From the Board of Estimate and Apportionment—Assistant Secretary transmits copy of a resolution, which reads as follows:

Resolved, That, pursuant to the provisions of section 47 of the Greater New York Charter, as amended, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment hereby approves of the issue of Corporate Stock of The City of New York, to an amount not exceeding two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000), for the purpose of providing means for the payment of architect's services in the preparation of plans and specifications for the erection of new penitentiary buildings on Riker's Island, and that when authority therefor shall have been obtained from the Board of Aldermen, the Comptroller is authorized to issue Corporate Stock of The City of New York, in the manner provided by section 169 of the Greater New York Charter, to an amount not exceeding two hundred thousand dollars (\$200,000), the proceeds whereof to be applied to the purposes aforesaid.

Mr. P. J. SCULLY, City Clerk, New York City:

Dear Sir—I beg to acknowledge receipt of carbon copy of resolution adopted by the Board of Aldermen on June 25, relative to co-operation between the Board of Aldermen and the managers of all railroads operating within The City of New York, in conjunction with the Commissioner of Police in order to protect the traveling public from the gangs of young ruffians that infest the transportation lines of New York City.

This is a subject which has been frequently discussed by the various operating officials, but to-day upon receipt of the resolution in question it was again taken up with the presidents of the various companies embraced within this system, who again reiterated that it was the desire of them all to co-operate with your Board in this matter in every way possible. They all realize the necessity for joint action to preserve order in public vehicles. In fact, Mr. Bryan, president of the Interborough Rapid Transit Company, tells me he went so far in times past as to employ Special Policemen, uniforming them and paying them out of company funds. That he also employed special counsel to prosecute cases where arrests were made. However, the Magistrates in nearly every instance either dismissed the hoodlums when brought before them, without any punishment whatever, or inflicted such slight punishment as to make it almost a joke. With respect to the Special Policemen, for some reason unknown, Mr. Bryan was instructed by the Police authorities to cease using them dressed in the uniform that he furnished them, because of the fact that such uniform too nearly resembled the uniform used by the City Police—although the style of uniform had been agreed to by a former Police Commissioner. With the enforcement of this order the efficiency of the Special Policemen was practically eliminated, because it was the belief that they were City officers that gave the influence over these hoodlums. I can realize that the use of this uniform might have been abused, but so far as we know no complaint was ever made that our officers did abuse it. As to the personnel of these Special Policemen, Mr. Bryan advises that they were never employed until their fitness had been approved by the Police Department.

We are, however, not discouraged by our past experience, and if any practical suggestion can be made by which we can assist to preserve order, we will be glad to co-operate.

I understand that, with respect to one of the obstacles we experienced in the past, the Magistrates are now beginning to realize the seriousness of this matter. In so far as the other obstacle is concerned, if we are not permitted to uniform our men similar to the uniform of the City authorities the public will pay but little attention to them.

Sir—Hon. John H. O'Brien, Commissioner, Department of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity, in communication under date of June 18, 1907, requests the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the issue of Corporate Stock to the amount of two hundred and twenty-five thousand dollars (\$225,000) to provide for the improvement and development of the water supply system at and near Bayside Pumping Station, in the Third Ward, Borough of Queens.

I would report: Oakland Lake is located about 600 feet south of Bayside Pumping Station, near Bayside, Borough of Queens, is fed by springs, and wastes by overflow about one million gallons daily.

Between the lake and the pumping station several wells have been driven and connected with a suction main leading to the station; these wells during 1903 yielded 1,326,860 gallons per twenty-four hours, diminishing to 1,013,853 gallons during 1905, and yielding at the rate of 867,184 gallons per twenty-four hours during the first quarter of 1906, the decreased yield being good evidence of their deterioration.

The scheme as outlined in the attached communication involves the purchase of a strip of land varying in width from 50 to 100 feet, extending entirely around the lake, including within its bounds the surface of the lake, about eight acres; the acquiring of this land being necessary to properly protect the lake from contamination by the wash from the surrounding slopes.

The amount of the land purchase contemplated is the least area possible for such protection, and will admit of the raising of the lake surface by about five feet, thereby increasing the storage and also improving the operation of the filters. The filter plant will be located between the lake and the pumping station and to the west of the line of the wells now in operation.

Owing to the conditions existing at this lake it will be necessary to construct these beds in a concrete basin, thereby materially increasing the cost over those constructed at Hempstead Reservoir.

The estimated cost for these filters is fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000), which includes the necessary sand washing apparatus, and the purchase of a small amount of land, thus obviating the necessity of moving some of the existing wells.

It is also proposed to purchase about seven acres north of the pumping station, and running from Broadway northerly across the tracks of the Long Island Railroad, for the purpose of driving additional wells and thereby increasing the well yield from two million to three million gallons daily; the old wells will then be cleaned, as their present yield clearly indicates the necessity for this operation.

The present equipment of the existing pumping station is entirely inadequate for the work contemplated, and it is proposed to install a modern high duty pump of 5,000,000 gallons capacity, to deliver the water from the wells and filter plant into the distribution system at a minimum cost.

The change in the equipment will involve the necessity for remodelling the old structure, and this item has been included in the estimate to the amount of twenty five thousand dollars (\$25,000).

In general, I believe the proposition, as submitted, to be worthy of consideration, as the work, if successful, would result in an increased yield, in a rapidly growing territory, of some three to four million gallons daily; should the project not be carried out it would necessitate the purchase at no distant day of this amount of water at the rate of \$65 per million gallons.

I would therefore suggest that if the financial condition of the City warrants the expenditure that the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, pursuant to the provisions of section 178 of the Amended Greater New York Charter, may properly authorize the Comptroller to issue Corporate Stock to the amount of two hundred and twenty-five thousand dollars (\$225,000) to provide means for the improvement and development of the water supply system at and near Bayside Pumping Station, in the Third Ward, Borough of Queens.

Sir—In communication addressed to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, the Hon. John F. Ahearn, President of the Borough of Manhattan, requests the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to authorize the issue of an additional amount of Corporate Stock, \$6,500, for certain rearrangements and additions in the District Attorney's office, made necessary by an additional court room and judges' quarters in the Criminal Courts Building, Borough of Manhattan, created pursuant to chapters 411 and 412 of the Laws of 1907. I would report:

At meeting of June 21, 1907, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment authorized the issue of Corporate Stock to the amount of \$26,000 to provide and equip an additional court room, judges' quarters, etc., in the Criminal Courts Building, Borough of Manhattan, to accommodate the additional part of the Court of General Sessions created pursuant to chapters 411 and 412 of the Laws of 1907.

Dear Sir—Anticipating an unavoidable deficiency in the salaries and wages appropriation to this Department, I very respectfully request an issue of Special Revenue Bonds to the amount of \$5,330, to meet such prospective deficiency.

The reasons for the anticipated deficiency and the special amounts needed to meet the same are as follows:

First—The Department is advised by the Corporation Counsel that the salaries for the Superintendents of the Metropolitan Hospital and the City Hospital on Blackwell's Island and of the Cumberland Street Hospital in Brooklyn, are legally fixed by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Board of Aldermen at \$3,000 per year instead of \$1,950, the rate hitherto paid. It is my desire, therefore, to pay the salaries of the Superintendents of these hospitals at the rate of \$3,000, which I consider just and equitable for these positions, from July 1, 1907. This will make an extra expense for the balance of the year of \$1,575.

Second—The Department desires to keep the Coney Island Reception Hospital open all the year instead of during the summer only. For the last three months of the year this will cause an additional expense for salaries and wages to the amount of \$755.

Third—The Department finds it necessary because of the increase in the work of caring for acute and emergent cases and the difficulty in securing pupil nurses, to in-

crease the force of graduate nurses at the Kings County Hospital. It is estimated that ten additional nurses will be required to handle this work properly at an estimated cost of \$50 per month per nurse or for the balance of the year of \$3,000.

Dear Sir—The undersigned Commissioner of Public Charities very respectfully requests that permission be granted to the said Department to purchase without public letting two automobile ambulances at a cost not to exceed \$8,000.

These two automobile ambulances are urgently needed in order to properly take care of the work of this Department in the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens. The territory which our ambulances have to cover is very large, and it is almost impossible to properly attend to the work of the Department with horses.

One of these automobile ambulances is to be used for taking insane patients from all over the Boroughs of Brooklyn and Queens to the Kings County Observation Pavilion on Clarkson street, Flatbush. The other automobile ambulance is to be used as a transfer ambulance for transferring cases from the different private hospitals all over these boroughs to the Kings County Hospital.

In my opinion the business of the Department will be greatly facilitated if the permission is granted.

Resolved, That the Honorable the Board of Aldermen be and is hereby respectfully requested to approve a resolution, of which the following is a copy, to enable the Board of Health to make requisition upon the Comptroller for the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250) from the appropriation set apart for contingencies of the Department of Health, in the Borough of Queens:

"Resolved, That for the purpose of defraying any minor or incidental expenses in the Borough of Queens contingent to the Department of Health, the Secretary of the Board of Health may, by requisition, draw upon the Comptroller for a sum not exceeding two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250); the Secretary of the Board of Health may, in like manner, renew the draft as often as the Board of Health may deem it necessary, to the extent of the appropriation set apart for contingencies of the Department of Health; but no such renewal shall be made until the money paid upon the preceding draft shall be accounted for to the Comptroller by the transmittal of a voucher or vouchers, certified by the Commissioners of the Board of Health, covering the expenditures of money paid thereon."

Hon. PATRICK F. McGOWAN, President of the Board of Aldermen:

Dear Sir—Various bills amending the Primary Election Law and the General Election Law have passed both branches of the Legislature and are now before the Governor and it is the expectation of this Board that they will receive executive approval.

One of them, being Assembly Bill No. 2401, introduced by Assemblyman Prentice, known in the Senate as Bill No. 1645, amends in many particulars the Primary Election Law and provides for a new scheme of primary elections, with official ballots and nominations in a manner somewhat similar to that provided for by the General Election Law.

The execution of this and the other new laws enacted at the last session of the Legislature will impose upon this Board increased duties and call for the expenditure of large sums of money.

Provision has been made in these bills that the expense of conducting the primary elections shall be a public charge.

The Prentice bill hereinbefore mentioned provides, in section 22, that "the Board of Estimate and Apportionment of the City of New York is hereby empowered, authorized and directed to issue special revenue bonds of the City of New York, in the manner provided for by law, to meet the expenses of the said Primary Elections in the said City for the current year and the amount of the said bonds shall be included in the final estimates of the amount to be raised in said City by taxation for the next ensuing year."

To meet the extraordinary expenses required in the execution of this and the other laws which were not in existence and which were not anticipated when the Budget for the current year was made up, this Board is obliged to request the Board of Aldermen to adopt a resolution, requesting the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to issue Special Revenue Bonds, in the sum of \$150,000, to meet these extraordinary expenses.

In administering the law, this Board will be careful to economize in every direction, but the duty of executing the law is imperative and, so far as we can now estimate the amount necessary, the sum herein requested will be needed.

Dear Sir—On June 6 last I addressed a communication to your Honorable Body requesting that provision be made to meet the expense of fitting up the additional office space recently acquired by this Department. This request was favorably acted upon and the matter will soon come before the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for consideration.

Pending action by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, which no doubt will be favorable, I respectfully request your Honorable Body to grant me the further favor in this matter of exemption from the requirements of section 419 of the Greater New York Charter, so that I may be able to procure the use of the added office space at the earliest possible date by contracting, without public letting, for the alterations and fittings necessary to make the said space available.

As a justification for this request permit me to call your attention to the fact that the procedure involved in the requirements of section 419 of the Charter will cause a loss of the use by the Department of the said premises for a much longer time than would be occasioned by the plan proposed. The premises in question are now in possession of the City and rent is chargeable for the same, and any material loss of time, such as is required for advertising, etc., as called for in section 419 of the Charter, would involve a loss to the City in rent representing at least 25 per cent. of the cost of the proposed work, and further, any delay in making the space referred to available for use by the Department will prove a serious hindrance to the proper performance of the work of the Department.

REPORTS OF SPECIAL COMMITTEES.

Report of Committee on Baseball—

No. 2281.

The Special Committee on Baseball appointed by this Board to make arrangements for the baseball contest for a public charity between the Select and Common Council of Philadelphia and the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, has the honor to report as follows:

That after preliminary trials of the ability of the various members of this Board to play the great American game of baseball, a team was selected whom this committee had every confidence would render a good account of themselves. The team, accompanied by their guests, left for Philadelphia on a special train on June 19, 1907, and on arrival were met by a delegation of the Select and Common Council of that city in Quaker costume who escorted the Gothamites to the City Hall, where they were eloquently welcomed by his Honor, Mayor Reyburn, and given the freedom of the city. President McGowan, on behalf of this Board, responded most appropriately. The team and guests were then taken in automobiles around the city, and through beautiful Fairmount Park to the Belmont Mansion, an old, historical landmark, where, on the lawn, they witnessed an exhibition drill by the mounted police force of that city; the neat appearance of the men and horses, and the excellence of the execution of the maneuvers of the cavalry and street riot drills cannot be too highly commended and well deserved the long applause they received from the spectators. COMMUNICATIONS FROM CITY, COUNTY AND BOROUGH OFFICERS RESUMED.

The Vice-Chairman laid before the Board the following communication from the Department of Bridges:

Department of Bridges,

New York, July 23, 1907.

Hon. PATRICK F. MCGOWAN, President, Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, City Hall, Manhattan:

Sir—The City of New York is constructing a subsurface railway station at the Delancey street terminal of the Williamsburg Bridge. In connection with the station construction it is necessary to reconstruct a sewer on Delancey street along the northerly side thereof, from Suffolk street to Essex street, and in order to effect the same the removal of the vaults, areas, stoops, railings or other incumbrances located on the property of The City of New York, and maintained by the owners of adjoining property, is required.

I respectfully request that the Honorable Board of Aldermen pass a resolution to the effect that the public interests require that any licenses heretofore given under ordinances or otherwise for such vaults, areas, stoops, railings or other incumbrances, located on the northerly side of Delancey street, between Suffolk street and Essex street, in the Borough of Manhattan, shall be terminated for a period of six months.

It is necessary that immediate action be taken in this matter, in order to permit the early completion of the station and the operation of elevated railway trains over the Williamsburg Bridge.

Whereas, During the construction of this sewer it will be necessary to remove all vaults, areas, stoops, railings or other incumbrances located on the northerly side of Delancey street, between Suffolk street and Essex street, in the Borough of Manhattan; now therefore be it

Resolved, That the Board of Aldermen, in the interests of the public, hereby terminates any licenses heretofore given under ordinances or otherwise for the maintenance of vaults, areas, stoops, railings or other incumbrances located on the northerly side of Delancey street, between Suffolk street and Essex street, in the Borough of Manhattan, for a period of six (6) months from the date hereof.

Which was made a Special Order for 2.30 o'clock p. m.

REPORTS OF STANDING COMMITTEES.

Report of Committee on Finance—

No. 2099.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York:

The Committee on Finance of the Board of Aldermen, to whom was referred the assessment rolls of the estates, real and personal, of The City of New York, for the year 1907, together with a communication from the Comptroller of The City of New York, dated June 1, 1907, transmitting the Budget for the year 1907, accompanied by his certificate of the amounts authorized by law to be raised by tax in and for the year 1907, and an estimate of the revenues of the General Fund for the Reduction of Taxation during the current year, respectfully submits the following

REPORT:

The total Budget for the year 1907 is one hundred and thirty million four hundred and twenty-one thousand five hundred and five dollars and sixty-six cents (\$130,421,505.66), which includes county charges and expenses for the four counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, aggregating four million six hundred and sixty-four thousand eight hundred and thirty-nine dollars and fifty cents (\$4,664,839.50), leaving one hundred and twenty-five million seven hundred and fifty-six thousand six hundred and sixty-six dollars and sixteen cents (\$125,756,666.16), as the amount of the Budget which affects the general tax rates of The City of New York.

In addition to the amount of four million six hundred and sixty-four thousand eight hundred and thirty-nine dollars and fifty cents (\$4,664,839.50) included in the Budget for County Charges and Expenses, the following amounts disbursed during the year 1906 from the proceeds of Special Revenue Bonds for Judgments and Claims for county charges or liabilities, are to be raised by tax in the year 1907, in the respective counties, as provided by subdivisions 3 and 7 of section 188 of the revised Greater New York Charter, viz.:

Section 902 of the Charter, referred to in the Comptroller's communication, directs that the amounts required for the payment of all county charges and expenses shall be levied and collected from the taxable property within each of said counties respectively, to the end that each of said counties shall ultimately bear and pay all expenses necessary to be incurred for county as distinguished from City purposes. Compliance with the provision of law will, of course, forever prevent an uniform tax rate from prevailing in The City of New York.

AMOUNT TO BE RAISED FOR CITY AND STATE PURPOSES BY GENERAL RATES.

The following statement shows, therefore, the proportion of the Budget which is to be raised by taxation at uniform rates throughout the whole City:

THE ASSESSED VALUATIONS.

Certain corporations which pay taxes directly to the State are exempt by law from local taxation for State purposes, so far as their assessment affects personal property. It is provided by section 202 of chapter 908 of the Laws of 1896, as follows:

"Section 202. The personal property of every corporation, company, association or partnership, taxable under this article, other than for an organization tax, shall be

exempt from assessment and taxation upon its personal property for State purposes, and the personal property of every corporation taxable under section one hundred and eighty-seven a of this article, other than for an organization tax and as provided in chapter 37 of the General Laws, shall be exempt from assessment and taxation for all other purposes, if all taxes due and payable under this article have been paid thereby."

This provision of law requires, therefore, a special rate of tax to be imposed upon the personal estates of corporations, which are exempt from local taxation, for State purposes, differing from and less than the general rate for State, city and county purposes.

The assessment rolls for the current year, transmitted to the Board of Aldermen July 1, 1907, show the following valuations by counties:

The county lines correspond with the borough lines in all the boroughs except Manhattan and The Bronx, which, together, constitute New York County, and, as the rate of taxation in these two boroughs happens to be the same, it will be convenient in dealing with the assessed valuations to use the county classification.

As shown in the beginning of this report, the amount to be raised by uniform rates throughout the entire City for general City and State purposes is \$96,791,595 55

It is to be noted that the quota of State taxes due from each of the respective counties is included in the Budget for City purposes and in the above stated amount of tax to be raised by general rates throughout the City. In 1901 the quota of State taxes due from the several counties was included in the county charges and expenses, levied and raised in the several counties. The amount of State taxes due from The City of New York is this year imposed and levied with the tax to be raised by general rates throughout the City, pursuant to opinions of the Corporation Counsel, expressed in communications to the Comptroller dated October 25, 1901, and June 24, 1907.

Separating the amount to be levied, so as to show the proportion thereof for State and local City purposes respectively, produces the following result:

Your Committee recommends that in fixing the actual tax rates in the tax levy ordinance the decimal fractions of such rates be not carried beyond five figures, i. e., hundred thousandths of one per cent., as any smaller fraction would have no practical effect on individual assessments, while increasing enormously and unnecessarily the difficulties of extending the tax rolls and preparing tax bills. The total loss by omission of such remote decimals will be only \$501.93 in the whole tax levy of \$101,950,253.58.

As there is nothing to be gained by separate extensions on the tax rolls of the City, State and County rates, your Committee recommends that the aggregate thereof, or, in other words, the total tax rates in each borough, as the case may be, be fixed in the ordinance levying the taxes for the year 1907. Such an ordinance has been prepared and is submitted herewith for approval and adoption by the Board of Aldermen.

SPECIAL ASSESSMENTS IN THE BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN, TO BE COLLECTED WITH THE ANNUAL TAXES.

The Commissioners of Taxes and Assessments have added to the assessment rolls of the Borough of Brooklyn:

First—The amounts required by law to be raised with the annual taxes for the payment of principal and interest on bonds issued pursuant to chapter 311 of the Laws of 1886, as amended by chapter 335 of the Laws of 1886, for flagging, curbing, guttering and paving certain streets in the Twenty-sixth Ward of said borough (late Town of New Lots).

Second—The annual installment required by law to be collected as a part of the annual taxes for sewerage improvements in the Twenty-ninth Ward of said borough (late the Town of Flatbush), pursuant to the provisions of chapter 161 of the Laws of 1889 and amendments thereto.

Third—The annual installment required by law to be collected as a part of the annual taxes for street improvements in the Thirty-first Ward of said borough (late the Town of Gravesend), pursuant to the provisions of chapter 118 of the Laws of 1892, as amended.

Fourth—The annual installment required by law to be collected as a part of the annual taxes for the improvement of Flatbush avenue, in the Twenty-ninth Ward of said borough (late the Town of Flatbush), pursuant to the provisions of chapter 161 of the Laws of 1889, as amended by chapter 356 of the Laws of 1894.

The amount to be raised for the payment of the principal and interest on the New Lots bonds is fifty-seven thousand two hundred and sixty-one dollars and forty-five cents (\$57,261.45); the amount of the Flatbush sewer installment is eight thousand two hundred and twenty-two dollars and sixty-nine cents (\$8,222.69); the amount of the Thirty-first Ward improvement installment is forty-eight thousand two hundred and ninety dollars and eighty-two cents (\$48,290.82); the amount of the Flatbush avenue improvement installment is thirty-six thousand two hundred and sixty dollars and six cents (\$36,260.06).

The law requires that these assessments and installments be included in the tax levy ordinance to be levied and collected with the annual taxes.

AN ORDINANCE to provide the necessary means for the support of the government of The City of New York, and the Counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, and for the payment of the quota of the State taxes due from said counties, and for other purposes, and to levy taxes on the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation in The City of New York, pursuant to law, in and for the year 1907.

Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen of The City of New York, as follows: Section 1. There shall be and hereby is imposed and levied upon the estates, real and personal, subject to taxation of and within The City of New York, the sum of

ninety-six million seven hundred and ninety-one thousand five hundred and ninety-five dollars and fifty-five cents (\$96,791,595.55), to pay the expenses included in the Budget for the year 1907, for conducting the public business of The City of New York in each department and branch thereof, including principal and interest of the City debt, and an amount provided for deficiencies in taxes pursuant to chapter 209 of the Laws of 1906, and the quota of State taxes due from the counties of Kings, Queens and Richmond, which sum so imposed and levied by this section is that portion of the Budget for the year 1907, amounting in the aggregate to one hundred and thirty million four hundred and twenty-one thousand five hundred and five dollars and sixty-six cents (\$130,421,505.66), remaining after deducting therefrom the sum of four million six hundred and sixty-four thousand eight hundred and thirty-nine dollars and fifty cents (\$4,664,839.50), being the aggregate of the county charges and expenses of the counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, included therein, which sum is hereinafter levied and imposed upon said counties in the manner provided by section 902 of the Greater New York Charter; and after also deducting the sum of twenty-eight million nine hundred and sixty-five thousand and seventy dollars and sixty-one cents (\$28,965,070.61), supplied by the General Fund for the Reduction of Taxation, as stated by the Comptroller of The City of New York in a communication dated June 1, 1907, transmitting his certificate of the amount of the appropriations made in the Budget for the year 1907, copies of which communication and certificate and of the said Budget are as follows:

Department of Finance—Comptroller's Office,
City of New York,
June 1, 1907.

To the Honorable the Board of Aldermen:

Gentlemen—Section 900 of the amended Greater New York Charter provides as follows:

"It shall be the duty of the Comptroller of said City to prepare and submit to the Board of Aldermen, at least four weeks before its annual meeting in each and every year, for the purpose of imposing the annual taxes, a statement setting forth the amounts by law authorized to be raised by tax in that year, on account of the Corporation of The City of New York, as hereby constituted, or for City purposes within said City as created by this Act, and purposes for which said City is liable, and on account of the Counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, and also an estimate of the probable amount of receipts into the City Treasury during the then current year from all the sources of revenue of the general funds, including surplus revenue from the Sinking Funds of the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of The City of New York and of any of the Municipal and Public Corporations, or parts of Municipal and Public Corporations, by this Act consolidated with the Municipal Corporation known as the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of The City of New York, other than the surplus of revenue of any such Sinking Funds for the Payment of Interest on the City Debt of the Municipal Corporation known as the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of The City of New York, or the like debts of the Municipal and Public Corporations by this Act consolidated as aforesaid, and the said Board of Aldermen is hereby authorized and directed to deduct the total amount of such estimated receipts from the aggregate amount of all the various sums which by law they are required to order and cause to be raised by tax in said year, for the purposes aforesaid, and to cause to be raised by tax only the balance of such aggregate amount after making such deductions."

Section 902 of the amended Greater New York Charter provides as follows:

"In the statement submitted by the Comptroller to the Board of Aldermen, as above provided in this chapter, he shall each year include and state specifically the sum or sums necessary to be raised to pay during the current year the salaries of the County officers and other County charges and expenses in the Counties of New York, Kings, Queens and Richmond, respectively, and the Board of Aldermen is hereby authorized and directed to levy upon and collect from the taxable property within each of said Counties, respectively, the sum or sums so necessary to be raised to pay the salaries of County officers and other County charges and expenses of such County, to the end that each of said Counties shall ultimately bear and pay all expenses necessary to be incurred within the County for County as distinguished from City purposes."

In pursuance of the foregoing provisions of law I have the honor to submit to your Honorable Body statement as follows:

First—The Budget in detail for the year 1907.

THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

FOR CHARITABLE INSTITUTIONS.

All such appropriations being made subject to the following conditions:

1. The accounts of all charitable institutions receiving public moneys shall be so kept as to show receipts and disbursements in such form as shall be satisfactory to the Comptroller, showing the addresses of the parents, guardians, or nearest relatives of inmates, and other information designed to facilitate inquiry into their financial inability to provide for such inmates.

2. Moneys received from the City Treasury shall be used by such institutions only for recurring expenses of "care, support, education and maintenance."
3. All institutions receiving public moneys shall be at all reasonable times open to the visitation and inspection of duly authorized representatives of the Department of Public Charities and the Department of Finance.

4. Upon it appearing to the satisfaction of the Comptroller that it would be to the public interests to withhold payments to any charitable institution for which an appropriation has been made, he shall give written notice to such institution of his intention to apply to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment for authority to so withhold such payments, and upon the determination of said Board that such payments should terminate, the right of any such institution to to receive payment for services rendered thereafter shall thereupon cease.

5. Except where appropriations are made in bulk and not upon a per capita basis, no payment shall be made for inmates of private, charitable institutions unless the same shall have been accepted by the Commissioner of the Department of Public Charities as a proper charge against the City, and except in emergency cases, Commissioner of Charities shall not accept as proper charges against the City inmates capable of paying for their own support or for whose care adequate provision can be made in public institutions. The City shall not become liable for any payment to a charitable institution in excess of the appropriation which may have been made to such institution, notwithstanding any per capita rates of payment that may have been fixed for the inmates thereof.

6. All institutions receiving money from the City are required to state specifically the amount so received, as from the City Treasury, in their printed annual reports.

7. That no money be paid to any private charitable institution which pays any salary to or gives any consideration, financial or of any kind, for services to, or that has any business dealing with, or secures goods or merchandise, directly or indirectly, from any officer or trustee or member of its Board of Managers.

8. Where the City is paying 50 per cent, and upwards of the cost of maintenance of an institution the Board of Estimate and Apportionment requires representation in the board meetings of that institution, with the right of taking part in all business transactions. This representation shall be through the Comptroller, who may attend any meeting, either in person or through a representative appointed by him, of which appointment the Comptroller will give written notice to the board of the institution.

9. The Board of Estimate and Apportionment will not pay for the maintenance of dependent and delinquent children in the same institution.

10. The rates of payments to private charitable institutions, unless otherwise specially provided for, are fixed for the various classes of inmates as follows:

For infants under two (2) years of age, and in infants' hospitals also between the ages of two and five, per day.....	\$0 45
For dependent children, from two (2) to sixteen (16) years of age, per week.....	2 25
For delinquent children, per annum.....	135 00
For adult inmates of reformatories, committed by the Courts, per annum.....	135 00
For inmates in homes for unfortunate and friendless women, per annum.....	110 00

To hospitals for medical treatment, per day.....	70 00

For services of Custodian, first year, \$900; second year, \$1,050; thereafter \$1,200 per annum.

That charitable institutions for children now carried in the Budget and not sending their inmates to the Public Schools, and not sharing in the Corporate School Fund, and not receiving Teachers and school supplies from the Board of Education, but giving in their own buildings secular education to the children resident in the institutions, shall be paid a per capita of 7 cents per day, five school days in the week, for each child receiving such instruction of four years of age and over during ten months in the year. This money to be paid under the authorization of section 230 of the Charter, but under the general conditions relating to institutions receiving Corporate School money, as provided in section 1154.

It is the judgment of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that all children should be fully surrendered by their parents or guardians to the institutions to which they may be committed, and the Commissioner of Charities is requested to secure such surrenders as far as possible.

Magistrates are requested to transfer dependent, and when judicious, no proper guardianship children, and all cases coming to their attention in the Courts where no crime is proven against the child, to the Commissioner of Charities, who can commit to institutions. Magistrates are earnestly requested not to commit a dependent child to an institution on a Court commitment.

* Institutions shall be paid \$18 for the care of the mother and child during fifteen days of her confinement, and for every day thereafter shall be paid at the rate of 45 cents per day for the support of the child, and also \$12 per month for the maintenance of the mother, if she remain in the institution nursing infant after the expiration of the fifteen days.

The Commissioner of Charities is instructed to take such steps, either by appeal to the national authorities or by proper bills to the Legislature, as to provide that the children of immigrants abandoned within one year after arrival in this City be returned to the country whence they came.

The Committee on Finance, to whom was referred on June 11, 1907 (Minutes, page 1192), the annexed ordinance in favor of an issue of \$1,100,000 Corporate Stock for purchase of a water plant, Borough of Richmond, respectfully

REPORTS:

The Committee have given careful consideration to this matter, and have held a public hearing upon same, at which President Cromwell, Comptroller Metz, various water engineers and many citizens of Richmond appeared and urged the adoption of the ordinance. Alderman Doull appeared in opposition. At this hearing it developed that the water service in that section of Staten Island was very poor and had been for some time, and that there should be some relief. The Committee carefully inquired into the valuation of the plant, and according to the engineer's statement, it seems that the sum of \$907,000 represents the value of the tangible property which would go to the City, and the balance of \$193,000 represents the compromise agreed on between the representative of the City and the representative of the water company. It also developed that the water supplied by the West Brighton pumping station was of very poor quality. The Committee of the Board of Estimate, consisting of the Comptroller and the President of the Borough of Richmond, submitted the annexed report on the valuation of the plant, and also the report of the arbitrators on same. The Committee have held several sessions since, at one of which John McKay, Chief Engineer of the Department of Water Supply for the boroughs of Brooklyn and Richmond, appeared and stated that he had gone carefully over the plant of the Staten Island Company, and believed that an entirely new plant could be constructed by the City which would adequately supply the territory covered by the Staten Island Company at a cost which would not exceed \$750,000, of which the plant and pipe installation would be \$500,000, the land \$100,000 and the machinery \$150,000; that this could supply over 10,000,000 gallons per day, to be obtained from wells driven by the company, and under contract for well water from New Jersey. The Committee are greatly in sympathy with President Cromwell and the people of that section of Staten Island in their endeavors to obtain an adequate water supply. The Committee feels, however, that even if the City should purchase that plant of the Staten Island Company, that considerable money would have to be spent to modernize that plant, which is an old one. The Committee believe that there is considerable question as to the valuation. They believe that the statement of Engineer McKay should be carefully investigated and that it would be economy for the City to install a new and proper plant not only if it can be done for the \$750,000 Engineer McKay estimates, but if it costs twice that amount, sooner than pay \$1,100,000 for an old plant with an insufficient supply both in quantity and quality. They do not, however, believe it to be policy to work hardship on the company, which has tried to be of service to the community but they feel that that company should at least go half way in meeting the City. The Committee recommends that this matter be again rejected, so that not only can further consideration be given to its value by the Engineers of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, but that investigation can be made into the proposition submitted by Chief Engineer McKay for the construction of a municipal water plant.

Devoe, Supervisor of Janitors of the Board of Education, and also investigated the cost of cleaning a number of buildings, private and public, in The City of New York. The Board of Trustees also advertised for bids for cleaning alone, and the annual cost at the rate per day submitted by the lowest bidder was found to be over \$20,000. Under all the circumstances, the Committee has decided to report the resolution favorably, and recommends its adoption.

Report of Committee on Docks and Ferries—

No. 275—(G. O. No. 329).

The Committee on Docks and Ferries, to whom was committed, on May 21, 1907 (Minutes, page 856), the annexed report and resolution in favor of the acquirement and operation of the East river ferries by the City, respectfully

REPORTS:

Your Committee held a public hearing on this proposition and has given considerable time and attention in investigating the local conditions along the river front on both the Manhattan and Brooklyn sides of the East river. A number of public meetings have been held in Brooklyn favoring the municipalization of the East river ferries, at which Comptroller Metz, Borough President Coler, ex-Mayor Wurster and other prominent officials and citizens appeared. As far as your Committee can ascertain, the sentiment in Brooklyn and along the east side of Manhattan Borough is practically unanimous in demanding that the ferry service on the East river be owned and operated by the City. In the Borough of Brooklyn a number of civic organizations favor free ferries as the only means of immediate relief from the present deplorable conditions on the East river bridges.

At a meeting of the Board of Aldermen, held on May 21, this Committee was instructed to report the probable cost of taking over these East river ferry properties. In this connection, we respectfully quote from a letter received from the Hon. J. A. Benschel, Commissioner of Docks and Ferries, under date of the 10th inst., addressed to your Committee:

"In 1902, the decision of the courts, made as a fair appraised value of the Union Ferry Company's property, amounted to about as follows:

"Real estate.....	\$556,000 00
"Ferry houses, bridges, etc.....	1,161,000 00
"Nineteen boats, with equipment.....	1,432,000 00
"Repair shops, etc.	80,000 00

"A total of..... \$3,339,401 00

"This sum was determined by the courts to be that which any company, securing the privilege to operate, other than the Union Ferry Company, would have to pay for the five ferries operated by the Union Ferry Company, at the termination of the lease or franchise which expired May 1, 1901. The above referred to real estate, owned by the ferry company, is located in the vicinity of Hamilton and Atlantic avenues, Brooklyn, and is estimated at a price of about \$1.53 per square foot.

"In addition to the above, in regard to the cost of the purchase of the ferries, the City will have to consider the proposition of purchasing an additional amount of real estate which is at present leased by the ferry company, in the vicinity of Montague street, and in the vicinity of Main street, the value of which, added to that owned by the ferry company, that will have to be purchased, makes a total amount that will have to be paid by the City, if it desires to operate those ferries at present, of \$789,150, and with the addition of the structures, leaving out the boats, would amount to \$2,030,550.

"In regard to the Brooklyn Ferry Company, of New York, this company operates seven ferries: One from Roosevelt street to South Eighth street, one from Grand street to Broadway, one from Grand street to Grand street, one from East Tenth street to Greenpoint avenue, one from East Twenty-third street to Greenpoint avenue, one from East Twenty-third street to Broadway and one from East Forty-second street to Broadway.

"The wharf property used by the above ferry company in Manhattan, except that between East Forty-first and East Forty-second streets, and that between Grand and Broome streets, is owned by the City.

"In making an estimated value of their bulkhead, owned by the company between Grand and Broome streets, between East Forty-first and East Forty-second streets and South Sixth and South Ninth streets, Brooklyn, and land in the vicinity of Greenpoint avenue, Brooklyn, the total estimated value of this wharf property is \$1,137,375. There are in addition to this 12 ferry houses and 21 slips, and estimating these on the same basis as that fixed by the courts for the Union Ferry Company, the value would be \$1,355,000, making a total for the land and structures of \$2,492,375, or in round figures say \$2,500,000. This company owns 22 ferryboats, which, estimated at the same rate the courts appraised the value of the boats of the Union Ferry Company, would amount to \$1,658,000.

"The total value estimated above of the ferry companies operating on the East river, above mentioned, excluding the boats, would be practically \$5,000,000. This might be somewhat increased at the present time owing to the increase in the value of real estate in New York City since 1902. If the City were compelled to purchase the boats now operated by the ferry companies on the East river, it would practically have to make an expenditure of \$8,000,000 more.

"The facts in regard to the municipalization of any ferry system, however, are that it is not possible for the City to run the ferry system as at present operated by any private corporation, and in all probability, should the City undertake the municipalization of the East river ferries, it would have to contemplate that at least 20 new boats would have to be added to the service, and that the ferry terminals would need to be repaired and, in many cases, entirely renewed.

"If this work should be done gradually, however, except the purchase of the boats, it would seem fair to contemplate an expenditure by the City of \$5,000,000 for property, \$4,000,000 for new boats and \$4,000,000 for rehabilitation and rebuilding of ferry terminals, making a total that the City would contemplate as being necessary to be expended, should it take steps to secure these ferries, of about \$13,000,000.

"The present ferry companies state that all the ferries, under their present systems, are now operated in total at a loss. As the City would be compelled to operate them with fares no greater than they are at present, and as the extension of the rapid transit system and bridges would make the loss even greater than it is now, the additional fact should be considered by the governing powers of the City."

Your Committee quotes Commissioner Benschel's letter for its value as an argument against immediate municipalization, and, while your Committee is without expert knowledge upon the subject, it gives it as its opinion that the estimated figures of the Commissioner are entirely too high. But, granting for the sake of argument, that the cost of acquiring an efficient ferry service upon the East river, between the points now being operated, would be \$13,000,000, it is the opinion of your Committee that

the expenditure of even this vast sum would be a good investment on the part of the City.

The interest on \$13,000,000, at the rate of 4 per cent. per annum, is \$520,000 per year. With an adequate ferry service upon the East river, the value of wharfage property and the increased taxable value of thousands of parcels of real estate along our immense water front, would bring to the City more than a million dollars additional in taxes annually. The same primary law of economics applies to a public as to a private corporation. We live in an age of progress, and in what is destined to become within a couple of decades the largest city in the world. Every means of communication between our boroughs should be developed to their highest state of efficiency. While your Committee heartily favors the building of subways and bridges as means of rapid transit, it would call attention to the fact that these methods of transportation do not affect our immediate waterfront. New York has one of the finest harbors in the world. It is, and is destined to be, a great shipping centre. It would be a grave error if our City authorities neglected the improvement of our great area of water frontage. Much of the commerce of the world passes in and out of this port, and the preservation of our commercial supremacy among American cities should be one of the first considerations of an intelligent and patriotic administration.

For the above reasons, your Committee respectfully recommends the adoption of the following substitute resolution:

Resolved, That this Board favors the acquirement of the properties of the various ferry companies operating upon the East river at as early a date as is practicable, believing that their ownership and operation by the municipality would result in an efficient service between the boroughs of Manhattan and Brooklyn, which would have the effect of greatly benefiting the properties along the river front in both boroughs, and giving improved transit facilities to thousands of our citizens; and be it further

Resolved, That this Board respectfully recommends this proposition to the early consideration of the Commissioner of Docks and Ferries, the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and the Board of Sinking Fund Commissioners.

Report of Committee on Laws and Legislation—

No. 386—(G. O. No. 330).

The Committee on Laws and Legislation, to whom was referred on March 6, 1906 (Minutes, page 977), the annexed resolution in favor of requesting the holding of a public hearing on and investigating of telephone service of The City of New York, respectfully

REPORTS:

In its examination of this important subject your Committee has carefully considered the relations of the City with the telephone companies now operating, particularly in the Borough of Manhattan, the policy which the City should adopt towards such companies with respect to the privileges they now exercise, and the compensation to which the City is entitled therefor.

During its investigation, your Committee has communicated with the Corporation Counsel, the Comptroller, the Bureau of Franchises, and the New York Telephone Company, requesting information relative to the telephone situation in the City; and in response to such inquiries your Committee has been advised as to the proceedings pending before the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, upon the application of the Atlantic Telephone Company for a franchise, and the proposition of the New York Telephone Company resulting from such application; as to the action of the City against the Empire City Subway Company (Limited) to recover the amount claimed to be due under the contract with that company; as to the cost to the City of telephone service in its various departments, and as to the claims of the New York Telephone Company with respect to its right to operate wires in this City.

Your Committee held a public hearing upon the subject matter of the resolution, which was largely attended, and at which a number of speakers expressed their views, more particularly with reference to the character and quality of the telephone service rendered by the existing companies.

From such information as your Committee has been enabled to obtain, and from an examination of the law relating to the franchises under which the existing telephone companies claim the right to operate, your Committee has reached the conclusion that the contention of the New York Telephone Company, with respect to its right to operate wires in this City by virtue solely of its charter from the State, is, at least, of doubtful validity, and that in dealing with said company the utmost care should be observed to avoid the danger of confirming said company in the exercise of privileges of questionable legality.

In the opinion of your Committee the City should refuse to admit or recognize any claim of right to use its streets for telephone purposes without the consent of the municipal authorities first legally obtained.

With reference to the claim of the New York Telephone Company of its right to operate under privileges acquired from the Metropolitan Telephone and Telegraph Company, because of the incomplete and indefinite information which has come to the knowledge of your Committee relative to the manner in which such privileges were acquired, your Committee is unable to determine as to their validity. Attention, however, is called to the fact that one of the conditions upon which the privilege of operating was granted by the Board of Aldermen in 1881 to the Metropolitan Telephone and Telegraph Company, namely, that providing for the payment of compensation to the City, has never been complied with by that company or by the present company. Attention is also called to the veto message of former Mayor William R. Grace, in which he set forth at length his views that the action of the Board of Aldermen referred to was illegal; notwithstanding which the resolution was again passed, over the veto.

Your Committee refers to these matters solely because it is convinced that their consideration is of the utmost importance to the interests of the City. They demand rigid investigation for the protection of the City's rights, which have been too frequently disregarded in the past, a condition which should no longer prevail.

This does not involve impairing the usefulness of companies legally exercising privileges in the streets of the City, but does involve a recognition by them of the City's rights with respect to such privileges.

Your Committee therefore recommends to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment that these questions be thoroughly examined, with the view to determine whether or not the present operating telephone companies should be required to obtain the consent of said Board in order to continue such operation, and as to its power to impose conditions therefor, including the compensation to be paid the City for such privileges.

Your Committee finds that the cost to the various City departments of telephone service has rapidly and almost alarmingly increased since 1901, the first year of which the figures have been obtained. In that year the estimated cost, to the City, of telephone service was \$167,434.57; in 1904 the amount was over \$200,000, and in 1905 \$265,000. This matter is of serious importance, and in the opinion of your Committee such an annual cost is excessive and suggests wastefulness. Your Committee believes that by proper limitations in the grants of telephone privileges such cost could be regulated in the interest of economy without injury to the City or injustice to the companies.

At the public hearing held by your Committee there were present representatives of various organizations and bodies of citizens from different parts of the City, as may be learned from the minutes of the meeting accompanying this report. Your Committee has also had recourse to magazine and other published articles and matters of daily observation regarding the telephone service which have come to the personal knowledge of its members. This latter class of information may be somewhat prejudiced or based upon a temporary condition of affairs, but your Committee is sensible that public sentiment regarding the telephone situation may be, to some extent, correctly reflected from such sources.

Your Committee finds, as a result of its investigation, that there is serious complaint, particularly with respect to four features of the present telephone service, namely: (1) The character of the service, (2) the rates, (3) the adjustment of rates, by which certain sections of the City are placed at a disadvantage with other sections of the same general locality, and (4) the charges for excess calls.

With regard to this last complaint it is claimed that under the present system of registering calls, mistakes are of frequent occurrence and calls are charged to the subscriber where in the first instance the wrong number has been given by the operator.

It is not always convenient for a subscriber to keep a record of his calls, but in some instances where this has been done it is alleged that serious discrepancies have been disclosed between such record and the charges made by the company, to the disadvantage of the subscriber. It is evident that some system should be adopted by which an accurate register shall be made, and only when the requested connection is given. As a means to this end your Committee calls attention to the automatic system of registering referred to in the accompanying report of the Bureau of Franchises, under date of November 21, 1906, which is well worthy of consideration.

Your Committee finds that the reduction of rates at pay stations promulgated by the company has not generally, much less universally, benefited the public. Such reduction has affected only a limited number of such stations. The situation in this respect has not met public expectation, justified by the assurances of the company.

Your Committee appreciates that complaint as to the present telephone service may be in some instances exaggerated, and also that the difficulties attending such service in a large city are not easily overcome, but your Committee is satisfied that there is some just ground for complaint, and that service open to such fair criticism is a natural outgrowth of an unrestricted and uncontrolled monopoly of the business.

With respect to the action of the City against the Empire City Subway Company (Limited), to which reference has been made, your Committee is of the opinion that the same should be prosecuted to a speedy determination, the rights of the City under its contract with said company definitely and finally ascertained and hereafter vigorously maintained and enforced.

The work of the Bureau of Franchises upon this general subject, evidenced by its reports under dates of October 12, 1905, and April 24 and November 21, 1906, accompanying this report, is deserving of the highest commendation. The varied and detailed information contained in the reports of said bureau displays a care and thoroughness of research impossible to your Committee with the means at its command, and has been most helpful to your Committee in its examination of this subject.

In conclusion your Committee submits that the whole matter is intricate and difficult, and that it has been the aim of your Committee to treat the question broadly, fairly and impartially, for the interests of the City, with a full appreciation of the limitations of your Committee in dealing with a subject so comprehensive.

Your Committee recommends the adoption of the following resolution:

Resolved, That a copy of this report be transmitted to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment and to the Corporation Counsel, with the request of this Board that they consider the findings of this report in determining the questions arising upon the applications for franchises made to the Board of Estimate and Apportionment by the various telephone companies, and especially in determining the legal status of the present operating telephone companies with respect to the privileges they now exercise, and the powers of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment in the premises.

A Resolution Relating to the Holding of a Public Hearing on and an Investigation of the Telephone Service in The City of New York.

Whereas, Prevailing conditions in the City's administration, its social and business life, have rendered the telephone a thing of public necessity and a tremendous economic factor, increasing, as statistics have shown, the productive power of our industries, adding to our wealth and facilitating the transaction of the public business; and

Whereas, In practically every city and State of the Union, excepting New York, it has been demonstrated that free competition among telephone companies has led to a material reduction of the rates charged for telephone service without lessening the efficiency of such service; and

Whereas, The telephone system in The City of New York is operated and controlled by one corporation without competition, and under circumstances that enable said corporation to charge exorbitant rates and impose arbitrary conditions for furnishing such service, whereby not only our citizens, but also our City government is made to suffer financially; and

Whereas, Public attention has recently been drawn to this matter by the report of the General Laws Committee favoring the Krulwich bill in our State Assembly, and by the consideration of the Keenan bill in our State Senate, and also by expert writers in our newspapers and magazines, who claim that the people of this City are being mercilessly plundered by a telephone trust, that refuses an intelligible statement of account to its subscribers and throttles competition by corrupt and unconscionable practices, or buys off its opponents.

Resolved, That our Committee on Laws and Legislation be instructed to hold a public hearing upon these charges and to investigate and report upon the conditions of the telephone service in this City; the method of charging subscribers for calls and the reasonableness of the rates charged for such service, and also to report upon the powers of this Board to control said matters, with a view to the betterment thereof, and for the purpose of relieving this City and its citizens from the effects of a monopolized control of such telephone service, and all other matters relating thereto; and be it further

Resolved, That said committee report to this Board thereon with all convenient speed.

Adopted by the Board of Aldermen, March 6, 1906, a majority of all the members elected voting in favor thereof.

It shall be the duty of every occupant or tenant of any such building or place of business to separate or cause to be separated and put into their respective receptacles all such materials and substances and such receptacles shall not be filled to within four inches of the top thereof.

Such receptacles, as well as any light refuse or rubbish to be removed, shall be kept within the premises until the proper time for removal, and shall then be placed in the area or within the stoop line only, and shall there remain until such materials or substances are removed by the Department of Street Cleaning, but in no case shall such receptacles be placed where they shall be or become a nuisance.

All light refuse or rubbish likely to be scattered or blown about, shall, before being placed outside of any building or premises for removal, be properly bundled, packed or otherwise secured.

Sec. 2. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 3. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS.

The person or persons making a bid or estimate for any services, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or offices, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid or estimate is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President or Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the estimates received will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of said Department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid or estimate shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also, that it is made without any connection with any other person making an estimate for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud, and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer of The City of New York, is, shall be or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid or estimate must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the estimate that the several matters stated herein are in all respects true.

Each bid or estimate shall be accompanied by the consent, in writing, of two householders or freeholders in The City of New York, or of a guaranty or surety company duly authorized by law to act as surety, and shall contain the matters set forth in the blank forms mentioned below.

No bid or estimate will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of any proposal, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks of The City of New York, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money to the amount of five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

The certified check or money should not be inclosed in the envelope containing the bid or estimate, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid or estimate.

For particulars as to the quantity and quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.

No bid shall be accepted from or contract awarded to any person who is in arrears to The City of New York upon debt or contract, or who is a defaulter, as surety or otherwise, upon any obligation to the City.

The contract must be bid for separately. The right is reserved in each case to reject all bids or estimates if it is deemed to be for the interest of the City so to do.

Bidders will write out the amount of their bids or estimates in addition to inserting the same in figures.

Bidders are requested to make their bids or estimates upon the blank forms prepared and furnished by the City, a copy of which, with the proper envelope in which to inclose the bid, together with a copy of the contract, including the specifications, in the form approved by the Corporation Counsel, can be obtained upon application therefor at the office of the Department for which the work is to be done.
