DEAR SIR—In compliance with your instructions I hand you herewith a report of the transactions of the Department of Sewers, Borough of Manhattan, for the quarter ending June 30, 1899.

In the schedule accompanying this report you will find a detailed statement showing the status of the several contracts under charge of this Department.

While no sewers have been officially accepted, yet 4,640 linear feet of sewer on contracts in progress have been turned in by the Engineers as built, together with the following receiving-basins, which have been finished:

Northwest corner of Ninetieth street and Lexington avenue.
North and south sides of Ninety-sixth street, between Riverside avenue and New York Central and Hudson River Railroad.

Northeast corners One Hundred and Fifty-first and One Hundred and Fifty-second streets and Eighth avenue.

Northeast corners of One Hundred and Fifty-third and One Hundred and Fifty-fourth streets and Eighth avenue.

Southeast corners of One Hundred and Fifty-fourth and One Hundred and Fifty-fifth streets and Eighth avenue.

The following sewers have been finished, but not officially accepted:

Sewers in One Hundred and Seventy-eighth street, between Amsterdam avenue and Kingsbridge road, with curves at Audubon, Eleventh and Wadsworth avenues.

Sewer in Fort Washington avenue, extending about 1,240 feet from Kingsbridge road.

Outlet sewer for Sewerage District No. 29, with sewers in Boulevard Lafayette, between summit south of One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street and summit north of One Hundred and Eighty-first street, and in One Hundred and Sixty-fifth street, between Boulevard Lafayette and Fort Washington avenue.

Sewer in Seventh avenue, west side, between One Hundred and Forty-second and One Hundred and Forty-third streets, etc.

Outlet sewer and overflow at One Hundred and Twenty-ninth street, North river, etc.

Receiving-basin on southwest corner of One Hundred and Twenty-second street and Eighth avenue.

The following are contracts for repairs to sewers and are to be paid from appropriations, for two of which, Eighty-first street at Amsterdam avenue, and Eleventh avenue, between Forty-first and Forty-second streets, bids have been received but the contracts not yet executed; while for Twelfth street, between Avenue A and First avenue; Twelfth and Thirteenth avenues, between Twenty-seventh and Thirtieth streets, etc.; One Hundred and Twenty-second street, between Pleasant and Second avenues, and Broad street, between Exchange place and Beaver street, plans are now in preparation.

For the present quarter it is gratifying to be able to report that the Department is in a condition to make contracts for and promptly execute all work petitioned for by citizens interested in improving their property, and works which appear necessary for the sanitary improvement of the city.

As may be seen by consulting the schedules presented, contracts have been awarded for a large number of sewers and receiving-basins; some have been executed, some are in progress and some are not yet commenced. Plans are ready or in course of preparation for many more, which will be let at an early date.

It will also be noted that many works of alteration and improvement to old sewers are projected, which are expected to result in great benefit to the sewerage districts affected.

The total length of sewers constructed in the Borough of The Bronx at the close of the quarter ending June 30, 1899, is 752,994.03 linear feet, or 142.613 miles, being divided as follows:

708,904.89 linear feet, or 134.262 miles, in the regular "Combined System," according to filed District Drainage Maps for the Twenty-third and Twenty-fourth Wards, west of the Bronx river, and 44,089.14 linear feet, or 8.35 miles, in the "Separate System," specially designed for the district east of the Bronx river (or Williamsbridge) previous to "Annexation."

18,568.51 linear feet, or 3.517 miles, of sewers were constructed during the quarter (exclusive of district east of Bronx river), being divided into 5,647.62 linear feet, or 1.07 miles, of brick sewer and 12,920.89 linear feet, or 2.447 miles, of pipe sewer.

The total number of receiving-basins (west of Bronx river) is 1,727, fifteen (15) having been constructed during the quarter.

195 linear feet, or 0.037 mile, of sewers, were constructed in the district east of the Bronx river (or Williamsbridge) during the quarter.

DEAR SIR—I submit herewith the operations of the Department of Sewers, Borough of Brooklyn, for the quarter ending June 30, 1899.

There have been constructed during the quarter 30,971.10 linear feet of pipe sewer and 1,625 linear feet of brick sewer, a total of 32,596.10 linear feet, or a linear mileage of 6.174 miles.

This construction has increased the total linear mileage of sewers built in the borough by 6.042 miles, as 132 mile records the reconstruction and alteration of a 66-inch sewer to an equivalent size of a 78-inch sewer, and does not increase the mileage laid.

The total mileage of sewers in the streets of the borough at the end of this quarter reaches a total of 623,532 miles.

The receiving-basins connected with this system at this time number 7,417. The number built during the quarter, 12.

The number of contracts in force during the quarter is 39.

New contracts have been entered into to the number of 14, and of these 13 have been by private contract, the same to be built in accordance with the sewerage plans and under the supervision of the Department, the cost of same borne by individuals.

13 contracts have been completed during the quarter, 10 of which were built by private contract.

10 contracts have been completed in construction, but are held in compliance with the retained percentage clause of the contracts, relating to any necessary repairs to roadways.

There are 11 contracts in course of construction and fulfillment, 1 in litigation, while 4 have not been begun in construction.

The report of the Chief Engineer and the Superintendent of Sewers give in detail the work performed in the construction of sewers and the maintenance of the sewerage system.

"During the last quarter the following amount of materials have been used at this branch of the Department of Sewers of the Borough of Queens:

"We have pumped 12,238,119 gallons of sewage and chemically treated same.
 "We have removed about 2,000 tons of sludge.
 "The large increase of solids over last year is due to the increase of house connections and the early arrival of cottagers here this year.
 "The decrease in the pumping is due to the recent drought. We have chlorinated three times during June and will be compelled to chlorinate once a week during the season. Same will require all time of laborers assigned here, leaving no time to attend to flushing or cleaning.

"(Signed) JOHN F. CRONIN, Superintendent."

The Engineer further reports as follows:

"During the last three months a complete survey of the sewerage system of Flushing, together with a detailed survey of the Myrtle avenue system, comprising watershed, size, area, rate of fall of the existing sewers, and plans for the correction of existing difficulties.

"Six hundred feet of 12-inch pipe have been laid in Metropolitan avenue.
 "Plans have been filed for private sewers in Crescent street, Trowbridge street and Grove street.

"The plans and specifications of the sewers in High street, Twenty-first street and Fifth avenue, as approved by the Board of Public Improvements, are now in readiness for the awarding of contracts, and the work will be started as soon as said contracts are awarded.

"Profiles have been made of Halsey street, Franklin street, Academy street, Hulse street and Van Alst avenue with the view of determining the most feasible method of laying a sewer in said streets."
