Minutes of Meeting of Board of Estimate and Apportionment, Held in Room 16, City Hall, Thursday, June 20, 1912.

PUBLIC IMPROVEMENT MATTERS.

The Board met in pursuance of an adjournment.

Present-William J. Gaynor, Mayor; Douglas Mathewson, Deputy and Acting Comptroller; John Purroy Mitchel, President, Board of Aldermen; George Mc-Aneny, President, Borough of Manhattan; Lewis H. Pounds, Acting President, Borough of Brooklyn; Cyrus C. Miller, President, Borough of The Bronx; Maurice E. Connolly, President, Borough of Queens, and Louis L. Tribus, Acting President, Borough of Richmond.

The Mayor, Hon. William J. Gaynor, presided.

After disposing of the Financial and Franchise calendars the following Public Improvement matters were considered:

The minutes of the meetings held May 31 and June 6, 1912, were approved as printed in the CITY RECORD June 15, 1912.

DISCONTINUING DOCK STREET, BETWEEN WATER STREET AND THE EAST RIVER, AND LAYING OUT A NEW STREET TO ADJOIN THE BROOKLYN BRIDGE LANDS AND TO EXTEND BETWEEN THE SAME LIMITS, BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN.

The following communication from the President of the Borough of Brooklyn

was presented: The City of New York, Office of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, Brooklyn, June 15, 1912.

Hon. WILLIAM J. GAYNOR, Mayor, Chairman of Board of Estimate and Apportion-

Dear Sir-At the meeting of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment held on May 2, 1912, there was referred to me the application of the Jay street terminal for a change in the location of Dock street, between Water street and the East River, in the 2d Ward of the Borough of Brooklyn, with the request that I report my recommendations in the matter. A similar petition had already been presented to me direct and I have called meetings of the Local Board of that district to consider the matter. The final meeting of this Board was held on the 10th inst., at which meeting there were representatives of the Dock Department and the Bridge Department. The Dock Department not only had no objection to the proposed change, but thought that it would be a decided benefit to the City; the Bridge Department has no objection either. The Aldermen of the Local Board, however, all voted against the closing of Dock street, their objection being based not upon the proposed change, but because they deemed it best to proceed to acquire all of the land between the present bridge property and the present dock property for dock purposes When the question was asked if any one present had any objection to the proposed change no one answered and no objections were made. A suggestion was made, however, that if the location be changed the new street have a width of 65 feet.

The entire matter has received careful consideration in my office and I have concluded that the proposed change will be of benefit to the City, and I submit herewith a map similar to the one submitted by the petitioners, except that it shows the proposed street 60 feet wide, which I think would be reasonable and fair both to the City and the petitioners.

According to the survey furnished by the petitioners, if the area of present Dock street were figured to the pierhead line, this 60 feet proposed would be practically an equal area, but if taken only to the bulkhead line an equal area would

Dear Sir-In response to your communication of May 17, forwarding copy of the report of the Chief Engineer of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment, and copies of two resolutions of the Local Board of the Prospect Heights District, relative to laying out and acquiring title to a "public park or playground" at the north-westerly corner of Lafayette avenue and Classon avenue, Borough of Brooklyn, I am authorized to make the following report:

An investigation of this site discloses the fact that there is already a playground inside of the school buildings, facing on DeKalb avenue, which is not used after school hours for play purposes, but simply by the school children during recess. The Principal of the school, Mr. W. A. Huntley, states that this playground is not used because no money is available for supervision. It appears to the Recreation Commission that the need in this locality is rather a wider use of the existing playground than the purchase of new lands, and the Commission therefore recommends that the application referred to this Commission be refused at least until it has been demonstrated that the wider use of the existing playground cannot supply the need.

Board of Estimate, City Hall, New York City: Gentlemen-As members of the Fifth Avenue Association, and consequently interested in the development and welfare of Fifth avenue, between Washington square and Fifty-ninth street, we are herewith writing to express our approval of the ordinances recently proposed by Borough President George McAneny, for the restriction of the height of buildings on Fifth avenue. We feel that such a restriction might well extend to 300 feet on either side of the avenue instead of 100 feet, as suggested by the Borough President. Very truly yours,

RELIEF FROM ASSESSMENT IN THE MATTER OF OPENING AND EXTENDING ROEBLING STREET, AS WIDENED, FROM BROADWAY TO DIVISION AVENUE; THE PUBLIC PLACE BOUNDED BY THE EASTERLY LINE OF ROEBLING STREET EXTENDED SOUTHERLY IN A DIRECT LINE TO THE NORTHEASTERLY SIDE OF LEE AVENUE, LEE AVENUE AND DIVISION AVENUE; AND TAYLOR STREET, AS WIDENED, FROM LEE AVENUE TO BEDFORD AVENUE, BOROUGH OF BROOKLYN.

The Secretary presented the following report of the Committee to which this matter was referred on October 21, 1910:

June 17, 1912. To the Honorable the Board of Estimate and Apportionment:

Gentlemen-On October 21, 1910, a petition for relief from assessment for the widening of Roebling and Taylor streets, in the Borough of Brooklyn, was referred to a committee consisting of the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, the President of the Board of Aldermen and the Comptroller. This Committee gave hearings to the property owners interested, and at the request of those who appeared before and addressed communications to the Committee, a report was deferred until the approximate expense of the proceeding should have been determined. Before the proceedings had reached a stage when the expense could be determined, chapter 679 of the Laws of 1911 was enacted, which gave the Board of Estimate and Apportionment the power to apportion the expense of any improvement involving either the acquisition of property or physical construction between a restricted area of assessment, a large area including a portion of a Borough, one or more Boroughs, and the City at large. The Committee believed that before applying the provisions of this act to any special cases, a definite policy with respect to its application should be formulated and adopted by the Board

On April 11, 1912, your Committee made a progress report submitting a report of the Chief Engineer of the Board which had been prepared at the request of the Committee, which report recommended a certain definite policy to be followed in the treatment of this and similar cases. The Board, upon the recommendation of the Committee, adopted the policy thus outlined as that of the Board, and we believe that the Roebling and Taylor streets matter should be finally disposed of in accordance with the general policy thus adopted, which included, among other things, the following

general principles which are applicable to this case:

(1) The estimated amount to be imposed upon the Borough of Brooklyn in any

one year as a Borough assessment should not exceed \$2,500,000.

Borough or upon the City.

(2) The act shall not be used to nullify the prohibition contained in section 980 of the Charter by which the Board of Estimate and Apportionment is not allowed to reconsider its determination as to the distribution of the expense of street openings

unless it is desired to apply the principle of Borough assessment.

(3) No portion of the expense shall be placed upon the City at large unless the improvement is unmistakably of metropolitan character.

(4) Where there is local benefit there must always be local assessment.

The Board has already determined, after a public hearing, that 25 per cent. of the expense of this improvement shall be borne by the City at large, while the remaining 75 per cent. was, under the Board's determination, to be placed upon a very large area of

benefit, including some 28,000 lots. Your Committee believes that the Board having once determined that 25 per cent. of the cost of this improvement shall be assumed by the City at large, it would be proper to adhere to that determination, but we believe

that the distribution of the remaining 75 per cent. can be made more equitable.

Section 980 of the Charter provides that the Board shall "have power to define the area or areas of assessment \* \* into zones or sub-areas of benefit, and to direct what portion in percentages of the cost and expense of the proceedings shall be made a charge upon \* \* \* such zones or sub-areas." In the case of street widenings it appears to your Committee that, while it is entirely proper to assess a portion of the cost of the additional land required for such widening upon the abutting property, it is inequitable to impose upon that property the damages caused to buildings. We believe that about 25 per cent. of the cost of the additional land, exclusive of improvements, could thus be assessed upon the frontage, the remaining cost of the land and the cost of damage to buildings being placed upon a large area, upon the

While the exact cost of the proceedings under consideration cannot be given at the present time, it will be approximately \$650,000, and we are advised that the awards for land constitute about 44 per cent. of the entire awards, and in order to apply the principle above outlined, we would recommend that 10 per cent. of the entire cost, or approximately one-fourth of the expense of the additional land, be assessed upon a restricted area extending one-half block on each side of the widened street. We further believe that, inasmuch as both Bedford avenue and Lee avenue will be substantially benefited by their improved connection with the Williamsburg Bridge, a larger area of assessment lying entirely outside of but not including the restricted area just described should bear such a proportion of the expense as will result in a graduated assessment, constantly decreasing with its distance from the streets to be widened, and extending to a line 100 feet south of Flushing avenue. Upon such an area there could be placed 20 per cent. of the entire cost of the proceeding, resulting in a fairly graduated assessment. The City at large assuming 25 per cent. of the expense, as already determined, there would then remain 45 per cent. to be distributed as a Borough assessment. The distribution of the expense under this plan would be as follows: (1) Upon a restricted area (A) extending one-half block on each side of the

street, 10 per cent. of the expense. (2) Upon a larger area of assessment (B), but not including area A, 20 per cent.

(3) Upon the Borough of Brooklyn, 45 per cent. of the entire cost.
(4) Upon The City of New York, 25 per cent. of the entire cost.

Your Committee believes that the placing of 25 per cent. of the cost of this improvement upon the City at large should not be considered a precedent, but it is done in this case because the Board has already determined that such proportion of the

expense should be borne by the City. We believe that these assessments will not be burdensome and that it will be unnecessary to extend the privilege of paying them in annual installments, but that they should be paid in one sum upon confirmation of the local assessments and in accordance with the provisions of section 247 of the Charter as enacted by chapter 679 of the Laws of 1911 with respect to the Borough assessment.

Your Committee has requested the Chief Engineer of the Board of Estimate and Apportionment to prepare technical descriptions for areas of assessment "A" and "B," which are as follows:

Beginning at a point on the southerly line of Broadway where it is intersected by a line midway between Roebling street and Driggs avenue and running thence eastwardly along the southerly line of Broadway to the intersection with a line bisecting the angle formed by the intersection of the prolongations of the easterly line of Roebling street and the westerly line of Havemeyer street, as these streets are laid out between Broadway and South 9th street; thence southwardly along the said bisecting line to the intersection with a line midway between Roebling street and Havemeyer street as these streets are laid out immediately adjoining Division avenue; thence southwardly along the said line midway between Roebling street and Havemeyer street and along the prolongation thereof to the intersection with the prolongation of a line midway between Taylor street and Wilson street as these streets are laid out between Bedford avenue and Lee avenue; thence southwestwardly along the said line midway between Taylor street and Wilson street and along the prolongation thereof to the intersection with a line distant 100 feet southwesterly from and parallel with the southwesterly line of Bedford avenue, the said distance being measured at right angles to Bedford avenue; thence northwestwardly along the said line parallel with Bedford avenue to the intersection with a line midway between Taylor street and Clymer street; thence northeastwardly along the said line midway between Taylor street and Clymer street to the intersection with the prolongation of a line midway between Roebling street and Driggs avenue; thence northwardly along the said line midway between Roebling street and Driggs avenue and along the prolongation thereof to the point or place of beginning.

Beginning at a point on the southerly line of Broadway where it is intersected by a line midway between Bedford avenue and Driggs avenue and running thence eastwardly along the southerly line of Broadway to the intersection with a line midway between Havemeyer street and Marcy avenue as these streets are laid out immediately adjoining Broadway; thence southwardly along the said line midway between Havemeyer street and Marcy avenue to the intersection with a line midway between Havemeyer street and Marcy avenue as these streets are laid out immediately north of Division avenue; thence southwardly along the said line midway between Havemeyer street and Marcy avenue and along the prolongation thereof to the intersection with a line midway between Lee avenue and Marcy avenue as these streets are laid out north of Middleton street; thence southeastwardly along the said line midway between Lee avenue and Marcy avenue and along the prolongation thereof to the intersection with the prolongation of a line midway between Nostrand avenue and Marcy avenue as these streets are laid out south of Flushing avenue; thence southwardly along the said line midway between Nostrand avenue and Marcy avenue and along the prolongation thereof to the intersection with a line always distant 100 feet southerly from and parallel with the southerly line of Flushing avenue, the said distance being measured at right angles to Flushing avenue; thence westwardly along the said line parallel with Flushing avenue to the intersection with a line midway between Bedford avenue and Skillman street; thence northwardly along the said line midway between Bedford avenue and Skillman street and along the prolongation thereof to the inter-section with the prolongation of a line midway between Bedford avenue and Wythe avenue as these streets are laid out between Clymer street and Heyward street; thence northwestwardly along the said line midway between Bedford avenue and Wythe avenue and along the prolongation thereof to the intersection with a line midway between Morton street and Clymer street; thence northeastwardly along the said line midway between Morton street and Clymer street and along the prolongation thereof to the intersection with the prolongation of a line midway between Bedford avenue and Driggs avenue as these streets are laid out south of Broadway; thence northwardly along the said line midway between Bedford avenue and Driggs avenue and along the prolongation thereof to the point or place of beginning, excluding the area heretofore described as area "A."

We would recommend that the Board give a public hearing upon these areas of assessment at the meeting to be held on July 11, and that the expense of the proceeding be apportioned in accordance with the above recommendations.

The preliminary work for this improvement was authorized by the Board of Estimate and Apportionment on June 13, 1912, at which time information was presented to show that its probable cost would be about \$3,300. Weaver, Chief Engineer, a copy of which is attached hereto, is to be deemed a part of this contract, is to be construed with the text thereof, and is to be subbe deemed a part of this contract, is to be construed with the text thereof, and is to be substantially followed, provided that deviations therefrom and additional turnouts, switches and crossovers, which are consistent with the foregoing description, and the other provisions of this contract may be permitted by resolution of

the Board. Second-To operate the cars of the Company upon two tracks when constructed upon the Queensboro Bridge and approaches thereto, such Queensboro Bridge and approaches thereto, such tracks to be assigned to the Company by the Commissioner of Bridges; beginning at the northwesterly side line of Jackson avenue at the bridge plaza, in the Borough of Queens, and there connecting with the tracks of the Company above described; thence in and upon said bridge plaza to the easterly approach to the Queensboro Bridge; thence upon and along said bridge approach and across intersecting streets and aveproach and across intersecting streets and avenues to the Queensboro Bridge; thence upon and along the Queensboro Bridge to the westerly bridge approach; thence upon and along said westerly bridge approach to the westerly terminus thereof, in the Borough of Manhattan. Sec. 3. The grant of the right or privilege to construct, maintain and operate the said railway from the Queensboro Bridge plaza, at Jackson avenue, Borough of Queens, to the intersection of Central avenue and the boundary line between the Borough of Queens and the County of Nassau, upon the route hereinbefore described, is subject to the following conditions, which shall be complied with by the Company:

First-The consent in writing of the owners of half in value of the property bounded on each street and avenue described in the route of the Company to the construction and operation of said railway, shall be obtained by the Company, and a copy of such consents shall be filed with the Board before construction is commenced on such street or avenue. The consent in writing of the owners of half in value of the property bounded on all streets and avenues to the con-struction and operation of said railway, shall be obtained by the Company within one year from the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and a copy of such consent shall be filed with the Board within such time, or a copy of an order of the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court that said railway ought to be constructed in lieu of such consents.

Second—The said right to construct, maintain and operate said railway shall be held and enjoyed by the Company from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor until May 20, 1934, with the privilege of renewal of said contract for the further period of twenty-five (25) years, upon a fair revaluation of such right privilege.

If the Company shall determine to exercise its If the Company shall determine to exercise its privilege of renewal it shall make application to the Board, or any authority which shall be authorized by law to act for the City in place of the Board. Such application shall be made at any time not earlier than two (2) years and not later than one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract. The determination of the revaluation shall be sufficient if agreed to in writing by the Company and the Board, but in no case shall the annual rate of compensation to the City be fixed at a less amount than the sum required to be paid during the last year prior to the termination of the the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract.

If the Company and the Board shall not reach such agreement on or before the day one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract, then the annual rate of compensation for such succeeding twenty-five (25) years shall be reasonable, and either the City (by the Board) or the Company shall be bound upon request of the other to enter into a written agreement with each other fixing the rate of such compensation at such amount as shall be reasonable, but in no case shall the annual rate so fixed be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, and if the parties shall not forthwith agree upon what is reasonable, then the parties shall enter into a written agreement fixing such annual rate and at such amount as shall be determined by three disinterested free-holders selected in the following manner: the other to enter into a written agreement with

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board; one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Company; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder, and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluation aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six (6) months prior to the expiration of this original contract, and their report shall be filed with the Board within three (3) months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations, without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine any of the books of the Company and its officers under oath. The valuation so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties, but no annual sum shall, in any event, be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year of this original contract. If in for the last year of this original contract. If in any case the annual rate shall not be fixed prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, then the Company shall pay the annual rate theretofore prevailing until the new rate shall be determined, and shall then make up to the City the amount of any excess of the annual rate then determined over the previous annual case then determined over the previous annual rate then determined over the previous annual rate. The compensation and expenses of the said appraisers shall be borne jointly by the City and the Company, each paying one-half

Third—Upon the termination of this original contract, or if the same be renewed, then at the termination of the said renewal term, or upon the termination of the rights hereby granted for any cause, or upon the dissolution of the Company before such termination, the tracks and equipments of the Company constructed pursuant to this contract within the streets and avenues that become the property of the City without shall become the property of the City without cost, and the same may be used or disposed of by the City for any purpose whatsoever, or the same may be leased to any company or individual. If, however, at the termination of this conract as above, the Board shall so order by reso lution, the Company shall, upon thirty (30) days' notice from the Board, remove any and all of its tracks and other equipment constructed pursuant to this contract and the said streets and avenues

Fourth—Nothing in this contract shall be deemed to affect in any way the right of the City to grant to any other corporation or corporations or to any individual or individuals a similar right or privilege upon the same or other terms and conditions over the routes hereinbefore described.

The Company shall not at any time oppose the The Company shall not at any time oppose the construction and operation of any street surface construction and operation of any street surface railway by any such other corporation or individual which may receive a franchise therefor from the City which may necessitate the use of any portion of the railway which shall be constructed or operated by the Company pursuant to this contract; and the consent of the Company to the use of any portion of its railway by such corporation or individual shall not be necessary. necessary.

Should the City at any time during the term Should the City at any time during the term of this contract grant to any other corporation or to any individual the right or privilege to operate a railway upon the tracks of the Company on the route herein described or any portion thereof, then the City shall, within thirty (30) days thereafter, give notice to the Company that such right has been granted and of the name of the corporation or individual to which such right has been granted.

At the expiration of ninety (90) days after the giving of such notice, such individual or cor-poration shall have the right to begin the opera-tion of cars upon the tracks of the Company upon the route or any portion thereof over which such corporation or individual may receive a right or privilege, and to use therefor the tracks, equipment, power and all other property of the Company which shall be necessary in the operation of the cars of such corporation or individual upon the tracks of the Company and shall have the the tracks of the Company, and shall have the right to continue such operation until this contract or the right to use such property under the terms and conditions of this contract granted said corporation or individual by the City shall expire. Such corporation or individual shall pay to the Company for the right to use such tracks, equip-ment, power and other property above described such sum or sums as may be agreed upon in writing by such corporation or individual and the Company within said ninety (90) days, or in the event that such agreement cannot be reached within said ninety (90) days, such sum or sums as shall be determined by the Public Service Commission of the State of New York, for the First District.

Within thirty (30) days after such determina-tion by the Public Service Commission such new corporation or individual shall file with the said commission its acceptance or rejection in writing of said determination. In the event of rejection such corporation or individual shall immediately cease the operation of its cars over the tracks of the Company and shall within thirty (30) days thereafter pay to said Company for the use of its tracks and equipment already enjoyed a sum equal to the legal interest on such portion of the actual cost of construction of said railway structures and additions and betterments thereto, as the number of cars operated by such corpora-tion or individual shall have borne to the number tion or individual shall have borne to the number of cars operated by the company or companies using the same during said period; also a like proportion of the cost of keeping the tracks and electrical equipment in repair; also a like proportion of laying and repairing of pavement, removal of ice and snow, taxes, and all duties imposed upon the Company by the terms of this contract in connection with the maintenance of the operation of said railway so used, together or the operation of said railway so used, together with the actual cost of the power used for the operation of the cars of such individual or corporation. Provided, however, that such corporation or individual shall not be compelled to pay to the Company any sum as compensation for loss to it due to competition.

Fifth-Said railway may be operated by over-Fifth—Said railway may be operated by overhead electric power substantially similar to the overhead electric system now in use by street surface railways in the Borough of Queens, or by any other motive power, except locomotive steam power or horse power, which may be approved by the Board, and consented to by the abutting property owners, in accordance with the provisions of law, and by the Public Service Commission for the First District of the State of New York. of New York.

Provided, however, that the Board, at any time after the first ten (10) years of this contract, upon giving to the Company one (1) year's notice, may require the Company to operate its railway upon the whole or any portion of its route lying in and northwesterly from the Brooklyn and Jamaica turnpike, or Fulton street; and at any time after the first fifteen (15) years of this contract, upon giving to the Company one year's notice, may require the Company to operate its railway upon the whole or any portion of its route lying southeasterly from the Brooklyn and Jamaica turnpike, or Fulton street, by underground electric power, substantially similar to the system now in use on the street surface railways in the Borough of Manhattan, or by any other practical motive power then in use which does not require the use of poles and overhead wires in the streets and avenues, and thereupon to discontinue the use of the overhead trolley system and remove its poles, wires and other structures used by it for that purpose, from the streets and avenues of the City.

Sixth—Said railway shall be constructed, maintained and operated subject to the supervision and control of all the authorities of the City who have jurisdiction in such matters, as provided by the Charter of the City.

No construction upon said railway shall be commenced until written permits have been obtained.

The electrical equipment to be installed by the

Company for the operation of the railway within the limits of the City, whether the same be upon streets and avenues or upon private property, shall be constructed and maintained under the supervision and control of the Commissioner of

Seventh—The Company shall complete and put in operation that portion of the railway herein authorized from the Manhattan terminal of the Queensboro Bridge to the intersection of the tracks of the Long Island Railroad with Thomson avenue at or near Greenpoint avenue on or betracks of the Long Island Railroad with Thomson avenue at or near Greenpoint avenue on or before October 31, 1912, from the intersection of the tracks of the Long Island Railroad Company with Thomson avenue to the intersection of Thomson avenue and Broadway on or before December 31, 1912, from the intersection of Thomson avenue and Broadway to the proposed new Long Island Railroad station in the former village of Jamaica, on or before March 31, 1913. Upon the failure of the Company to complete the construction and place in operation any of the said portions of the railway on or before the dates or times herein specified, the right herein granted shall cease and determine, and all sums a properties asid to the City code of the right herein granted shall cease and determine, and all sums or securities paid to the City, or deposited with the Comptroller, as security for performance by the Company of the terms and conditions of this contract, as herein provided, shall be forfeited to the City without action by the City, provided, however, that the Board may extend the time within which to complete the construction and

place the railway in operation as it may deem just and equitable.

Eighth—Said railway shall not cross any railway or railroad other than street surface railways encountered in the route at the grade thereof but shall be constructed either above or below the grade of such railway or railroads. If any railway or railroad other than street surface railways are operated at the same grade of the streets or avenues in which the Company is hereby authorized to construct a railway at the time the Company constructs such railway, then the Company may construct at its own expense and use a temporary crossing and approaches thereto either upon private property or within the lines of such streets or avenues to be de-termined by resolution of the Board, and continue to use such temporary crossing until such time as either the grade of such street or avenue or such railway or railroad shall have been changed so that such railway or railroad shall not cross such street or avenue at the grade thereof. Tenth -Should the streets and avenues in which the railway is hereby authorized be changed at any time during the term of this contract, or should any such street or avenue be made a boulevard, in which it may

be desirable to have the position of the tracks changed, the Company shall, at its own expense, change its tracks to conform with such new grades, lines and positions as shall be directed by the Board or by the official having jurisdiction of such streets, avenues or boulevards, and during the construction of any public improvement upon said street, avenue or boulevard, the Company shall take care of and protect the track at its own expense; all to be done subject to the direction of the City official having jurisdiction.

Should, in the opinion of the President of the Borough of Queens, the present roadway of any of the said streets, avenues or highways be of insufficient width to accommodate both railway and other vehicular traffic, the Company shall widen such roadway under the direction of the President of the Borough of Queens to a width sufficient to accommodate such traffic; provided that no roadway shall be widened beyond the total width of the street, avenue or highway.

Eleventh—As long as said railway, or any portion thereof, remains in any street or avenue, the Company shall pave and keep in permanent repair that portion of the surface of the street or avenue in which the said railway is constructed, between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and for a distance of two (2) feet beyond the rails on either side thereof, under the supervision of the local authorities, whenever required by them to do so, and in such manner as they may pre-scribe. And the City shall have the right to change the material or character of the pavement of any street or avenue, and in that event the Company shall be bound to replace such pavement in the manner directed by the proper City officer, at its own expense, and the provision as to compairs herein contained shall apply to such renewed

or altered pavement.

Twelfth—The Company, so long as it shall continue to use any of the tracks upon the streets and avenues in which said railway shall be constructed, shall cause to be watered at least three structed, shall cause to be watered at least three (3) times every twenty-four (24) hours when the temperature is above 35 degrees Fahrenheit, the entire width of the streets and avenues, except when the width of such streets and avenues shall exceed sixty (60) feet between curb lines, in which case the Company shall cause to be watered only sixty (60) feet in width of such roadway, and the Company shall provide for such purpose at least one tank car, the capacity of which shall be sufficient to water such streets and avenues

and the Company shall provide for such purpose at least one tank car, the capacity of which shall be sufficient to water such streets and avenues in a satisfactory manner.

Provided, however, that the Company may, with the approval of the City officials having jurisdiction over such matters, oil that portion of the surface of the streets and avenues, between the tracks, the rails of the tracks and two of the surface each summer season, in such a manner as may be necessary to prevent the rising of dust, and if the Company shall so oil such portions of the streets and avenues then the Company shall not be required to water such streets and avenues as herein provided.

Thirteenth—The Company shall at all times keep the streets and avenues upon which the said railway is constructed, between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and for a distance of two (2) feet beyond the rails, on either side thereof, free

and clear from ice and snow; provided, however, that the Company shall, at the option of the President of the Borough of Queens, enter into an agreement for each winter season, or part thereof, to clean an equivalent amount of street

Fourteenth—It is agreed that the right hereby granted to operate a street surface railway shall granted to operate a street surface railway shall not be in preference or in hindrance to public work of the City, and should the said railway in any way interfere with the construction of public works in the streets and avenues, whether the same is done by the City directly or by a contractor for the City, the Company shall, at its own expense, protect or move the tracks and appurtenances in the manner directed by the City officials having jurisdiction over such public work. shall be applicable thereto.

Sixteenth—The grant of this privilege is subject to whatever right, title or interest the owners. of abutting property or others may have in and to the streets and avenues in which the Company

is authorized to operate.

Sec. 4. The grant of the right or privilege to operate cars upon two (2) tracks of the Queensboro Bridge and the approaches thereto, upon the route hereinbefore described, and to use other than the city was said bridge.

Such tracks and all electrical equipment neces-Such tracks and all electrical equipment necessary for the operation of cars thereon shall be installed at the expense of the City, and shall remain the property of the City, but the Company shall keep and maintain such tracks and electrical equipment in good order and repair, and in such manner as shall be approved and directed by the Commissioner of Bridges, and shall furnish all motive power required by the Commissioner of Bridges for the operation of its cars. thirty-five hundred dollars (\$3,500) and which shall be equal to three (3) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of thirty-five hundred dollars (\$3,500).

During the second term of five (5) years an annual sum which shall in no case be less than seven thousand dollars (\$7,000), and which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum

During the third term of five (5) years an annual sum, which shall in no case be less than twelve thousand dollars (\$12,000), and which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of twelve thousand dollars (\$12,000)

During the remaining term ending May 20, 1934, an annual sum which shall in no case be less than fourteen thousand seven hundred dollars (\$14,700), and which shall be equal to five (5) per cent. of its gross annual receipts, if such percentage shall exceed the sum of fourteen thousand seven hundred dollars (\$14,700).

(b) For the use of the bridge structure and approaches thereto the sum of five cents for each round trip or the sum of two and one-half cents for each single trip of each and every car operated upon the bridge.

The number of such cars shall be certified by the Commissioner of Bridges to the Comptroller once each month in such form as shall be designated by the Comptroller.

(c) For the use of the tracks owned by the

(c) For the use of the tracks owned by the City upon the bridge and approaches, a sum equal to four (4) per cent. per annum upon the valuation of thirty thousand dollars (\$30,000) per mile of single track used, provided, however, that if such tracks are used by any other company or companies, then the Company shall pay only such portion of such four (4) per cent. per annum upon the cost thereof as shall be proportionate to the use of such tracks by the Company tionate to the use of such tracks by the Company. The Commissioner of Bridges shall compute the sums due the City for the use of such tracks and

certify the same to the Comptroller.

(d) For the use of terminal loops and other terminal facilities which are the property of the City a sum equal to four (4) per cent, upon the cost of the tracks in the terminals, and all overhead equipment necessary for the operation of the cars, provided, however, that if such terminal loops and other terminal facilities are used by any other company or companies, then the Company shall pay only such portion of four (4) per cent. per annum upon the cost thereof as shall be proportionate to the use of such facilities by the Company. The Commissioner of Bridges shall compute the sums due the City for the use

of such terminal facilities and overhead equipment and certify the same to the Comptroller.

The Company upon the delivery of this contract and before any rights herein conferred are exercised by the Company shall pay to the City the sum of twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000), which sum the City agrees to exercise (\$20,000), which sum the City agrees to accept as payment for all sums due the City pursuant to the said contract of May 20, 1909, from the date thereof to the date hereof, and is the sum the Company agrees to be due the City pursuant to said contract.

The gross annual receipts mentioned above shall be the gross earnings of the Company from all sources within the limits of the City.

The annual charges shall commence from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

All annual charges as above shall be paid into All annual charges as above shall be paid into the treasury of the City on November 1 of each year, and shall be for the amount due to September 30 next preceding. Provided that the first annual payment shall be only for that proportion of the first annual charge as the time between the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor and September 30 following shall bear to the whole of one year.

Whenever the percentage required to be paid

Whenever the percentage required to be paid shall exceed the minimum amount as above, then such sum over and above such minimum shall be

paid on or before November 1 in each year for the year ending September 30 next preceding.

The annual charges herein provided are in-tended to include the percentages of gross re-ceipts now required to be paid by railway com-panies to the City pursuant to the Railroad Law as amended.

ny and all payments to be made by the terms of this contract to the City by the Company shall not be considered in any manner in the nature of a tax, but such payments shall be in addition to any and all taxes of whatsoever kind or description now or hereafter required to be paid by any ordinance of the City or by any law of the State of New York.

Second-The annual charges or payments shall continue throughout the whole term of this contract, whether original or renewal, notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other railway or railroad company providing for payment for railway or railroad rights of franchises at a different rate, and no assignment lease or sublease of the rights or privileges hereby granted, whether original or renewal, or of any part thereof, or of any of the routes mentioned herein, or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sublease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of this contract; and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said conditions as to payments, anything in any statute or in the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof or otherwise exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this contract.

Third—The rights and privileges hereby granted shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall the title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the Company, or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, evidenced by an instrument under seal, anything herein contained to the contrary thereof in anywise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unnecessary

any subsequent consent or consents. Fourth-Said railway shall be constructed and operated in the latest approved manner of street railway construction and operation, and it is hereby agreed that the Board may require the Company to improve or add to the railway equipment, including rolling stock and railway appurtenances, from time to time, as such additions and improvements are necessary, in the opinion of the Board. Upon failure on the part of the Company to comply with the direction of the Board within a reasonable time, the rights hereby granted shall cease and determine.

Fifth—The rate of fare for any passenger upon said railway shall not exceed five (5) cents, and the Company shall not charge any passenger more than five (5) cents for one continuous ride from any point on said railway, or a line or branch operated in connection therewith, to any point thereof, or of any connecting line or operated in the latest approved manner of street

The rate of fare upon the local bridge cars, or the through cars of the Company, entitling a passenger to ride once across the bridge shall not exceed three cents, and the Company shall at all times have tickets on sale, one of which shall entitle a passenger to ride across said

bridge, and the Company shall sell such tickets at the rate of not exceeding three cents for one and five cents for two.

The Company shall carry free upon the railway hereby authorized during the term of this contract all members of the Police and Fire Departments of the City, when such employees are partments of the City, when such employees are

in full uniform. Sixth—No cars shall be operated upon the railway hereby authorized, other than passenger cars, cars for the transportation of express matter and cars necessary for the repair or maintenance of the railway and no freight cars

Twelfth—The Company shall at all times keep accurate books of account of the gross earnings from all sources within the limits of the City, and shall, on or before November 1 of each year, make a verified report to the Comptroller of the City of the business done by the Company for the year ending September 30 next preceding, in such form as he may prescribe. Such report shall contain a statement of such gross earnings, the total miles in operation within the limits of the City and the miles of railway constructed and operated under this contract, and such other information as the Comptroller may require. The Comptroller shall have access to all books of the Company for the purpose of ascertaining the correctness of its report, and may examine its

officers under oath.

Thirteenth—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained, this contract may be forfeited by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel on notice of ten (10) days to the Company, or at option of the Board by resolution of said Board, which said resolution may contain a provision to the effect that the railway constructed and in use by virtue of this contract shall thereupon become the property of the City without proceed-ings at law or in equity. efficient public service at the rates herein fixed or fail to maintain its structures and equipment as herein provided in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, the Board may give notice to the Company specifying any de-fault on the part of the Company, and requiring the Company to remedy the same within a reasonable time; and upon failure of the Company to remedy such default within a reasonable time, the Company shall, for each day thereafter during which the default or defect remains, pay to the City the sum of two hundred and fifty dollars (\$250) as fixed or liquidated damages, or the Board, in case such structures or equipment which may affect the surface of the streets shall which may affect the surface of the streets shall not be put in good condition within a reasonable time after notice by the Board as aforesaid shall have the right to make all needed repairs at the expense of the Company, in which case the Company shall pay to the City the amount of the cost of such repairs, with legal interest thereon, all of which sums may be deducted from the fund hereinafter provided for. the fund hereinafter provided for.

Fifteenth-The Company shall assume all li bility to persons or property by reason of the construction or operation of the railway authorized by this contract, and it is a condition of this contract that the City shall assume no lia-

this contract that the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property on account of the same, and the Company hereby agrees to repay to the City any damage which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or default of the Company.

Sixteenth—This grant is upon the express condition that the Company shall, before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred hereby, and at all times thereafter during the term of this contract have on deposit with the Company troller of the City the sum of twenty thousand dollars (\$20,000), either in money or securities, to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance by the Company

of all of the terms and conditions of this contract, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charges for the privilege hereby granted, the efficiency of the public service rendered, the repairs of the street pavement, the removal of snow and ice and the quality of construction of the railway, and in case of default in the performance by the Company of such terms and conditions the City shall have the right to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furnished for the performance thereof after due notice, and shall collect the reasonable cost thereof from the said fund without legal proceedings; or after default in the payment of the annual charges, shall collect the same, with interest, from the said fund after ten (10) days' notice in writing to the Company; or in case of failure to keep the said terms and conditions of this contract relating to the headway, heating and lighting of cars, fenders, wheel guards and watering of street pavements, the Company shall pay a penalty of fifty dollars (\$50) per day for each day of violation, and the further sum of ten dollars (\$10) per day for each car that shall not be properly heated, lighted or supplied with fenders or wheel-guards, in case of the violation of the provisions relating to those matters; all of which sums may be deducted from said fund.

They shall act as apprais-ers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigation, without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine any of the books of the Company and its officers under oath. The valuation so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties, but no annual sum shall, in any event, be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year of the original term of this contract. If in any case the annual rate shall not be fixed prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, then the Company shall pay the annual rate theretofore prevailing until the new rate shall be determined, and shall then make up to the City the amount of any excess of the annual rate then determined over the previous annual rate. exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this contract.

Fourth—The consent hereby given shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall title, interest or property therein pass to a rest in the standard or any manner. property therein pass to or vest in any other per-

son or corporation whatsoever, either by the acts of the said grantee, its successors or assigns, or by operation of law, without the consent in writ-

ing of the City, acting by the Board, or its suc-cessors in authority.

Sixth—The Company shall commence and com-plete the construction of the tracks and appurte-nances herein authorized within one (1) year from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor, otherwise the rights herein grant-

ed shall cease and determine.

Seventh—The Company shall pay the entire cost of the construction and maintenance of the tracks herein authorized to be constructed, and in addition shall pay the following:

(a) The cost of the protection of all surface and subsurface structures which shall be in any

way disturbed by the construction of such tracks. (b) All changes in sewer or other subsurface structures made necessary by the construction of the said tracks, including the laying or relaying of pipes, conduits, sewers or other structures.

(c) The replacing or restoring the pavement

(c) The replacing or restoring the pavement in said streets which may be disturbed during the construction of the tracks.

(d) The inspection of all work during the construction or removal of the tracks, as herein provided, which may be required by the President of the Borough of Richmond and the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity.

Eighth—Before the construction shall be begun the Company shall obtain permits to do the work

the Company shall obtain permits to do the work from the President of the Borough of Richmond and from the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and Electricity. The Company shall perform all the duties which may be imposed upon it by these officials, as conditions of such permits, provided such conditions are not inconsistent. ent with the provisions of this consent. The Company shall submit to these officials working plans, which shall include and show in detail the method of construction of said railroad tracks, and the mode of protection or changes in all subsurface structures required by the construction of each tracks.

Ninth—The said railroad crossings shall, for their entire length between the lines of the streets where they are laid on the surface, be paved between the rails and for a width of two (2) feet outside thereof with asphalt blocks or vitrified brick, laid upon a concrete foundation, or such other material as may be prescribed by the President of the Borough of Richmond, and in a manner acceptable to him. The said crossings shall be constructed maintained and c ings shall be constructed, maintained and operated at the expense of the Company, subject to the supervision, control and inspection of the proper authorities of The City of New York who have jurisdiction in such matters under the Charter of The City of New York.

Tenth-The Company shall be liable for all damages to persons or property, including the street and subsurface structures therein, by reason of the construction and operation or maintenance of said railroad tracks, and appurte-nances, and it is a condition of this consent that The City of New York assumes no liability to either person or property on account of this consent.

Eleventh-Free and uninterrupted access to and passage over the streets shall be maintained at all times, both during construction and there-after, and no cars shall be allowed to stand upon said railroad tracks within the limits of

said streets.

Twelfth—This consent is granted on the further and express condition that all laws or ordi-nances now in force, or which may hereafter be adopted, shall be strictly complied with.

Thirteenth—The Company shall at all times keep the streets upon which the rails authorized by this contract are laid, between the said rails and for a distance of two (2) feet beyond the said rails, on either side thereof, free and clear

from ice and snow.

Fourteenth—The Company shall, upon being ordered by the Board so to do, remove the tracks hereby authorized to be constructed on and across Nicholas avenue and Granite avenue, from the surface of said streets, and construct the same over or under the said streets, as di-rected by the Board, and in such manner as the Board may prescribe, under the supervision of the local authorities of the Borough, at its own expense. And it further agrees, that if at any time during the continuance of this contract or any renewal thereof, proceedings shall be taken under the Railroad Law or any law of the State, looking to the removal of the tracks laid by it on the surface of any street, under authority of this contract, then and in that event the Company shall remove the tracks herein authorized and construct the same across said streets, either over or under the same as directed, at its own cost and expense. Nothing contained herein shall be deemed to affect the rights or liabilities of the Company as to the tracks already laid by it.

Fifteenth—The Company shall station flagmen at such points as shall be necessary to exclude pedestrians and vehicles from the tracks hereby pedestrians and vehicles from the tracks hereby authorized at all times when cars or trains shall be operated thereon. Should gates be erected, maintained and operated across any of the streets or avenues for the purpose of excluding pedestrians or vehicles from the tracks hereby authorized, the Company shall locate and erect the posts for such gates at such points as may be directed by the President of the Borough of Richmond. Sixteenth—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions

Sixteenth—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained, or with any orders of the Board, acting under the powers herein reserved, the franchise or consent herein granted may be forfered by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel, on notice of ten (10) days to the Company, or at the option of the Board by resolution of said Board, which said resolution may contain a provision to the effect that the railroad tracks and other structures constructed and in me he a provision to the effect that the railroad tracks and other structures constructed and in use by virtue of this contract shall thereupon become the property of the City without proceedings at law or in equity. Provided, however, that such action by the Board shall not be taken until the Board shall give notice to the Company to appear before it on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why such resolution declaring the contract forfeited should not be adopted. In case the Company fails to appear, action may be taken by the Board forthwith.

Seventeenth—This grant is upon the express condition that the Company within thirty (30) days after the signing of this contract by the

Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred hereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of the City the sum of five hundred dollars (\$500), either in money or securities to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance by the Company of all of the terms and conditions of this contract and compliance with all orders of the Board acting under the powers herein reserved, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charges for the privilege hereby granted, the repairs of street pavement, and the removal of the tracks at its own expense as herein provided, and in case its own expense as herein provided, and in case of default in the performance by the Company of such terms and conditions or compliance with such orders or either or any of them, the City shall have the right to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furnished for the performance thereof after due notice, and shall collect the reasonable cost thereof from the said fund without legal proceedings, or after default in the without legal proceedings; or after default in the payment of the annual charges, shall collect the same, with interest, from the said fund after ten (10) days' notice to the Company; or in case of failure to observe the other terms and conditions of this contract and orders of the Board acting hereunder, the Company shall pay a penalty of ten dollars (\$10) per day for each day of viola-

The Board, on complaint made, shall give notice to the Company, directing its President, or other officer, to appear before the Board on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why the Company should not be penalized in accordance with the foregoing provisions. If the Company fails to make an appearance, or, after a hearing, appears in the judgment of the Board to be in fault, said Board shall forthwith impose the prescribed penalty, or where the amount of the penalty is not prescribed herein, such amount as appears to the Board to be just, and without legal procedure direct the Comptroller to withdraw the amount of such penalty from the security fund deposited with him. In case of any drafts made upon the security fund the Company shall, upon ten (10, days' notice, pay to the City a sum sufficient to restore said security fund to the original amount of five hundred dollars (\$500), and in default thereof this contract shall be cancelled and annulled at the option of the Board, acting in behalf of the City. No action or proceeding or right under the provisions of this contract shall affect any other legal rights, remedies or causes of

Eighteenth—The words "notice" or "direction" wherever used in this contract shall be deemed to mean a written notice or direction. Every such notice or direction to be served upon the Company shall be delivered at such office in the City as shall have been designated by the Company, or if no such office shall have been designated, or if such designation shall have for any reason become inoperative, shall be mailed in the City, postage prepaid, addressed to the Company at the City. Delivery or mailing of such notice or direction as and when above provided shall be equivalent to direct personal notice or direction, and shall be deemed to have been given Every such notice or direction to be served upon direction, and shall be deemed to have been given at the time of delivery or mailing. Nineteenth—The word "street," wherever

Nineteenth—The word "street," wherever used herein, shall be deemed to mean such streets, avenues, highways, driveways, concourses, boule-vards or public places across and over which the Company is hereby granted the right to construct its tracks.

Sec. 3. Nothing in this contract shall be construed as in any way limiting the present or future jurisdiction of the Public Service Commission under the Laws of the State of New York.

Sec. 4. Nothing in this contract contained shall be deemed to limit in any way the police power now vested or hereafter to be delegated or granted to the City by the State of New York.

Sec. 5. The Company promises, covenants and agrees to conform to and abide by and perform to an experiments.

Sec. 2. The grant of this privilege is subject to the following conditions, which shall be complied with by the Company:

First—The consent in writing of the owners of half in value of the property bounded on said streets and avenues to the construction and said streets and avenues to the construction and operation of said railroad shall be obtained by the Company within one (1) month from the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and a copy of such consents shall be filed with the Board within such time, or in the event that such consents cannot be obtained within such time, the Company shall, within said one (1) month, or within one (1) month thereafter, make application to the Appellate Division of the Supreme Court for the appointment of Commissioners in the manner provided by the Railroad Law to the manner provided by the Railroad Law to determine if said railway ought to be constructed; otherwise this grant shall cease and deter-

Second—The said right to construct, maintain and operate said railroad shall be held and enjoyed by the Company for the term of fifteen (15) years from the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor, with the privilege of renewal of said contract for the further period of ten (10) years, upon a fair revaluation of such right and privilege.

If the Company shall determine to exercise its

privilege of renewal it shall make application to the Board, or any authority which shall be authorized by law to act for the City in place of the Board. Such application shall be made at any time not earlier than two (2) years, and not later than one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract. The determination of the revaluation shall be sufficient if agreed to in writing by the Company and the Board, but in no case shall the annual rate of compensation to the City be fixed at a less amount than the sum required to be paid during the last year prior to the termination of the privilege of renewal it shall make application to ing the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract.

If the Company and the Board shall not reach such agreement on or before the day one (1) year before the expiration of the original term of this contract, then the annual rate of com-pensation for such succeeding ten (10) years shall be reasonable, and either the City (by the Board) or the Company shall be bound upon request of the other to enter into a written agreement with each other fixing the rate of such compensation at such amount as shall be reasonable, but in no case shall the annual rate fixed be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, and if the or the original term of this contract, and if the parties shall not forthwith agree upon what is reasonable, then the parties shall enter into a written agreement fixing such annual rate and provided, further, that when the completion of said construction shall be prevented by legal at such amount as shall be determined by three disinterested freeholders selected in the follow-

One disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Board; one disinterested freeholder shall be chosen by the Company; these two shall choose a third disinterested freeholder, and the three so chosen shall act as appraisers and shall make the revaluation aforesaid. Such appraisers shall be chosen at least six (6) months prior to the expiration of this original contract, and their report shall be filed with the Board within three (3) months after they are chosen. They shall act as appraisers and not as arbitrators. They may base their judgment upon their own experience and upon such information as they may obtain by inquiries and investigations without the presence of either party. They shall have the right to examine any of the books of the Company and its officers under oath. The valuations so ascertained, fixed and determined shall be conclusive upon both parties, but no annual sum shall, in any event, be less than the sum required to be paid for the last year of the original term of this contract. If in any case the annual rate shall not be fixed prior to the termination of the original term of this contract, then the Company shall pay the annual rate theretofore prevailing until the new rate shall be determined, and shall then make up to the City the amount of any excess of the annual rate then determined over the previous annual The compensation and expenses of the said appraisers shall be borne jointly by the City nd the Company, each paying one-half thereof.
Third—Upon the termination of this original

contract, or if the same be renewed, then at the termination of the said renewal term, or upon the termination of the rights hereby grant-ed for any cause, or upon the dissolution of the Company before such termination, the tracks and equipments of the Company constructed pursuant to this contract within the streets and avenues shall become the property of the City without cost, and the same may be used or disposed of by the City for any purpose whatsoever, or the same may be leased to any company or indi-

If, however, at the termination of this contract, as above, the Board shall so order by resolution, the Company shall, upon thirty (30) days' notice from the Board, remove any and all of its tracks and other equipment constructed pursuant to this contract and the said streets and avenues shall be restored to their original condition at the sole cost and expense of the

Company.

Fourth—The Company shall pay to the City for this privilege the following sums of money:
(a) The sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000) in cash within thirty (30) days after the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor.

(b) During the first ten (10) years of this contract an annual sum of five hundred dollars

During the succeeding five years of this contract an annual sum of one thousand dollars The annual charges shall commence from the date upon which this contract is signed by the

All annual charges as above shall be paid into the treasury of the City on November 1 of each year and shall be for the amount due to Septem-

ber 30 next preceding. Provided that the first annual payment shall be only for that proportion of the first annual charge as the time between the date upon which this contract is signed by the Mayor and September 30 following shall bear to the whole of one year.

Before any rights hereby conferred are exercised by the Company and within thirty (30) days after the date on which this contract is signed by the Mayor, the Company shall also pay to the City the sum of six thousand two hundred and fifty dollars (\$6,250) for the past use and occupation of the streets by railroad tracks previously operated by the New York Dock Company. pany.

Any and all payments to be made by the terms of this contract to the City by the Company shall not be considered in any manner in the nature of a tax, but such payments shall be made in addition to any and all taxes of whatsoever kind or description, now or hereafter required to be paid by any ordinance of the City or resolution of the Board, or any law of the State of New York

Fifth—The annual charges or payments shall continue throughout the whole term of this contract (whether original or renewal), notwithstanding any clause in any statute or in the charter of any other railway or railroad com-pany providing for payment for railway or rail-road rights or franchises at a different rate, and no assignment, lease or sublease of the rights or privileges hereby granted (whether original or renewal), or of any part thereof, or of any part thereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purthereof, shall be valid or effectual for any purpose unless the said assignment, lease or sub-lease shall contain a covenant on the part of the assignee or lessee that the same is subject to all the conditions of this contract; and that the assignee or lessee assumes and will be bound by all of said conditions, and especially said conditions as to payments, anything in any statute or in the charter of such assignee or lessee to the contrary notwithstanding, and that the said assignee or lessee waives any more favorable conditions created by such statute or its charter, and that it will not claim by reason thereof or otherwise exemption from liability to perform each and all of the conditions of this contract.

contract.

Sixth—Nothing in this contract shall be deemed to affect in any way the right of the City to grant to any person or corporation a franchise or right to use the streets hereinbefore described or any part of them for railway purnoces.

Seventh—The rights and privileges hereby granted shall not be assigned, either in whole or in part, or leased or sublet in any manner, nor shall the title thereto, or right, interest or property therein, pass to or vest in any other person or corporation whatsoever, either by the act of the Company, or by operation of law, whether under the provisions of the statutes relating to the consolidation or merger of corporations or otherwise, without the consent of the City, acting by the Board, evidenced by an instrument under seal anything berein contained to the conunder seal, anything herein contained to the con-trary thereof in anywise notwithstanding, and the granting, giving or waiving of any one or more of such consents shall not render unneces sary any subsequent consent or consents.

Eighth—It is understood that the tracks here by authorized are now constructed and operated upon the surface of the streets, but should the Public Service Commission for the First District of the State of New York determine at any time during the term of this contract, pursuant to law, that such tracks must be operated either above or below the grade of the streets, then the Company shall at its own cost and expense construct the railroad hereby authorized at such a position, and shall complete said construction within nine (9) months from the date of such determination by said Public Service Commis-sion; otherwise this right shall cease and determine, and all sums paid, or which may be de-posited with the Comptroller of the City, as here-inafter provided, shall thereupon be forfeited to the City, provided that the period for comple-tion of such construction may be extended by proceedings in any court or by works of public improvement, or from other causes not within control of the Company, the time for the comple tion of such construction may be extended for the period of such prevention, but no delay shall be allowed for unless the court proceedings shall be diligently prosecuted by the Company and provided further, that in no case shall such delay be deemed to begin until the Company shall have given written notice to the Board of any such court proceedings or other occasion of delay, and deliver to the Board copies of any injunction or other orders, and the papers upon which the same shall have been granted, and unless upon the request of the Board the Com pany shall, in writing, consent that the Board either in its own name as a party, or in the name of the City as a party, may intervene in any

such proceedings.

Ninth—Said railroad shall be constructed. maintained and operated subject to the super-vision and control of all the authorities of the City who have jurisdiction in such matters, as provided by the Charter of the City. No construction upon said railroad shall be commenced until written permits have been ob-

tained from the proper City officials.

In any permits so issued such officials may also impose such conditions, as a condition of the granting of the same, as are necessary for the purpose of protecting any structures, in the streets and avenues, over which such officials have jurisdiction and the Company shall comply with such conditions.

The electrical equipment to be installed, if any, by the Company for the operation of the railroad within the limits of the City, whether the same be upon streets and avenues or upon private property shall be constructed and maintained under the supervision and control of the Commissioner of Water Supply, Gas and

Electricity.
Tenth—The work of construction of the tracks hereby authorized shall be done in such manner as shall not substantially interfere with the ordinary use of any street or avenue as a public

highway.

Eleventh—Cars may be operated upon said tracks by steam locomotives, which shall be housed or boxed so as to conform with the type commonly known as the dummy engine, or by any other motive power which may be approved by the Board and consented to by the abutting property owners, in accordance with the provisions of law, and by the Public Service Commission for the First District of the State of New York, provided, however, that the Board, upon

avenues, the Company shall station flagmen at such points as shall be necessary to exclude pedestrians and vehicles from the tracks at all times when cars or trains shall be operated thereon. Should it seem necessary in the opinion of the Board at any time during the term of this contract that gates be erected, maintained and operated across any of the streets or avenues for the purpose of excluding pedestrians and vehicles from the tracks hereby authorized, then the Company shall erect, maintain and operate such gates as may be designated upon thirty (30) days' notice by the Board to the Company.

Fourteenth—As long as said railroad, or any portion thereof, remains in any street or avenue, the Company shall set the curbs, pave the roadway and sidewalks and keep in permanent repair that portion of the surface of the streets or avenues in which the said railroad is constructed, between its tracks, the rails of its tracks and for a distance of two (2) feet beyond the rails on either side thereof, under the supervision of the local authorities, whenever required by them to do so, and in such manner as they may prescribe. In case of the neglect of the Company to make pavement or repairs after the expiration of thirty (30) days' notice to do so from the President of the Borough of Brooklyn, said President may make the same at the expense of the Company, and the City shall have the right to change the material or character of the pavement of any street or avenue, and in that event the Company shall be bound to replace such pavement in the manner directed by the proper City official, at its own expense, and the provisions as to repairs herein contained shall apply to such renewed or altered pavement.

Fifteenth—Should the Company be allowed to operate at the same grade as the streets and avenues, it shall at all times keep the streets and avenues, it shall at all times keep the streets and clear from ice and snow; provided, however, that the Company shall, at the option of the Commissioner of Street Cleaning, enter in

line to house line.

Sixteenth-Should the grades or lines of the Sixteenth—Should the grades or lines of the streets and avenues in which the railroad is hereby authorized be changed at any time after the railroad has been constructed and during the term of this contract, which may necessitate the change of the grade or a position of the said tracks, then the Company shall, at its own expense, change its tracks and appurtenances to conform with such new grades and lines, and during the construction of any public improvement upon said streets and avenues the Comment upon said streets and avenues, the Com-pany shall take care of and protect the tracks and appurtenances at its own expense, all to be done subject to the direction of the City official having jurisdiction over the construction of such change.

Seventeenth—It is agreed that the right hereby granted to operate a railroad shall not be in preference or in hindrance to public work of the City, and should the said railroad in any way interfere with the construction of public works in the streets and avenues, whether the same is done by the City directly or by a contractor for the City, the Company shall, at its own expense, protect or move the tracks and appurtenances in the manner directed by the City officials having jurisdiction over such public work.

Eighteenth—Any alteration to the sewerage or drainage systems, or to any other subsurface or to any surface structures in the streets, required on account of the construction or operation of the railroad, shall be made at the sole cost of the Company, and in such manner as the proper City officials may prescribe. Seventeenth-It is agreed that the right hereby

officials may prescribe. Nineteenth—Said railroad shall be constructed and operated in the latest approved manner of railroad construction and operation, and it is hereby agreed that the Board may require the Company to improve or add to the railroad equipment, including rolling stock and railroad approved the purtenances, from time to time, as such additions and improvements are necessary, in the opinion of the Board. Upon failure on the part of the Company to comply with the direction of the Board within a reasonable time, the rights hereby

granted shall cease and determine. Twentieth—The rates for carrying property upon the tracks hereby authorized shall in all cases be reasonable in amount, subject to the con-trol of the Board, and may be fixed by the Board after notice to the Company, and a hearing had thereon, and when so fixed such rates shall be binding upon the Company, and no rates in excess of those fixed shall be charged for such service.

Twenty-first—The Company shall at all times keep accurate books of account of the gross receipts from all sources within the limits of the City, and shall, on or before November 1 of each year, make a verified report to the Comptroller of the City of the business done by the Company, for the year ending September 30 next preceding, in such form as he may prescribe. Such report shall contain a statement of such gross receipts the total miles in operation within the limits of the total miles in operation within the limits of the City and the miles of railroad constructed and operated under this contract, and such other information as the Comptroller may require. The Comptroller shall have access to all books of the Company for the purpose of ascertaining the correctness of its report, and may examine its offi-

cers under oath.

Twenty-second—In case of any violation or breach or failure to comply with any of the provisions herein contained, or with any orders of the Board acting under the powers herein reserved, the franchise or consent herein granted may be forfeited by a suit brought by the Corporation Counsel, on notice of ten (10) days to the Company, or at the option of the Board by resolution of said Board, which said resolution may contain a provision to the effect that the railroad constructed and in use in streets and avenues by virtue of this contract shall thereupon become the cers under oath. virtue of this contract shall thereupon become the property of the City without proceedings at law or in equity. Provided, however, that such action by the Board shall not be taken until the Board shall give notice to the Company to appear before it on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why such resolution declaring the contract for-feited should not be adopted. In case the Com-pany fails to appear, action may be taken by the Board forthwith.

Twenty-third—If the Company shall fail to give efficient public service at the rates herein fixed, or fail to maintain its structures and equipment as herein provided in good condition throughout the whole term of this contract, the by the Board and consented to by the abutting property owners, in accordance with the provisions of law, and by the Public Service Commission for the First District of the State of New York, provided, however, that the Board, upon giving to the grantee one year's notice, may require the Company to operate its railroad upon the whole or any portion of the tracks hereby authorized by such proper system of electric power as may be designated by the Board, and the Company shall thereupon discontinue the use of steam locomotives from such tracks.

Twelfth—Neither passengers nor vehicles shall be prevented from crossing the tracks hereby authorized by the occupation of such tracks by cars or trains operated thereon for a greater period than five (5) consecutive minutes, at any time, and the aggregate of such periods shall not exceed ten (10) minutes in any hour between 7 o'clock a. m. and 6 o'clock p. m.

Thirteenth—Should the Company be allowed to operate at the same grade as the streets and

construction or operation of the railroad authorized by this contract, and it is a condition of this contract that the City shall assume no liability

contract that the City shall assume no liability whatsoever to either persons or property on account of the same, and the Company hereby agrees to repay to the City any damage which the City shall be compelled to pay by reason of any acts or default of the Company.

Twenty-fifth—This grant is upon the express condition that the Company, within thirty (30) days after the signing of this contract by the Mayor, and before anything is done in exercise of the rights conferred hereby, shall deposit with the Comptroller of the City the sum of five thousand dollars (\$5,000), either in money or securities, to be approved by him, which fund shall be security for the performance by the Company of all of the terms and conditions of this contract and compliance with all orders of the Board acting under the powers herein reserved, especially and compliance with all orders of the Board acting under the powers herein reserved, especially those which relate to the payment of the annual charges for the privilege hereby granted the rendering of efficient public service, at reasonable rates, the repairs of the street pavement, the quality of construction of the railroad and the quality of construction of the railroad and the maintenance of the property in good condition throughout the whole term of the contract, and in case of default in the performance by the Company of such terms and conditions, or compliance with such orders or either or any of them, the City shall have the right to cause the work to be done and the materials to be furnished for the performance thereof after due notice, and shall collect the reasonable cost thereof from the said fund without legal proceedings; or after default in the payment of the annual charges, shall collect in the payment of the annual charges, shall collect the same, with interest, from the said fund after ten (10) days' notice to the Company; or in case of failure to observe the said terms and condi-tions of this contract and orders of the Board hereunder, relating to the obstruction of traffic and the maintenance of flagmen, the Company shall pay a penalty of fifty dollars (\$50) per day for each day of violation, all of which sums may be deducted from said fund.

The Board, on complaint made, shall give notice to the Company, directing its President, or other officer, to appear before the Board on a certain day not less than ten (10) days after the date of such notice, to show cause why the Company should not be penalized in accordance with the foregoing provisions. If the Company fails to make an appearance, or, after a hearing appears in the judgment of the Board to be in fault, said Board shall forthwith impose the prescribed penalty, or where the amount of the penalty is not prescribed herein, such amount as appears to the Board to be just, and without legal procedure direct the Comptroller to withdraw the amount of such penalty from the security fund deposited with him. Twenty-eighth—The words "notice" or "direc-on," wherever used in this contract, shall be tion," wherever used in this contract, shall be deemed to mean a written notice or direction. Every such notice or direction to be served upon the Company shall be delivered at such office in the City as shall have been designated by the Company, or if no such office shall have been designated, or if such designation shall have for any reason become inoperative, shall be mailed in the City, postage prepaid, addressed to the Company at the City. Delivery or mailing of such notice or direction as and when above provided shall be equivalent to direct personal notice or direction, and shall be deemed to have been given at the time of delivery or mailing.

Twenty-ninth—If at any time the powers of

This grant is also upon the further express condition and limitation that the Company will not institute any proceedings to acquire by condemnation any land, property, appurtenances or rights owned by or leased to, used or occupied by the Union Ferry Company of New York and Brooklyn, in the operation of its public ferries, or any of them, or in connection therewith, nor any right of way over or through such lands or property except for the express purpose of making an extension to connect by land any two or all of the Company's three sets of land tracks described in its certificate of incorporation, and shown on the map hereinbefore described, attached hereto, and made a part of this contract. The Company shall first, however, by valid proceedings under the Railroad Law, file a proper certificate for such extension and apply for and receive the con-sent of the City to such extension and connection and the franchises therefor. Sec. 4. The grant of this privilege to the Company is likewise subject to the following conditions:

This contract shall not become operative until

This contract shall not become operative until the Company shall procure and cause to be executed and proved in proper form for record and duly delivered to the Board, an agreement in which both the New York Dock Railway and the New York Dock Company shall each agree with the City and between themselves:

First—That each of said Companies hereby consents to the condemnation by the City at any time in the future of any property, land, franchises or tracks owned by them, or either of them, or of the right to use such land, property, franchises or tracks, in common with said Companies, or either of them, which for public use or for public purposes may be required by the City or by any persons or corporation, thereunto duly authorized by the City.

Second—That in any such condemnation no

award shall be claimed by either Company for the value of any railroad franchise granted by the City, nor shall any award be made therefor.

Third—That should the City at any time in the future establish a freight terminal or other means of public service requiring the use of the railroad, docks or other property and facilities of either Company, then either Company or both shall upon notification by the Board permit the City to enter upon such property and use such property enter upon such property and use such property and facilities for said purposes. The compensation to either Company and other terms upon which the City shall be entitled to use such property and facilities shall be as favorable to the City as those upon which similar property and facilities are similarly used in manner and extent by other persons or corporations. If no similar by other persons or corporations. If no similar property and facilities are similarly used in man-ner and extent by other persons or corporations, then the said compensation and other terms shall be reasonable, and may be determined by condemnation, but the City shall at all times be permitted to enter upon such property for said purposes after sixty (60) days' notice by the Board to either or both of said Companies, provided that such condemnation proceedings shall be initiated within ninety (90) days after such

Fourth—That the foregoing provisions shall be binding upon the said Companies and their

successors or assigns.

Sec. 5. The grant herein is made by the City solely for the purpose of legalizing the existence of tracks in public streets which had heretofore been constructed and operated without authority, been constructed and operated without authority, and this grant is not to be construed as in any way forming a precedent for the City in determining its policy in relation to future applications of the Company, its successors or assigns, to occupy the streets or public property by railroad tracks.

Sec. 6. Nothing in this contract shall be construed as in any way limiting the present or future jurisdiction of the Public Service Commission under the Laws of the State of New York

Sec. 7. This grant is also upon the further and express condition that the provisions of article 5 and other provisions of the Railroad Law pertinent thereto shall be strictly complied with by the Company.

Sec. 8. The Company promises, covenants and agrees on its part and behalf to conform to and abide by and perform all the terms, conditions and requirements in this contract fixed and con-
