The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,524, as follows, viz.: 2 public buildings, 610 tenement houses, 145 private dwellings, 80 other dwellings, 8 manufactories and workshops, 20 stores and warehouses, 43 stables, 1 market, 42 slaughter-houses, 1 slip, 7 fat-rendering establishments, 2 public sewers, 5 manure dumps, 1 oil works, 3 garbage dumps, 43 sunken and vacant lots, 2 soap factories, 1 head-cleaning establishment, 1 lime kiln, 1 dyeing establishment, 50 yards, courts, and areas, 54 cellars and basements, 109 waste pipes and drains, 156 privies and water-closets, 93 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 2 dangerous stairways, 4 cesspools, 2 piggeries, 2 smoky chimneys, 15 other nuisances, together with 24 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 525.

During the past week 78 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 75 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the port.

56 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 42 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 36 houses, 36 privy-vaults, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 27 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 26 houses, 26 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

2 cases of contagious disease were removed to hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

NOVEMBER 2, 1878.

There were 450 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, November 2, 1878, which is an increase of 2 as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 3 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1877. The actual mortality for the week ending October 26 was 448, which is 16.2 below the average for the corresponding week of the past 5 years, and represents an annual death-rate of 21.41 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,087,917.

There was an increase in the deaths during the past, compared with the preceding week, from measles of 2, scarlatina, 6; whooping-cough, 5; typhoid fever, 3; cerebro-spinal fever, 1; alcoholism, 3; rheumatism and gout, 1; pneumonia, 3; marasmus, tabes mesenterica, and scrofula, 5; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 8; meningitis and encephalitis, 7; diseases of the nervous system, 2; Bright's disease and nephritis, 2; cyanosis and atelectasis, 2; premature and pretermatural births, 2; deaths by suicide, 2; drowning, 4, and a decrease in the deaths from diphtheria of 5; croup, 2; malarial fevers 4; puerperal diseases, 3; diarrhoeal diseases, 2; inanition, 2; cancer, 1; phthisis pulmonalis, 2; bronchitis, 8; convulsions, 2; apoplexy, 1; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 2; enteritis, gastritis, and peritonitis, 3.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 83 were in institutions, 246 in tenement-houses, 105 in houses containing 3 families or less, 7 in hotels and boarding-houses, 8 in rivers, streets, boats, etc.; 7 were on the basement floor, 89 on the first, 116 on the second, 91 on the third, 46 on the fourth, 9 on the fifth. 447 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 3 non-residents. 58 were stated to be single, 111 married, 53 widowed, and the condition of 228 was not stated; these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

The disposition of 448 deaths and still-births, or 92.75 per cent. of the total number reported, was in the following 14 cemeteries: Bayside (Jewish), 9; Calvary (Roman Catholic), 200; City (pauper burial ground—undenominational), 54; Greenwood (undenominational), 42; Lutheran (undenominational), 58; Cypress Hills (undenominational), 13; Evergreen (undenominational), 31; Woodlawn (undenominational), 14; St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal), 6; Union (Methodist Protestant), 4; Holy Cross (Roman Catholic), 9; Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish), 2; St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic), 1; Washington (undenominational), 5.

NOVEMBER 9, 1878.

444 deaths were reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, November 9, 1878; this is a decrease of 6 compared with the preceding week, and 15 less than the number reported during the corresponding week of 1878, and was the lowest weekly mortality reported since the week ending June 8, 1878. The actual mortality for the week ending November 2 was 452, which is 7.2 below the average of the corresponding week of the past 5 years and represents an annual death-rate of 21.59 to the 1,000 inhabitants, the population estimated at 1,088,189.

The most noticeable decrease in the deaths during the week was from the following causes: Measles, 2; whooping cough, 4; typhoid fever, 5; cerebro-spinal fever, 1; diarrhoeal diseases, 4; alcoholism, 2; phthisis pulmonalis, 2; pneumonia, 1; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 2; enteritis, gastritis, and peritonitis, 1; cyanosis and atelectasis, 2; premature and pretermatural births, 5; suicide, 1; and drowning, 5; an increase took place in the deaths from scarlatina, 2; croup, 1; erysipelas, 3; malarial fevers, 2; puerperal diseases, 6; inanition, 3; cancer, 5; bronchitis, 4; diseases of the heart, 3; aneurism, 2; marasmus and scrofula, 1; diseases of the brain and nervous system, 1; and Bright's disease and nephritis, 2.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 79 were in institutions, 219 in tenement-houses, 132 in houses containing 3 families or less, 7 in hotels and boarding houses, 6 in rivers, streets, boats, etc. 8 were on the basement floor, 84 on the first, 142 on the second, 83 on the third, 34 on the fourth, 7 on the fifth. 441 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 3 non-residents. 59 were stated to be single, 119 married, 64 widowed, and the condition of 202 was not stated, these were children who had not attained a marriageable age.

SUPREME COURT.

In the matter of the application of the Department of Public Parks, for and on behalf of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York, relative to the opening of a certain road, avenue, or parkway, known as the Spuyten Duyvil Parkway, although not yet named by proper authority, and streets connecting same with Broadway, from the Spuyten Duyvil and Port Morris Railroad to Broadway, as the same is laid down and shown on the map filed by the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks in the office of the Register of the City and County of New York, on August 7, 1877.

PURSUANT TO THE STATUTES OF THE STATE of New York, in such case made and provided, the Department of Public Parks, for and in behalf of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of New York, hereby give notice that the Counsel to the Corporation of said City, will apply to the Supreme Court, in the First Judicial District of the State of New York, at a Special Term of said court, to be held in the County Court-house, in the City of New York, on the thirtieth day of November, A. D. 1878, at 11 o'clock in the forenoon of that day, or as soon thereafter as counsel can be heard thereon, for the appointment of Commissioners of Estimate and Assessment in the above-entitled matter.
