DEPARTMENT OF BUILDINGS.

[BOARD OF EXAMINERS.]

At a meeting of the Board of Examiners, held at the office of the Superintendent of Buildings, No. 2 Fourth avenue, on Tuesday the 7th day of January, A.D. 1879, in pursuance of the call of the Superintendent of Buildings, being present thereat:

Superintendent Henry J. Dudley, Edwin Dobbs, John Banta, Henry Dudley, and J. M. McLean. Superintendent Henry J. Dudley presiding.

The reading of the minutes of the previous meeting having been dispensed with, the Chairman submitted for the action of the Board the hereinafter named petitions and applications, to wit:

Petition of Charles Baxter, architect, for and on behalf of Charles White, owner, for permission in the erection of two brown-stone front and brick dwelling houses on south side of Eighty-sixth street, 130 feet east of Madison avenue, each 15 x 50 feet, three stories and basement, and 48 feet in height, to be allowed to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law as to permit the party-wall between the two buildings to be constructed above the second tier of beams, but eight (8) inches in thickness, and in all other respects in conformity with Plans and Specifications for New Buildings No. 744, filed December 21, 1878. Petition, upon motion, granted.

Petition of Henry Olsen, for permission to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law as to allow the frame building situated on the premises No. 128 East Eighty-fourth street (and which is 22 feet front and rear, 35 feet in depth, 2 stories, or 25 feet in height), to be altered and enlarged by raising the same an additional story, with Mansard roof, in conformity with the Specifications and Plans No. 1,076 for Alterations, filed December, 1878, relative thereto. Petition, upon motion, denied.

Petition of Daniel H. Stewart, builder, on behalf of Samuel P. White, owner, for permission to so far vary the provisions of the Building Law as to permit the brick dwelling-house, Nos. 212 and 214 West Eighteenth street, to be altered and enlarged by placing an additional story thereon, in conformity with the Specifications and Plans No. 1,119 relative thereto, filed, December 30, 1878, for alterations. Present building is 38 x 35 feet, and 29 feet in height, and when raised as proposed will not exceed 39 feet in height. Petition, upon motion, denied.

Upon motion, the petition of Wm. H. Hume, architect, on behalf of George C. Eyland, owner, relative to proposed alterations to building No. 16 Peekman street (and which petition was, upon motion, denied by Board of Examiners at Board meeting of December 24, 1878), was re-submitted to the Board, together with communication of Wm. H. Hume, dated January 6, 1879, relative thereto. And, upon motion, the former action of the Board, had at meeting of December 24, 1878, denying such petition, was reconsidered; and, upon motion, it was

Resolved, That the amended petition of the petitioner, Wm. H. Hume, providing for erection of an iron mansard roof to the building referred to, lightening and lessening the weight proposed to be placed thereon, be granted, upon the proper verification of the petition relative thereto. Plans and Specifications No. 1105, filed December 10, 1878.

Petition of John T. Conover for permission, on behalf of the owner, estate of R. M. Blatchford, to be allowed to so far vary or deviate from the strict provisions of the Building Law as to permit of the alteration and enlargement of the building known as No. 1 East Fourteenth street, in conformity with the Plans and Specifications relative thereto for Alterations No. 1111, filed December 23, 1878.

Foregoing petition was, upon motion, denied.

Petition of John C. Tucker, owner, for permission to so far vary or deviate from the provisions of the Building Law as to allow and permit of the erection of the iron and brick store, proposed to be erected upon the premises No. 30 West Fourteenth street, and No. 29 West Thirteenth street, 25 feet by 206 feet 6 inches, in conformity with the Plans and Specifications for New Buildings No. 4, relative thereto, filed January 3, 1879. Petition, upon motion, granted.

Application of Samuel M. Simpson, carpenter, asking to be examined by the Board of Examiners under the requirements of section 9, chapter 547, of Laws of 1874, as to his qualifications and competency to fill the position of an Inspector of Buildings.

The above-named applicant upon examination was found to be duly qualified, and so declared. Upon motion, it was

Resolved, That hereafter the meetings of this Board be held on the first and third Tuesdays of each and every month, without notification.

There being no further business before the Board, the minutes of the meeting were read, and, upon motion, approved as read.
