## DEPARTMENT OF PARKS.

### REPORT FOR THE QUARTER ENDING JUNE 30, 1908, BOROUGHS OF BROOKLYN AND QUEENS.

Department of Parks, Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, Litchfield Mansion, Prospect Park, Brooklyn, July 1, 1908.

Statement of Work Performed by the Department of Parks of the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens, during the Three Months from April 1 to June 30, 1908.

During the quarter ending June 30 the efforts of the Department were mainly directed toward getting all the parks and parkways in the system in good condition for the summer season. In addition, many improvements of a permanent character were made. Trees, shrubbery and flowers were planted, new asphalt tile walks were laid in several parks, and the roads in Prospect and other parks and parkways were repaired.

## Prospect Park.

Prospect Park, the principal park in the system, was completely overhauled, the trees and shrubbery cleaned, repairs to the roadways and drives made, buildings were repaired and other work of a similar character performed.

The croquet shelter was enlarged, and new brick gutters on concrete foundation were constructed along the West Drive from a point near the Litchfield Mansion to the Main Entrance. Over six thousand (6,000) flowering plants and shrubs, twelve hundred (1,200) evergreens and sixteen hundred (1,600) azaleas of different varieties were planted. One hundred thousand (100,000) feet of sod were laid. The work of resowing the worn spots on the lawns and around the plantations was continued, and as a result it is now in excellent condition.

## Forest Park.

Forest Park had its roads resurfaced and rolled, the gutters cleaned, and the golf course was thoroughly repaired and put in good condition. The greenhouses in this park furnished the major part of the flowering plants, etc., set out in the small parks and in Prospect Park during the spring and early summer season.

## Highland Park.

A large amount of regrading and resowing was done in this park. The flower garden received a number of fine new plants and is in a flourishing condition. All the roadways were repaired and resurfaced, and the one leading from the park proper to Jamaica avenue was practically rebuilt.

## Fort Greene Park.

A large portion of this park, particularly that part fronting on Myrtle avenue, is in the hands of the contractor who is erecting the Prison Ship Martyrs' Monument and its appurtenances. This work is unfinished, and as a result very little could be done on this portion of the park. The remainder has been kept in good condition. Borders were hedged, and considerable sodding, seeding and other work was performed throughout the park.

## Sunset Park.

The grounds around the new shelter were graded, sodded and seeded. The territory adjoining the newly laid tile walks was treated in a similar manner, the edges being sodded and the larger areas seeded down. A contract has been awarded for the construction of the boundary wall on Forty-fourth street and Seventh avenue and part of Fifth avenue. When this is completed the park will be planted and placed in a finished condition.

## Seaside Park.

Seaside Park, at Coney Island, received a thorough overhauling. New flower beds were laid out, the walks were paved with asphalt tile pavement, and the plantations adjoining the walks were resown, sodded and seeded.

Irving Square, Saratoga Square, Bushwick, Cooper, Bedford and Fulton Parks had their interior walks remodeled and paved with asphalt tiles. The lawns bordering these walks were reshaped, covered with topsoil, the edges sodded and the remainder seeded.

## Winthrop Park.

Winthrop Park is now in course of transformation by having its interior walks paved with tiles. About six thousand (6,000) cubic yards of topsoil have been spread in this park preparatory to the laying of the new walks.

The remaining small parks have been carefully looked after and all of them are in good condition.

## Athletics on Parade Ground.

The parade ground was opened early in April, and devotees of baseball, cricket and other sports were afforded an opportunity to indulge in their favorite pastime. The tennis grounds were formally opened on Decoration Day and since then have been largely used. The space allowed for that sport has been somewhat enlarged, and there has been a vast increase in the number of players.

## Music in the Parks.

The first concert of the season was given on Sunday, May 31. The following Sunday the United German Singers of Brooklyn, numbering over five hundred (500), gave an excellent concert, which was attended by a crowd variously estimated as between twenty-five thousand (25,000) and thirty-five thousand (35,000) people. Concerts will be given every Saturday and Sunday until the middle of October in Prospect Park, and in several of the small parks every Sunday until the middle of September. Owing to the location of Highland Park and its popularity the concert season was started in June.

Altogether forty (40) concerts are to be given in Prospect Park and fifty-two (52) in the smaller parks.

The trees in all the parks and on the parkways were pruned, cleaned and sprayed. All the dead trees were removed and new ones planted instead. Much attention was given to this work, and as a result the parks were singularly free from the insect pests that visited other sections.

## Parkways.

Ocean Parkway was thoroughly overhauled. Repairs to the traffic road were made wherever necessary, the cycle path was partly resurfaced with limestone screenings, the trees were cleaned, the grass borders cut, partly resodded, and the main road repaired where necessary.

Eastern parkway received similar treatment. Large portions of the main drive were recovered with gravel and rolled. The promenades were resurfaced with limestone screenings, the trees were cleaned and the grass borders put in good condition. A large portion of the Eastern Parkway Extension was resurfaced with limestone screenings and limestone, and the asphalt portions were repaired and partly resurfaced.

Glenmore avenue was thoroughly repaired and put in good condition. The remainder of the streets in the Twenty-sixth Ward of the Borough of Brooklyn under the care of this Department, paved with asphalt, were repaired and cleaned.

Bay Parkway—The work of resurfacing this parkway with limestone and Hudson River gravel has been started, and it is expected that it will be finished by August 1. The Shore road has been overhauled and repaired where necessary. Sections of the same were resurfaced with trap rock and screenings.

Fort Hamilton Avenue—The pavement of this parkway is the poorest of any under the jurisdiction of the Department. Money for the repaving of this thoroughfare has been asked for on several occasions, but no funds have been provided. It is impossible to keep it in a satisfactory condition, although constant repairs to the macadam are being made. Owing to the building operations in this section the macadam pavement which was laid about ten years ago is inadequate to take care of the exceedingly heavy traffic.

## Care of Trees in City Streets.

The work of caring for the trees in the city streets has been continued with vigor. In consequence of the siege of the Tussack moth the elm leaf beetle and other destructive insects the efforts of the Department were in the main directed to combat the same. Shortly after the care and preservation of the trees on all the city streets were placed under the control of this Department, and an approximate estimate was made of the cost of cleaning and pruning the trees in the two boroughs, a request was made to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for a sum sufficient to begin the treatment of the trees in a systematic manner. The amounts allowed from time to time have not been adequate to properly protect and treat the street trees. A scheme of treatment was evolved which had for its primary object the preservation of the trees in and surrounding the larger parks in the Borough of Brooklyn. A systematic treatment was accorded to the sections immediately adjoining Prospect, Fort Greene and a few of the other parks. The trees in these areas were cleaned of all insects, eggs masses, and the dead wood removed and carried away. The spring and early summer seasons, however, demonstrated that the force available for the purpose of looking after the trees was entirely too small. Both horizons were overrun with enormous

masses of insects. Some species that have not appeared in the city for forty years were prevalent this year, and the Department, in order to preserve the good work which had been previously done, was compelled to increase its force of employees. In spite of this increase and the most earnest efforts it was impossible to prevent the ravages of the Tussock moth and elm leaf beetle to any great extent.

Early in the spring the work of pruning the trees was started and continued as long as it was practical to do so. Then the spraying began. An idea of the magnitude of the work done is shown by the following figures:

#### Revenue from Parks and Parkways.

During the three months from April 1 to June 30, 1908, inclusive, the sum of five thousand two hundred and eleven dollars and fifty-eight cents (\$5,211.58) was received from rents of houses, revenue from park privileges and bay window permits, which amount was turned over to the Hon. James J. Martin, City Chamberlain, for deposit to the credit of the "Revenue Fund."

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therin, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and to its all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereto, or clerk thereto, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a surety or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be enclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either enclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.
