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POLICE DEPARTMENT.

Report for Quarter ending June 30, 1901.

Hon. ROBERT A. VAN WYCK, Mayor, New York City:

SIR—Pursuant to section 1544, chapter 376, Laws of 1897, the Police Commissioner of the Police Department of The City of New York hereby submits the following report of the operations and transactions of the Police Department and Force for the three months ending June 30, 1901.

REPORT.

On the 30th day of June, 1901, the number of the Force, of all grades (including those on probation), was 7,519.

SICK TIME.

The time lost by members of the Force by reason of sickness, disability and injuries received, for the quarter, and the details thereof, will be found in schedule annexed, marked "A," from which it will be seen that the sick time lost was 18,204 days. Sick time paid, 9,102 days; sick time unpaid, 9,102 days. Total days' time of the Force was 664,877 days. Per cent. of sick to full time, 2.74; for preceding quarter, 3.93.

ARRESTS.

The total number of persons arrested by the Police Force during the quarter was: Males, 28,240; females, 6,976. Total, 35,216. Number arrested for principal felonies, 2,708; number discharged without trial, 752; number acquitted, 435; number convicted, 482; number sent to other authorities, 52; number died, 3; number pending, 984.

LOST CHILDREN (see Schedule "B").

Males, 707; females, 298. Total, 1,005. Restored to parents or guardians, 988; other dispositions, 17. Of this number there were disposed of from Central Office, 706.

Schedule "B" contains a valuable collection of miscellaneous statistics, to which attention is respectfully called.

NOTE.—The discrepancy existing between the number of arrests for particular offenses in Felony Report and General Report (in Schedule "B") is accounted for by the fact that the General Report is made up from the Daily Returns from the Station-houses and the Felony Report is made from the Quarterly Returns. An offense charged in the Station-house at the time of the arrest is liable to be, and often is, changed to a greater or less offense on evidence elicited before the Magistrate.

The value of lost and stolen property recovered and returned to owners and other transactions of the Property Clerk's office will be found in schedule annexed, marked "E."

DISCIPLINE OF THE FORCE.

The number of officers dismissed the Force was 12.

The number of charges made against members of the Force and filed in the office of the Chief Clerk during the quarter was: April, 218; May, 192; June, 154. Total, 564.

The following is the number of charges disposed of during the quarter: Charges on which officers were dismissed, 13; fines, 421; reprimands, 41; complaints dismissed and withdrawn, 178. Total, 653.

"There has been some question about the right of the present Board to make a Budget for the incoming administration and I would like Mr. Levey to read the last sentence of the Act under which we made the Budget for the year 1902.

Mr. Levey reads as follows :

Act Enacting New Charter—Section 5.

And provided, further, that the board of estimate and apportionment as now constituted and the municipal assembly of the city of New York shall during the year nineteen hundred and one make appropriations for the year nineteen hundred and two, so far as practicable, as though this act had fully taken effect at the time of preparing the annual budget for the year nineteen hundred and two.

The Mayor—"I see a criticism that we made some transfers of employees for the purpose of protecting those now in offices and Departments. I would like Mr. Levey to read that section that refers to the transfer of employees in Departments.

Mr. Levey reads :

New Charter—Section 1543.

Wherever in any department or institution an office, position or employment is abolished, or made unnecessary through the operation of this act, or in any other manner, or whenever the number of offices, positions or employments of a certain character is reduced, the person or persons legally holding the office or filling the position or employment thus abolished or made unnecessary shall be deemed to be suspended without pay, and shall be entitled to reinstatement in the same office, position or employment, or in any corresponding or similar office, position or employment, if within one year thereafter there is need for his or their services. Whenever such offices, positions or employments are abolished or made unnecessary, it shall be the duty of the head of the department or institution to furnish the names of the person or persons affected to the municipal civil service commission, with a statement in the case of each of the date of his original appointment in the service. It shall be the duty of the municipal civil service commission forthwith to place the names of said persons upon a list of suspended employees for the office, or position or for the class of work in which they have been employed, or for any corresponding or similar office, position or class of work, and to certify the said persons for reinstatement, in the order of their original appointment, before making certifications from any other list.

The Mayor—"That section specifically provides for the protection of employees in Departments that have been abolished. Employees in Departments that have not been abolished are protected by the State and Civil Service Law."

The General School Fund for the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx is more than sufficient for its purposes, and it is therefore recommended that a transfer be made therefrom. The following resolution is therefore submitted for adoption :

Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and it is hereby respectfully requested to transfer from the General School Fund for the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx for the current year, which fund is in excess of its requirements, the sum of ten thousand

dollars (\$10,000) to the General School Fund for the Borough of Queens for the same year, which fund is insufficient for the purposes thereof.

Hon. MILES M. O'BRIEN, President, Board of Education:

DEAR SIR—I have received your communication dated March 19, 1901, of which the following is a copy:

"The General School Fund for the year 1900 for the Borough of Queens is insufficient for its purposes, liabilities for Teachers' salaries still existing to the extent of about \$600.

"It is undoubtedly a fact that the General School Funds of other boroughs for the same year are in excess of their requirements, and that School Boards having the administration of said General School Funds would not, I believe, object to relinquishing a small part of their surplus.

"Will you kindly state whether there is any legal objection to a transfer of any part of the surplus of the General School Fund of one borough to meet a deficiency in the General School Fund of another borough, provided (1) that the School Board approves; (2) that the transfer is of funds of same fiscal year; (3) that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment approves.

"Transfers of General School Fund moneys from one borough to another are practically without precedent in the annals of this Board, except that when the first apportionment was made (in 1898) Judge Gaynor approved the transfer of considerable sums from Brooklyn to Queens and Richmond, the School Board of Brooklyn consenting thereto."

Section 1060 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by chapter 751 of the Laws of 1900, commonly known as the Davis Law, among other things, provides as follows:

"The general school fund shall consist of all moneys raised for the payment of salaries of the borough and associate superintendents and all members of the supervising and teaching staff throughout all boroughs, in conformity with section 1091 of this act. The special school fund shall contain and embrace all moneys raised for educational purposes not comprised in the general school fund. It shall be the duty of the board of estimate and apportionment and of the municipal assembly to indicate in the budget in raising the special school fund the respective amounts thereof which shall be available for use in the territory within the jurisdiction of each of the school boards. The general school fund shall be raised in bulk, and for the city at large, and shall be apportioned to the several boroughs by the board of education as hereinafter provided."

Section 1065 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended by the law aforesaid, among other things, provides as follows:

"The general school fund shall be administered by the respective school boards, and in the month of December in each year shall be apportioned for the next succeeding calendar year by the Board of Education among the different school boards of the city as follows:"

In my opinion there is no legal objection to the transfer of any part of the surplus of the General School Fund of one borough to meet the deficiency in the General School Fund of another borough, provided (1) that the School Board approves; (2) that the transfer is of funds of the same fiscal year, and (3) that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment approves.

SIR—I have received a communication from Deputy Comptroller Levey dated October 11, 1901, marked "Executive" L., E. J. L., of which the following is a copy:

"I transmit herewith a certified copy of a resolution adopted by the Board of Education on October 9, 1901, requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to transfer \$10,000 from the General School Fund for the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx for the current year, to the General School Fund of the Borough of Queens for the current year."

"Please advise the Comptroller whether such a transfer can lawfully be made."

The resolution of the Board of Education reads as follows:

"To the Board of Education:

"The Committee on Finance respectfully reports that the moneys provided for the General School Fund for the Borough of Queens for the current year are insufficient for their purposes, and it is deemed expedient that additional moneys should be transferred to the control of said borough, in order that the schools may not suffer.

"The General School Fund for the Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx is more than sufficient for its purposes, and it is therefore recommended that a transfer be made therefrom. The following resolution is therefore submitted for adoption:

"Resolved, That the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and it is hereby respectfully requested to transfer from the General School Fund for the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx for the current year, which fund is in excess of its requirements, the sum of ten thousand dollars (\$10,000) to the General School Fund for the Borough of Queens for the same year, which fund is insufficient for the purposes thereof."

In my opinion such a transfer can lawfully be made, provided, first, that the School Board for the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx approves it; second, that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment approves.

In reply to a somewhat similar question from the President of the Board of Education, I rendered an opinion to him under date of May 10, 1901, a copy of which I inclose herewith.

DEAR SIR—In my Departmental Estimate for 1901 I asked for an appropriation of \$306,530, for "Aqueduct—Repairs and Maintenance," which appropriation was in the Final Estimate very properly changed in title to "Maintenance—Croton Water System," but was reduced from my estimate to the sum of \$287,802.50. Among the items which made it necessary for me to make an increase of \$30,000 in the estimate for 1901, over the appropriation for 1900, were: Increase in number and wages of laborers, watchmen, etc., in consequence of the amended Labor Law, \$11,272.50; 1,000 tons additional coal for high service pumping stations, \$4,000; increase in other materials required, \$5,000. The reduction of nearly \$20,000 from my Departmental Estimate has made the appropriation inadequate to meet the necessary demands upon it to the close of this year, and I therefore respectfully ask that your Board transfer the sum of \$15,000 to the appropriation "Maintenance—Croton Water System, for 1901" from the appropriation, "Laying Croton Pipes—Boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx, for 1901," from which the said sum can be spared by reason of the fact that the Municipal Assembly has hitherto withheld its concurrent action to authorize the laying of water-mains recommended by the Department and approved by the Board of Public Improvements.

There is also a deficiency in the appropriation "Pumping Stations—Fuel and Supplies, Borough of Queens, for 1901," for which my Departmental Estimate was \$26,000, and the Final Estimate allowed \$23,000. Owing to rapid increase in the demands upon the water service from public pumping plants in the First and Third Wards of the borough, it became necessary to operate all the pumping machinery with increased force and for longer hours at night, and since August last a second pumping plant in the former Village of Whitestone had to be put in operation to maintain proper water service to the higher grounds. This necessarily involved increased expense for fuel and machinery supplies, even beyond my Departmental Estimate. To meet the deficiency I respectfully ask that the sum of \$5,500 be transferred to the appropriation "Pumping Stations—Fuel and Supplies—Borough of Queens, for 1901," from the appropriation "Supplying Water to Long Island City for 1901," from which the same can be spared.

DEAR SIR—I have received from the Clerk of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment a communication dated October 10, transmitting a number of papers in relation to my communication of September 3, 1901, requesting the approval of the form of contract for the final disposition of garbage in the Borough of Brooklyn.

With reference to the proposed changes in the terms of the contract, as suggested by Mr. Chandler Withington, Principal Assistant Engineer of the Department of Finance, I beg to say to the first change proposed, namely, the term of contract to be for one year from January 1, 1902, instead of a contract for five years, that should the terms of this proposed contract be so amended there is but one firm or company now in existence that could possibly submit a bid, which fact seems to me of sufficient interest to The City of New York and this Department as well to cause the rejection of its adoption.

As to his second proposition, that the percentage by weight of foreign refuse collected and delivered to the contractor shall not be more than ten per cent. in lieu of five per cent., I submit that there is no especial objection to this change, except that if we can reduce the foreign refuse to a five per cent. basis, which I think is quite possible with the necessary police aid, then our separation will be that much improved at least.

As to his third proposition, to eliminate the requirement to build the plant within the territorial limits of The City of New York, I contend is quite inconsistent with his fourth proposition, whereby it is proposed to insert a purchase clause that would result advantageously to the City's interest.

I have read with a great deal of interest the report submitted to the Comptroller by Dr. James C. Bayles, and concur in much that he says, especially in reference to the one-year contract, as suggested, wherein he states that there is but one company now in a position to enter into a contract for that period.

To overcome this seeming obstacle and what seems to be the principal objection to a contract for five years, in view of the short time left before the expiration of the present contract, I now propose that we eliminate from consideration the date (January 1, 1902), and advertise for a contract for five years, to commence six or eight months hence, and in the mean time devise some method of disposing of the garbage of the Borough of Brooklyn in the interim that may be approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

I presume it is quite unnecessary for me to invite the attention of the Board to sections 450 and 544 of the Charter, the former dwells upon the special law, the latter governing contracts for final disposition, which provides that the Commissioner of Street Cleaning shall advertise for proposals in newspapers, etc., for a period of at least ten days, for the work to be performed in such form and manner and on such terms and conditions as he, the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, may prescribe, subject, of course, to the approval both as to terms and conditions by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, but not as to form and manner.

I do not wish to be understood as being captious on this point, or to fall back upon my legal rights in such premises, as I am more than willing to conform as much as possible and as far as my judgment will permit me to with the views of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, as may be considered best in the City's interest.

It is a matter of too grave importance to be subjected to either hasty consideration or to the adoption of methods proposed by those who are not closely identified with the work or the responsibility for it, therefore I make the suggestion contained herein for a five years' contract, to take effect eight months hence, the accumulation in the interim to be disposed of in a manner to be agreed upon by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Should this suggestion meet with favorable consideration at your hands, the City still remains a free agent to either accept or reject any or all bids that may be submitted under the terms and conditions as would be advertised, and should it be found to be in the interest of the City to reject them all, it would be in possession of some very valuable information that can be acquired in no other way and which can be used to advantage in drawing up future forms of contract for such work.

SIR—Hon. Percival E. Nagle, Commissioner, Department of Street Cleaning, in communication under date of September 3, 1901, transmits to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, for their approval of the terms and conditions thereof, pursuant to section 544 of the Greater New York Charter, a form of contract, in triplicate, for the final disposition of garbage in the Borough of Brooklyn.

The proposals for bids or estimates and the form of specifications, as transmitted, contain the following provisions, viz.:

1. Capacity of plant, 650 tons per day.
2. Estimated daily average, 350 tons per day.
3. Term of contract, five years from January 1, 1902.
4. Amount of security required, \$100,000.
5. Each bid or estimate must be accompanied by a certified check for 5 per cent. of the amount for which the work bid for is proposed in any one year to be performed.
6. Each bid or estimate to be accompanied by a complete description of the methods to be pursued by the Contractor.
7. To describe and locate the place or places where the materials are to be received by the Contractor; such place or places to be furnished at his expense.
8. To begin work on said plant within thirty days after contract has been delivered, and to complete same by time that the work is to begin.
9. The compensation to be paid to the contractor must be stated at a price per annum.
10. The City will deliver to the contractor at the places mentioned all the garbage and kindred refuse that may be collected, and which when collected shall contain not more than five per cent. by weight of other refuse.
11. All scows or boats used in the transportation of garbage are to be provided with covers.

12. The plant is to be built within the territorial limits of The City of New York.

13. Special deposit of \$10,000 to be deposited on or before the signing, sealing and delivery of the contract.

14. No other or greater compensation in case the daily amount of garbage delivered shall be materially or in any degree greater or less than the estimated quantity of 350 tons daily.

15. Payments to be made monthly, one equal twelfth part of the annual price.

16. Right to purchase plant at the termination of the contract, or at any time within three months, upon the City giving to the contractor thirty days' notice of its intention so to do; the City shall have the right to purchase, and the contractor shall in such case sell and convey the plant, scows and other means of transportation and final disposition of the garbage, and all his right, title and interest therein. The price to be paid shall be the fair and reasonable value thereof to be agreed upon by the Commissioners and the contractor, subject to the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

17. Annulment of contract for discontinuance or failure to comply with the terms and conditions of contract.

18. Contractor to pay for inspection. The salary or salaries aggregating \$1,500, to be paid to said person or persons in equal monthly installments.

In reply, would suggest the following changes from the form of contract submitted by the Commissioner of Street Cleaning:

First—Term of contract to be for one year from January 1, 1902.

Second—The percentage by weight of foreign or other refuse collected and delivered to the contractor shall not be more than 10 per cent. in lieu of 5 per cent.

Third—The requirement to build the plant within the territorial limits of The City of New York to be eliminated.

Fourth—Right to purchase plant: That the contractor be required to furnish a list with his bid or estimate of the nature of his right, title and interest, such as buildings, plant, land and scows, or any other means of transportation, also the nature and extent of such rights, whether acquired by lease or otherwise.

Hon. BIRD S. COLER, Comptroller:

SIR—I have carefully examined the form of contract for the final disposition of the garbage collections of Brooklyn and the memorandum thereon by Mr. C. Withington, Principal Assistant Engineer, referred to me for an expression of opinion by Mr. E. J. Levey, Deputy Comptroller.

This contract relates to work to begin January 1, 1902. It calls for a plant with a capacity of 650 tons per day, to handle an estimated average of 350 tons per day. The contractor must provide scows or other floating conveyances, put up a large amount of security and have his plant ready for full and satisfactory operation by the time work is required to begin.

It is obvious that under a contract still in consideration, which must become operative under considerable penalties on January 1, and which admits of no postponement owing to the fact that the putrescible garbage of a city cannot be permitted to accumulate for even a few days, the only person or persons in a position to bid under conditions warranting them in expecting consideration are represented in the Sanitary Utilization Company. No other individual or corporation could get ready in time. Since, therefore, all question of competition is eliminated, and the whole matter reduces itself to a pro forma renewal of the existing relation with that company, which has its plant ready, the contract calls for very different consideration from that which would be accorded to it if, under its provisions, a bona fide competition was expected—or, indeed, was possible. All the arguments in favor of long time contracts as permitting the contractor to offer lower prices per unit of service rendered than he could be expected to do on a short contract, are eliminated from the discussion in this instance. The contractor has the plant ready, all the appliances needed for operation under it, and the experience of previous years. He can safely figure much closer than anyone else could afford to do, and would be at no disadvantage in working from year to year under annual contracts. I accordingly agree with the first recommendation of Mr. Withington that the term of the contract be for one year from January 1, 1902, instead of five years, as provided in the printed text.

In the process employed at Barren Island for the treatment of garbage, any inorganic matter present is troublesome at every stage, and the lower the point to which it can be reduced the less the cost of treatment. It should be remembered, however, that to keep foreign matter out of garbage entails much expense to the City, and even with the most careful oversight possible the separation is only partly effected. For example, more ashes are concealed in the garbage in winter than in summer, and to prevent it at times running above five per cent. might require the services of a large number of policemen and special inspectors. Accordingly, I am disposed to disagree with Mr. Withington's second recommendation that the maximum admixture of foreign matter permissible be made ten per cent. instead of five per cent. I suggest as a substitute for so much of clause (1) as relates to this matter, a provision to the following effect:

The officers of the Department of Street Cleaning shall exercise due diligence to prevent the admixture of ashes or other inorganic substances with the garbage collected by it or under its direction; and when notified by the contractor that the percentage of such foreign substances exceeds five per cent. they shall take such measures as the Commissioner may direct to secure a better separation.

It is not wise to insert in a contract of this character a clause by which the contractor can plead failure on the part of the City to perform its contract obligations. The average composition of the garbage collections of New York and Brooklyn is well known, and is not likely to vary materially. A five per cent. maximum is too low, and an arbitrary maximum of ten per cent. is, in my judgment, unnecessary and dangerous.

I agree with Mr. Withington in recommending that the requirement that the plant to be provided under this contract be built within the corporate limits of New York be stricken out. It makes no great difference in this instance, since the only plant to which the specifications could apply is within the city limits, but as there is no advantage in establishing a precedent in this matter, which will be followed in future contracts, and no possible reason exists for wanting garbage treated within the city limits if it can be treated elsewhere, this provision seems to me unnecessary and undesirable.

In the clause giving the City the option of purchase of plant, I find a form of words which conforms very closely to that which has embarrassed the municipal authorities under the contract of 1896. To the very intelligent and valuable suggestion of Mr. Withington on this subject I add the recommendation that the language of this clause be recast so that the thirty days' notice shall not of necessity be of "intention" to purchase, but of a desire to investigate the plant and its operation to the end that any time within the duration of the option it may exercise the right to proceed to valuation, or to decline to avail itself of the option, as its interest may appear from the results of the investigation made for it. The language of a clause designed to give the City an option should not be such that its first step commits it irrevocably and puts it in a position where it may be required to take the plant at any price fixed by the agreement of arbitrators, whose conclusions are not subject to the approval of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment.

Not considering myself skilled in the drawing of contracts, I prefer not to reduce my recommendation that this clause of the contract be revised to the form of a recast of its language.

My study of the subject up to this point leads me to believe that cartage to tide water and treatment at Barren Island is neither the cheapest nor the best method of handling the garbage of large sections of Brooklyn. Better plans could be formulated within a year, and plants built which would be perhaps more satisfactory than that at Barren Island. Between now and the first of next January, however, it would be impossible to make any other plan operative, and the foregoing recommendations are the only ones which suggest themselves to me as essential to the protection of the city's interest in the contract under consideration.

SIR—Hon. Percival E. Nagle, Commissioner of Street Cleaning, in communication to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment October 21, 1901, acknowledges the receipt of a "number of papers" from the Clerk of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, in relation to his communication of September 3, 1901, requesting the approval of the form of contract for the final disposition of garbage in the Borough of Brooklyn.

The Commissioner objects to all except the second of the changes in the proposed contract for final disposition of garbage of the Borough of Brooklyn suggested by Mr. Chandler Withington, Principal Assistant Engineer of this Department, in his report of September 12, 1901 (herewith) submitting this contract to the Comptroller.

The changes submitted by Mr. Withington are as follows:

First—Term of contract to be for one year from January 1, 1902.

Second—The percentage by weight of foreign or other refuse collected and delivered to the contractor shall not be more than 10 per cent. in lieu of 5 per cent.

Third—The requirement to build the plant within the territorial limits of The City of New York to be eliminated.

Fourth—Right to purchase plant: That the contractor be required to furnish a list with his bid or estimate of the nature of his right, title and interest, such as buildings, plant, land and scows, or any other means of transportation, also the nature and extent of such rights whether acquired by lease or otherwise.

To the first change he answers that in the event of the contract being made "for one year from January 1, 1902, instead of a contract for five years, there is but one firm or company now in existence that could possibly submit a bid, which fact seems to me to be of sufficient interest to The City of New York, and this Department as well, to cause the rejection of its adoption."

The principal contention of the Commissioner is that this contract, involving a large outlay in the furnishing of the plant necessary to carry on the business, should be made for a term of five years instead of one year, for the simple reason that for the shorter term only one bidder exists. The Commissioner has in other communications requested that this term be extended.

Dr. James C. Bayles, in his report accompanying the report of Mr. Withington, states "This contract relates to work to begin January 1, 1902. It calls for a plant with a capacity of 650 tons per day to handle an estimated average of 350 tons per day. The contractor must provide scows or other floating conveyances, put up a large amount of security, and have his plant ready for full and satisfactory operation by the time work is required to begin."

Dr. Bayles' opinion as to the term being founded on this condition is to the effect that the Sanitary Utilization Company is the only company in a condition to bid. "No other individual or corporation could get ready in time."

"All the arguments in favor of long-time contracts, as permitting the contractor to offer lower prices per unit of service rendered than he could be expected to do on a short contract are eliminated from the discussion in this instance."

With regard to the limit of foreign matter, mixed with garbage, he says "a five per cent. maximum is too low, and an arbitrary maximum of even ten per cent. is, in my judgment, unnecessary and dangerous."

He does not argue the question as to building the plant within the corporate limits, for the reason that, in this instance, the only plant to be considered is within the city limits.

He gives his opinion with regard to Par. N of the contract relative to purchase that, instead of giving notice of "intention" to purchase, it shall be of a desire to investigate, etc.

The most important part of this report in the general investigation is contained in the last paragraph, in which he says: "My study of the subject up to this point leads me to believe that cartage to the tidewater and treatment at Barren Island is neither the cheapest nor the best method of handling the garbage of large sections of Brooklyn. Better plans could be formulated within a year and plants built which would be perhaps more satisfactory than that at Barren Island. Between now and the first of next January, however, it would be impossible to make any other plan operative, and the foregoing recommendations are the only ones which suggest themselves to me as essential to the protection of the city's interest to the contract under consideration."

It seems to be quite certain that only one bidder can be expected if the contract be limited to a term of one year, and as that one bidder is the Sanitary Utilization Company, the process proposed will be the same as now used at Barren Island.

The object to be attained is, evidently, to reach the best method of solving this problem of the disposition of garbage.

Taking into consideration the magnitude of this work, and this desire to take advantage of the best system of modern practice, as may be proposed, I am convinced that sufficient time should be allowed bidders for the investigations necessary, and the preparations for carrying out the contract.

In my opinion the term of such a contract as this should not be less than five years as suggested by the Commissioner, a shorter term not giving enough time for the development of any new system.

It is evident that, inasmuch as the present contract expires on the 1st of January, 1902, the time is too short to effect the permanent arrangement.

In view of the circumstances as they exist, the Commissioner makes the following suggestion: "In view of the short time left before the expiration of the present contract, I now propose that we eliminate from consideration this date (January 1, 1902) and advertise for a contract for five years to commence six or eight months hence, and in the meantime devise some method of disposing of the garbage of the Borough of Brooklyn in the interim that may be approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. It is a matter of too grave importance to be subjected to either hasty consideration or to the adoption of methods proposed by those who are not closely identified with the work or the responsibility for it; therefore, I make the suggestion contained herein for a five years' contract to take effect eight months hence, the accumulation in the interim to be disposed of in a manner to be agreed upon by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment."

Considered generally, I would recommend the adoption of the course presented as a suggestion by the Commissioner.

The Commissioner objects to the elimination of the requirement to build the plant within the territorial limits of The City of New York. He contends this is quite inconsistent with the fourth proposition whereby it is proposed to insert a purchase clause that would result advantageously to the City's interest.

The argument on this point is not very clearly expressed, but in consultation with the Commissioner I understood his objections to be that, with a plant located outside of the control of the City, a constant menace would confront us in the objections of various parties who might interfere with the work by injunctions and otherwise. Outside of the State we would be utterly powerless.

I think there is great force in this view.

SUMMARY.

I would respectfully recommend the adoption of the plan proposed by the Commissioner to eliminate from consideration the date (January 1, 1902) and advertise for a contract for five years, to commence, say, eight months hence.

That the percentage of foreign or other refuse be 10 per cent. in lieu of 5 per cent.

I would not recommend the elimination of the requirement that the plant be built within territorial limits of the city.

I would recommend that the contractor be required to furnish a list with his bid or estimate of the nature of his right, title or interest in plant, such as building, plant, land and scows, or in any other means of transportation, also the nature and extent of such rights whether acquired by lease or otherwise.

The President stated that in the case of the certificate of nomination filed October 1, 1901, of Anthony Smith for Member of Assembly and Charles Solomon for Alderman, under the name and emblem of the Citizens' Union, which was by this Board denied recognition as not being entitled to the name and emblem, and that the Court had sustained the action of the Board that Anthony Smith and Charles Solomon had filed declarations of said nominations on the 18th instant, that a substitution had been made of the names of David Blaustein for Member of Assembly, and of Max Franklin for Member of the Board of Aldermen from the Eighth District; that the President had communicated with the committee named upon said certificate of nomination, informing them that it was their privilege to select another name and emblem, and having received information from them indirectly that they had selected the "Stag" as an emblem, but without stating any party name, he had selected the name of "The Municipal League" for said certificate of nomination. The certificate of nomination filed October 11, 1901, under the name and emblem of The Citizens' Union, in the Twenty-first Assembly District, County of Kings, and the Sixty-sixth Aldermanic District, City of New York, nominating Joseph H. Adams for Member of Assembly, and Charles Alt for Alderman, the same action taken and no substitution of party name or emblem having been made by the committee named in the certificate, the President selected and designated the name "The Commonwealth Party," and the emblem of an "Anchor," for said certificate of nomination; it was moved that said action of the President in each case be approved, and that said nominations under said names and emblems be printed upon the official ballot for said districts for the ensuing election. Which was carried.

On motion it was

Resolved, That the Department of Police be and hereby is authorized and requested to receive for and on behalf of the Board of Elections of The City of New York, and carefully preserve the same until otherwise requested by this Board or directed by a court of competent jurisdiction, the ballot-boxes used at each polling place in The City of New York at the election of November 5, 1901, for the reception of the voted ballots, also the sealed packages of detached stubs and unused ballots connected with said election.

A communication was received from State Superintendent of Elections, stating that the Election Inspectors of the Eleventh Election District of the Sixth Assembly District, County of New York, were, under section 11, subdivision 1, of the Election Law, disqualified from acting as Inspectors in said district, on the ground that they were employed in public office and were paid out of the public money. Referred to the President for investigation and report.

A similar complaint in regard to an Election Inspector of the Eighteenth Election District of the First Assembly District, County of Kings, was likewise referred to the President for investigation and report.
