From the Board of Estimate and Apportionment—Assistant Secretary transmits copy of resolution adopted by the Board, which reads as follows:

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, in accordance with the provisions of section 56 of the Greater New York Charter, hereby recommends to the Board of Aldermen the establishment of the position of Wheelwright in all City Departments, in addition to those already existing therein, with wages at the rate of four dollars (\$4) per diem.

From the Municipal Civil Service Commission—Asking that copies of all payrolls of the Department of Correction, as of March 1, 1910, except those of Laborers, be sent to the Civil Service Commission. Copies of payrolls sent as requested.

From the Municipal Civil Service Commission—Communication received from Municipal Civil Service Commission, stating, in effect, that: (1) No voucher for expert services, coming under provisions of paragraph 6, Rule XII., will be certified unless such employment has been authorized by the Civil Service Commission. (2) Emergency appointments made under paragraph 4 of Rule XII., must be reported to the Commission with the least possible delay. (3) Special services rendered under contract (not strictly under provisions of Rule XII.) must be reported within five (5) days after commencement of employment. Communication acknowledged and referred to Secretary.

From the Comptroller—Returning the following proposals, with approval of the sureties: Julius Braunstein, for plumbing repairs at City prison, Manhattan; Edward G. Shepard, supplies; Peter J. Constant, leather. Awards to be made and contracts drawn.

From the Comptroller—Returning proposal of Cavanagh Brothers for supplies for manufacturing purposes, for substitution of sureties. Substitution approved.

From the Comptroller (Division of Inspection)—Referring to claim of Department of Correction for 15 dozen push brooms furnished to President, Borough of Richmond, at \$6.19 per dozen, and stating that no brooms are listed in Department catalogue at that price. Referred to Warden of Penitentiary for investigation and report.

Warden's Report—Brooms, per dozen, \$5.60; reinforced scrapers, 59 cents per dozen; total, \$6.19. Copy sent to Comptroller. In future, catalogue number will be put on all articles in invoices.

From the Comptroller (Division of Inspection)—Requesting information regarding towels used in Department; rate paid for each towel, of what do “accessories” consist, are towels owned by the Department, or not, etc.? Materials for all towels used in Department of Correction is purchased from State Prisons, where manufactured, as required by law. Towels are hemmed and laundered by Department (prison) labor.

From the Comptroller (Audit)—Asking if expenditure covered by vouchers for \$923.75 in favor of the Troy Laundry Company for sterilizer, etc., represents a complete job, or if other expense will be incurred for this work at laundry of City Prison, Manhattan. Comptroller informed that voucher is for a complete job, and no further expense will be incurred.

From the Comptroller (Audit)—In answer to letter from Department of Correction, explaining why trap rock used on Harts Island was charged to “Special Fund, S. 12” as created in accordance with section 7, chapter 173, Laws of 1905, Comptroller states that resolution of Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorizing the expenditure of \$100,000 for “Dormitories,” does not seem to include use of trap rock. This rock was used in constructing new subway leading from boiler house to new dormitory. This subway was left out of contract because it could be built by Department labor, at a saving to the City. The money was not used for “repairs or replacements,” so it could not be charged to that appropriation.

From the Comptroller (Audit)—Stating that a voucher for \$344.06, in favor of Joseph Bauer, for plumbing work at City Prison, Brooklyn, had been received, and asking for the written order, by authority of which the said work was performed. Referred to Department Inspector, who reports that main sewer became choked up, and sewage overflowed in prison cells and corridors during the night. Plumber was called in at once to repair damage and to flush out corridors and cells. Being an emergency job, and ordered and work done at night, no written order was given. Copy of Inspector's report sent to Comptroller.

From the Comptroller (Real Estate)—Comptroller requests further information in regard to renewal of lease of stable building, No. 516 East Twentieth street, what rent is paid, and is same considered just and reasonable? Rent paid, \$1,200 per annum. A three-story building; rent considered just and reasonable.

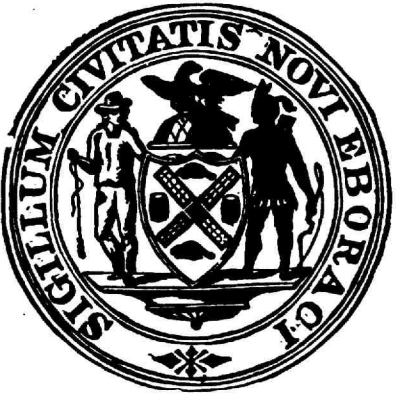

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and that the bidder or estimator is not in collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath of the bidder or estimator, or by the oath of the person or persons making the estimate, making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.
