Meeting of March 12, 1878.

At a meeting of the Board of Examiners, held at the office of the Department of Buildings, No. 2 Fourth avenue, on Tuesday, the twelfth day of March, A. D. 1878, at 3 o'clock P. M. In pursuance of the call of the Superintendent of Buildings. At which meeting there were present:

Superintendent Walter W. Adams, Henry Dudley, James M. McLean, Edwin Dobbs, and John Banta. Superintendent W. W. Adams presiding. The minutes of the previous meeting having been read for the information of the Board, the Chairman submitted the several hereinafter named petitions and applications, to wit:

Petition of James O. Kane for permission in the erection of six brick dwelling houses, each 18 feet 10 inches by 40 feet, two stories and basement in height, on the north side of One Hundred and Thirty-fourth street, and on the south side of One Hundred and Thirty-fifth street, to so far vary the provisions of the "Building Law" as to permit of the erection of all of the walls of said buildings above the basement stories thereof, but eight (8) inches in thickness. The beams to be set and laid alternately in accordance with the Specifications and Plans No. 68 of New Buildings, filed February 2, 1878. Petition granted, provided and upon the condition that the front and rear walls of the buildings proposed to be erected be constructed throughout twelve (12) inches in thickness.

Petition of M. Levy, owner, per William Jose, architect, for permission in the erection of a five-story brick dwelling on the north-east corner of First avenue and Third street, to be occupied as a store on first floor, and by three families on each floor above store. Building to be 24 by 62 and 58 feet in height from curb level, to so far vary the provisions of the "Building Law" as to permit of the construction of the building in conformity with the Plans and Specifications for New Buildings, Nos. 78 and 79, filed February 28, 1878, and particularly to permit the construction of the bearing walls on line of Third street only twelve inches in thickness. Petition granted upon the condition and provided that the first story of the bearing wall on the line of Third street be constructed sixteen (16) inches in thickness.

Petition of Charles C. Haight, architect, for and on behalf of H. E. Pellen, owner, for permission to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law in the erection of the six-story brick warehouse on premises No. 277 Canal street, as to permit of the erection of the same in accordance with the Plans and Specifications No. 72 of New Buildings, filed February 23, 1878. The building to be 25 x 89, and 75 feet in height at the highest point (divided into six stories), foundations to be of stone and carried 13 feet below the curb level, and to be 24 inches in thickness, the upper walls 16 inches in thickness to top of the fifth story floor beams, and but 12 inches thick thence to the top. Petition, upon motion, granted.

Application of C. H. Longstreet, Superintendent of the Morrisania Steamboat Company, for permission to erect on dock pier foot of Fifty-first street, East river, a frame structure (for use as a passenger house), in conformity with special application and plan relative thereto No. 82, filed March 4, 1878. Petition granted.

Petition of the New York Mutual Gas-light Company, per Chas. Place, secretary thereof, for permission in the erection of an extension to the main building on northeast corner of Union square and Sixteenth street, to be constructed of brick, 40 x 27, two stories and basement, or 45 feet in height, to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law as to permit of the erection of the bearing wall on line of Sixteenth street but 12 inches in thickness, as provided in Plan and Specifications for Alterations, No. 148, filed March 4, 1878. Petition, upon motion, granted.

Petition of M. & H. Schrenkeisen for permission to so far deviate from the strict provisions of the Building Law as to permit the building already erected upon the premises No. 15 Elizabeth street to stand as erected, notwithstanding that the walls of said building have been constructed and carried up to a height six feet in excess of the height provided and conditioned in the Specifications and Plans of New Buildings, No. 759, filed December 15, 1877. Petition, upon motion, granted.

Petition of Messrs. Palmer & Embury for permission to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law as to permit of the erection of a two-story brick furniture factory on the premises southeast corner of Water street and Gouverneur slip (the dimensions of which are to be), 149 feet 11 inches in width, front and rear, 40 feet in depth with being 57x30. Two stories 33 feet 10 inches in height, in conformity with the Plans and Specifications for New Buildings No. 96, submitted March 6, 1878, and without any division wall therein from front to rear. Petition, upon motion, granted.

Petition of John Glass, owner, per Geo. B. Pelham, architect, for permission in the erection of a five-story brick tenement building on the northwest corner of First avenue and Sixtieth street, 25 feet 5 inches x 75 and 54 feet in height, to so far vary or deviate from the strict provisions of the Building Law as to permit of the construction of the bearing wall, on line of Sixtieth street, but 12 inches instead of 16 inches, in conformity with Plans and Specifications No. 110 of New Buildings, filed March 11, 1878. Petition granted, upon motion.

Petition of John C. Burne, architect, for and on behalf of Michael Cronin, owner, for permission in the erection of a brick stable, two stories in height, 25 feet front and rear, 98 feet in depth, and 20 feet in height, on premises on north side of East Fifty-sixth street, 200 feet west of Second avenue, to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law as to permit the building to be constructed in conformity with Specifications and Plans No. 107, New Buildings of 1878, filed March 9, 1878, providing for the construction of the walls but 8 inches in thickness. Petition, upon motion, granted.

Petition of Felix Fuentor, owner, by John D. Hamilton, builder, for permission to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law as to permit him to erect an additional story to the present two-story extension to building No. 323 West Thirtieth street, now 30 feet in height, and to be, when completed, three stories, 38 feet in height, and as at present 23 x 10, with 8-inch walls, in conformity with Plans and Specifications for Alterations No. 173, filed March 11, 1878. Petition, upon motion, granted.

Petition of Edwin T. Petition, upon motion, granted.

Petition of Hannah Stegman, owner, for permission, in the proposed alteration of buildings 810, 812 and 814 Washington street, to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law as to permit her to alter and raise the said buildings, in accordance with the Plans and Specifications for Alterations No. 164, filed March 8, 1878. Petition, upon motion, granted.

There being no further business before the Board, the Minutes were, upon motion, read and approved, and the meeting, upon motion, adjourned subject to the call of the Superintendent of Buildings.

the Comptroller, of the actual total gross receipts for  
ferriage received by such lessee during the preceding  
three months, and also, that the lessee shall keep regular  
books of account, showing the daily gross receipts of the  
ferry leased, and allow said Comptroller, or any person  
designated by him, to examine such books.

The franchise will be put up and knocked down to the  
person offering to pay the largest percentage.

All moneys received for the conveyance of passengers,  
animals, vehicles, or freight from New York to be col-  
lected at the landing place in New York, or, if collected  
elsewhere, to be included in the receipts upon which such  
percentage is to be calculated and paid.

No bid less than such percentage on such gross receipts  
will be entertained.
