

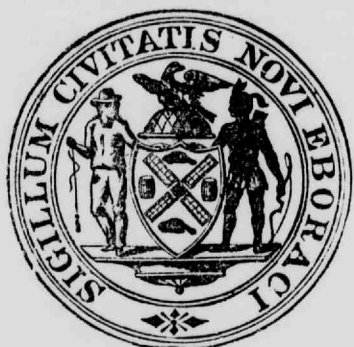

### APPROVED PAPERS.

*Ordinances, Resolutions, etc., approved by the Mayor during the week ending July 7, 1877.*

Resolved, That the Board of Apportionment be and are hereby requested to transfer from some unexpended appropriation the sum of \$10,000, to be expended for the celebration of Independence Day, 1877, under the direction of the Commissioners of the Department of Public Parks.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, June 19, 1877.

Received from his Honor the Mayor, July 2, 1877, without his approval or objections thereto; therefore, as provided in section 11, chapter 335, Laws of 1873, the same became adopted.

Resolved, That an ornamental lamp-post and lamp be lighted on the north side of Bowling Green, in place of the ordinary street-lamp now located there, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, June 19, 1877.

Approved by the Mayor, July 2, 1877.

Resolved, That Sixty-sixth street, from Eighth avenue to the Boulevard, be regulated and graded, and that the curb and gutter stones be set or reset, and the sidewalks flagged or reflagged, where not already done, or where such curb, gutter, and flagging are not on the proper grade, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, June 19, 1877.

Approved by the Mayor, July 2, 1877.

Resolved, That Fourth avenue, from Seventy-first to Seventy-ninth street, be curbed, guttered, and the sidewalks thereof flagged a space four feet wide through the centre thereof, where not already done, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, June 19, 1877.

Approved by the Mayor, July 2, 1877.

Resolved, That gas-mains be laid, lamp-posts erected, and street-lamps lighted in Eightieth street, from the Boulevard to Riverside avenue.

Resolved, That the sidewalk on the north side of Fifty-eighth street, between Eighth and Ninth avenues, be flagged four feet wide through the centre thereof, where not already done, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, June 19, 1877.

Approved by the Mayor, July 2, 1877.

Resolved That One Hundred and Twentieth street, from the First avenue to the Harlem river, be paved with Belgian or trap-block pavement, and that at the several intersecting streets and avenues crosswalks be laid where not now laid, and relaid where those now laid are, in the opinion of the Commissioner of Public Works, not in good repair, or are not upon a grade adapted to the grade of the proposed new pavement, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted.

Resolved, That gas-mains be laid, lamp-posts erected, and street-lamps lighted in Avenue A, between Seventy-third and Seventy-fourth streets, and in Seventy-fourth street, between Avenue A and the First avenue, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, June 19, 1877.

Approved by the Mayor, July 2, 1877.

Resolved, That gas-mains be laid, lamp-posts erected, and street-lamps lighted in Ninety-sixth street, between the Eighth and Ninth avenues, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, June 19, 1877.

Approved by the Mayor, July 2, 1877.

Whereas, In the dire calamity that has befallen the city of St. John, New Brunswick, by which millions of dollars in value of property and several valuable lives have been destroyed by fire, and thousands of men, women and children rendered houseless and homeless, and in want of the absolute necessities of life, it is the bounden duty of the people and government of this city to sympathize and to aid by every means in the power of both, in alleviating the distress and misery inseparable from such a calamity; and

Whereas, In view of the fact that the Common Council of this city is, by State law, deprived of the power to lend or give pecuniary assistance to the suffering people of St. John, or to any other object, no matter how pressing, as it is prohibited from making appropriation of any character in aid of any charity, no matter how urgent or deserving, it only remains to this Common Council to exercise the weight and influence of its official authority, and to recommend to our citizens generally, that they aid to the extent of their ability the afflicted people of St. John, that now so piteously appeal in their misfortunes to the liberality of the people of the City of New York; be it therefore

Resolved, That in the misfortunes of the people of the city of St. John, New Brunswick, caused by the destruction of the major part of that city by fire, the government and people of this city do deeply sympathize, and we hereby, in the most earnest manner, solicit the aid and co-operation of our citizens to the extent of their ability in the effort to relieve the suffering and impoverished people of our sister city in this their time of sore affliction; "also the suffering people of Marblehead."

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to J. M. Toucey to lay a five-inch wrought-iron pipe across the East river and Blackwell's Island, from or near Sixty-third street, East river, to the opposite shore, the work to be done at his own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

Resolved, That Julius A. Heinig be and he is hereby appointed a Commissioner of Deeds in place and stead of Edward F. Williams, who has resigned.

N.Y., to place two bay-windows on their new armory building now being erected on the block of land bounded by Lexington and Third avenues, Sixty-sixth and Sixty-seventh streets, as shown on the annexed diagram, the work to be done at their own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

"Resolved, That if the appropriation for lamps and gas for the present year be insufficient to carry into effect the provisions of the foregoing resolution, then that steps be immediately taken by the said Department to light the piers and bulkheads at which steamboats or other vessels land or receive passengers during the night time.

"Which was decided in the affirmative by the following vote (three-fourths of all the members elected voting in favor thereof):

"Affirmative—The Chairman pro tem., Aldermen Billings, Cole, Cudlipp, Gross, Gumblerton, Guntzer, Hess, Howland, Keenan, McCarthy, Morris, Pinckney, J. Reilly, B. Reilly, Sauer, Seery, Sheils, Tuomey, and Wade—20."

Therefore be it Resolved, That the Commissioner of Public Works and the Commissioners of the Dock Department be respectfully requested to immediately put the above resolutions as passed by the Board of Aldermen, July 28, 1876, and approved by the Mayor August 2, 1876, into effect.

HEALTH DEPARTMENT OF THE CITY OF NEW YORK,  
NEW YORK, July 3, 1877.

The Board of Health met this day.

229 orders for the abatement of nuisances were made.

The Attorney was directed to commence suits for non-compliance with the orders of the Board in 52 cases, and for a violation of the Sanitary Code in 16 cases.

## Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending June 30, 1877:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,800, as follows, viz.: 8 public buildings, 914 tenement-houses, 145 private dwellings, 54 other dwellings, 12 manufactories and workshops, 19 stores and warehouses, 57 stables, 50 slaughter-houses, 22 milk inspections, 1 public sewer, 5 fat-rendering establishments, 1 dock, 1 public park, 1 roadway, 15 sunken and vacant lots, 48 yards, courts, and areas, 46 cellars and basements, 126 water-pipes and drains, 164 privies and water-closets, 54 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 1 brewery, 1 rag and bone establishment, 5 dangerous stairways, 1 cistern and cesspool, 2 dangerous chimneys, 39 violations of the Code, 11 other nuisances, together with 3 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious diseases.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 686.

During the past week 163 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

99 permits were issued to the consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

170 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy-sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 41 dwellings where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 37 houses, 37 privy-sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

The Special Disinfecting Corps have disinfected 3,436 privies and water-closets, 260 cellars, 432 yards, courts, and areas, 254 garbage-boxes, and 147½ miles of street gutters.

1 person sick with small-pox was removed to the hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

During the week ending Saturday, June 30, 1877, there were issued from this Bureau 569 burial permits for city deaths, 20 for bodies in transitu, and 48 for the interment of still-born infants. There were recorded 569 deaths, 147 marriages, 442 births, 48 still-births, 20 applications for transit permits, and 58 returns from coroners. There were 26 searches of the registers of births, marriages, and deaths, and 3 transcripts of birth record, 3 of marriage, and 20 of death were issued from this Bureau.

SIR—569 deaths were reported to this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, June 30, which is an increase of 147 as compared with the number reported the preceding week, and 67 less than the reported during the corresponding week of 1876. The actual mortality for the week ending June 23, was 441, which is 88.6 below the average mortality for the corresponding week of the past 5 years, and represents an annual death-rate of 21.29 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,076,920.

The increase in the mortality during the week was among children under 5 years of age, which exceeded the deaths of the preceding week by 159. 118 more deaths were also reported in tenement houses; of this number 101 were from diarrhoeal diseases. The following statement will show the deaths from diarrhoeal diseases and of children under 5 years, and in tenement houses, the past 5 weeks:

The increase in the number of deaths during the past compared with the preceding week was from the following causes, viz.: Measles, 4; scarlatina, 1; membranous croup, 2; whooping-cough, 2; erysipelas, 2; cerebro-spinal fever, 1; malarial fevers, 1; puerperal diseases, 1; diarrhoeal diseases, 107; inanition and want of breast milk, 8; rheumatism and gout, 2; phthisis pulmonalis, 8; bronchitis, 3; pneumonia, 1; disease of the heart, 6; marasmus and scrofula, 2; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 4; infantile convulsions, 10; gastritis, enteritis, and peritonitis, 11; cyanosis, 3; deaths by drowning, 7; and a decrease of 1 from small-pox, 3 from diphtheria, 3 from typhoid fever, 7 from cancer, 3 from apoplexy, 2 from diseases of the brain and nervous system, 1 from cirrhosis and hepatitis, 5 from premature and pretermatural birth.

Of the total number of deaths reported for the week, 72 were in institutions, 326 in tenement-houses, 156 in houses containing 3 families and less, 2 in hotels and boarding-houses, 13 in rivers, boats, streets, etc., 9 were on the basement floor, 129 on the first, 166 on the second, 110 on the third, 50 on the fourth, 17 on the fifth, 1 on the sixth, and 2 were not stated; 567 were stated to be residents of New York City, and 2 were non-residents; 92 were stated as single, 92 married, and 29 widowed, and the condition of 356 was not stated, these were children who had not attained a marriageable age; 244 deaths were of children under 1 year, 301 under 2 years, 354 under 5 years, and 19 were persons 70 years and over.

The disposition of 567 deaths and still-births, or 91.89 per cent. of the total number reported, were in the following 14 cemeteries, which are in the vicinity of this city, viz.: Bayside (Jewish) 12, Calvary (Roman Catholic) 214, City (pauper burial ground, undenominational) 77, Greenwood (undenominational) 36, Lutheran (undenominational) 118, Cypress Hills (undenominational) 18, Evergreen (undenominational) 38, Woodlawn (undenominational) 14, St. Michael's (Protestant Episcopal) 13, Union (Methodist Protestant) 10, Holy Cross (Roman Catholic) 9, Machpelah, L. I. (Jewish) 5, St. Raymond's (Roman Catholic) 2, Washington (undenominational) 2.

The mean temperature for the week ending June 30, was 70.9 degrees Fahr., the mean humidity was 75, saturation being 100, the mean reading of the barometer was 29.843 inches, the number of miles traveled by the wind was 1,011, and the total amount of rain-fall was 0.23 inch, as reported by D. Draper, Director of the New York Meteorological Observatory, Central Park.

The distribution of the deaths for the week ending June 23, was in the following wards, viz.: First, 3; Second, 1; Third, 6; Fourth, 12; Fifth, 3; Sixth, 9; Seventh, 17; Eighth, 14; Ninth, 8; Tenth, 19; Eleventh, 18; Twelfth, 48; Thirteenth, 13; Fourteenth, 10; Fifteenth, 6; Sixteenth, 22; Seventeenth, 34; Eighteenth, 42; Nineteenth, 62; Twentieth, 30; Twenty-first, 24; Twenty-second, 27; Twenty-third, 8, and Twenty-fourth, 5.

## BUREAU OF VITAL STATISTICS.

The actual mortality for the week ending June 23, 1877, was 441, which is 88.6 below the average for the corresponding week of the past five years, and represents an annual death-rate of 21.29 per 1,000 persons living, the population estimated at 1,076,920.

Certain items of new work connected with the ventilating of the Museum of Art were ordered.

A form of deed of gift was adopted, and it was ordered that on donations being presented to the Park the donors be required to execute a deed of gift.

The employment of Mr. H. R. Searing, steam engineer; Henry Reilly, steersman and watchman; and John Meehan, night watchman, was continued, on the same conditions and at the same rates of pay as heretofore fixed by the Department.

The proposal of Mr. Michael Noonan for the construction of drains in the district of the Twenty-fourth Ward bounded on the north by Fordham and Pelham avenues, on the east by the Southern Boulevard, on the south by the Kingsbridge road, and on the west by Arthur street, was accepted as the lowest bid, and the contract was awarded to him.
