MINUTES, LOCAL BOARD OF CHESTER, TWENTY-FIFTH DISTRICT.

Pursuant to call by President Haffen the members of the Local Board of Chester, Twenty-fifth District, Borough of The Bronx, met at the office of the President of the Borough of The Bronx, in the Municipal Building, Crotona Park, corner of One Hundred and Seventy-seventh street and Third avenue, on May 24, 1906, at 9 a. m.

Mr. L. Crantz appeared in favor, and stated he was about to erect a building and would like to see the sewer work completed as soon as possible. No one appeared in opposition.

Laid over awaiting report of the Chief Engineer.

No. 282. Acquiring title to the extension of Westchester avenue, from Main street (West Farms road), Westchester, to the Eastern boulevard at Pelham Bay Park.

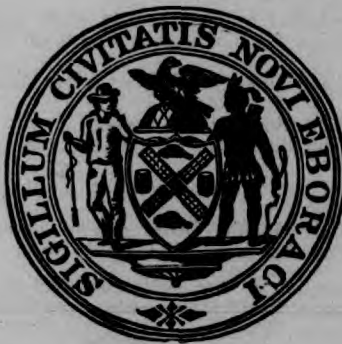

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety, or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.
