Permanent Census Board.

Report for the Three Months Ending December 31, 1911.

August 3, 1912.

Hon. WILLIAM J. GAYNOR, Mayor: Sir—I beg to submit the following statement of the work of the Permanent Census Board for the quarter ending December 31, 1911:

The initial canvass, as indicated in the last quarterly report submitted to your Honor was then completed in all the Boroughs, except Richmond. On December 9, 1911, the work of the first enumeration was completed for the City at large. During this time, 24 Enumerators were actually engaged in the canvass, the maximum serving on any given day being 12, the remaining 12 then performing night duty from the 146th precinct station house.

In the three months above referred to, these Enumerators performed 608 days

of actual canvassing and reported on 38,834 children. The average number of returns a day for each month was as follows:

October, 69; November, 64; December, 47. The low rate for the last month was due to the sparsely settled character of the districts canvassed in Richmond.

The following table shows the number and character of special cases reported on and referred to the various official agencies for action:

To the Compulsory Education Division, Department of Education.

Physically ill, 96; illegally detained, 204; immigrants, 14; truants, 15; illegally employed, Boys 14-16, 141; illegally employed, girls 14-16, 186; graduate, no work certificate, 107; not in evening school, 141; instructed at home, 22; evidence of age, 1. Total, 927.

In addition, the following special reports were made of—

Cases of contagious disease (children and adults), referred to Department of Health, 23. Cases of physically or mentally deficient children, referred to various agencies: Deaf and dumb children, 8; blind children or children with defective vision, 14; children mentally ill, 78; neglected children, 5; destitute children, 6. Total, 134.

In addition to the foregoing, 5,430 cases of immigrant children referred to this office by the Bureau of Industries and Immigration of the State Department of Labor were investigated and reports furnished to that Bureau.

Finally, the work of amending the census was begun in The Bronx. In this work, 52 days were consumed in actual canvassing, and the names of 5,688 children were reported, the average number a day being 109.

Combining the various activities of completing the initial canvass, investigating immigrant cases, and amending the census in The Bronx, the total number of names reported on for these months was 49,952, the average daily returns for the three classes of cases being 62.

Report for the Three Months Ending March 31, 1912.

August 3, 1912.

Hon. WILLIAM J. GAYNOR, Mayor: Sir—I beg to submit the following report for the quarter ending March 31, 1912:

At the close of 1911, 24 Police Enumerators were engaged in the work of amending the census, the number working each day not exceeding 12. On January 6, 1912, this number was reduced by the transfer of 8 men to various precincts throughout the City, so that thereafter but 8 Enumerators were available for regular duty.

During the months of January, February and March, comprising this quarter, the Enumerators performed 538 days' actual canvassing, as compared with 608 days the preceding quarter, and reported on 60,438 children, making an average of 112 a day.

The following tabulation shows the number of cases of children not attending school reported to the Compulsory Education Division of the Board of Education:

Physically ill, 59; illegally detained, 109; immigrants, 27; truants, 12; illegally employed, boys 14-16, 47; illegally employed, girls 14-16, 81; graduate, no work certificate, 39; not in evening school, 115; instructed at home, 3; evidence of age, 2. Total, 494.

In addition, the following special reports were made of—

Cases of contagious diseases (children and adults), referred to Department of Health, 5. Cases of physically or mentally deficient children, referred to various agencies: Blind children or children with defective vision, 6; children mentally ill, 20; crippled children, 5; neglected children, 1; destitute children, 3. Total, 40.

The lessened amount of work required of the clerical staff of the office by reason of the reduction in the number of Police Enumerators has made it possible to begin a more careful reorganization of the office work.

The preparatory work for taking the census and amending the same, which was provided for in the statute creating the Permanent Census Board, was to have been done in the 16 months preceding the time fixed for the beginning of the initial canvass, October, 1909. As the organization of the Board was delayed for various reasons, until after that time, this preparatory work could not then be done. As a result, much of the earlier work was necessarily done without full preparation. The work of redistricting the City on a more exact and more workable basis, and the provision of accurate guides, charts and maps of the same, and the bringing of the permanent files into harmony with this plan is now being carried on. Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a Department, chief of a Bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate, that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.
