basis of compensation is agreed upon.

Therefore we respectfully suggest that the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund recommend to the Commissioner of Docks the rejection of the proposition of the company's officials for the cancellation of any part of the unpaid franchise and dock rentals; that the company be required to liquidate the indebtedness hereinbefore set forth, as well as the payment of the aforesaid rentals while operating the several ferries until some other basis of compensation is agreed upon.

A resolution to this effect is transmitted herewith for your consideration and adoption. Respectfully submitted,

Gentlemen—The petition of Harry Schneider respectfully shows:

1. That he resides at No. 673 Snediker avenue, in the Borough of Brooklyn, City of New York.

2. That he desires to obtain from The City of New York the release of all its right, title and interest in and to the following described premises, to wit:

All that certain gore lot, piece or parcel of land situate, lying and being in the Borough of Brooklyn, County of Kings, City and State of New York, bounded and described as follows, to wit:

That there is no record of said road at the point shown on the survey having been closed by any general or special law, proceeding or ordinance, but that Thatford avenue and Newport avenue have both been projected through said Hunterfly road, as shown on the Tax Map of The City of New York, and that Commissioners were appointed on May 21, 1909, to acquire title to land in Newport avenue at or in the vicinity of the land in question, and that proceedings are now pending by The City of New York to acquire title to land in Thatford avenue in part running south from the southeast corner of Thatford and Newport avenues, and adjoining premises colored red on the survey hereto annexed, and that said road at this point has for many years been in disuse as a road.

7. That your petitioner, by reason of owning the abutting property on the east, as above set forth, has, in order to protect his property, enclosed said gore lot by a board fence, which said fence was erected about eight months ago, when petitioner took title to the premises secondly above described adjoining said parcel colored red on the survey.

7a. Petitioner further shows that The City of New York has heretofore and on the 17th day of February, 1904, by deed dated on that day, and recorded in the Kings County Register's office in Liber 28 of Conveyances, at page 158 in Section 12, Block 3116, on March 18, 1904, conveyed a portion of land in the said Hunterfly road, immediately adjoining on the east the parcel colored red on survey hereto annexed and sought to be released, to Adolph I. Rudolph, Abraham Bernhard, Albert Halperin and Philip Margolin, and that petitioner has since succeeded to their ownership and interest in the same, and is now in possession thereof.

8. That by reason of the facts above set forth, showing the abandonment of said road as a traveled road, showing that streets are projected through said road, and also hereby stating that his property on the east is partly improved by the erection of substantial buildings, your petitioner prays that said release be granted unto him, more especially as said gore lot sought to be released could not be used by any third party, except for speculative purposes in land, on account of its peculiar size and formation and situation, but can be used and improved by petitioner, together with his land adjoining on the east, thereby affording The City of New York additional revenue through taxation of the same.

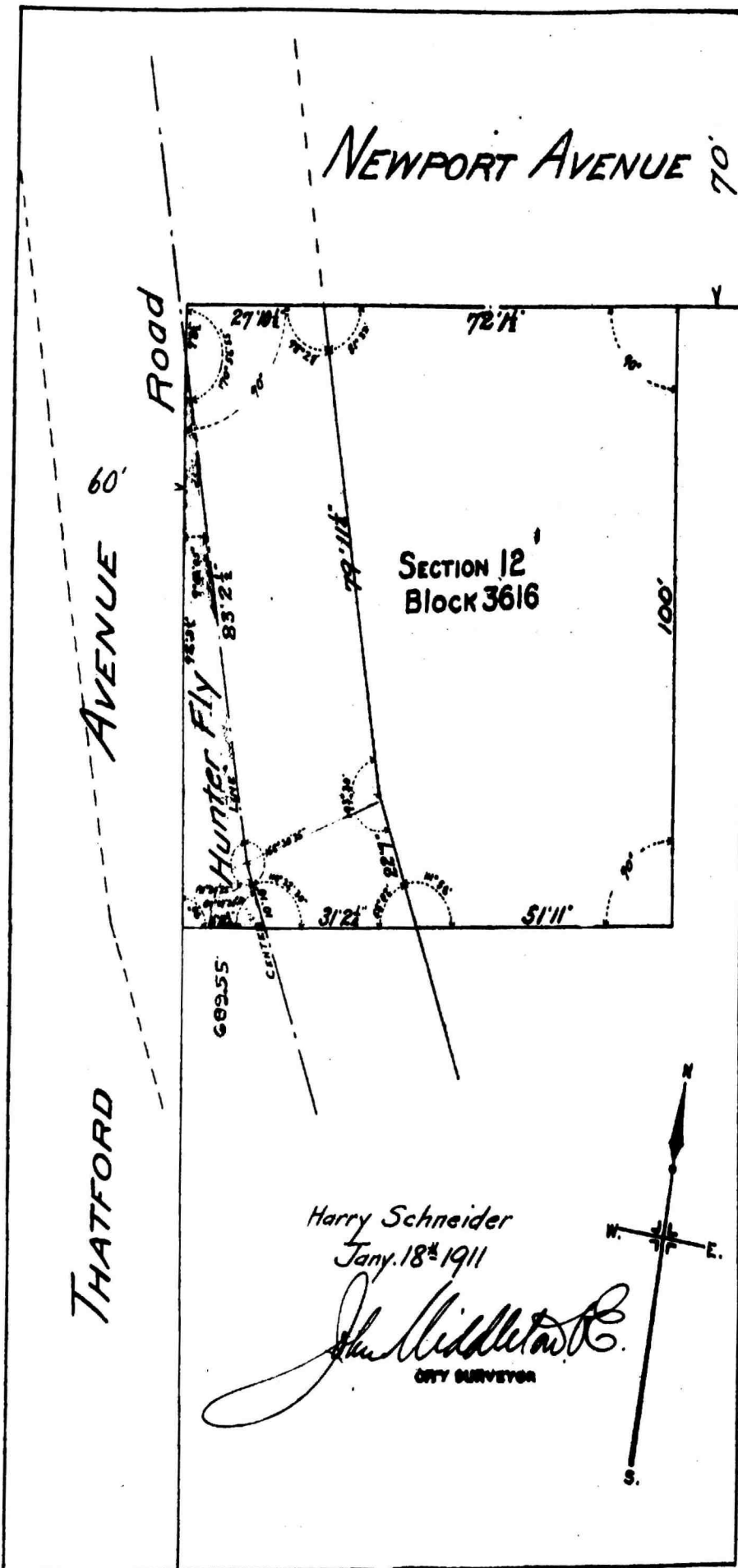

Law Department, Office of the Corporation Counsel, New York September 5, 1911.

Hon. WILLIAM A. PRENDERGAST, Comptroller:

Sir—I am in receipt of Assistant Deputy Comptroller Smith's communication, dated August 19, 1911, and reading as follows:

"Herewith I transmit the papers in the matter of the petitions of Louis Seinsoth and Harry Schneider, praying for a conveyance of the interest of the City in a section of the Hunterfly road, in the Borough of Brooklyn, for an opinion as to whether Hunterfly road, at the points involved in these petitions, has been closed by lawful authority within the meaning of section 205 of the Charter, and also as to whether the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund may lawfully sell and convey the interest of the City in said sections of the road to the owners of lands abutting thereon."

Under date of June 26, 1911, in returning to you the petitions above mentioned and requesting further information, attention was called to the statements in the report showing that the section of the Hunterfly road in question had been abandoned as a highway. That report apparently relied upon present conditions, the existence of which was not inconsistent with a temporary obstruction creating a nuisance in the highway requiring prompt abatement by the public authorities.

It now appears that all kinds of travel had entirely ceased in the section of the Hunterfly road in question and on adjoining parts of it for many years. The conditions stated in the former report, therefore, show in connection with the other facts, not a temporary obstruction and nuisance in an open highway rendering travel dangerous and calling for abatement, but, rather, so complete an abandonment of an old highway that the public did not resort to it at all for purposes of travel.

I am of opinion, and so advise you, that the Hunterfly road, by reason of the complete and long continued abandonment of travel thereon by the public, has been discontinued and closed by lawful authority, and that the Sinking Fund Commissioners are authorized by section 205 of the Greater New York Charter to sell and convey the right, title and interest of the City, in and to the lands lying within it to the owner or owners of lands fronting upon it, provided that said Commissioners shall first determine that the lands so to be sold are not needed for any public use.

It may not be amiss to add that Mr. Taber, in his letter to Deputy Comptroller Mathewson, dated July 3, 1911, has fallen into an error in his third proposition:

"I cannot see that section 205 of the Charter contains any requirement that it must be shown that an old road has been closed by lawful authority before the City will execute a quit-claim deed."

That section, as amended by chapter 379 of the Laws of 1903, so requires in express terms. (People ex rel. Brown vs. Metz, 119 App. Div., 271, 275; affd. 189 N. Y., 550.) As has been pointed out in former communications to the Comptroller, "closed by lawful authority" does not require specific action on the part of the public authorities. A street is as completely closed by lawful authority when travel thereon has been abandoned for many years as if a formal closing by statute, ordinance or by a judicial proceeding had been had. (City of Buffalo vs. D. L. & W. R. R. Co., 190 N. Y., 96.)

I return all the papers accompanying your communication.

In connection therewith the Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution:

January 5, 1912.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—In reference to a communication from Harry Schneider, of 673 Snediker avenue, Brooklyn, petitioning the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund for a conveyance of the interest of the City in a section of the old Hunterfly road, designated as Lot 19, Block 3616, Section 16, abutting on Lot 24, Block 3616, Section 16, Borough of Brooklyn, I report as follows:

The petition is made pursuant to the provisions of section 205 of the Greater New York Charter, and involves three questions: First, has the road been closed

by lawful authority? Second, is the property required for any public use? Third, what is the nature of the City's interest in the land?

As to the first—there has been no special proceeding closing the road at this point, but it has long been abandoned as a highway. The question was submitted to the Corporation Counsel and he has advised that this section of the Hunterfly road has been closed by lawful authority within the meaning of section 205 of the Charter.

As to the second—seventeen City Departments have stated in writing that the property is not required by them.

As to the third question—the petitioner has agreed to pay 50 per cent. of the value of the land in the road. The appraiser of real estate of the Department of Finance has appraised the property at \$505. The charge, therefore, will be \$202.50, plus \$12.50, to cover the cost of drawing deeds, or a total of \$215.

In view of the foregoing facts, I recommend a conveyance of the right, title and interest of the City in the following described property to Harry Schneider, residing at 673 Snediker avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, County of Kings, City and State of New York, for the sum of \$215; provided that all taxes, assessments and liens due the City which appear against the property in the road and petitioner's abutting property be discharged before a deed is delivered; and further, that the petitioner grant to the City in appropriate form, easements for all transportation, public or municipal purposes, in the easterly half of Thatford avenue adjoining his property and that section of the road conveyed; the deed to be delivered by the City to contain a condition reserving all easements in Thatford avenue adjoining the section of Hunterfly road conveyed, a condition that the petitioner is the owner of the lands fronting on that section of the road conveyed, and a waiver of all claims for damages arising out of the closing of the road.

The property is described in the attached resolution. Respectfully,

Beginning at a point on the easterly side of Thatford avenue distant seven (7) feet, eight and one-half (8½) inches southerly from the corner formed by the intersection of the southerly side of Newport avenue with the easterly side of Thatford avenue, and which point of beginning is formed by the intersection of the easterly side of Thatford avenue and the centre line of the Hunterfly road where it crosses said easterly side of Thatford avenue, running thence in a southeasterly direction along said centre line of said Hunterfly road eighty-three (83) feet, two and one-half (2½) inches to an angle in said centre line of said road; thence still in a southeasterly direction along said centre line of said road ten (10) feet, ten (10) inches, to a point distant easterly sixteen (16) feet, ten and three quarters (10¾) inches from the easterly side of Thatford avenue on a line measured at right angles thereto, which said right angle line intersects the easterly side of Thatford avenue at a point distant one hundred (100) feet south from the southeasterly corner of Thatford avenue and Newport avenue; running thence Westerly at right angles to Thatford avenue sixteen (16) feet ten and three-quarters (10¾) inches to the easterly side of Thatford avenue; and thence running northerly along the easterly side of Thatford avenue ninety-two (92) feet, three and one-half (3½) inches to the point or place of beginning.

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 205 of the amended Greater New York Charter, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund hereby authorize a conveyance to Harry Schneider, residing at No. 673 Snediker avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, County of Kings, City and State of New York, of all the right, title and interest of The City of New York in and to that portion of old Hunterfly road, hereinabove described; it being the intention to convey all that part of the old Hunterfly road lying in front of Lot 24, Block 3616, Section 16, Borough of Brooklyn, between the easterly side of Thatford avenue and the centre line of Hunterfly road, designated as Lot 19, Block 3616, Section 12, Borough of Brooklyn, on the tax maps of The City of New York in use January 1, 1911; the conveyance to be made subject to the following conditions:

That the petitioner waives any and all claim for damages arising out of the closing of Hunterfly road;

That the petitioner is the owner of the lands fronting on that section of the road conveyed;

That the City reserves and the petitioner grants to the City easements for all rapid transit, municipal and public purposes in Thatford avenue in front of the premises hereinabove described.

The said conveyance to be in such form as shall be approved by the Corporation Counsel; and further be it

Resolved, That the interests of The City of New York in and to the same are hereby appraised at the sum of two hundred and fifteen dollars (\$215), to be paid by the petitioner; and evidence produced that all taxes, assessments and charges due the City which appear against the property in the road and the petitioner's abutting property have been paid before the execution and delivery of the deed.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

Hon. WILLIAM A. FRENDEGAST, Comptroller:

Sir—I have received Deputy Comptroller Fisher's communication of July 3, 1911, transmitting report of Robert Jordan, Examiner in the Division of Law and Adjustment of the Finance Department, in the matter of the application of the Canal Realty Company for a conveyance of the interest of the City in five parcels of the old Hunterfly road, Borough of Brooklyn, and I am asked for an opinion:

"First—As to whether the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund can lawfully sell and convey the right, title and interest of the City in those parts of the Hunterfly road sought by the Canal Realty Company in Blocks 3536, 3537, 3538, 3539 and 3558 in Section 12, of the Borough of Brooklyn.

"Second—Are the sections of Hunterfly road described in the said petition closed by lawful authority within the meaning of section 205 of the Charter?"

The report of the examiner relates principally to the status of certain streets which intersect the portions of the old road referred to, with the object of determining whether access may be had by means of those streets to the property fronting upon the old road.

I do not find in this report any information as to the actual condition of the old road itself. I have, therefore, obtained additional facts by means of affidavits of property owners or residents in the vicinity.

Alexander S. Drescher makes oath that he has continuously resided within the vicinity of the lands of Hunterfly road for the past twelve years, and that to his knowledge, during that period no part of the lands lying within the said road "has been either opened to public use or in anywise used by the public either for driving or passing and repassing. That the surrounding streets as laid out on the Town Survey Commissioner's map of the County of Kings have been used for purposes of egress and ingress, and no part of said Hunterfly road has ever been used for that purpose."

Moses Ginsberg makes affidavit that he is the president of Canal Realty Company, the petitioner herein; that the said corporation owns all the land abutting on the south one-half of Hunterfly road, between the limits of Barrett street and Hopkins avenue, and also all the land to the north thereof, including the north one-half of the said Hunterfly road which the Company acquired from John H. Vanderveer Com-

pany. Mr. Gainsberg also says in his affidavit "that deponent has been a resident of the vicinity wherein said Hunterfly road is situate for the past fifteen years, and that to deponent's knowledge within said period no part of the said lands lying in Hunterfly road has been either opened to public or private use or in anywise used by the public either for driving or passing and repassing. * * * That parts of the said Hunterfly road, both to the east and west of the lands petitioned for herein, have been ceded by The City of New York to abutting owners who have improved the land and built large tenements thereon, and that throughout the period of said fifteen years, to deponent's own knowledge, said lands have never been in anywise any kind of thoroughfare, either public or private."

The Comptroller has already been advised by the Corporation Counsel that an old road which had been abandoned by the public for a number of years, and had been treated as private property by abutting owners is legally closed within the meaning of section 205 of the Charter. The facts here presented clearly bring the present application within the scope of that opinion.

I answer each of the questions proposed, therefore, in the affirmative.

In connection therewith the Deputy and Acting Comptroller presented the following report and offered the following resolution:

Department of Finance, City of New York, Bureau of Municipal Investigation and Statistics, January 24, 1912.

To the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund:

Gentlemen—In a petition addressed to the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Canal Realty Company, a domestic corporation, prays for a conveyance of the interest of the City in five parcels of land within the lines of Hunterfly road. The property is designated on the tax maps in the Borough of Brooklyn as follows:

Block 3536, Lots 1 and 28; Block 3537, Lot 1; Block 3538, Lot 1; Block 3539, Lot 1; Block 3558, Lot 4. All the property is in Section 12.

The application is made pursuant to the provisions of section 205 of the Greater New York Charter. Three questions must be determined:

First—Has the road been closed by lawful authority? There is no available record of a specific closing of this part of Hunterfly road, but it has long been abandoned by the public. The question of closing was submitted to the Corporation Counsel and he has advised that the road is closed by lawful authority, within the meaning of section 205.

Second—Is the property required for public use? Sixteen City departments have stated in writing that it is not required by them, and the Public Service Commission does not insist upon the reservation of an easement for rapid transit purposes.

Third—What is the nature of the City's interest? It is not necessary to discuss this point in detail, as the petitioner has agreed to pay 50 per cent. of the value of the land. The property has been valued by the appraiser of real estate of the Department of Finance at \$16,024.80. Under the 50 per cent. rule of the Commissioners the charge will be \$8,012.40, plus \$12.50 to cover the cost of drawing deeds, making a total of \$8,024.90.

In view of the foregoing I recommend the adoption of the attached resolutions authorizing a conveyance to Canal Realty Company for the sum of \$8,024.90, subject to the conditions recited therein. Respectfully,

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 206 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, by unanimous vote, hereby authorize a conveyance to Canal Realty Company, a domestic corporation, having its principal office at No. 1779 Pitkin avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, County of Kings, City and State of New York, of all the right, title and interest of The City of New York in and to those portions of old Hunterfly road hereinabove described, subject to the following conditions:

That the grantee is the owner of the lands fronting on the sections of road conveyed.

That the petitioner waives any and all claim for damages arising out of the closing of Hunterfly road.

That the following reservation be incorporated in the deed:

* * * excepting and reserving to the party of the first part all easements and other rights of every kind and description which it has in and to Barrett street, Sutter avenue, Saratoga avenue, Douglass street, Ames street, Amboy street, Blake avenue, Hopkinson avenue and Bristol street by reason of its ownership of or interest in the premises hereby conveyed or otherwise with the same force and effect and to the same extent as though this conveyance had not been made or delivered. And the party of the second part, in further consideration of this conveyance, does hereby for itself, its successors and assigns, waive, surrender and release any right to damages which have accrued or may at any time accrue from the use, for any rapid transit, municipal, public or semi-public purpose, of Barrett street, Sutter avenue, Saratoga avenue, Douglass street, Ames street, Amboy street, Blake avenue, Hopkinson avenue and Bristol street by reason of ownership of or interest in the premises hereby conveyed or herein described; without prejudice, however, to any rights or claims which have accrued or may hereafter accrue by virtue of such uses to the grantee herein or its (his) successors in interest by reason of its ownership of the premises adjoining those hereby conveyed.

—the said conveyance to be in such form as shall be approved by the Corporation Counsel; and be it further

Resolved, That the interests of The City in and to the same be and are hereby appraised and fixed at the sum of eight thousand and twelve dollars and forty cents (\$8,012.40), plus twelve dollars and fifty cents (\$12.50) to cover the cost of drawing deeds, making a total of eight thousand and twenty-four dollars and ninety cents (\$8,024.90) to be paid by the petitioner, and evidence produced that all taxes, assessments and liens due The City which appear against the land in the road and the petitioner's abutting land, have been paid before the execution and delivery of the deed.

The report was accepted and the resolution unanimously adopted.

The Comptroller presented a statement of bonds and stock of The City of New York, bonds and mortgage, and real estate held by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund as investments on December 31, 1911.

Which was referred to a select committee consisting of the President of the Board of Aldermen, and Chairman of the Finance Committee, Board of Aldermen.

A communication was received from the Fire Department requesting a lease of premises known as the Chapin Home at No. 151 East 66th street, Borough of Manhattan, for use as headquarters for the Bureau of Fire Prevention, for a period of one year from January 15, 1912, at a rental of \$5,000 per annum, payable quarterly; the lessor to have the right to cancel the lease at any time upon giving three months written notice; the lessee to furnish heat, light, water and janitor service and to pay any taxes that may be imposed and to make such inside and outside alterations and repairs as it may deem necessary.

Which was referred to a select committee consisting of the Chamberlain and President of the Board of Aldermen with instructions to confer with the Fire Commissioner in regard to the matter.

The following communications were received from the New York Connecting Railway Company, relative to the compensation to be paid by the said Company for occupying portions of Wards and Randalls Islands:

Philadelphia, January 17, 1912.

To the Board of Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of The City of New York. Hon. WILLIAM J. GAYNOR, Mayor, Chairman, New York City, New York

Gentlemen—The Act of the Legislature of the State of New York known as chapter 752 of the Laws of 1900, which became a law on May 3, 1900, authorized The New York Connecting Railroad Company "to construct upon the line of its railroad a bridge for railroad purposes only, of a single span across the East River at or near Hell Gate, together with necessary viaduct approaches, and to maintain and operate the same," and the certificate issued under date of February 14, 1907, by the Board of Rapid Transit Railroad Commissioners for The City of New York to The New York Connecting Railroad Company, authorized that company to lay down, construct and operate a railway upon a route as therein described, beginning at a point in the Borough of Brooklyn, over the northeasterly side of Knickerbocker avenue, near the Roman Catholic Cemetery of the Most Holy Trinity, and running thence into and through the Borough of Queens and "by bridge in a northwesterly direction over the East River to a point on Wards Island, thence with a curve towards the east in a general north-easterly direction by bridge over Wards Island and Little Hell Gate to a point on Randalls Island, thence still continuing in a general northeasterly direction by bridge over Randalls Island and the Bronx Kills," to a connection with the railroad of the Harlem River and Portchester Railroad Company north of 141st street, in the Borough of The Bronx; and the said certificate provided, in the paragraph therein designated Third, of Article V, that the Railroad Company shall pay as rental the reasonable value of the use and occupation by the Railroad Company of portions of Wards and Randalls Islands, such use and occupation being classified as follows:

- (1) Permanent occupation by the abutments, piers and other supports of the bridge or elevated structure;
- (2) Permanent overhead occupation by the bridge or elevated structure; and
- (3) Any use during construction;

—that "The amount of such annual payments may be agreed upon in writing by the Railroad Company and the Board of Commissioners of the Sinking Fund of The City or other authorities in control of said islands"; and that if such agreement shall not be made within six months after the date of the first occupation, then the rates of such payments shall be prescribed by the Board of Commissioners of the Sinking Fund or such other authorities.

Although the Railroad Company has not entered into possession or occupation either temporarily or permanently of any portion of either of said islands, yet it desires to agree upon the amount of the payments to be made as contemplated by said certificates issued February 14, 1907, and to that end submits herewith a plan showing the portions of each island which it desires to occupy with its permanent pier and overhead occupation and its temporary occupation, differentiated between land under water, fast land and marsh land; and respectfully requests that your honorable Board will fix a time and place when and where it or such representative or representatives as it shall be pleased to designate may be met by the representatives of the Railroad Company, for the purpose of conferring, with the ultimate view of agreeing, upon the amount of such payments.

Because of the occupation and use of portions of the islands through which the railroad is to pass by public institutions and because of the possible interest which the following named persons or any of them may have in either of said islands or said institutions, I have given advice of this communication to—

The Governor of the State of New York;

bers of the Board thereof, to wit: The Governor, Attorney-General, and the Comptroller of the State of New York;

The Managers of the Manhattan State Hospital;

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that at the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, held this day, the following resolutions were adopted:

Whereas, The Postal Telegraph Cable Company has, under date of January 13, 1911, made application to this Board for the consent of The City of New York under section 102 of the Transportation Corporations Law (chapter 219 of the Laws of 1909) to the re-location of two conduits and cables (at present owned by The Commercial Cable Company) in the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens; and the laying of two additional conduits and cables from the junction of Dover and Water sts., Borough of Manhattan, across the East River and through the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens to the Beach at Far Rockaway; and

Whereas, The above petition was withdrawn at the meeting of this Board held February 9, 1911, and a new petition dated February 9, 1911, presented; and

Whereas, The Corporation Counsel has advised this Board that public notice should be given of the proceedings looking to the granting of this consent, in accordance with the provisions of section 74 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapters 629 and 630 of the Laws of 1905; and

Whereas, In pursuance of such laws this Board adopted a resolution on January 19, 1911, fixing the date for a public hearing thereon as March 2, 1911, at which citizens were entitled to appear and be heard, said date being continued for the second petition at the meeting of February 9, 1911, and publication was had for at least two (2) days in "The Sun" and "The Commercial," newspapers designated by the Mayor, and in the City Record for ten (10) days immediately prior to the date of the hearing, and the public hearing was duly held on such date; now, therefore, it is

Resolved, That the following form of the resolution for the grant of the consent applied for by the Postal Telegraph Cable Company, containing the form of proposed contract for the grant of such consent, be hereby introduced and entered in the minutes of this Board, as follows, to wit:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby grants to the Postal Telegraph-Cable Company the consent of The City of New York as more fully set out and described in the following form of proposed contract for the grant thereof, embodying all the terms and conditions, upon and subject to the terms and conditions in said proposed form of contract contained, and that the Mayor of The City of New York be and he hereby is authorized to execute and deliver such contract in the name and on behalf of The City of New York, as follows, to wit:

PROPOSED FORM OF CONTRACT.

This contract, made and entered into this day of , 191 , by and between The City of New York (hereinafter called the City), party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City (hereinafter called the Board), and the Postal Telegraph-Cable Company, a corporation formed under and pursuant to the Laws of the State of New York (hereinafter called the Company), party of the second part, witnesses:

Whereas, The Company on or about the 10th day of August, 1883, filed a certificate of incorporation in the office of the Secretary of State as the New England Telegraph Company; and

Whereas, The said New England Telegraph Company on or about July 26, 1884, filed with the Postmaster-General of the United States of America a certificate of acceptance of the restrictions and obligations imposed on telegraph companies by an Act of Congress of the United States, passed July 24, 1866, entitled, "An Act to aid in the construction of telegraph lines and to secure to the government the use of the same for postal, military and other purposes," and by title 65 of the Revised Statutes of the United States; and

Whereas, The said New England Telegraph Company on or about April 20, 1910, assumed the name of Postal Telegraph-Cable Company, by which it is now known, pursuant to an order of the Supreme Court of the State of New York, authorizing it so to do; and

Whereas, The Company has now applied for the consent of the City to the laying of certain underground conduits between the Borough of Manhattan and Far Rockaway Beach, Borough of Queens, which consent, the Board is advised, is required under the provisions of section 102 of the Transportation Corporations Law (chapter 219 of the Laws of 1909); now, therefore, in consideration of the mutual covenants and conditions herein contained, the City and the Company covenant and agree as follows:

Section 1. The City hereby consents to the construction, erection, maintenance and operation by the Company of the following:

1. Two (2) conduits, each not more than three (3) inches inside diameter with the necessary junction boxes, manholes and appurtenances for the purpose of placing cables and conductors therein from a point at the intersection of Dover and Water sts., Borough of Manhattan; through and along Dover st. to South st.; thence through and along South st. to a point situated near the northerly boundary of the property belonging to the City at the foot of Roosevelt st., now leased to the Clyde Steamship Company, and known as Pier (new) 22; thence underneath said property to the easterly extremity of the pier occupied by the Clyde Steamship Company; thence under the East River to a point near the northwestern extremity of the wharf belonging to the City at the foot of the tower of the Brooklyn and of the Brooklyn Bridge; thence beneath said wharf to a point in Water st., Borough of Brooklyn, near the northeastern corner of the aforesaid property; thence through and along Water st. to Dock st.; thence through and along Dock st. to Front st.; thence through and along Front st. to a point where they will join the route of the present conduits of The Commercial Cable Company; thence through and along Front st. to Hudson ave.; thence through and along Hudson ave. to Park ave.; thence through and along Park ave. to Vanderbilt ave.; thence through and along Vanderbilt ave. to Plaza st.; thence along Plaza st. to St. Johns place.

Together with the privilege of constructing and maintaining one (1) small cable house on the wharf or pier on each side of the East River for the purpose of connecting the underground land cables with the two cables to be laid under the East River.

2. Four (4) conduits, each not more than three (3) inches inside diameter, with the necessary junction boxes, manholes and appurtenances for the purpose of placing cables and conductors therein, from a point at the intersection of Plaza st. and St. Johns place, Borough of Brooklyn; thence through and along St. Johns place to East New York ave.; thence through and along East New York ave. to Liberty ave.; thence through and along Liberty ave. to Linwood st.; thence through and along Linwood st. to Belmont ave.; thence through and along Belmont ave. to Railroad ave.; thence through and along Railroad ave. to Pitkin ave.; thence through and along Pitkin ave. to the property, formerly of the Brooklyn City Water Works, now known as the conduit lands (Conduit ave.); thence through and along the said conduit lands (Conduit ave.) to the boundary line between the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens; thence continuing along the conduit lands (about 4 1/2 miles) to the point of intersection of the said conduit lands with the Rockaway turnpike; thence through and along the Rockaway turnpike to the boundary line between The City of New York and the County of Nassau.

Also beginning at the intersection of Central ave. and McNeil ave., Far Rockaway, Borough of Queens; thence through and along McNeil ave. to Broadway; thence through and along Broadway to its intersection with Oak st.; Rockaway turnpike and Jarvis lane; thence through and along Jarvis lane to a point where it joins or intersects Grand View ave.; thence through and along Grand View ave. and in a line therewith to the beach at Far Rockaway; thence to connect with the ocean cables of The Commercial Cable Company, which are to be brought to a land connection at this point.

All as shown on a map or plan entitled: "Map or plan to accompany the petition of the Postal Telegraph-Cable Company, dated February 9, 1911, to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, for permission to construct conduits and draw cables therein from a point at the intersection of Dover and Water sts., Borough of Manhattan, through the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens to the beach at Far Rockaway, as more specifically set forth in the petition of the Company," and signed by C. C. Adams, as Vice-President, a copy of which is attached hereto, and is to be deemed a part of this contract.

Sec. 2. The consent hereby given is in consideration of and subject to the following provisions and conditions:

First—This contract is entered into on the mutual and express understanding and agreement by and between the parties hereto that the Company will not use the said conduits or conductors for which consent is hereby granted for any other purpose than as a telegraph line in connection with the cable lines of the Postal Telegraph-Commercial Cable system, so-called.

Second—The said consent to construct, maintain and operate said conduits and their appurtenances shall continue and extend for the period of the duration of the Company and any renewal of its chartered existence in accordance with the laws of the State of New York.

Third—Nothing in this contract shall be deemed to affect in any way the right of the City to grant to any individual or other corporation a similar right or privilege upon the same or other terms and conditions, over or through the same route, hereinbefore described, or any portion thereof.

Fourth—The consent hereby granted shall not be assigned, nor shall the title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever,

either by the act of the Company, or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in anywise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Fifth—The Company shall commence construction of the conduits herein consented to within six (6) months from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor and complete the construction of the same, and have the necessary cables and conductors drawn into the same and commence operation within two (2) years thereafter, otherwise this consent shall cease and determine; provided that the period for commencement and the period for completion, here specified, may be extended by the Board; and provided, further, that when the commencement or completion of said construction shall be prevented by legal proceedings in any court or by works of public improvements, or from other causes not within control of the Company, the time for the commencement or completion of such construction shall be considered extended for the period of such prevention, but no delay shall be allowed for unless the court proceedings shall be diligently prosecuted by the Company, and provided, further, that in no case shall such delay be deemed to begin until the Company shall have given written notice to the Board of any such court proceedings or other occasion of delay, and deliver to the Board copies of any injunction or other orders, and the papers upon which the same shall have been granted, and unless upon the request of the Board the Company shall, in writing, consent that the Board either in its own name as a party, or in the name of the City as a party, may intervene in any such proceedings.

Sixth—Said conduits shall be constructed, maintained and operated subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of the City who have jurisdiction in such matters, as provided by the Charter of the City.

No construction upon said conduits shall be commenced until written permits have been obtained from the proper City officials.

In any permits so issued such officials may also impose such conditions, as a condition of the granting of the same, as are necessary for the purpose of protecting any structures in the streets and avenues over which such officials have jurisdiction and the Company shall comply with such conditions.

The electrical equipment to be installed by the Company within the limits of the City, whether the same be upon streets and avenues or upon private property, shall be constructed and maintained under the supervision and control of the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

Upon completion of the work the grantee shall furnish to the Presidents of the Boroughs plans of such character as they may direct, showing accurately and distinctly the location, size and type of construction and complete dimensions of the structure installed; also the location and dimensions of all substructures encountered during the progress of the work. The depth below the street surface of the new structures and substructures encountered must be shown; also their location with reference to the nearest curb line and the nearest curb line intersection.

Seventh—The Company where it has opened any street or avenue for the purpose of laying or repairing the conduits and cables herein consented to, shall properly restore said pavement and maintain the same for a period of one year, all at its own expense. If the Company shall, after five (5) days' notice from either the President of the Borough of Brooklyn or the President of the Borough of Queens, or any other proper City official, neglect to so restore or maintain said pavement, then the said President, or either of them, or such other proper official, shall be authorized to do so at the expense of the Company, and the cost of such restoration and maintenance shall be a proper charge against the Company. No street or avenue which shall be opened for the purpose of this construction or for any remains subsequent to the completion of such construction shall be kept open for a longer period than the local authorities may prescribe, or where no period is prescribed, not longer than is reasonably necessary.

Eighth—The Company shall not construct any overhead wires, conductors or cables or erect any poles upon or along the route for which consent is herein granted, or any part of the same, and it is distinctly understood and agreed that such conduits and cables, and every portion thereof shall be placed and constructed underneath the surface of the streets and avenues and other public places and property on such route.

Ninth—It is a condition of this contract that the Company shall bear the entire expense of all work undertaken under the consent granted.

Tenth—Any alteration to the sewerage or drainage systems or to any other subsurface or to any surface structures in the streets, required on account of the construction or operation of the conduits, shall be made at the sole cost of the Company, and in such manner as the proper City officials may prescribe.

Eleventh—It is agreed that the consent hereby granted to construct and operate these conduits and conductors shall not be in preference or in hindrance to public work of the City, and should the said conduits and conductors in any way interfere with the construction of public works in the streets and avenues, whether the same is done by the City directly or by a contractor for the City, the Company shall, at its own expense, protect or move the conduits, conductors and appurtenances in the manner directed by the City officials having jurisdiction over such public work.

Twelfth—Should the grades or lines of the streets and avenues in which the conduits are laid be changed at any time after the same have been constructed and during the term of this contract, the Company shall at its own expense, change said conduits and appurtenances to conform with such new grades and lines, and during the construction of any public improvement upon said streets and avenues, the Company shall take care of and protect the conduits and appurtenances at its own expense, all to be done subject to the direction of the City official having jurisdiction over the construction of such change.

Thirteenth—The wires, cables, conductors and conduits to be laid shall be employed for no other purpose than that explicitly set forth herein, except by consent of the Board, and the Company binds itself not to lay, use, lease or operate the said wires, cables, conductors and conduits for illegal purposes or to illegal places.

Fourteenth—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained, this contract may be forfeited by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel, on notice of ten (10) days to the Company, or at the option of the Board by resolution of said Board. Provided, however, that such action by the Board shall not be taken until the Board shall give notice to the Company to appear before it on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why such resolution declaring the contract forfeited should not be adopted. In case the

Company fails to appear, action may be taken by the Board forthwith.

Fifteenth—If the Company shall fail to maintain its structures and equipment as herein provided in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, the Board may give notice to the Company specifying any default on the part of the Company, and requiring the Company to remedy the same within a reasonable time; and upon failure of the Company to remedy such default within a reasonable time, and in case such structures or equipment which may affect the surface of the streets shall not be put in good condition within a reasonable time after notice by the Board as aforesaid, the City shall have the right to make all needed repairs at the expense of the Company, in which case the Company shall pay to the City the amount of the cost of such repairs, with legal interest thereon.

Sixteenth—The Company shall assume all liability to persons or property by reason of the construction or operation of the conduits to be laid, and it is a condition of this contract that the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property on account of the same, and the Company hereby agrees to repay to the City any damage which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or default of the Company.

The Company shall not, without the permission and consent of the lessee, enter into or use any wharves or piers or other public property affected by this contract, but which is leased by the City to any person or corporation.

Seventeenth—This consent is upon the express condition that the Company within thirty (30) days after the signing of this contract by the Mayor and before anything is done in exercise of the consent hereby granted shall file with the Comptroller of the City the joint and several bond of the Company and the Commercial Cable Company in the sum of twenty-five thousand dollars (\$25,000) conditioned that the Company will perform all the terms and conditions of this contract and each and every one thereof, and comply with all orders of the Board or other local authority acting under the powers herein reserved, especially those which relate to the repairs of street pavement, quality of construction of the conduits and the maintenance of the property in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, and in case of default in the performance by the Company of such terms and conditions or upon its failure to comply with such orders or either or any of them, the City shall have the right to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furnished for the performance thereof, after due notice, and shall collect the reasonable cost thereof from said Companies or either of them.

Eighteenth—The words "notice" or "direction," wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean a written notice or direction. Every such notice or direction to be served upon the Company shall be delivered at such office in the City as shall have been designated by the Company, or if no such office shall have been designated, or if such designation shall have for any reason become inoperative, shall be mailed in the City, postage prepaid, addressed to the Company at the City. Delivery or mailing of such notice or direction as and when above provided shall be equivalent to direct personal notice or direction, and shall be deemed to have been given at the time of delivery or mailing.

Nineteenth—The words "streets or avenues" and "streets and avenues" wherever used in this contract shall be deemed to mean "streets, avenues, highways, boulevards, concourses, drives, bridges, tunnels, parks, parkways, waterways, docks, bulkheads, wharves, piers or public grounds or waters," the City Aqueduct or Conduit Lands within and belonging to the City and any other property to which the City has title or over which the public has an easement, encountered in the route hereinabove described, and through or in which this contract shall operate.

Twentieth—If at any time the powers of the Board or any other of the authorities herein mentioned, or intended to be mentioned, shall be transferred by law to any other board, authority, officer or officers, then and in such case such other board, authority, officer or officers, shall have all the powers, rights, and duties herein reserved to or prescribed for the Board or other authorities, officer or officers.

Twenty-first—The grant of this privilege is subject to whatever right, title or interest the owners of abutting property or others may have in and to the streets and avenues affected by this contract.

Sec. 3. Nothing contained herein shall be deemed to authorize the Company to use the land, formerly of the Brooklyn City Water Works, now generally known as the Conduit Lands or the City Aqueduct, without the consent of the Board of Commissioners of the Sinking Fund first had and obtained in the manner and in accordance with the procedure for such consent required by "The Greater New York Charter." And nothing contained herein shall be deemed nor is anything contained herein intended or to be construed as giving to the said Postal Telegraph-Cable Company the consent of this Board, under its authority conferred by "The Greater New York Charter," to the use of the said Conduit Lands for a further or longer term than the Board of Commissioners of the Sinking Fund is authorized to grant either by permission or lease or otherwise, or to the use of any other property of the City as above for a longer period than the local authority or authorities having the control and management of the same are empowered to authorize. And the said right to use the said Conduit Lands and other City property shall be subject to such conditions and provisions as may be imposed by the Board of Commissioners of the Sinking Fund.

Sec. 4. This contract shall not take effect nor shall the Postal Telegraph-Cable Company exercise its privilege of constructing the underground conduits for which consent is herein granted, unless and until The Commercial Cable Company shall execute and file with the Board an instrument under seal, wherein it shall agree in consideration of the grant of the consent to be given by the Board of Commissioners of the Sinking Fund to the use of the City Aqueduct or Conduit Lands, to transfer to the City free of all cost and expense that portion of the present conduits, belonging to the said Commercial Cable Company between Plaza st., Borough of Brooklyn, and the cable landing at Manhattan Beach, Coney Island, which is to be abandoned and through which no further operations in connection with the Atlantic cables will be conducted when the conduits hereinbefore referred to are completed and placed in operation, such portion to be so transferred being shown on the map or plan attached hereto. In said instrument The Commercial Cable Company shall agree and bind itself to make such transfer to the City within six (6) months after the completion of the conduits herein consented to and the placing of the same in operation.

Sec. 5. Nothing in this contract shall be construed as in any way limiting the present or future jurisdiction of the Public Service Commission under the laws of the State of New York.

Sec. 6. The consent herein granted is subject to the jurisdiction of the United States of America over navigable streams and waters.

Sec. 7. The Company promises, covenants and agrees on its part and behalf to conform to

and abide by and perform all the terms, conditions and requirements in this contract fixed and contained.

PUBLIC NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT at the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held this day the following resolutions were adopted:

Whereas, The Bronx Traction Company has under date of November 24, 1911, made application to this Board for the grant of the right, privilege and franchise to construct, maintain and operate a double track street surface railway as an extension to its existing system upon and along Westchester Avenue from Westchester Square to Eastern Boulevard, Borough of the Bronx; and

Whereas, Section 172 of the Railroad Law and sections 72, 73 and 74 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapters 629 and 630 of the Laws of 1905, provide for the manner and procedure of making such grants; and

Whereas, In pursuance of such laws this Board adopted a resolution on November 29, 1911, fixing the date for public hearing thereon, as December 21, 1911, at which citizens were entitled to appear and be heard, and publication was had for at least fourteen (14) days in "The New York Press" and "The New York Times," newspapers designated by the Mayor, and in the City Record for ten (10) days immediately prior to the date of hearing, and the public hearing was duly held on such day, and

Whereas, This Board has made inquiry as to the money value of the franchise or right applied for and proposed to be granted to the Bronx Traction Company, and the adequacy of the compensation to be paid therefor; now, therefore, it is

Resolved, that the following form of the resolution for the grant of the franchise or right applied for by the Bronx Traction Company, containing the form of proposed contract for the grant of such franchise or right, be hereby introduced, and entered in the minutes of this Board, as follows, to wit:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby grants to the Bronx Traction Company the franchise or right fully set out and described in the following form of proposed contract for the grant thereof, embodying all of the terms and conditions, including the provisions as to rates, fares and charges, and subject to the terms and conditions in said proposed form of contract contained, and that the Mayor of The City of New York be and he hereby is authorized to execute and deliver such contract in the name and on behalf of The City of New York, as follows, to wit:

PROPOSED FORM OF CONTRACT.

This Contract, made this day of 1912, by and between The City of New York (hereinafter called the City), party of the first part, by the Mayor of said City, acting for and in the name of said City, under and in pursuance of the authority of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of said City (hereinafter called the Board), and the Bronx Traction Company (hereinafter called the Company), party of the second part, witnesseth:

In consideration of the mutual covenants and agreements herein contained, the parties hereto do hereby covenant and agree as follows:

Section 1. The City hereby grants to the Company, subject to the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth, the right and privilege to construct, maintain and operate a double track extension to its present street surface railway, with the necessary wires and equipment, for the purpose of conveying passengers only in the Borough of The Bronx, in The City of New York, upon the following route, to wit:

Beginning at and connecting with the existing double track railway of the Company at or near the intersection of West Farms road with Westchester avenue; thence in, upon and along Westchester avenue to its intersection with Eastern boulevard, and to cross such other streets and avenues, named and unnamed, as may be encountered in said route.

The said route with turnouts, switches and crossovers hereby authorized is shown upon a map entitled: "Map showing proposed extension of The Bronx Traction Company in the Borough of The Bronx, City of New York, to accompany petition dated November 24, 1911, to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment," and signed by Edward A. Maher, President, and T. F. Mullany, Chief Engineer; a copy of which is attached hereto, is to be deemed a part of this contract, and is to be substantially followed, provided that deviations therefrom and additional turnouts, switches and crossovers which are consistent with the foregoing description, and the other provisions of this contract may be permitted by resolution of the Board.

Sec. 2. The grant of this privilege is subject to the following conditions, which shall be complied with by the Company:

First—The consent in writing of the owners of half in value of the property bounded on said streets and avenues to the construction and operation of said railway shall be obtained by the Company within three (3) months from the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and a copy of such consents shall be filed with the Board within such time, or in the event that such consents cannot be obtained within such time, the Company shall within said three (3) months or within one (1) month thereafter, make application to the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court for the appointment of Commissioners in the manner provided by the Railroad Law to determine if said railway ought to be constructed; otherwise this grant shall cease and terminate.

Second—The said right to construct, maintain and operate said railway shall be held and enjoyed by the Company from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor, until January 19, 1936, with the privilege of renewal of said contract for the further period of twenty-five (25) years upon a fair revaluation of such right and privilege.

If the Company shall determine to exercise its privilege of renewal it shall make application to the Board, or any authority which shall be authorized by law to act for the City in place of the Board. Such application shall be made at any time not earlier than two (2) years and not later than one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract. The determination of the revaluation shall be sufficient if agreed to in writing by the Company and the Board, but in no case shall the annual rate of compensation to the City be fixed at a less amount than the sum required to be paid during the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract.

If the Company and the Board shall not reach such agreement on or before the day one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract, then the annual rate of compensation for such succeeding twenty-five (25) years shall be reasonable, and either the City (by the Board) or the Company shall be bound upon request of the other to enter into a written agreement with each other, fixing the rate of such compensation at such amount as shall be reasonable, but in no case shall the

annual rate so fixed be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, and if the parties shall not forthwith agree upon what is reasonable, then the parties shall enter into a written agreement fixing such annual rate and at such amount as shall be determined by three disinterested freeholders selected in the following manner:

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board; one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Company; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder, and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluation aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six (6) months prior to the expiration of this original contract, and their report shall be filed with the Board within three (3) months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations, without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine any of the books of the Company and its officers under oath. The valuations so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties, but no annual sum shall, in any event, be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year of the original term of this contract. If in any case the annual rate shall not be fixed prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, then the Company shall pay the annual rate theretofore prevailing until the new rate shall be determined, and shall then make up to the City the amount of any excess of the annual rate then determined over the previous annual rate. The compensation and expenses of the said appraisers shall be borne jointly by the City and the Company, each paying one-half thereof.

Third—The Company shall pay to the City for the privilege hereby granted the following sums of money:

(a) The sum of one thousand five hundred dollars (\$1,500) in cash within three (3) months after the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor and before anything is done in exercise of the privilege hereby granted.

(b) During the first term of five (5) years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than one thousand five hundred and fifty dollars (\$1,550), and which shall be equal to three (3) per cent. of its gross annual receipts if such percentage shall exceed the sum of one thousand five hundred and fifty dollars (\$1,550).

During the second term of five (5) years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than two thousand eight hundred dollars (\$2,800), and which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross annual receipts if such percentage shall exceed the sum of two thousand eight hundred dollars (\$2,800).

During the third term of five (5) years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than three thousand one hundred dollars (\$3,100), and which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross annual receipts if such percentage shall exceed the sum of three thousand one hundred dollars (\$3,100).

During the fourth term of five (5) years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than three thousand four hundred dollars (\$3,400), and which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross annual receipts if such percentage shall exceed the sum of three thousand four hundred dollars (\$3,400).

During the remaining term expiring January 19, 1936, an annual sum which shall in no case be less than three thousand seven hundred and fifty dollars (\$3,750), and which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross annual receipts if such percentage shall exceed the sum of three thousand seven hundred and fifty dollars (\$3,750).

The gross annual receipts mentioned above shall be that portion of the gross receipts of the Company as shall bear the same proportion to its whole gross receipts as the length of the extension hereby authorized shall bear to the entire length of the railway of the Company in operation within the limits of the City.

The annual charges shall commence from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

All annual charges as above shall be paid into the Treasury of the City on November 1 of each year and shall be for the amount due to September 30 next preceding, provided that the first annual payment shall be only for that proportion of the first annual charge as the time between the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor and September 30 following shall bear to the whole of one year.

Whenever the percentage required to be paid shall exceed the minimum amount as above, then such sum over and above such minimum shall be paid on or before November 1 in each year for the year ending September 30 next preceding.

The annual charges herein provided are intended to include the percentages of gross receipts now required to be paid by railway companies to the City, pursuant to the Railroad Law, as amended.

Any and all payments to be made by the terms of this contract to the City by the Company shall not be considered in any manner in the nature of a tax, but such payments shall be made in addition to any and all taxes of whatsoever kind or description, now or hereafter required to be paid by any ordinance of the City, or resolution of the Board, or any laws of the State of New York.

Fourth—The annual charges or payments shall continue throughout the whole term of this contract (whether original or renewal), notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other railway or railroad company providing for payment for railway or railroad rights or franchises at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sublease of the right or privileges hereby granted (whether original or renewal), or of any part thereof, or of any of the routes mentioned herein, or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of this contract; and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said conditions as to payments, anything in any statute or in the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof or otherwise exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this contract.

Fifth—Nothing in this contract shall be deemed to affect in any way the right of the City to grant to any individual or other corporation a similar right or privilege upon the same or other terms and conditions over the route hereinbefore described.

The use of the railway constructed by the Company under this contract, including the tracks, wires and other equipment or any structures used in connection therewith in streets and avenues hereinbefore described shall be permitted by the Company, to any individual or corporation to which the City may have granted, or may hereafter grant, the right or privilege to use such streets and avenues for street railway purposes, upon payment of an annual sum by such individual or corporation to the Company,

which shall equal the legal interest on such proportion of the actual cost of the construction of such railway and structures, and additions and betterments thereto, as the number of cars operated by such individual or corporation shall bear to the number of cars operated by the companies then using the same; and also such proportion of the cost of keeping the tracks and electrical equipment in repair, and the cost of additions and betterments thereto, such proportion of laying and repairing of pavement and removal of snow and ice and all other duties imposed upon the Company by the terms of this contract in connection with the maintenance or the operation of said railway as used, as the number of cars operated by such individual or corporation shall bear to the number of cars operated by the companies then using the same, together with the actual cost of the power necessary for the operation of the cars thereon of such individual or corporation. Provided, however, that if, in the opinion of the Company, the legal rate of interest upon the cost of such railway shall be an insufficient sum to be paid for the use of such tracks, it may appeal to the Board and the Board may fix a percentage upon the cost to be paid to the Company, at a sum in excess of the legal rate of interest, if, in its opinion, such action is justified. The Company shall not at any time oppose, but shall, upon the request of the Board, consent to the construction or operation of any street surface railway which may necessitate the use of any portion of the railway which shall be constructed by the Company pursuant to this contract.

Sixth—The rights and privileges hereby granted shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall the title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the Company, or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, evidenced by an instrument under seal anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in anywise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary any subsequent consent or consents.

Seventh—Upon the termination of this original contract, or if the same be renewed, then at the termination of the said renewal term, or upon the termination of the rights hereby granted for any cause, or upon the dissolution of the Company before such termination, the tracks and equipments of the Company constructed pursuant to this contract within the streets and avenues shall become the property of the City without cost, and the same may be used or disposed of by the City for any purpose whatsoever, or the same may be leased to any company or individual. If, however, at the termination of this contract as above, the Board shall so order by resolution, the Company shall, upon thirty (30) days' notice from the Board, remove any and all of its tracks and other equipment constructed pursuant to this contract and the said streets and avenues shall be restored to their original condition at the sole cost and expense of the Company.

Eighth—The Company shall commence construction of the railway herein authorized within three (3) months from the date upon which the consents of the property owners are filed with the Board or from the date of the order of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court made pursuant to section 174 of the Railroad Law confirming the determination of the Commissioners appointed thereunder, that such railway construction and place the same in full operation within three (3) months from the date of filing such consents or the date of such order; otherwise this right shall cease and determine, and all sums paid, or which may be deposited with the Comptroller of the City, as hereinafter provided, shall thereupon be forfeited to the City, provided that the period for commencement and the period for completion and placing the railway in full operation may be extended by the Board, but the total extension of time for either of such periods shall not exceed in the aggregate six (6) months; and provided, further, that when the commencement or completion of said construction shall be prevented by legal proceedings in any court or by works of public improvement, or from other causes not within control of the Company, the time for the commencement or completion of such construction may be extended for the period of such prevention, but no delay shall be allowed for unless the court proceedings shall be diligently prosecuted by the Company, and provided further, that in no case shall such delay be deemed to begin until the Company shall have given written notice to the Board of any such court proceedings or other occasion of delay, and deliver to the Board copies of any injunction or other orders, and the papers upon which the same shall have been granted, and unless upon the request of the Board the Company shall, in writing, consent that the Board either in its own name as a party, or in the name of the City as a party, may intervene in any such proceedings.

Ninth—Said railway shall be constructed and operated in the latest approved manner of street railway construction and operation, and it is hereby agreed that the Board may require the Company to improve or add to the railway equipment, including rolling stock and railway appliances, from time to time, as such additions and improvements are necessary, in the opinion of the Board. Upon failure on the part of the Company to comply with the direction of the Board within a reasonable time, the rights hereby granted shall cease and determine.

Tenth—Said railway shall be constructed, maintained and operated subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of the City, who have jurisdiction in such matters, as provided by the Charter of the City.

No construction upon said railway shall be commenced until written permits have been obtained from the proper City officials.

In any permits so issued such officials may also impose such conditions, as a condition of the granting of the same, as are necessary for the purpose of protecting any structures, in the streets and avenues, over which such officials have jurisdiction and the Company shall comply with such conditions.

The electrical equipment to be installed by the Company for the operation of the railway within the limits of the City, whether the same be upon streets and avenues or upon private property, shall be constructed and maintained under the supervision and control of the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

Eleventh—Said railway may be operated by overhead electric power substantially similar to the overhead electric system now in use by street surface railways in the Borough of the Bronx, or by any other motive power except locomotive steam power or horse power, which may be approved by the Board and consented to by the abutting property owners, in accordance with the provisions of law, and by the Public Service Commission for the First District of the State of New York.

Twelfth—Upon six (6) months' notice by the Board to the Company, all wires for the transmission of power, except trolley wires for the operation of the railway, upon all or any portion of the route hereby authorized, shall be placed in conduits beneath or alongside of the railway. The Company shall provide in such conduits two

(2) ducts not less than three (3) inches in diameter for the exclusive use of the City. Such ducts shall be used only by the Company for the operation of its railway and by the City, as above.

Thirteenth—The rate of fare for any passenger upon said railway shall not exceed five (5) cents, and the Company shall not charge any passenger more than five (5) cents for one continuous ride from any point on its road, or on any road, line or branch operated by it or under its control, to any other point thereof, or of any connecting branch thereof, within the limits of the City.

The Company shall carry free upon the railway hereby authorized during the term of this contract all members of the Police and Fire Department of the City, when such employees are in full uniform.

Fourteenth—No cars shall be operated upon the railway hereby authorized, other than passenger cars and cars necessary for the repair or maintenance of the railway, and no freight cars shall be operated upon the tracks of said railway.

Fifteenth—The Company shall attach to each car run over the said railway proper fenders and wheel guards, in conformity with such laws and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter, during the term of this contract, be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities, or as may be required by resolution of the Board.

Sixteenth—All cars which are operated on said railway shall be heated during the cold weather, in conformity with such laws and ordinances as are now in force, or may hereafter, during the term of this contract, be enacted or adopted by the State or City authorities, or as may be required by resolution of the Board.

Seventeenth—All cars operated on said railway shall be well lighted by electricity, or by some lighting system equally efficient, or as may be required by resolution of the Board.

Eighteenth—Cars on said railway shall run at intervals of not more than thirty (30) minutes, both day and night, and as much oftener as reasonable convenience of the public may require, or as may be directed by the Board.

Provided, however, that the Company during the first five (5) years of this contract shall not be required to operate its cars between the hours of one (1) o'clock a. m. and five (5) o'clock a. m., each day, unless the Board shall determine after a hearing held thereon that public convenience requires the operation of cars during said hours.

Nineteenth—The Company, so long as it shall continue to use any of the tracks upon the streets and avenues in which said railway shall be constructed, shall, if directed by the President of the Borough of the Bronx, cause to be watered at least three (3) times every twenty-four (24) hours when the temperature is above thirty-five (35) degrees Fahrenheit, the entire width of the streets and avenues, except when the width of such streets and avenues shall exceed sixty (60) feet between curb lines, in which case the Company shall cause to be watered only sixty (60) feet in width of such roadway, and the Company shall provide for such purpose at least one tank car, the capacity of which shall be sufficient to water such streets and avenues in a satisfactory manner.

Twentieth—The Company shall at all times keep the streets and avenues upon which the said railway is constructed, between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and for a distance of two (2) feet beyond the rails, on either side thereof, free and clear from ice and snow; provided, however, that the Company shall, at the option of the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, enter into an agreement for each winter season, or part thereof, to clean an equivalent amount of street surface from house line to house line.

Twenty-first—As long as said railway, or any portion thereof, remains in any street or avenue, the Company shall pave and keep in permanent repair that portion of the surface of the street or avenue in which the said railway is constructed, between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and for a distance of two (2) feet beyond the rails on either side thereof, under the supervision of the local authorities, whenever required by them to do so, and in such manner as they may prescribe. In case of the neglect of the Company to make pavement or repairs after the expiration of thirty (30) days' notice to do so from the President of the Borough of the Bronx, the President shall make the same at the expense of the Company. And the City shall have the right to change the material or character of the pavement of any street or avenue, and in that event the Company shall be bound to replace such pavement in the manner directed by the proper City official, at its own expense, and the provisions as to repairs herein contained shall apply to such renewed or altered pavement.

Twenty-second—Any alteration to the sewerage or drainage systems, or to any other substructure or to any surface structures in the streets, required on account of the construction or operation of the railway, shall be made at the sole cost of the Company, and in such manner as the proper City officials may prescribe.

Twenty-third—It is agreed that the right hereby granted to operate a street surface railway shall not be in preference or in hindrance to the public works of the City, and should the said railway in any way interfere with the construction of public works in the streets and avenues, whether the same is done by the City directly or by a contractor for the City, the Company shall, at its own expense, protect or move the tracks and appurtenances in the manner directed by the City officials having jurisdiction over such public work.

Twenty-fourth—Should the grades or lines of the streets and avenues in which the railway is hereby authorized be changed at any time after the railway has been constructed and during the term of this contract, the Company shall, at its own expense, change its tracks and appurtenances to conform with such new grades and lines, and during the construction of any public improvement upon said streets and avenues the Company shall take care of and protect the tracks and appurtenances at its own expense, all to be done subject to the direction of the City official having jurisdiction over the construction of such change.

Twenty-fifth—The Company shall submit to the Board a report not later than November 1, of each year for the year ending September 30 next preceding, and at any other time, upon request of the Board, which shall state:

1. The amount of stock issued, for cash, for property.
2. The amount paid in as by last report.
3. The total amount of capital stock paid in.
4. The funded debt by last report.
5. The total amount of funded debt.
6. The floating debt as by last report.
7. The total amount of floating debt.
8. The total amount of funded and floating debt.
9. The average rate per annum of interest on funded debt.
10. Statement of dividends paid during the year.
11. The total amount expended for same.
12. The names of the directors elected at the last meeting of the corporation held for such purpose.
13. Location, value and amount paid for real estate owned by the Company as by last report.
14. Location, value and amount paid for real estate now owned by the Company.
15. Number of passengers carried during the year.
16. Total receipts of Company for each class of business.

17. Amounts paid by the Company for damage to persons or property on account of construction and operation.

18. Total expenses for operation, including salaries.

—and such other information in regard to the business of the Company as may be required by the Board.

Twenty-sixth—The Company shall at all times keep accurate books of account of the gross receipts from all sources within the limits of the City, and shall, on or before November 1 of each year, make a verified report to the Comptroller of the City of the business done by the Company for the year ending September 30 next preceding in such form as he may prescribe. Such report shall contain a statement of such gross receipts, the total miles in operation within the limits of the City, and the miles of railway constructed and operated under this contract, and such other information as the Comptroller may require. The Comptroller shall have access to all books of the Company for the purpose of ascertaining the correctness of its report, and may examine its officers under oath.

Twenty-seventh—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained, or with any orders of the Board acting under the powers herein reserved, the franchise or consent herein granted may be forfeited by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel, on notice of ten (10) days to the Company, or at the option of the Board by resolution of said Board, which said resolution may contain a provision to the effect that the contract shall thereupon become the property of the City without proceedings at law or in equity. Provided, however, that such action by the Board shall not be taken until the Board shall give notice to the Company to appear before it on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why such resolution declaring the contract forfeited should not be adopted. In case the Company fails to appear, action may be taken by the Board forthwith.

Twenty-eighth—If the Company shall fail to give efficient public service at the rates herein fixed, or fail to maintain its structures and equipment as herein provided in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, the Board may give notice to the Company specifying any default on the part of the Company, and requiring the Company to remedy the same within a reasonable time; and upon failure of the Company to remedy such default within a reasonable time, the Company shall, for each day thereafter during which the default or defect remains, pay to the City the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250) as fixed or liquidated damages, or the Board, in case such structures or equipment which may affect the surface of the streets shall not be put in good condition within a reasonable time after notice by the Board as aforesaid shall have the right to make all needed repairs at the expense of the Company, in which case the Company shall pay to the City the amount of the cost of such repairs, with legal interest thereon, all of which sums may be deducted from the fund hereinafter provided for.

Twenty-ninth—The Company shall assume all liability to persons or property by reason of the construction or operation of the railway authorized by this contract, and it is a condition of this contract that the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property on account of the same, and the Company hereby agrees to repay to the City any damage which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or default of the Company.

Resolved, That, while the said sale is held under the supervision of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller is authorized to cause the sale to be advertised and to direct the sale thereof as financial officer of the City.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department, and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done. Plans and drawings of construction work may also be seen there.
