Sanitary Bureau.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending February 28, 1880:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,499, as follows, viz.: 1 public building, 885 tenement houses, 71 private dwellings, 64 other dwellings, 16 manufactories and workshops, 9 stores and warehouses, 30 stables, 36 slaughter-houses, 1 lime-kiln, 1 garbage dump, 2 manure dumps, 1 stock yard, 1 public sewer, 9 sunken and vacant lots, 1 lodging-house, 1 bone and rag house, 21 yards, courts, and areas, 74 cellars and basements, 88 waste pipes and drains, 87 privies and water-closets, 10 streets, gutters, and sidewalks, 7 dangerous stairways, 1 piggery, 5 smoky chimneys, 24 other nuisances, together with 55 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 774.

During the past week 90 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 48 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

97 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 68 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 53 houses, 53 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

3 cases of contagious disease were removed to Hospital by the Ambulance Corps.

The following is a record of the work performed in the Sanitary Bureau for the week ending March 6, 1880:

The total number of inspections made by the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors was 1,647, as follows, viz.: 2 public buildings, 898 tenement houses, 63 private dwellings, 87 other dwellings, 16 manufactories and workshops, 18 stores and warehouses, 40 stables, 1 tripe factory, 3 lodging-houses, 2 foundries, 15 slaughter-houses, 1 public bridge, 1 railroad cut, 1 stream, 1 rag house, 28 sunken and vacant lots, 52 yards, courts, and areas, 62 cellars and basements, 96 waste-pipes and drains, 129 privies and water-closets, 18 street gutters and sidewalks, 4 dangerous stairways, 1 cesspool, 8 smoky chimneys, 25 other nuisances, together with 75 visits of the Sanitary Inspectors to cases of contagious disease.

The number of reports thereon received from the Inspectors was 887.

During the past week 97 complaints were received from citizens, and referred to the Sanitary and Assistant Sanitary Inspectors for investigation and report.

Permits were issued to the consignees of 53 vessels to discharge cargoes, on vouchers from the Health Officer of the Port.

108 permits were granted scavengers to empty, clean, and disinfect privy sinks.

The Disinfecting Corps have visited 88 premises where contagious diseases were found, and have disinfected and fumigated 76 houses, 76 privy sinks, together with clothing, bedding, etc.

Bureau of Vital Statistics.

The certificates of 574 births, 45 still-births, 142 marriages, and 541 deaths, reported to have taken place in this city, were received by this Bureau during the week ending Saturday, February 28, 1880. This shows an increase of 59 births, 3 still-births, and 22 deaths, and a decrease of 40 marriages, when compared with the number received during the preceding week, but when compared with the corresponding week of the year 1879, there was an increase of 54 births, and a decrease of 6 still-births, 61 marriages, and 59 deaths. Compared with the mortality reported during the preceding week, the deaths from scarlatina decreased 5; whooping cough, 2; typhoid fever, 1; malarial fevers, 2; bronchitis, 8; heart diseases, 8; marasmus, tabes mesenterica and scrofula, 2; hydrocephalus and tubercular meningitis, 2; gastritis, enteritis, and peritonitis, 2; surgical operations, 2; suicides, 3; while the deaths from measles increased 8; diphtheria, 10; erysipelas, 2; puerperal diseases, 6; inanition 1; rheumatism and gout, 4; cancer, 3; phthisis pulmonalis, 3; aneurism, 2; meningitis and encephalitis, 7; convulsions, 2; apoplexy, 7; all diseases of the brain and nervous system, 17; cirrhosis and hepatitis, 2; Bright's disease and nephritis, 5; cyanosis and atelectasis, 1; premature and preterm births, 5; and drowning, 2. The number of deaths from croup, diarrhoeal diseases, alcoholism, and pneumonia, was the same in the two succeeding weeks.

Deaths from the principal Zymotic Diseases, Phthisis Pulmonalis, Pneumonia, Bronchitis, and Children under five years of age, reported during the week and compared with the three preceding weeks.

The number of hours the lamps are to be kept burning during the contract is 4,000.

The amount of security required is \$60,000 on all contracts which will amount to \$100,000 or more; and on smaller contracts the security shall be sixty per cent. of the total amount of the bid.
