An Ordinance to Amend Article 17 of Chapter 10 of the Code of Ordinances, by the Change of a Section Number.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York as follows: Section 1. The ordinance adopted July 17, 1917, and effective September 18, 1917, relating to "Liquefied Chlorine," is hereby amended by having the section number thereof read "214a" instead of "214."

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

Resolution for Special Revenue Bonds, \$50,000, for the Purchase of Food and Fuel by the Commissioner of Public Markets.

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of subdivision 8, section 188, of the Greater New York Charter, and section 14 of chapter 813 of the Laws of 1917, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment be and is hereby requested to authorize the Comptroller to issue special revenue bonds to the amount of fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000), the proceeds whereof to be used by the Commissioner of Public Markets to purchase food and fuel for the handling and sale thereof and for any incidental expenses incurred therein.

No. 172.

An Ordinance to Amend Section 1 of Article 1 of Chapter 16 of the Code of Ordinances, Relating to Municipal Civil Service.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York, as follows: Section 1. Section 1 of article 1 of chapter 16 of the Code of Ordinances, relating to the municipal civil service, is hereby amended to read as follows:

§1. Officers and employees to be residents.

No person not a citizen and an actual resident and dweller, in good faith, in the state of New York shall be eligible to appointment or employment in any of the departments, boards, bureaus or branches of the government of the city, except in institutions which care for the sick and infirm, and in clinics or dispensaries which furnish medical or surgical advice or treatment, and in laboratories offering facilities for the diagnosis of disease or the analysis of food and drugs. Any person who now is or who shall become, after such appointment or employment, a citizen, resident or dweller outside the state of New York, shall thereby forfeit his said appointment or employment and shall be removed therefrom. The provisions of this section shall not apply to appointments or employments for services or work to be performed for the city outside the state of New York; nor to a temporary appointment or employment for a specific service or work, where peculiar or exceptional qualifications of a scientific, professional or educational character are necessary. Prior to such temporary appointment or employment, evidence in writing shall be furnished that the services or work to be performed cannot be well done by any citizen and actual resident of the state of New York who is available, and that the non-resident person proposed to be appointed is generally recognized as one possessing such exceptional qualifications in a high degree. No appointment or employment under this section shall be valid unless the consent of the mayor shall be first obtained. He may require the municipal civil service commission to pass upon the matter and certify whether such appointment or employment be necessary, and, also, whether the non-resident person proposed therefor be competent and necessary, for lack of a citizen and actual resident of the state of New York who is available for appointment.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

An Ordinance to Amend Subdivision 4 of Section 5 of Article 1 of Chapter 5 of the Code of Ordinances, Relating to Changes in the Occupancy of Buildings.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York as follows:

Section 1. Subdivision 4 of section 5 of article 1 of chapter 5 of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended by adding thereto a new clause as follows:

Nothing in this section shall prevent the issuance by the superintendent of buildings of a certificate of occupancy for the reception of persons for medical or charitable care or treatment, for any now existing building erected of non-fireproof construction as defined by subdivision 3 of section 71 of article 4 of this chapter, not exceeding 40 feet in height or 5,000 square feet in area, and enclosed on at least three sides by an open court as defined by section 135 of article 7 of this chapter, such court to be not less than 10 feet in width at all points, and provided that all interior stairways and all vertical shafts are enclosed in partitions of fireproof or fire resisting material, that all openings in such partitions are protected by self-closing fire doors or fire windows, and that proper exit facilities be provided and that boiler room, kitchen and bakery be separate and apart from the building proper and be constructed of fireproof materials.

Sec. 2. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

An Ordinance to Amend Chapter 27 of the Code of Ordinances by Inserting Therein a New Section in Relation to the Willful Destruction of Foods.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of the City of New York as follows:

Section 1, chapter 27, of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended by inserting therein a new section to be known and styled as follows:

§9a. Willful destruction of food prohibited; exception. No person, firm or corporation shall willfully waste or destroy, or cause, suffer or allow to be willfully wasted or destroyed, any wholesome food fit for human consumption. Provided, however, the provisions of this section shall not apply where the willful destruction and waste of such food is regulated or controlled by the provisions of the United States Food Control Laws, or the New York State Food Control Laws. Any person, firm or corpora-

tion who shall violate the provisions of this section shall, upon conviction thereof, be punished by a fine of five dollars (\$5), or be imprisoned for a period not exceeding one day, or may be both fined and imprisoned.

This section shall take effect immediately and shall continue in force during the time the United States is at war and thereafter until the mayor shall declare that the emergency causing the enactment thereof no longer exists.

Sec. 2. The table of section headings of chapter 27 of the Code of Ordinances is hereby amended to read as follows:

Resolution Establishing the Grade of Position of Attendant in the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

Whereas, The Board of Estimate and Apportionment adopted the following resolution at a stated meeting held March 15, 1918:

Approved by the Mayor April 24, 1918.

During the past ten days the hospitals of the department, except Gouverneur, have been taxed to the utmost in caring for the increased number of patients coming to them, particularly patients suffering from pneumonia, the majority of whom are seriously ill. In pavilions A and B they had over 100 patients sleeping on cots. The Training School has experienced great difficulty in filling the vacancies among the nurses, and there has been an unusual shortage of regular employees. There is a large number of deaths among these patients, and we have experienced great difficulty in getting the bodies transferred promptly from the wards to the morgue, although everything possible has been done to expedite such transfer. I bring this matter to your attention now, not that

anything more can be done to meet the situation, but because I feel that we may be criticised from some source for the lack of attention we are able to give many of the cases.

At Fordham there has been a double row of beds through the centre of some of the wards. The urgent necessity of increasing the capacity of this hospital is becoming daily more apparent. I would suggest consideration be given the building of two or three ward units on the grounds of Fordham, similar to construction of the Columbia War Hospital, which would meet the needs for the present.

On separate motion, duly seconded and carried in each instance, action was taken upon the report of the General Medical Superintendent as follows: After consideration, it was moved, seconded and carried to approve an arrangement to reimburse Dr. Gregory for his services, and the Secretary was instructed to carry on the correspondence with the Mayor, the Civil Service Commission and other departments with this end in view.

The subject relative to the overcrowding of the hospitals of the department was considered, but in view of the prevailing situation no decision was arrived at to solve the problem.

The overcrowding of Fordham Hospital was discussed and the feasibility of using the funds provided for the roof wards for the construction of temporary structures to relieve the situation was considered, but action deferred pending further inquiry by the Building Committee, who were also instructed to make inquiries regarding the desirability of erecting temporary buildings of hollow tile fireproof construction to meet the needs.

COMMITTEE REPORTS.

Consideration was given to the bids received at Bellevue Hospital on January 31, for the alterations to Harlem Hospital, on which action was deferred at the meeting on Feb. 5, as the bids were in excess of the amount allowed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment. On motion, duly seconded and carried, on the recommendation of the Building Committee, action was taken in accordance with the resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment as approved on March 15, 1918, and the contracts awarded as follows: Items Nos. 1, 2, 3—Enlarging ambulance platform; converting stable into garage exclusive of heating and plumbing; enclosing balconies; Rangeley Construction Company, \$15,457. Item No. 4—Entrance to Nurses' Home; Werner-Huberty Co., Inc., \$636. Item No. 5—Moving vacuum tanks; F. C. Allen, Jr., & Co., \$844. Item No. 7—Construction of new area and ash hoist; Charles J. Daly, \$4,319. The estimate of cost for the heating work in connection with the alterations to the ambulance station was approved in the sum of \$975, on which Callahan, Kingsley Company were the low bidders, and the estimate of cost for the plumbing work on this building was approved in the sum of \$983, on which William Messer Company were the low bidders, the cost of both to be charged to the 1918 budget fund, contract or open order service, Code 2087, "Repairs and Replacements."

Consideration was given to the bids received on Jan. 31 for the installation of screens and iron work at Fordham Hospital, on which action was deferred by the Trustees on Feb. 15. As the lowest bid was in excess of the amount approved by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, that Board on March 15 amended the estimate of cost to \$7,490, the amount of the lowest bid, and it was moved, seconded and carried, on the recommendation of the Building Committee, to award the contract to Alexander John in this sum.

After consideration, on motion, duly seconded and carried, contracts with the New York Telephone Company for telephone service in the hospitals of the department for the year 1917, in the sum of \$8,191.42, were approved.

On the recommendation of the Building Committee, premised on a report from Joseph H. Freedlander under date of March 21, 1918, it was moved, seconded and carried to accept the work under the contract of Jennings & John for the layout of the grounds at Harlem Hospital and authorize final payment with the exception of the 2 per cent. retained for repair security.

Mr. Farley reported that under date of March 18 he communicated with the Commissioner of the Department of Docks and Ferries regarding a mooring place for the boat "Camp Huddleston," and that he had not as yet received a reply. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this subject was continued with the Committee.

On the recommendation of the Building Committee, it was moved, seconded and carried to accept the work of M. Osseman for the alterations to the boat "Camp Huddleston," and final payment authorized with the exception of the 2 per cent. retained as repair security, the work having been substantially completed within the contract time.

Reference was made to a communication from the Municipal Civil Service Commission, dated March 21, addressed to

Dr. O'Hanlon, stating that at a meeting held on March 20 a letter was considered from the Secretary to the Mayor informing the Civil Service Commission that the Mayor disapproves the payment by the city of \$1,200 a year to Catherine Kelley, Physician (Electrocardiographer), at Bellevue, who has heretofore been paid from private funds, and ordering the termination of her employment. After discussion, it was moved, seconded and carried to refer this subject to Dr. Brannan and Mr. O'Keeffe.

Mr. Sachs referred to the subject of appointing negroes on the house staff, and presented a letter, dated March 21, from Harvard University regarding the standing of Franklin A. Myers, a negro, who may probably enter into competitive examination for one of the places at Bellevue or one of its allied hospitals. It was moved, seconded and carried to place the communication on file awaiting such examinations.

COMMUNICATIONS.

A letter, dated March 23, was presented from Major L. T. LeWald, Commanding Officer of the Military School of Roentgenology, regarding the appointment of a substitute for Major William R. Stewart during his temporary absence from the city, and setting forth that the Government appreciates the facilities offered at Harlem Hospital for instruction in Roentgenology and requesting, in view of the fact that Major Stewart is called to a post outside of the city, that the present privilege of instructing military students be continued, and recommending First Lieutenant Calvin B. Witter, Medical Reserve Corps, for the position. As the appointment of Lieutenant Witter is also recommended by Major Stewart, it was moved, seconded and carried, after consideration, to approve this request, and at the same time grant Major Stewart an indefinite leave of absence on account of military service.

The minutes of the Executive Committee of the Medical Board of Bellevue Hospital for March 13 were presented. The nominations to the House Staff, Second Division, were approved as follows: Morton Ryder, 2 years Medical, July 1, 1918; Samuel Schwadron, 2 years Medical, Jan. 1, 1919; William R. Delzell, 2 years Surgical, July 1, 1918; Richard Y. Thompson, 2 years Surgical, Jan. 1, 1919; Lloyd Freeman Craver, 18 months Medical, July 1, 1918; Jacob S. Goldberg, 18 months Medical, Jan. 1, 1919; Maurice T. Root, 2 years mixed service, July 1, 1918.

The following was noted for record: Abolishing the Committee on Nursing; Committee on Examinations; Committee on Outlying Services, and the Committee on Alcoholic and Psychopathic Service, the functions of the last two to be taken over by the Executive Committee as a whole; and the appointments to the Conference Committees and various other committees.

The minutes of the Medical Board of Harlem Hospital for March 19 were presented.

The Board of Trustees believes it would tend to greater efficiency and closer cooperation of the various functions of the department if the chief officer of each hospital as well as the General Medical Superintendent of the department would attend the meetings of the Medical Board with a view to solving at the time such problems as may arise. With this end in view the General Medical Superintendent was instructed to direct the chief officer of each hospital to attend the meetings of the medical boards. At the same time the Medical Boards of the hospitals of the department were requested to send a copy of the minutes to the Superintendent of the hospital, who is to report on all matters referred to therein, so as to reach the Trustees in time for consideration with the minutes. The recommendation that patients be discharged between 9 a. m. and 5 p. m., and that the discharge of patients be requested by relatives or friends the day before they wish to take the patients home, was referred to the General Medical Superintendent for compliance, in so far as is practicable with the general conduct of the hospital. The request for instructions regarding the communication from Dr. M. Janoff, who transmitted through his attorney a certified copy of an order entered in the Kings County Clerk's office, changing the name of Martin Lewis Janoff, formerly on the house staff, to Martin Lewis Janes, and requesting that a hospital diploma be issued to him in the name of Martin Lewis Janes, was considered. On motion, duly seconded and carried, it was voted to comply with this request and file the certified copy of the order among the records in the office of the Trustees.

The minutes of the Medical Board of Fordham Hospital for March 1 were presented. On motion, duly seconded and carried, the report on the measures to overcome the crowded conditions in the Out Patient Department was approved.

The Trustee members of the Conference Committee were requested to confer with representatives from the Medical Board of Fordham on the crowded conditions in

the Out Patient Department, and also to inquire into the recommendation that the proposed ward in the north wing be made into a children's ward.

A letter, dated March 8, was presented from Edward C. Brenner, resigning as Visiting Physician to the First Division, Tuberculosis Service, Bellevue. On motion, duly seconded and carried, this resignation was accepted with regret.

A letter, dated March 19, was presented from Conron Bros., setting forth that there is a quantity of eggs on their contract with Bellevue and Allied Hospitals which have not been delivered, and stating that in view of the fact that there is no storage room at Bellevue Hospital, to extend the time for delivery and they will hold the eggs subject to the department's order.

After consideration, it was moved, seconded and carried not to extend the time on the contract, but to issue orders for the eggs required in the department to April 1, and to call the attention of the contractor to the clause in the contract and specifications regarding the quantity of eggs to be ordered.

Request from the Committee on Finance and Budget of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for a statement of the requirements of Bellevue and Allied Hospitals during the years 1918, 1919, 1920 and 1921 for the construction, improvement, permanent betterment and equipment of buildings, the acquisition of title to property required, and all other public improvements, requiring the issuance of corporate stock, was referred to the Building Committee and the Finance Committee.

Three communications, dated March 5, March 11 and March 19, were presented from the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, transmitting copies of resolutions approving (1) permission to fill vacancies in the nursing service and hospital helper group; (2) re-estimate of cost for alterations to Harlem Hospital and installation of screens at Fordham Hospital; (3) denying request for modification of budget for 1918 to permit the transfer of salary accruals and suggesting that the Trustees submit to the Board of Estimate requests for transfers of such accruals as may be required, which communications were ordered placed on file.

A resolution, dated March 12, 1918, was presented from the Board of Aldermen, granting permission to buy, in the open market, without public letting, a dishwashing machine at a cost not to exceed \$1,650; an automobile, at a cost not to exceed \$1,300; and the installation of a sump pump for Harlem Hospital, at a cost not to exceed \$1,125, which resolutions were ordered placed on file.

A communication, dated March 12, was presented from the Department of Finance, transmitting an executed copy of renewal of lease authorized by the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, on Feb. 14, 1918, of rooms 226 to 238, inclusive, in Osborn Hall, which was ordered placed on file.

A motion to adjourn the meeting was moved, seconded and carried.







The breach of either or any of these conditions shall forthwith void the sale and cause immediate forfeiture of the purchase money and the security deposited for the faithful performance of the conditions of the sale. The placing therein or permitting the occupancy of any such building by any tenant free, for rent or otherwise, excepting the necessary watchmen or the workmen engaged in the actual demolition thereof, shall of itself be a breach of the above conditions of sale.

The sale will be as of the condition of the property on date of delivery thereof to the purchaser. The City of New York will not be responsible for any change or loss which may occur in the condition of the buildings, or their appurtenances between the time of the sale thereof and the time of delivering possession to the purchaser, after being properly vacated of all tenants. The sale and delivery to purchaser will be made as nearly together as the circumstances of vacating the structures of their tenants will permit.

All the material of buildings, sheds, walks, structures and cellars of whatsoever nature, with their exterior and interior fixtures, appurtenances and foundations of all kinds, except the exterior walls of the buildings and their foundations, and the sidewalks and curb in front of said buildings, extending within the described area, shall be torn down and removed from the premises. None of the dirt, debris or waste resulting from the demolition shall be allowed to remain on the premises, except old mortar or plaster only, which may be left, but not higher at any point than two feet below the curb opposite that point. The exterior walls and their foundations shall be taken down only to a plane whose elevation shall be the level of the curb in front of the building. Where there is no curb the elevation of the surrounding ground shall be considered curb level. All wells, cesspools, sinks, etc., existing on the property must be filled to the level of the surrounding ground with clean earth.

The purchaser at the sale shall also withdraw and remove all abandoned water taps and old service mains and in place thereof cause to be inserted a brass plug in the main water pipe in the street, in compliance with the rules and regulations of the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity that this has been performed.

The purchaser at the sale shall also remove all house sewer connections to the main sewer in the street, and the openings of the main sewer in street shall be properly closed in compliance with the directions of the Bureau of Sewers in the Borough in which the buildings are situated, and furnish the Department of Finance with a certificate from the Bureau of Sewers that the work has been properly performed.

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser of the building.

Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture

of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances or portions as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the bidder's assent to the above conditions being understood to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the date of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials or labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furnishings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam holes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the Contractor.

"No buildings, parts of buildings, fixtures or machinery sold for removal under these terms and conditions shall in any case be relocated or re-erected within the lines of any proposed street or other public improvement, and if any such buildings, parts of buildings, fixtures or machinery, etc., shall be relocated or re-erected within the lines of any proposed street or other public improvement, title thereto shall thereupon become vested in The City of New York and a resale at public or private sale may be made in the same manner as if no prior sale thereof had been made."

The Comptroller of The City of New York reserves the right on the day of sale to withdraw from sale any of the buildings, parts of buildings and machinery included therein, or to reject any and all bids, and be it further

Resolved, That while the said sale is held under the supervision of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller is authorized to cause the sale to be advertised and to direct the sale thereof as financial officer of the City.

NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS ON WORK TO BE DONE FOR, OR SUPPLIES TO BE FURNISHED TO THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

The person or persons making a bid for any service, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or officers, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the bids will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of the said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also that it is made without any connection with any other person making a bid for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer or employee of The City of New York is, shall be, or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the bid that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true.

No bid will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of such bid, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks or trust companies of The City of New York, or a check of such bank or trust company signed by a duly authorized officer thereof, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

All bids for supplies must be submitted in duplicate.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid.

For particulars as to the quantity or quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation of the City.

The contract must be bid for separately.

The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done or the supplies are to be furnished. Plans and drawings of construction work may be seen there.
