The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending July 19, 1584. The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary Inspectors was 8,186. The number of complaints returned by the Sanitary Inspectors was 1,456. During the past week 523 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report. 76 permits were issued to consignees of vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port. 13 permits were issued to consignees to discharge rags in (bulk under bonds), 1 misocillaneous permit was issued under the Sanitary Code. 189 permits were issued to scavengers to empty, clean and disinfect privy sinks. 17 premises were visited where contagious diseases were reported, and 17 disinfections and 8 fumigations were performed. 7 cases of contagious disease were removed to Riverside Hospital. 30 vaccinations were performed, of which 14 were primary and 16 re-vaccinations. 4,170 pounds of meat, and 1,200 pounds of fish were seized and condemned. 82 specimens of milk were examined, 1 analysis was made, 40 quarts of adulterated milk destroyed and 2 arrests were made. \$2 specimens of mulk were channel, destroyed and 2 arrests were made. The certificates of 621 births, 51 still-births, 201 marriages, and 870 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, July 10, 1854. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from scarlatina decreased 3; diphtheria, 1; whooging cough, 6; erysipelas, 1; diartheeal diseases, 56; inanition, 3; phthisis pulmonalis, 2; bronchitis, 6; pneumonia, 3; heart diseases, 15; meningitis and encephalitis, 5; convulsions, 5; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 11; gastrius, enteritis, and peritonitis, 9; cyanosis and atelectasis, 1; while the deaths from measles increased 8; croup, 5; typhus fever, 1; typhoid fever, 1; cerebro-spinal fever, 1; malarial fevers, 3; a loobolism, 2; rheumatism and gout, 3; an eurism, 2; marsuns, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 1; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 3; apoplexy, 4; cirrhosis and hepatits, 1; Bright's disease and neprintis, 10; premature and preternatural births, 8; suicide, 1; drowning, 1. The number of deaths from puerperal diseases, cancer, and direct effect of solar heat, was the same in the two successive weeks.
