Petition of John A. Fitzsimons and others was read.

Mr. L. Crantz appeared in favor, and stated he was about to erect a building and would like to see the sewer work completed as soon as possible. No one appeared in opposition.

Laid over awaiting report of the Chief Engineer.

No. 282. Acquiring title to the extension of Westchester avenue, from Main street (West Farms road), Westchester, to the Eastern boulevard at Pelham Bay Park.

Petition of William J. Hyland and others was read. No one appeared in opposition.

On motion a resolution in favor of initiating this improvement was unanimously adopted.

On motion the Board respectfully recommended to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that said Board fix a date for the vesting of title to that part of Bronx Boulevard between Julianne street and East Two Hundred and Tenth street (or Magenta street), in order that proper proceedings may be initiated to bridge the Bronx river near Williamsbridge Station, Borough of The Bronx.

No. 55. Acquiring title to Kinsella avenue (street), from Rose street (Matthews avenue) to Bear Swamp road.

Petition of V. D'Andrew was read and represented an ownership of 475 feet.

No one appeared in opposition.

This street is shown on map showing the street system in Van Nest, which was approved by the Local Board of Chester, and is before the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for consideration.
