DEAR SIR—I have the honor to present the following report of the transactions of this Department for the quarter ending June 30, 1901:

BOROUGH OF MANHATTAN AND THE BRONX.

CROTON WATER SUPPLY.

During the quarter there were drawn from the storage reservoirs the following quantities of water:

All these drafts on stored water occurred subsequent to June 15, up to which time the natural flow of the Croton river furnished a full supply.

At the close of the quarter there were still in storage in the reservoirs 42,000,000,000 gallons of water.

The rainfall in the Croton Watershed and the Bronx River Watershed, as recorded by rain gauges kept at several stations by the Department, was as follows:

The average daily supply and consumption of water in the boroughs of Manhattan and The Bronx during the quarter has been 275,000,000 gallons from public water supply and 2,000,000 gallons from private water companies.

BRONX AND BYRAM RIVER WATER SUPPLY.

For two years past the available supply from these sources has been utterly inadequate for the demands of the population of The Bronx, and special measures, of which account has been given in previous reports of this Department, had to be taken to relieve the situation to prevent distress. These consisted in placing and putting in operation temporary pumping plants, with connections with the distributing system, to distribute additional water supply from the Croton Aqueduct.

In consequence of the low rainfall up to the present quarter, the two Rye Pond Reservoirs are not yet filled to their full capacity, but the Kensico Reservoir was filled in May.

The supply from the Bronx and Byram rivers averaged in April 15,000,000 gallons per day; 20,000,000 gallons in May, and 15,000,000 gallons in June.

Since June 10, the temporary pumping plant drawing from the Aqueduct, near Jerome Park Reservoir, has furnished an additional supply of 7,000,000 gallons per day.

Contracts have been made for the engine, boiler and coal houses, and for two 10,000,000 gallons pumping engines for a high service supply for this borough, the water to be obtained from the Croton supply. To utilize this it will be necessary to lay water-mains to connect with the distributing system, for which authority has not yet been obtained from the Municipal Assembly.

The new Croton Aqueduct has continued to furnish all the water required in the Borough of Manhattan, and part of the supply for the Borough of The Bronx, and although water was carried through it at the depth of 11 feet it has shown no defects.

The Department is continuing the measures for the sanitary protection of the water supply by maintaining a constant patrol of all the streams and reservoirs to detect and prevent nuisances and by the operation of the electrozone plant at Brewster and the dry-pan process at Mount Kisco for treatment and disposition of the sewage.

In extending and improving the distribution of water the following water-mains were laid:

- 2,350 feet of 48-inch mains.
- 2,370 linear feet of 36-inch mains.
- 80 linear feet of 20-inch mains.
- 1,207 linear feet of 12-inch mains.
- 16,560 linear feet of 6-inch mains.

Total, 22,567 linear feet of mains.

In connection therewith 40 new stop-cocks or valves, and 60 new fire-hydrants were placed.

Two special Pipe Repair Companies have been engaged in making improvements in the distributing system, and their work is summarized as follows:

- 72 additional fire-hydrants placed.
- 986 linear feet of additional water-mains laid.
- 12 new stop-cocks and boxes set.
- 50 new fire-hydrants placed.
- 29 stop-cocks repaired.
- 6 new stop-cocks placed for defective ones.

The six regular Repair Companies have given proper attention to the maintenance of the distributing system, and their work is summarized as follows:

- 197 new fire-hydrants set.
- 2,630 old hydrants repaired.
- 22 new stop-cocks set.
- 336 stop-cocks repaired.
- 186 leaks in water-mains repaired.
- 290 defective and leaking service-pipes shut off.
- 46 horse troughs repaired.
- 663 linear feet of water-mains placed in repair.

BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN.

The favorable conditions of rainfall during the past quarter have given considerable relief from the distressed condition under which the people of Brooklyn suffered for a year past on account of insufficient water supply. During the first quarter of the year the rainfall was 9.95 inches; during the last quarter it was 14.35 inches. As a consequence the average daily supply of water, which was 92,000,000 gallons, was capable of increase to 96,650,000 gallons, and the water held in the reservoirs has been increased from 269,500,000 gallons to 612,103,000 gallons. The large rainfall in March, April and May made it possible to discontinue drafts upon the Hempstead Storage Reservoir, which, on March 28, had a depth of water of only 4 feet 1 inch, and at the close of the last quarter had risen to a depth of 16 feet 8 inches.

In consequence of insufficient storage capacity in the watershed east of Rockville Centre, the supply from which is delivered into the Millburn Pumping Station, the full benefit of the copious rainfall could not be realized. Over one thousand million (1,000,000,000) gallons of water which with proper storage reservoirs could have been impounded as a reserve for dry seasons, had to be allowed to run to waste over the dams. There is no way of preventing such waste in the future, except by the construction of the reservoirs at Massapequa and East Meadow Creek and the reconstruction of the Millburn Reservoir to make it water-tight. The Department has obtained the appropriation for the Millburn Reservoir and that work is about to be begun. It is therefore urgently desired that the municipal authorities will, as early as possible, grant the appropriations for the construction of these two reservoirs as well as for the Forest Park Reservoir.

The work on the new conduit from Millburn Pumping Station to Spring Creek has not progressed at the rate expected and promised by the contractor when the contract was executed on the 29th of November last. He alleges that the causes for slow progress are difficulty in obtaining the necessary special castings and stress of weather during the latter part of March and the month of May.

The analyses made of the water supply at the Laboratory at Mount Prospect show that the water has been relatively good, although at times, in consequence of heavy rains, the number of bacteria was large.

Owing to the late date when an appropriation of \$250,000 by bond issue was obtained for extension of water-mains in the Borough of Brooklyn, the work done in making such extension was comparatively light.

There was laid during the quarter 863 feet of 12-inch mains and 318 feet of 6-inch mains. Favorable report to the Board of Public Improvements has been made on water-main extensions for 5,115 feet.

The defective engines and boilers at the Mount Prospect Pumping Station are about to be replaced under a new contract recently made. Engine No. 1 may have to be shut down before the new engines are in place, which will involve possible hardship to the high service district, owing to lack of pressure.

At the New Utrecht Pumping Station the supply of water pumped and delivered has been increased about 600,000 gallons per day over the quantity supplied in the second quarter of last year. New boilers are also needed at this station, as the old ones may not pass inspection for another year.

At the Gravesend Pumping Station the supply has been increased 400,000 gallons per day over the average for the corresponding quarter of last year.

At the Ridgewood South Side Station minor repairs have been made to the engines and boilers.

At the New Lots Pumping Station, acquired by the City from the Long Island Water Supply Company last year, two new boilers have been set and are now in operation. The service from this water plant has been satisfactory until about the middle of June, when the consumption increased beyond its capacity.

Work on the construction of the filter plants at Springfield and Baiseley's Ponds was commenced in May and is fairly progressing.

BOROUGH OF QUEENS.

The following are the average quantities of daily water supply furnished from the six pumping stations and under the contract of the Citizens' Water Supply Company during the quarter:

Owing to the increase in population and buildings, and especially in manufacturing establishments, the demand for water is in excess of the supply and causes decrease of pressure, in the delivery of the water. Requests for extension of the water service are constant, and will have to be met, although the means appropriated for additional purchase of water from private water companies, or for improvement of the public water plants, are inadequate.

The pumping plant at the Flushing Station has had to be operated sixteen hours every day, instead of eight hours. To continue this will necessitate the employment of an additional Engineer and two Firemen.

The plans and specifications for improvements at Pumping Station No. 3, Long Island City, and at Flushing and College Point, are now being prepared.

BOROUGH OF RICHMOND.

The average daily supply and consumption of water from the small public water plant at Tottenville during the past quarter has been 107,000 gallons.

The Department having at last received, by concurrence of the Municipal Assembly, an appropriation by bond issue of \$10,000 for laying additional water-mains, driving wells and making connections, the plans and specifications for this work are now in preparation and the contract will be advertised in a few days.

During the quarter 11 additional taps for house connections were placed in water-mains.

Under the appropriation of \$100,000 by bond issue, granted by concurrent resolution of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Municipal Assembly, approved by your Honor on May 14 ultimo, two parties of engineers have begun to make preliminary surveys, one on the Esopus river and the other on the Catskill river. The preliminary survey for the supply from the Ten Mile river were made some years ago. The object of these surveys is to select the most convenient locations for storage reservoirs and the lines of conduit for conveying the water to the city and to make preparation for detailed surveys and plans to carry out the necessary work.
