## MUNICIPAL CIVIL SERVICE COMMISSION.

### Minutes of Meeting of the Municipal Civil Service Commission of New York Held Wednesday, Feb. 27, 1918, at 10:30 A. M.

Present—James E. MacBride, President; Morris Cukor and William Drennan, Commissioners. The President presided.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the classification of positions in the Exempt Class under the heading "Department of Correction," by changing the line, 13 Chaplains, to read: 16 Chaplains. There were no appearances and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the classification of positions in the Labor Class, Part III., by including therein the title: "Gas Fitter." William C. Ormond, President of the Board of Assessors, and Robert W. Rodman, Esq., Sanitary Assistant to the Superintendent of School Buildings, Department of Education, appeared in favor of the proposed amendment. There were no other appearances and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

A public hearing was had on the proposed amendment of the classification of positions in the Non-Competitive Class, Part II., under the heading, College of the City of New York (without maintenance), by changing the line, Laboratory Mechanician, \$480 per annum, to read Laboratory Mechanician, \$612 per annum. Professor William Fox, of the College of the City of New York, appeared in favor of the proposed amendment. There were no other appearances and the Chair declared the hearing closed.

The Commission then went into regular session and the minutes of the meeting held Feb. 6 were approved.

On motion, the following resolutions were adopted:

Resolved. That the classification of positions in the exempt class, under the heading Department of Correction, be and the same is hereby amended by changing the line, 13 Chaplains, to read, 16 Chaplains.

Resolved. That the Municipal Civil Service Classification be and the same is hereby amended by including in the Labor Class, Part III., the title Gas Fitter.

The matter of the proposed amendment of the classification of positions in the Non-Competitive Class, Part II., under the heading, College of the City of New York (without maintenance), by changing the line, Laboratory Mechanician, \$480 per annum, to read, Laboratory Mechanician, \$612 per annum, was referred to the Acting Chief Examiner for a report as to whether the position could not be filled as the result of a competitive examination.

George B. Buck, Esq., appeared as directed to explain why the following named Clerks, E. Mabel Cummings, Mrs. Florence Sheppard, Dorothy Kittay and Mrs. Elizabeth B. Buchnam, had been employed under the provisions of clause 4 of Rule XII., in the Teachers' Retirement Board for a period of fifteen days at the rate of \$75 per month, to take the places of persons appointed from the list of Temporary Clerk whose services had been dispensed with. The Secretary was instructed to withhold the certificate of the Commission from the payroll of the aforementioned Clerks.

Harry C. Honeck, Warden, Riker's Island, Department of Correction, appeared in connection with a protest filed by the Keepers' Mutual Benevolent Organization against his appointment as Warden from the appropriate eligible list of Superintendent of Industries. The protest was dismissed.

James L. Mullin, 851 Jefferson ave., Bklyn., appeared, as directed. In this connection the Commission considered a report dated Feb. 18 from the Examiner in Charge of the Bureau of Investigation, stating that because Mr. Mullin, who was a candidate in the examination for promotion to Sergeant, Police Department, had used the wrong index number in his examination it was credited to John Frazer, who had not competed. The Commission requested the candidate to appear at its next regular meeting with witnesses who could substantiate his statements to the effect that he had competed in the examination, and the Secretary was instructed to request John Frazer to appear at that time.

George Cunningham and Emil Carbonell appeared as directed in connection with the appeal of George Cunningham that his papers in the examination for promotion to Sergeant, Police Department, be rated. The papers had not been rated because it appeared that the answers of these candidates were almost identical and that one candidate had been seated behind the other in the examination room. The matter was laid over.

Percy L. 

The permit for all opening in the street to be obtained by and at the expense of the purchaser. Failure to remove said buildings, appurtenances, or any part thereof, within thirty days from the day of possession will work forfeiture

of ownership of such buildings, appurtenances or portions as shall then be left standing, together with all moneys paid by said purchaser on account thereof at the time of the sale, and the understanding to be implied by the act of bidding, and The City of New York will, without notice to the purchaser, cause the same to be removed and the cost and expense thereof charged against the security above mentioned.

The work of removal must be carried on in every respect in a thorough and workmanlike manner, and must be completed within thirty days from the date of possession, and the successful bidder will provide and furnish all materials or labor and machinery necessary thereto, and will place proper and sufficient guards and fences and warning signs by day and night for the prevention of accidents, and will indemnify and save harmless The City of New York, its officers, agents and servants, and each of them, against any and all suits and actions, claims and demands of every name and description brought against it, them or any of them, and against and from all damage and costs to which it, they or any of them be put by reason of injury to the person or property of another, resulting from negligence or carelessness in the performance of the work, or in guarding the same, or from any improper or defective materials or machinery, implements or appliances used in the removal of said buildings.

Where party walls are found to exist between buildings purchased by different bidders, the materials of said party walls shall be understood to be equally divided between the separate purchasers.

Party walls and fences, when existing against adjacent property not sold, shall not be taken down. All furnishings, plaster, chimneys, projecting brick, etc., on the faces of such party walls are to be taken down and removed. The walls shall be made permanently self-supporting, beam holes, etc., bricked up, and the wall pointed and made to exclude wind and rain and present a clean exterior. The roofs and adjacent buildings shall be properly flashed and painted and made watertight where they have been disturbed by the operations of the Contractor.

No buildings, parts of buildings, fixtures or machinery sold for removal under these terms and conditions shall in any case be relocated or re-erected within the lines of any proposed street or other public improvement, and if any such buildings, parts of buildings, fixtures or machinery, etc., shall be relocated or re-erected within the lines of any proposed street or other public improvement, title thereto shall thereupon become vested in The City of New York and a resale at public or private sale may be made in the same manner as if no prior sale thereof had been made.

The Comptroller of The City of New York reserves the right on the day of sale to withdraw from sale any of the buildings, parts of buildings and machinery included therein, or to reject any and all bids, and be it further

Resolved, That while the said sale is held under the supervision of the Commissioners of the Sinking Fund, the Comptroller is authorized to cause the sale to be advertised and to direct the sale thereof as financial officer of the City.

#### NOTICE TO CONTRACTORS.

GENERAL INSTRUCTIONS TO BIDDERS ON WORK TO BE DONE FOR, OR SUPPLIES TO BE FURNISHED TO THE CITY OF NEW YORK.

The person or persons making a bid for any service, work, materials or supplies for The City of New York, or for any of its departments, bureaus or officers, shall furnish the same in a sealed envelope, indorsed with the title of the supplies, materials, work or services for which the bid is made, with his or their name or names and the date of presentation to the President of Board or to the head of the Department at his or its office, on or before the date and hour named in the advertisement for the same, at which time and place the bids will be publicly opened by the President or Board or head of the department and read, and the award of the contract made according to law as soon thereafter as practicable.

Each bid shall contain the name and place of residence of the person making the same, and the names of all persons interested with him therein, and, if no other person be so interested, it shall distinctly state that fact; also that it is made without any connection with any other person making a bid for the same purpose, and is in all respects fair and without collusion or fraud and that no member of the Board of Aldermen, head of a department, chief of a bureau, deputy thereof, or clerk therein, or other officer or employee of The City of New York is, shall be, or become interested, directly or indirectly, as contracting party, partner, stockholder, surety or otherwise in or in the performance of the contract, or in the supplies, work or business to which it relates, or in any portion of the profits thereof. The bid must be verified by the oath, in writing, of the party or parties making the bid that the several matters stated therein are in all respects true.

No bid will be considered unless, as a condition precedent to the reception or consideration of such bid, it be accompanied by a certified check upon one of the State or National banks or trust companies of The City of New York, or a check of such bank or trust company signed by a duly authorized officer thereof, drawn to the order of the Comptroller, or money or corporate stock or certificates of indebtedness of any nature issued by The City of New York, which the Comptroller shall approve as of equal value with the security required in the advertisement to the amount of not less than three nor more than five per centum of the amount of the bond required, as provided in section 420 of the Greater New York Charter.

All bids for supplies must be submitted in duplicate.

The certified check or money should not be enclosed in the envelope containing the bid, but should be either inclosed in a separate envelope addressed to the head of the Department, President or Board, or submitted personally upon the presentation of the bid.

For particulars as to the quantity or quality of the supplies, or the nature and extent of the work, reference must be made to the specifications, schedules, plans, etc., on file in the said office of the President, Board or Department.
