

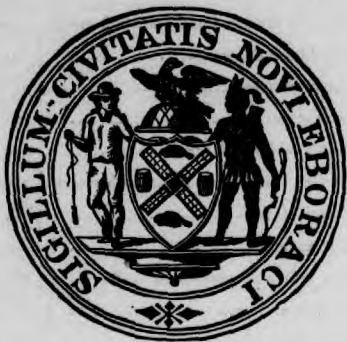

I would ask at the same time for authority to procure, by purchase, such materials as sod-ting, Telford foundation stone, macadam stone, drain-pipes, cast-iron gratings, etc., that may be necessary for the work, the value of which is to be under five thousand dollars (\$5,000).
