

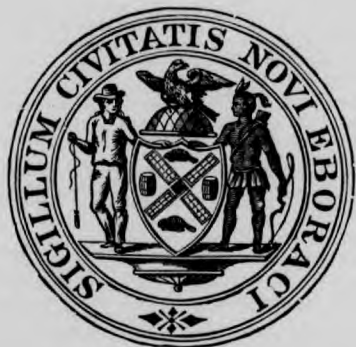

BOARD OF ALDERMEN.

WEDNESDAY, August 31, 1887, 1 o'clock P. M.

MOTIONS AND RESOLUTIONS.

Alderman Flynn moved that when this Board adjourns it do adjourn to meet again on Friday, September 2, 1887, at one o'clock P. M.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said motion. Which was decided in the affirmative.

By Alderman Cowie—

Resolved, That John L. Wilkie and Daniel McKernan Simpson be and each is hereby appointed a Commissioner of Deeds in and for the City and County of New York. Which was referred to the Committee on Salaries and Offices.

By Vice-President Divver—

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to the J. M. Horton Ice Cream Co. to extend a vault on the northwest corner of New Chambers and William streets, the said vault to extend two feet beyond the curb-line on New Chambers street, and running along New Chambers street ninety and one-half feet west from William street, and to extend six feet beyond the curb-line on William street, and running along William street north from New Chambers street sixteen feet one inch, provided the said J. M. Horton Ice Cream Co. shall pay the usual fee, and that the work be done in a durable and workmanlike manner, and provided the said J. M. Horton Ice Cream Co. stipulates with the Commissioner of Public Works to save the city harmless from any loss or damage that may occur through the extension of said vault, during or subsequent to the completion of the said extension, the work to be done at their own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works ; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council. Which was referred to the Committee on Public Works.

By Alderman Flynn—

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to Robert Peach to retain the stand for the sale of fruit, oysters, etc., in front of No. 33 Coenties Slip, on the curb-line ; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council. Which was referred to the Committee on Public Works.

By Alderman Smith—

Resolved, That crosswalks of three courses of blue stone be laid across the Boulevard, Avenue A, on a line parallel and within the lines of the sidewalks on the northerly and southerly sides of Eighty-fifth street, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works, the expense to be paid from the appropriation for "Boulevards, Roads and Avenues, Maintenance of." Which was referred to the Committee on Street Pavements.

By Alderman Long—

Resolved, That the vacant lots on the southeast corner of Madison avenue and One Hundred and Twelfth street, extending about one hundred and forty feet on Madison avenue and about seventy feet on One Hundred and Twelfth street, be fenced in, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works ; and that the accompanying ordinance therefor be adopted. Which was referred to the Committee on Public Works.

Alderman Ficke moved that the Committee on Street Pavements be discharged from the further consideration of the following :

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to the property-owners in and on the four blocks on West End avenue, between Seventy-second and Seventy-sixth streets, to pave the roadways of said four blocks with Trinidad Asphalt pavement, at their own expense ; the pavement to be also kept in good order at their own expense for the period of five (5) years ; the work to be done under the direction and to the satisfaction of the Commissioner of Public Works, without any charge to the city ; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council. The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said motion. Which was decided in the affirmative.

The President then put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution. Which was decided in the affirmative.

By Alderman John Murray—

Resolved, That Michael Ford be and he is hereby appointed a Commissioner of Deeds in and for the City and County of New York. Which was referred to the Committee on Salaries and Offices.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS.

Alderman Van Rensselaer called up G. O. 399, being a resolution and ordinance, as follows :
AN ORDINANCE to amend subdivisions 11 and 14 of section 107 of article VIII. of chapter 8 of the Revised Ordinances of 1880, relating particularly to stands for hackney coaches.

The Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of New York do ordain as follows :

Section 1. Subdivision 11 of section 107 of article VIII. of chapter 8 of the above-entitled ordinances is hereby amended by striking therefrom the word "North" before the word "West," so that said subdivision, when so amended, shall read as follows :

"Stand No. 11—West and south sides of Madison Square."

Sec. 2. Subdivision 14 of section 107 of article VIII. of chapter 8 of the above-entitled ordinances is hereby amended by striking therefrom the word "Sixth" before the word "avenue" and inserting in lieu thereof the word "Seventh," so that said subdivision 14, when so amended, shall read as follows :

"Stand No. 14—At the junction of Broadway, Seventh avenue, or the squares Forty-third to Forty-seventh street."

Sec. 3. All ordinances or parts of ordinances inconsistent or conflicting with the provisions of this ordinance are hereby repealed.

Sec. 4. This ordinance shall take effect immediately.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said ordinance. Which was decided in the affirmative.

Alderman Van Rensselaer called up G. O. 414, being a resolution, as follows :

Resolved, That permission be and the same is hereby given to the Eden Musée to suspend two gas bracket lamps, of the pattern designated in the drawing accompanying this resolution, from the wall of the building known as the Eden Musée, in Twenty-third street, north side, between Fifth and Sixth avenues, at a height of about twenty feet above the sidewalk, the work to be done and gas supplied at their own expense, under the direction of the Commissioner of Public Works ; such permission to continue only during the pleasure of the Common Council.

The President put the question whether the Board would agree with said resolution. Which was decided in the affirmative.

Which was decided in the affirmative.

M.

AT A MEETING OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH
of the Health Department of the City of New York,
held at its office on the 24th day of August, 1887, the
following resolutions were adopted:

Resolved, That under the power conferred by law upon
the Health Department, the following amendment of the
Sanitary Code for the security of life and health be and
the same is hereby adopted, and declared to form a
portion of the Sanitary Code.

Resolved, That section 206 of the Sanitary Code be and
is hereby amended so as to read as follows:

Section 206. No privy vault or cesspool shall be allowed
to remain on any premises, or shall be built in the City
of New York, unless when unavoidable and in accordance
with the terms of a permit issued by the Board of
Health. The sides and bottom of every privy vault,
cesspool or school-sink in the City of New York must be
impermeable and secured against any saturation of
the walls or the ground above the same.

also with the name of the person or persons presenting
the same, and the date of its presentation.

Any bidder for this contract must be known to be en-
gaged in and well prepared for the business, and must
have satisfactory testimonials to that effect; and the
person or persons to whom the contract may be awarded
will be required to give security for the performance of
the contract by his or their bond, with two sufficient
sureties, each in the amount of twenty thousand dollars
(\$20,000).

Bidders are required to submit their estimates upon
the following express conditions, which shall apply to and
become part of every estimate received:

1st. Bidders must satisfy themselves, by personal ex-
amination of the location of the proposed work, and by
such other means as they may prefer, as to the accuracy
of the estimate, and shall not at any time after the sub-
mission of an estimate, dispute or complain of the state-

ment of quantities, nor assert that there was any misun-
derstanding in regard to the nature or amount of the
work to be done.

2d. Bidders will be required to complete the entire
work to the satisfaction of the Armory Board, and
in substantial accordance with the specifications of the
contract and the plans therein referred to. No extra
compensation beyond the amount payable for the work
before mentioned, which shall be actually performed, at
the prices therefor to be specified by the lowest bidder,
shall be due or payable for the entire work.

Bidders will state in their estimates a price for the
whole of the work to be done, in conformity with the

NOTICE TO CROTON WATER CONSUMERS.

NUMEROUS APPLICATIONS HAVE BEEN made to this Department by citizens claiming reductions or rebates on bills for water supplied through meters, on the alleged ground of leakage caused by defective plumbing and worn-out service pipes, or by wilful waste of water by tenants allowing the faucets to be turned on in full force in water-closets, sinks, etc., without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the premises.

The main object of the use of water-meters is to enable this Department to detect and check the useless and unwarrantable waste of an element so valuable and essential to the health and comfort of all the citizens, and this object can only be accomplished by enforcing payment for the water wasted.

Under the law all charges for water supplied through meters are a lien against the respective premises, and the law therefore holds the owner of the premises responsible for the amount of water used or wasted.

No ice is therefore given to all householders that, in all further applications for reduction of water rents, no allowance will be made on account of waste of water occurring through leaks, from defective service pipes or plumbing, or wasteful use of water by tenants or occupants of buildings, though such leakage or waste may have occurred without the knowledge or consent of the owners of the buildings.

House-owners are further notified that whenever their premises become vacant, and are likely to remain vacant, they must notify this Department in writing, and that unless this requirement is complied with no deductions in extra water rents will be allowed for any portion of one year.
