



STR—There were 758 deaths reported to have occurred in this city during the week ending Saturday, March 20, 1886, which is a decrease of 18, as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 58 more than were reported during the corresponding week of the year 1885. The actual mortality for the week ending March 13, 1886, was 768, which is 52.6 above the average for the corresponding week for the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 27.99 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,426,501.

## AQUEDUCT COMMISSION.

Minutes of Stated Meeting of the Aqueduct Commissioners, held at their office, No. 209 Stewart Building, on Wednesday, March 17, 1886.

The Commissioners assembled at 2 o'clock P. M., to meet the Civil Engineers appointed at the meeting of the 6th instant, to investigate the charges pending against the efficiency of the Chief Engineer of the Commission, and the character of the work on the New Aqueduct.

Commissioners present—The Comptroller, Commissioner of Public Works, Commissioners Spencer, Dowd and Baldwin; and Engineers Newton, Greene and Gilmore.

The Commissioners held a conference with the Engineers as to the mode of procedure to be followed in making their investigation, and it was decided to leave the matter entirely to the discretion of the said Engineers, with full power in the premises.

At 3 o'clock the regular order of business was taken up, and pending the arrival of the Mayor, Vice-President Dowd presided.

The minutes of the stated meeting of March 10, were read and approved.

The Committee of Finance and Audit reported their examination and audit of bills included in Vouchers 1572 to 1589, which vouchers, on motion of Commissioner Baldwin, were approved and ordered certified to the Comptroller for payment.

The Committee also reported their direction to the Purveyor to sell one of the horses at the stable of the Engineers' headquarters at Tarrytown, the horse being no longer serviceable for the work.

The Committee on Construction made the following report:

NEW YORK, March 13, 1886.

To the Aqueduct Commissioners:

Agreeably to your direction at your meeting of Wednesday, March 10, the Committee on Construction report that it has selected and appointed Arthur Beattie and John Surrigan, as Laborers, and ordered them to report to Division Engineer Watkins for duty on the Sixth Division, on Monday, March 15, 1886.

On motion of Commissioner Baldwin, the above action of the Committee was approved by the Commissioners, and the persons therein named ordered placed upon the pay-roll of Division 6, from the date of their commencement of work.

The Comptroller gave notice under date of March 13, of the issue of warrants for vouchers not approved by the Aqueduct Commissioners, and appertaining to the work of the Commissioners of Appraisal for

—which notice was ordered placed upon file and entered upon the books of this Commission.

The Secretary submitted an opinion from the Counsel to the Corporation, in relation to the removal of an air-box on Section 2 at Croton Dam, referred to in the report of the Committee on Construction, and laid over at the meeting of the Commissioners on January 28, to await the receipt of this opinion. The opinion was read and ordered placed upon file, further action in the premises by the Commissioners being unnecessary.

The Secretary presented the application of Mr. J. C. Lulley for the position of Auditor of this Commission. Which was read and laid over.

The Commission of Engineers requested that the Aqueduct Commissioners would authorize the Secretary to prepare and present to said engineers, detailed specifications of the charges which they are to investigate, with a list of the witnesses for each specification, and that all records relating to the investigation be laid before them.

On motion of the Comptroller, the Secretary was directed to prepare the specifications and list asked for, and to lay before the said engineers all records relating to or connected with the subject of said charges.

(The Mayor then appeared and thereafter presided).

Commissioner Spencer moved the reconsideration of the resolution adopted March 6, appointing the Engineers to make certain investigations. Which motion was adopted.

Commissioner Spencer then offered the following resolution, which was unanimously adopted: "Resolved, That Messrs. John Newton, George S. Greene and O. A. Gilmore, Civil Engineers, are hereby appointed to investigate the charges made against the efficiency of the Chief Engineer of this Commission, and of imperfect work in the construction of the New Aqueduct, with full power to send for persons and papers, and to make their examination thorough and complete so far as the same relates to the engineering and construction of the work in question, and report to the Aqueduct Commissioners."

Commissioner Baldwin then offered the following resolution:

"Resolved, That the Board of Engineers be requested, when the charges have been submitted, to hear all necessary statements, and make all necessary examination of the work in person at the earliest time practicable, leaving to them all the details as to the manner of conducting the said examination." The resolution was adopted unanimously.

Commissioner Spencer moved that the Secretary be authorized to employ a Stenographer to report the testimony to be taken before the Commission of Engineers, investigating the charges against the Chief Engineer and the work upon the New Aqueduct. Which motion was adopted unanimously.

The Commissioners then adjourned.

## HARLEM RIVER BRIDGE COMMISSION.

The grade of the bridge will be at least 14½ feet above mean high water, and its clear passage width 80 feet.
