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### BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT.

BOARD OF ESTIMATE AND APPORTIONMENT—CITY OF NEW YORK,  
MAYOR'S OFFICE, CITY HALL,  
WEDNESDAY, December 13, 1882—11 o'clock A.M.

The Board met in pursuance of an adjournment.

Present—All the members, viz.:

Wm. R. Grace, the Mayor; Allan Campbell, the Comptroller; Wm. Sauer, the President of the Board of Aldermen; Thos. B. Astin, the President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments.

The minutes of the meeting held December 5, 1882, were read and approved.

The Chairman presented the following:

MAYOR'S OFFICE, December 12, 1882.

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

GENTLEMEN—In my last annual message to the Board of Aldermen I called attention particularly to the fact of how large a part of the annual appropriation was in reality in no respect subject to the control of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. This is notably the case with regard to the salaries paid by the city, \$5,581,019.91 of the entire sum appropriated for the current year being definitely fixed by law. This is one of the most important facts in the consideration of the condition of our civil service. In the message referred to I found occasion to say, "Under existing conditions, and so long as the present methods of appointment are permitted to control, I do not see how it is possible for the city to cut down its pay-rolls, for it is to the interest of political parties to keep them as large as possible; and our charter and the special laws relative to the city are peculiarly conducive to the attainment of party and other than of administrative successes. Under changed conditions, however, which should make ability, character and attainments the highest claims upon office, I feel satisfied that, excepting only policemen, firemen and school-teachers, the list of city employees might certainly be reduced one-third." Ever since the early spring I have made every effort to discover where reductions can be effected without detriment to the city and have prosecuted a very thorough inquiry into the condition of our civil service. I regret to say that the form in which the provisional estimates are sent in to us from the several departments in too many instances wholly fails to supply anything like adequate data to enable this Board to pass upon the correctness of the estimates without going to outside sources for information. I regret, also, that, according to the opinion of the Counsel to the Corporation, this Board has no power over the matter of salaries except such as follows incidentally upon the right to increase or reduce the aggregate amount asked for for this item by each department. I am satisfied, however, that this Board should not act without the fullest inquiry and without a knowledge of the facts much fuller than can be had from an examination of the budget, and I have therefore caused to be prepared by the Commissioners of Accounts an official tabulated statement of all salaries now paid by the city. According to the official reports in the CITY RECORD of 31st January, 1882, there were (and examination of the last pay-rolls shows that the same holds good at the present time) in the service of the city 5,981 persons, receiving salaries amounting to \$7,511,013.71, not including 3,151 persons employed by the Board of Education, with salaries aggregating \$2,718,257.92, and not including temporary clerks and day laborers. When those persons whose salaries are fixed by law are deducted, there only remain (and this does not include employees of the Board of Education) about 2,076 persons, of forty-five designations, over whose salaries, amounting to \$1,942,668, this Board has any control. While such is the case, and far the larger part of the expenditure required to be made, and more than a majority of the persons employed, hold their offices and receive their salaries under laws which leave us powerless to effect any remedy or reduction, we should not be held responsible, and it is next to impossible to bring anything like system into our civil service, which, from my personal experience, I am satisfied most urgently needs reforming. If the same office rules were applied in the service of the city, and its employees selected for like reasons as those which govern in a great business house, a very large proportion of our civil servants might be dispensed with. This can never be done, however, so long as more than one-half of the persons employed, and more than one-half the salaries paid, are beyond the control of the Board which has the duty of passing upon the annual budget, and while the remainder are employed for all sorts of reasons at all possible rates of wages, and while there exists absolutely no system by which they can be classified either as to the exact duties imposed upon them or the amounts of salaries paid. Among the 5,981 persons employed—exclusive of those under the Board of Education—there are 135 prevailing annual rates of pay, and among the 3,151 employees of the Educational Department there are 694 annual rates. This is hardly credible, and it must be admitted that, while the Departments which have the full or partial control of these matters make it possible for such a state of affairs to exist, we are practically powerless. Nevertheless it is our duty to know the exact distribution of this immense force and of the moneys disbursed among them more fully than it can be learned from the budget; and I have prepared tables showing, first, the designations of all officials, the number under each designation, the number of rates of pay prevailing in each designated class, and the aggregate of salaries paid to each class; second, the number of each designated class employed in each Department, and the number of such class in each Department at each prevailing rate. An examination of the first summarized statement will show, for example, that there are in the service of the city 356 clerks at 45 prevailing rates, receiving aggregate salaries of \$434,356; 137 clerks and assistant clerks of courts at 16 rates, receiving \$394,500; 63 chief clerks, secretaries, and special clerks at 16 rates, receiving \$173,690; 30 commissioners at 6 rates, receiving \$140,500; 249 inspectors at 19 rates, receiving \$271,468. The entire want of system is shown in the fact that among 54 messengers there prevail 20 rates of wages, among 34 rodmen and chainmen 10 rates, among 30 stenographers 5 rates, among 20 superintendents 12 rates, among 54 watchmen 15 rates, and among 60 engineers and stokers 21 rates. Among the principals and teachers of ward schools, numbering 2,842 persons, and receiving \$2,314,957.92, there prevail 544 rates of pay, and 116 janitors of day schools are paid at 91 rates. The whole list, however, is given below. Among the worst evils of such lack of system is the injustice which results from the inequality of the salaries paid by the different departments for the same services, and the impossibility of instituting a system of promotions for merit, and preventing the appointment in the first instance to the highest grade of places. While this lack of system is sanctioned in whole or in part by the condition of our laws, our duty is little more than ministerial, and the city cannot be relieved in the first instance without the aid of the Legislature. Nevertheless, the statements prepared by the Commissioners of Accounts, at my suggestion, should be printed in our minutes in order that we may have them before us for such action, in those cases which fall within our jurisdiction, as in our judgment may be for the best interests of the city.

The history of the Finance Department since the present Comptroller has been at its head shows, through the reductions which he has effected, how many more persons there may be in an office than may actually be required. I should favor the establishment, for the purposes of this Board, of equitable fixed rates for each class of employees—such, for example, as four rates among clerks to correspond with the rates prevailing in the great National Departments—and then allowing to each Department an aggregate sufficient to pay a certain number of employees of each designated class at each fixed rate, decreasing the whole number of persons from whom such allowance shall be made to a number varying from 20 to 30 per cent. less than the total number of such persons now employed

in each Department, with such exceptions as may be unavoidable, and excepting the Department of Education, and then requiring the Departments to get along with the money so appropriated. The result will be a decided gain to the city, both in the amount of money saved and in the condition of the civil service. I would also suggest that this Board memorialize the Legislature upon this subject and present the draft of such a measure as will afford the necessary relief.

The President of the Board of Aldermen presented the following:

Whereas, In making the estimates of the expenses of the office of the Clerk of the Board of Aldermen for 1883, the circumstance was overlooked that the number of members of the Board will be increased to twenty-four; that the labors of the clerks and other officers will be correspondingly increased, and that no increase either in the number or compensation of these officers has been provided for; be it therefore

Resolved, That in making a final estimate of the expenses of the City Government for the year 1883, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and is hereby respectfully requested to increase the amount of the appropriation for "Salaries—Clerks and Officers of the Board of Aldermen," from \$18,000 to \$20,000, and the President of this Board is hereby requested to urge a compliance with this request upon the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Which was laid over.

The President of the Board of Aldermen presented the following:

Whereas, The pressing necessity for the establishment of an hospital for the reception of sick and injured persons in the upper portion of this city must be obvious to all, when it is known that no place of this character exists north of Ninety-ninth street, near Tenth avenue, and as accidents and sicknesses are of frequent occurrence in said part of the city of so serious a nature as to render it extremely dangerous to the sufferers to transport them so long a distance before surgical or medical assistance can be secured, and as no appropriation has been made in the Provisional Estimate for the year 1883 for the establishment of such an institution; be it therefore

Resolved, That, in making the Final Estimate for 1883, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and it is hereby respectfully requested to include in the amounts to be expended under the direction of the Commissioners of the Department of Public Charities and Correction the sum of ten thousand dollars for the establishment of a reception hospital in the Twenty-third Ward, for sick and disabled persons, and that the President of this Board be and he is hereby requested to urge upon said Board of Estimate and Apportionment a compliance with this request.

Which was laid over.

The Comptroller moved that the Board proceed to the consideration of the Final Estimate for the year 1883.

Which was agreed to by the following vote:

Affirmative—The Mayor, Comptroller, President of the Board of Aldermen, and President of the Department of Taxes and Assessments—4.

Mrs. Lillie Devereux Blake appeared before the Board and made a statement relative to an appropriation for Matrons in the Station Houses.

The Chairman moved that Friday, December 15th, at 11 o'clock A. M., be fixed as a time to hear the Council of Political Reform relative to the Final Estimate for 1883.

Mr. S. S. Randell, representing the Local Improvement Association of the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, appeared before the Board, and made a statement relative to various appropriations for the annexed district.

Messrs. H. J. Ford, Alderman Wells, Judge Hall, William W. Niles, Judge Shannon, Mr. Edsall, and George W. Ditchett, appeared before the Board and made statements relative to roads, avenues, etc., in the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards.

Mr. George A. Miller, representing the Board of Officers of the Twenty-second Regiment, N. G. S. N. Y., appeared before the Board and presented the following:

To the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for the City and County of New York:

The undersigned, members of the Board of Officers of the Twenty-second Regiment of Infantry, National Guard, State of New York, respectfully represent as follows:

The said regiment occupies, for purposes of an armory, the premises known as numbers 111 to 131 West Fourteenth street, in the City of New York, which premises are leased for the regiment by the City and County of New York, and have been so leased for periods aggregating upwards of twenty years.

The building erected upon said premises was constructed by means of subscriptions raised by and among the then members of the regiment, in the year 1863, and without expense to the city. In consideration of the erection of this building by the regiment, the owners of the land rented the same to the city, for a long period of years, for a rental much less than would have been required if such had not been the fact.

The regimental and company organizations have always provided themselves with the funds necessary for the fitting up of the officers' and company rooms, and have frequently appropriated their own money for the purpose of making repairs to other portions of the building necessary to make it weather-tight and habitable.

The repairs made by or at the instance of the city, for many years past, have been wholly inadequate to keep the building in a condition fit for the military purposes for which it is leased.

Seven or eight years ago, a portion of the roof of said building, which covered a room therein which was used for the drilling of recruits, fell in and completely destroyed the said room, and that portion of the leasehold premises has remained and now is absolutely useless to the city and to the regiment.

The destruction of this room exposed to the weather the larger portion of the west side of the armory building, which is unprotected save by a thin board wall, and it has since been and still is very difficult, during cold weather, to keep the large drill-room in a condition comfortable or healthful.

The flooring of the large drill-room has heretofore been laid directly upon the ground (there being no cellar under the room), and, as a consequence, portions of the floor continually become unsound, rotten, and unfit for military purposes.

The inside of the walls and roof of the large drill-room has not been painted for at least ten years, and is now in a dingy, dirty, and unwholesome condition.

The water-closets in the building are unfit and inadequate for the proper accommodation of the members of the regiment, particularly on occasions when the regiment is garrisoned in the building.

The wash-room is also ridiculously unfit for the accommodation of the members of the regiment.

The undersigned therefore respectfully petition your Honorable Board to make special provision whereby the city shall cause to be repaired the said armory building, in the following particulars:

1. The construction of a room in place of the one destroyed, as heretofore described.
2. The laying of a new floor for the large drill-room, upon concrete or other appropriate substance.
3. The painting of the walls and roof of the large drill-room.
4. The construction and equipment of suitable water-closets and wash-rooms.

According to the estimates which we have been able to obtain, the whole cost of these repairs will not exceed the sum of six thousand dollars.
