

Rule 16. While a member is speaking, no member shall entertain any private discourse or pass between him and the Chair.

Rule 29. No member shall leave the Chamber during the meeting of the Board without permission from the Presiding Officer.

Rule 35. A majority of each Committee shall be sufficient to agree upon a report when signed

by such majority.

Rule 36. The members of the Board shall not leave their places, on adjournment, until the

same shall have been duly announced.

Rule 37. No person shall be permitted on the floor of the Chamber of this Board, inside of the railing, nor within the room west of or adjoining the Clerk's office, other than members and ex-members of the Common Council, the Mayor, the heads of the several Departments of the City Government, and the reporters of the press, unless by written permission, obtained from a member of the Board, to be countersigned by the President; nor shall any such permission extend beyond the day for which it is given by the president of the Sourcest of Agree visibility. beyond the day for which it is given. It shall be the duty of the Sergeant-at-Arms rigidly to enforce this rule.



The 800 deaths represent a death-rate of 24.49, against 22.48 for the previous week and 23.05 for the corresponding week of 1890.

Contagious and infectious diseases show a marked increase, the number of cases reported of diphtheria, measles, scarlet fever and typhoid fever being respectively 149, 126, 175 and 27, against 120, 70, 157 and 28 for the previous week, a total of 477 against 375, and the greatest increase being in measles. Diphtheria showed an increase chiefly between Rivington and Fourteenth streets, Third avenue and Avenue B, between Twenty-sixth and Fortieth streets, West, above Eighty-sixth street, and in the lower part of the annexed district, varying little elsewhere. Measles increased chiefly between Fortieth and Eighty-sixth streets, from river to river, especially on the east side. Scarlet fever increased most markedly between Division and Rivington streets, east of the Bowery, between Rivington and Fourteenth streets, Third avenue and Avenue B, and above Eighty-sixth street, with slight changes elsewhere; 15 of the 27 cases of typhoid fever were above Fortieth street, and 8 of the remaining 12 below Fourteenth street.
