COMMITTEE REPORTS.

Mr. O'Keeffe, on behalf of the Conference Committee of Harlem Hospital, reported that at a meeting held at Harlem Hospital on January 15th they considered the reports of the Medical Board and recommended the promotion of J. A. Heitlinger and M. D. Touart as Assistant Visiting Physician, and the appointment of Milton Rosenbluth, Assistant Pathologist; Charles H. Sanford, Assistant Surgeon to Out Patients, Orthopaedics; M. J. Tobias and Samuel Malisoff, Assistant Physicians to Out Patients. Irving Wilson Voorhees as Assistant Surgeon to Out Patients, Department of Otolaryngology. The Committee also recommended the creation of the position of Orthopaedist to the Hospital and to the Out Patient Department, and to increase the number of internes from 12 to 24. After discussion, on motion, duly seconded and carried, this report was approved and the appointments made accordingly.

The Conference Committee further reported at the same meeting that they had reviewed the attendance of the men recommended for reappointment for 1917, and, having found the attendance very satisfactory, recommended reappointments, which were approved.

Mr. O'Keeffe further reported the insufficient supply of drugs and chemicals for the hospital and for the Pathological Department at Harlem. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this matter was referred to the General Medical Superintendent for report.

Mr. Robbins, on behalf of the Conference Committee, read a letter from the Medical Board of Harlem Hospital under date of Jan. 15 setting forth in detail the inadequate supply of drugs and chemicals required in the hospital and in the Pathological Department. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this matter was referred to the General Medical Superintendent for investigation and report.

The Conference Committee of Gouverneur Hospital recommended the appointment of the following: David Robbins, Assistant Surgeon to Out Patients, G. U.; Abraham Goldstein, Assistant Surgeon to Out Patients; W. Spielburg, Assistant Physician to Out Patients; W. Rosenberg, Assistant Surgeon to Out Patients, Ear, Nose and Throat Clinic; J. J. Cotter, Assistant Surgeon to Out Patients, Ear, Nose and Throat Clinic; E. Cook, Assistant Visiting Obstetrician in the place of Dr. Oastler. On motion, duly seconded and carried, the recommendations were approved and the appointments made accordingly.

Mr. Paulding reported that the attendance of the physicians and surgeons at Gouverneur Hospital recommended for reappointment had been reviewed, and, on behalf of the Conference Committee, recommended the reappointments for the year 1917, which were approved.

Mr. Paulding, on behalf of the Special Committee appointed to consider the subject relating to the services of surgeons and laryngologist at Gouverneur Hospital, reported that Dr. Brannan, Dr. Coakley and Dr. O'Hanlon were requested, as a Sub-Committee, to define what shall be considered proper cases to come under the control of the Laryngologist in order that a rule may be formulated to apply to all the hospitals of the department. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this report was approved.

Dr. Brannan reported that arrangements were made in each hospital of the department to provide for the after care of cases of poliomyelitis and presented an estimate of \$13,240 required during the year 1917 to provide the service and equipment for this work. After consideration, on motion, duly seconded and carried, it was

Resolved, To request the Comptroller to authorize this expenditure from an issue of special revenue bonds made by the Board of Aldermen on September 12, 1916, in the sum of \$25,000 for this purpose.

The President reported that he had considered the credentials of Perry Helmock, an applicant for appointment on the obstetrical service of Bellevue Hospital for six months from Jan. 1, 1917, and recommended his appointment, which was approved.

Reference was made to the desirability of giving Dr. Hirsch complete supervision of the X-Ray Department in the allied hospitals, as well as at Bellevue, with an appropriate title to be designated by the General Medical Superintendent. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this was approved.

Dr. Brannan referred to the great volumes of smoke emitted from the chimneys of the New York Edison Company at 38th st. and the East River. After discussion it was moved, seconded and carried to request the President to bring this matter to the attention of the Commissioner of the Department of Health.

Mr. Farley, Chairman of the Building

Committee, reported that it would be desirable to construct a bridge at Gouverneur Hospital from the hospital to the new building for the Out Patient Department. Before taking any action it was moved, seconded and carried to request the architects for an estimate of the cost of such a bridge.

Dr. Brannan referred to a letter dated Dec. 27 from the Superintendent of Training Schools to the Executive Committee of the Medical Board of Bellevue Hospital in regard to the great amount of time wasted on account of the delays on the part of surgeons in beginning operations on schedule time. After discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried to inform the Medical Board in each hospital of the department that the Trustees view such delays as an uncalled for hardship upon patients, to say nothing of the waste of the nurses' time, and to adopt a rule that not more than ten minutes' delay will be allowed to the surgeons in beginning their operations.

The President called attention to the great number of special diets among the patients at Bellevue, referred to in the same letter. After discussion it was moved, seconded and carried to defer action pending a report from the General Medical Superintendent of a conference with the Medical Board on the subject.

COMMUNICATIONS.

A communication was presented from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, dated Jan. 5, 1917, setting forth that that Board on Dec. 29, 1916, denied, without prejudice to further consideration when the necessity and urgency is established, all requests for corporate stock. In view of this report the Chairman of the Building Committee recommended that the Trustees renew their request in full, revised, in accordance with a conference with the architect, on account of the increased cost of building materials, amounting to about 40 per cent. since 1914, when the original request was made. Mr. Farley also presented a letter from the architect, dated Jan. 15, stating that the shell of pavilions F and G at the present time would cost about \$1,200,000, but that it could probably be reduced so as to keep it within the amount, \$1,000,000, by omitting the outside balconies, fire escapes and inside staircases. After discussion and consideration, on motion, duly seconded and carried, it was

Resolved, To request the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize an appropriation of corporate stock in the sum of \$2,192,500, made up in accordance with the following schedule:

First—Very Urgent—Equipment for new Out Patient Department of Gouverneur Hospital, \$17,500; construction of pavilions F and G, Bellevue, \$1,000,000; additional wing to Bellevue Training School, \$280,000.

Second—Urgent—Additional wing to Fordham Hospital, \$360,000.

Third—Necessary—Nurses' Residence at Gouverneur, \$210,000; enlarging Nurses' Residence at Harlem, \$45,000.

Fourth—Desirable—Power plant at Bellevue, \$280,000.

The minutes of the Executive Committee of the Medical Board for Dec. 27, 1916, were presented. On motion, duly seconded and carried, the resignations of David W. Mackenzie as Assistant Visiting Surgeon, Intern on the Urology, and of E. C. Cosby, Intern on the First Division, were accepted with regret. The report of the proposed examination for the house staff of the Fourth Division and the granting of diplomas to the men who have completed their service on the house staff, mentioned in the minutes, were approved. A communication from the General Superintendent of Training Schools in regard to making arrangements to begin operations on scheduled time was noted, and the Trustees adopted a rule that not more than ten minutes delay shall be allowed to any surgeon to begin operations. The subject of the Visiting Physicians and Surgeons regulating the diets of the patients every day was also considered. Both of these subjects were referred to the General Medical Superintendent for conference with that Board and for report to the Trustees.

The minutes of the Executive Committee of the Medical Board of Bellevue Hospital for Jan. 10, 1917, were also presented.

The appointments of Joseph E. Connelly and James P. Hennesy as Resident Physician and Resident Gynaecologist, respectively, on the Third Division, were approved. The resignation of Wm. M. Findley, a member of the house staff on the Fourth Division, was accepted.

The minutes of the Medical Board of Fordham Hospital for Jan. 12 were presented. The Conference Committee was requested to consider the reappointments; the need of a Resident Pathologist, as well as the report in regard to the crowded condition of the Out Patient Department and the hospital. The reorganization of the First Surgical Service to be placed in charge of a Director and

the appointment of Alexander Nicoll as Director were approved.

A letter, dated Jan. 10, was presented from Simon D. Ehrlich applying for the position of Anaesthetist to Gouverneur Hospital. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this was referred to the General Medical Superintendent for recommendation.

The Secretary reported that under date of Jan. 12 requests were addressed to the Board of Aldermen for permission to buy in the open market, without public letting, during 1917, fresh fruits and vegetables in the sum of \$12,000; butter and eggs, \$12,500; fish, \$10,000; coal, \$5,000. On motion, duly seconded and carried, these requests were approved.

The resolution adopted by the Board of Aldermen on Jan. 1, 1917, requesting the administrative heads of city departments to take notice of the editorial expression of public sentiment which appeared in the New York Sun was presented. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this communication was ordered placed on file.

It was moved, seconded and carried to adjourn to meet on Tuesday, Jan. 23, 1917.


